Vandals Knock Down Over 150 Delineators Friday

COUNTY—During the early morning hours of Friday, July 29, vandals struck Callahan County. Approximately 150 delineators on the access roads on both sides of I-20, running from Hanner Chevrolet to 604, were senselessly knocked down.

According to Department of Highways and Public Transportation spokesman, Ed Wheeler, the total cost of the damage will run around \$1,200.

The highway department completed

work on the delineators Tuesday morning, after 4 employees worked 2½ days on the project.

Wheeler also reported that 20 delineators on the East Business route were knocked down Saturday night, July 30. The highway department has already restored these delineators, however.

Sheriff Bill Skinner noted that one streetlight was also shot out Friday, in addition to the other vandalism. The sheriff's department is still investigating the incident.

County Schools Lunch Program Explained

COUNTY—The Baird, Eula and Clyde schools will again offer free and reduced-priced lunches to school children from families who fall within certain income eligibility brackets. This is to comply with Public Law 105 enacted October 7, 1975. Each student will be offered the opportunity to participate.

The schools serve nutritious meals every school day. At Baird the lunch prices are: Kindergarten through grade 5--55¢; grades 6-12 will pay 60¢ will adults pay 75¢.

will be 7¢ per half-pint.

Eula lunch prices will be 50¢ for students and 75¢ for adults.

Clyde lunch prices are: grades 1 through 5--50¢; grades 6-12--60¢ and adults--60¢

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the following scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals, they are also eligible for free extra milk.

The reduced price for lunch is 20¢.

If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter cost in excess of 30 per cent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, complete the application you will receive from the schools through your child and return it to the school. Within ten days of receiving your application the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by call-

ing or writing the school superintendent.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application when you receive it.

Whenever possible, you are encouraged to pay by the week, month or six-weeks for your child's lunches.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child-feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

whipped Cross Plains, 10-2, as Bill Earp hurled a two-hitter.

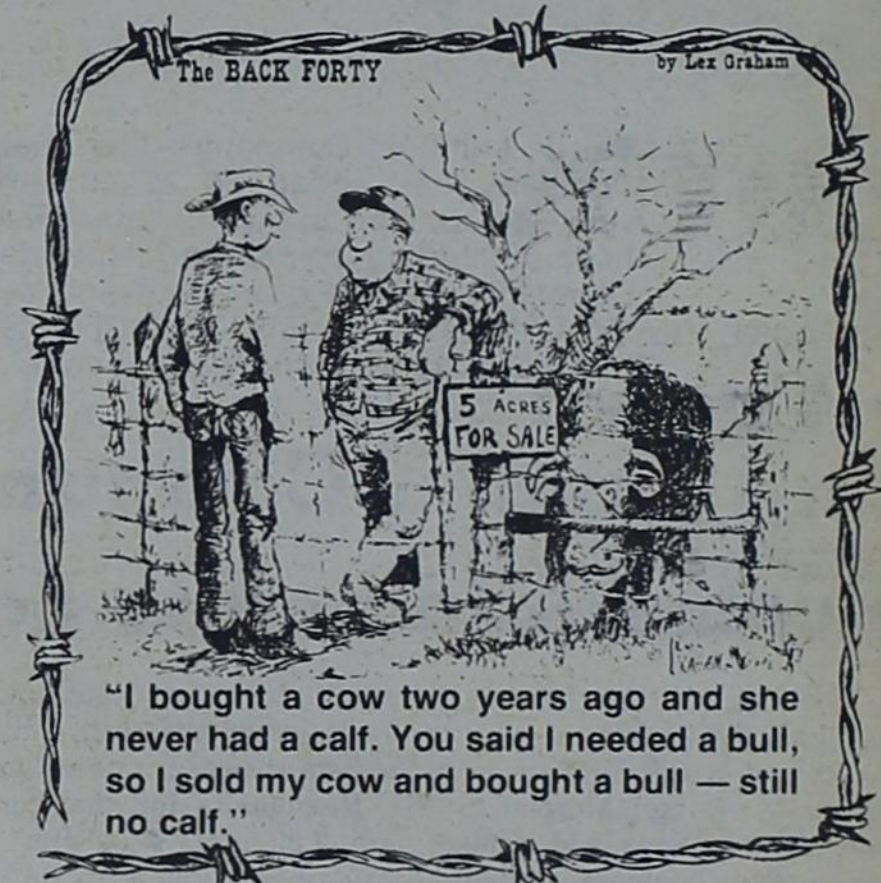
Then in the championship game, Baird outlasted the Cougars again, 11-8.

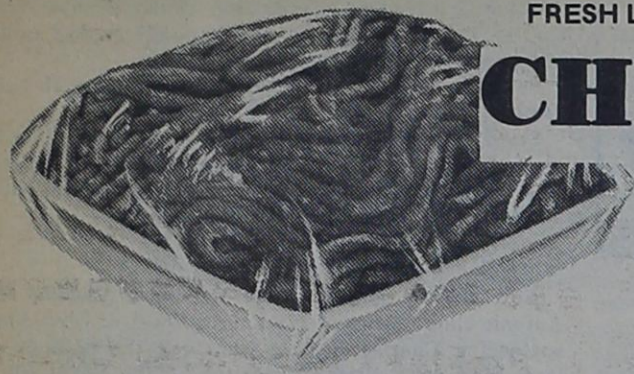

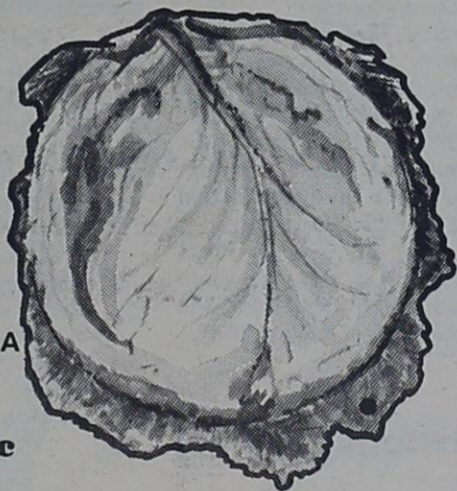

A graduate of Abilene High School, Miss Rose is employed by Valley Faucet, Abilene.

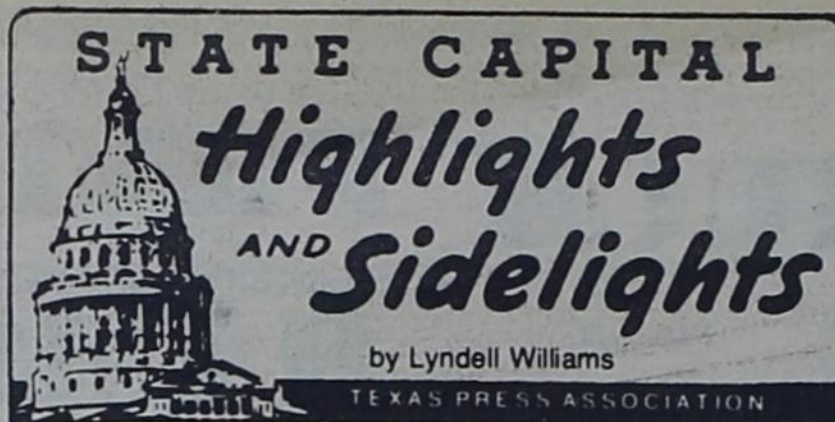
Wilson was graduated from Clyde High School and Cisco Junior College. He is employed by the Abilene Lumber Truss Plant.

AUSTIN—Nine mayors from Texas coastal towns made a trip to Washington to try and revive Seadock, the proposed \$700 million Texas offshore terminal facility.

But major oil companies, part of the consortium which planned the facility 26 miles off Freeport to unload foreign oil, said there is little hope.

The companies claimed the federal government attached too stringent terms to licensing and made their sizable investment unsound. Gulf, Mobil and Exxon, which pledged 52 per cent of Seadock's financing, pulled out.

Advocates of the superfort believe it can save \$1 a barrel on imported oil costs, permitting transportation of the oil in supertankers which are too large for most existing ports.

Meanwhile, Gov. Dolph Briscoe has signed into law legislation which would permit the state to finance an offshore terminal if Seadock folds as expected.

The bill provides for issue of revenue bonds through a deepwater port authority to build the facility. Revenue would come from users of the terminal, and the state's credit would not be obligated.

The legislation also insures that federal licensing requirements must impose no financial liability (such as for oil spills) on the state.

Tax Expanding

Revenue from 10 state occupation taxes has grown 133 per cent in the last five years—to a total of nearly \$1 billion in 1976.

Bullock said oil and gas production taxes led the big increase, leaping from \$305.2 million in 1972 to \$793.7 million last year.

Oil and gas production taxes account for 80 per cent of all occupation tax revenue in Texas. Gas production taxes jumped 219 per cent and oil taxes 125 per cent

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene spotted No. 1 K.G. Sharp in the regular field three miles southwest of Baird.

Slated for 1,600 feet, it spots 1,325 feet from the north and 1,341 feet from the east lines of Victoria CSL Survey 9.

HLM Oil Co. of Abilene staked two regular field locations three miles northeast of Putnam.

Both are on the G.S. Pruet 80-acre lease and slated for 700 feet.

No. 8 Pruet will be drilled 460 feet from the south and 1,798 feet from the west lines of Section 2270, TE&L Survey.

Site for No. 9 Pruet is 770 feet from the south and 1,790 feet from the west lines of Section 2270.

Margaret Amsler of McGregor, James DeAnda of McAllen, Sloan B. Blair of Fort Worth and Warlich Carr of Lubbock are new members of the State Board of Law Examiners.

Court Speaks

The Supreme Court invalidated efforts of the Texas Welfare Department to collect child support payments from out of state men for children born out of wedlock.

The high court accepted for review an appeal in a Kerrville case involving school district employees' liability for injuries to students when the district is free of liability.

A Corpus Christi physician also won high court review of lower court decisions awarding community property and insurance proceeds to the children of his second wife whom he was accused of shooting to death negligently.

Still another appeal will be heard from royalty owners from lower court rulings affecting oil and gas royalties in Live Oak County. The controversy centers on wells drilled into deeper strata from the same lease.

The Supreme Court found a Baytown youth is entitled to \$9,625 for a serious cut on his left arm while playing tag on a city tennis court.

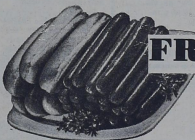

Registration For CJC Students Now

CISCO-Cisco Junior College is now registering students for the up-coming fall of 1977.

CJC now has a continuous registration plan whereby students may register several weeks in advance for school terms that are approaching.

Mr. Olin O. Odom III emphasized that students who are planning to at-

tend college at Cisco or one of its extension locations during the fall should go ahead and pre-register. They may register at the main campus at Cisco, at the Community College Center of Abilene, or at the Clyde Educational Center in Clyde. "Clyde and Merkel students can pre-register at our Abilene offices. We would prefer that they do so if it is convenient for them" stated Mr. Odom.

Offices at the Cisco campus and the CCCA offices at 1600 Sherman in Abilene are open from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Clyde Educational Center offices in downtown Clyde are open for pre-registration between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon.

In addition to the continuous pre-registration, regular registration will be held at Coleman on August 25, from 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. and regular registration will be held in Merkel on August 25, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Local Firemen Attend School

BAIRD-Three members of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department attended the Texas Fireman's Training School at Texas A&M University July 24 through July 29.

Chief Pat McKennon was enrolled in Fire Prevention I, which included classes in fire prevention inspections and fire cause detection. Gary Edwards completed the Firefighting I course, which included classes in pump operations and commercial-retail complex fires. Larry Newton attended the Firefighting III course which covered such areas as hazardous chemicals and fire attack simulation.

Due to the successful completion of these courses the citizens of Baird will receive a 5 per cent credit in the city key rate, which is used to figure fire insurance premiums.

A greater savings to the community than the key rate credit is the reduction of local fire losses which should be brought about by the use of efficient fire fighting methods and fire prevention measures that are taught during the school.

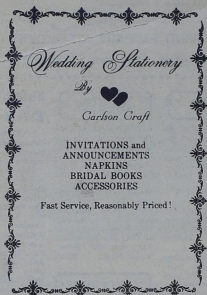

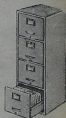
