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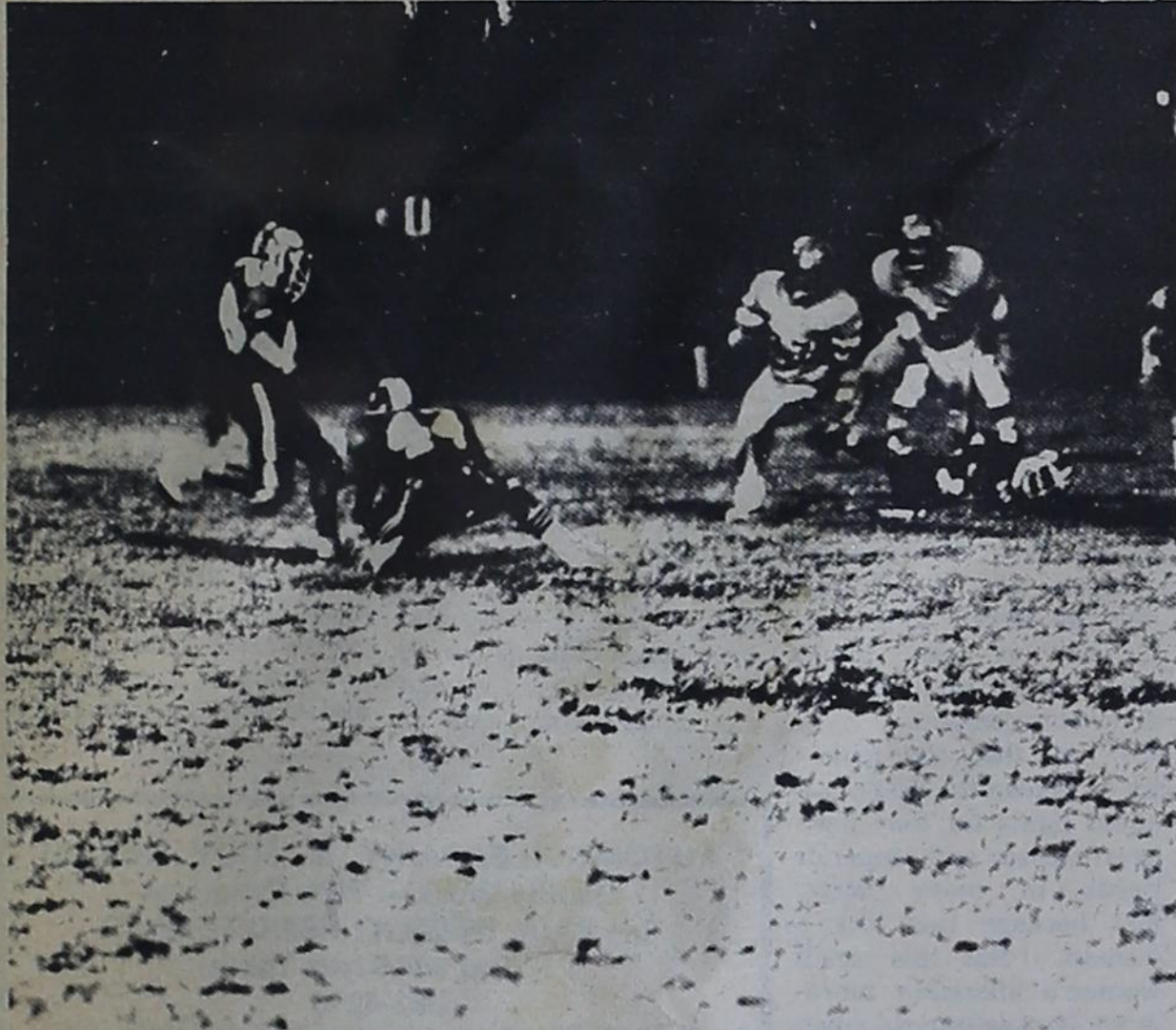

The Baird Bears were defeated in their first district ballgame 21-13 by the Albany Lions. The Bears did everything but win on the scoreboard where it counts.

The Bears had a total offense of 302 yards while the Lions had 224 yards. In first downs the Bears had 17 to 8 for the Lions.

Chris Vestal has 23 yards in seven carries and completed 8 of 22 passes for 103 yards, Mo Gonzales completed two passes for 550 yards, Jim Sadler caught 6 of 8 passes for 96 yards and Gary Smith caught 3 of 6 passes for 62 yards.

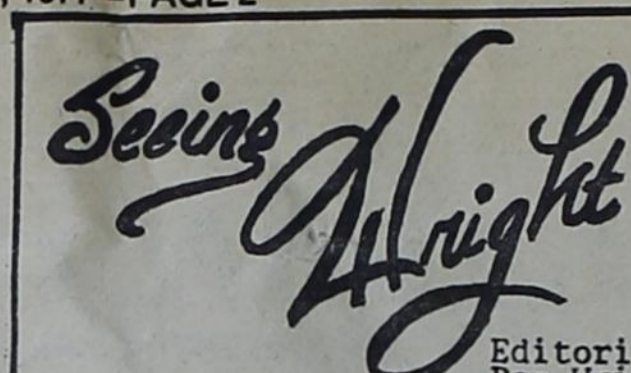
Mrs. W.P. Brightwell as club counselor, reported that memorial gifts are sought for the repair and maintenance of the TFWC Headquarters at Austin.

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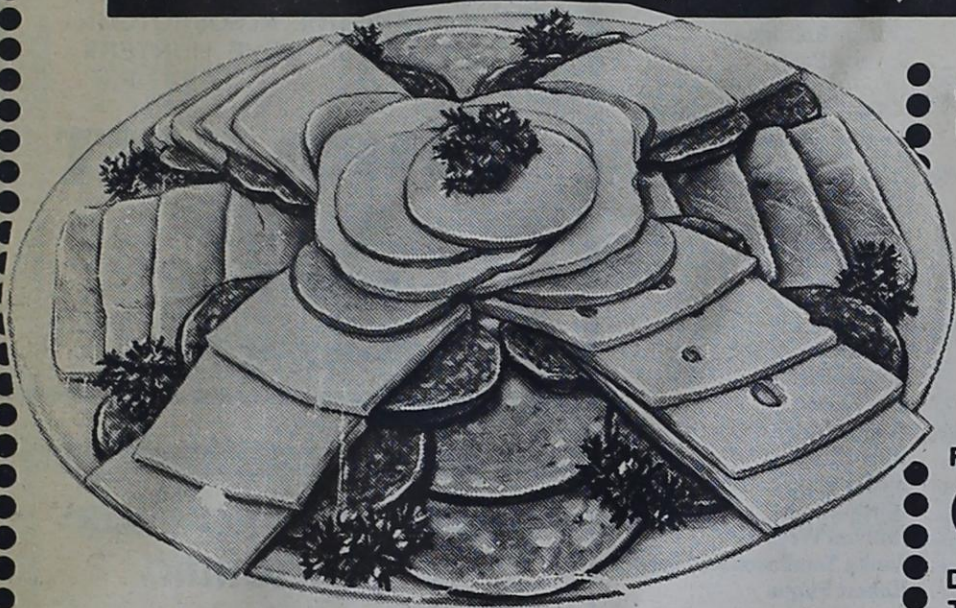
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Clyde '66-'67 Grads Reunion Set

Stenholm for Congress 17th Congressional Dis.

Charles Stenholm announced Tuesday, October 4, his candidacy for congress from the 17th Congressional District.

The Stenholms traveled on two buses accompanied by supporters from their home town, visiting 23 communities for announcement rallies throughout the day.

The reason for the bus tours, Stenholm said, "is to bring my announce-

ment to as many people as possible and to make this a district-wide campaign right from the start."

Stenholm, a Stamford resident, emphasized in his announcement that all residents, regardless of whether they lived on the farms, in small towns, or larger cities of the district, have a stake in what happens to the district's basic source of wealth, which is land. "What

helps the producers of food, fiber, and energy," he said, "helps us all; and what hurts them hurts us all."

Stenholm cautioned that district residents should not consider the problems of this area without looking at problems in other areas of the economy. "Businessmen, manufacturing people, consumers, agricultural and energy producers, and senior citizens share the same basic problems: Cost of production and cost of living are rising every day because of inflation; government regulations that have no relation to the

needs of the country to punish producers and consumers instead of encouraging production, initiative and peace of mind.

Speaking to on-lookers at each brief stop, Stenholm said that the 17th District is unique among congressional districts in that voters can send someone to congress who knows the problems of agriculture, business, rural and urban areas from a lifetime of living and working in the district. He added that the numbers of individuals involved in agriculture and energy production had decreased at a time when this production has increased in importance to the country.

"When you consider that the voice of this important segment of our economy has decreased in Washington where the laws, rules, and guidelines are written that regulate the economy where we all make our living," Stenholm said, then the importance of sending "someone to Washington who understands the needs of a district whose livelihood is tied to the land makes the uniqueness of the 17th District very crucial."

The day tour ended in Big Spring Tuesday evening with a rally.

Stenholm is seeking the congressional seat now held by Omar Bureson.

Bureson announced in August that he would retire at the end of his current term in 1978.

Southwestern Gas Pipeline Inc. of Dallas completed No. 1 Roy Tatum in the Delight (duffer) Field two miles northeast of Cottonwood in Callahan County.

Location is 400 feet from the north and 430 feet from the west lines of Lot 4, Lavaca CSL Survey 6.

Absolute open flow was 160,000 cubic feet of gas daily. It had a gas-liquid, hydrocarbon ratio of 300,000-1 of 52 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 3,818-30 feet, treated with 1,250 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 24,000 gallons of water and 36,000 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4.5-inch casing at 3,870 feet and the hole is bottomed at 3,868 feet.

Bruce A. Wilbanks of Midland completed No. 1 Slaughter in the Putnam, North (Duffer) Field five miles northwest of Putnam.

Generation units at the company's power plants

are connected with the computer, and the desired output from each unit under various conditions is obtained in the most efficient manner.

The equipment is located in the System Operations Office at North 4th and Plum in Abilene and is operated under the direction

Yancy said the new program is especially beneficial now when the cost of boiler fuel is so high. The computer automatically adjusts generation to minimize total fuel consumption.

The computer also aids in the interchange of power between WTU and other companies by allowing

the dispatcher to evaluate the advisability of purchasing or selling power at any given time under set of circumstances.

THE DESOLATE WILDERNESS

Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620:

"So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting place for above eleven years, but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to heaven, their dearest country, where God had prepared for them a city (Hebrews 11:16) and therein quieted their spirits.

"When they came to Delfs-Haven they found a ship and all their things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take leave of them. One night was spent with little sleep with most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other expressions of true Christian love.

"The next day they went on board, and their friends with them, where truly doleful was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speeches pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with the most fervent prayers unto the Lord and His blessings, and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them.

"Being now past the vast ocean, in a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succor; and for the season, it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to no places, much more to search unknown coasts.

"Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to heaven) they could have but little solace or content and respect of any outward object, for summer being ended, all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country full of woods and thickets, represent a wilde and savage hew.

"If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had past, and was now as a main bar of gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world."

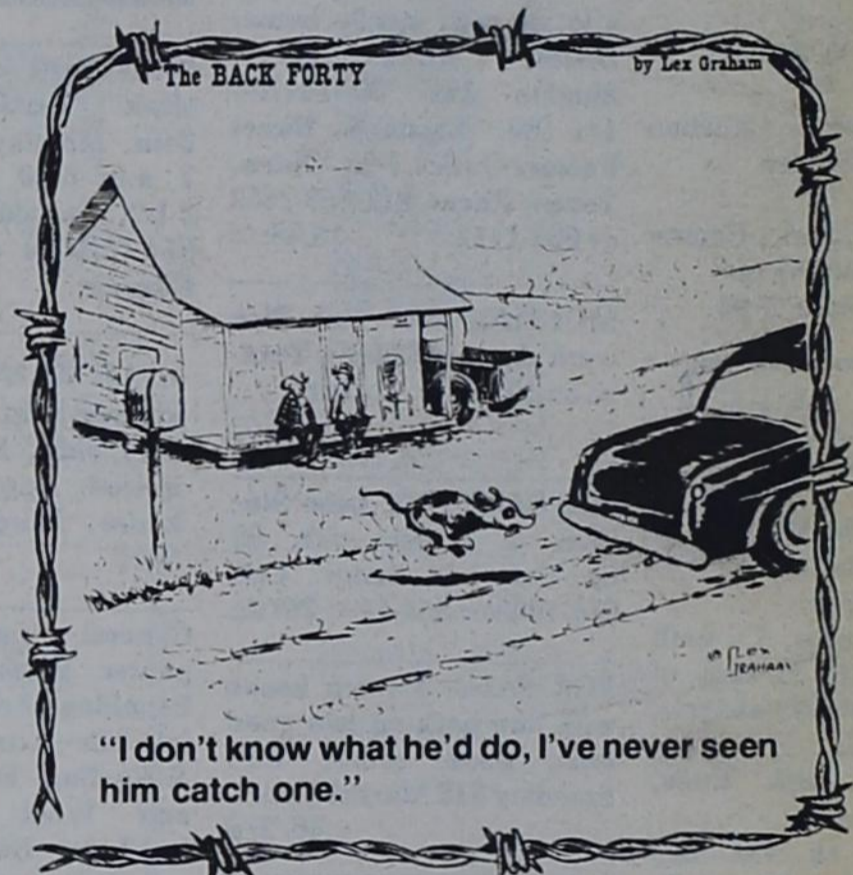
