Majority At Haskell Favors Water Authority

Some 300 citizens of the area heard the Haskell water situation discussed pro and con last Tuesday night at a mass meeting in the Haskell courthouse, with a majority of those present indicating they favored the proposed North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

Principal questions asked during the 2½-hour session concerned Haskell's need for an additional source of water, the quality of water from the proposed Miller Creek reservoir and the tax rate required to finance the program.

Chief spokesman for opposition to the NCTMWA program was former Haskell mayor Courtney Hunt, who said, first, "We don't need any more water today," and second, that Haskell had "equal rights with Stamford in all water, over 10,000 acre feet, in Lake Stamford." Hunt took good naturedly a round of laughter which greeted his statement.

Joe D. Carter, chairman of the State Water Commission at Austin; Jimmy Nichols, Fort Worth engineer; and Frank McMahon, Dallas bond financing attorney, answered questions submitted by the group.

These men stated the NCTMWA project was feasible and economical and that Miller Creek was one of the last favorable sites for development of municipal water source.

Carter, in remarking about Haskell securing water from the lake belonged to Stamford Lake Stamford, pointed out that people who had paid for it, and they would have the say-so as to who received water from the lake.

Tom Bullington, Munday attorney, presided as moderator. Although a stormy session had been expected, the meeting was conducted in an orderly manner and there was no boisterous debate.

Wheatley To Attend Tax Policy Meeting

Rep. J. C. (Carl) Wheatley has been requested to attend a meeting of the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy in Dallas on Friday, March 30th.

House Concurrent Resolution 5, 57th Legislature, 3rd called session, directs this commission to make a "comprehensive study of proposed or prospective changes" in the Texas Limited Sales, Excise and Use Tax.

Rep. Wheatley encourages the assistance of the people of the 83rd Legislative District, which is composed of Jones, Haskell, Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton Counties, to submit to him proposals to correct the inequities of the sales tax in as much detail as possible.

Even though Rep. Wheatley voted against this Sales Tax, since it was enacted and is now the law he believes that all possible efforts should be made to correct the inequities that have become evident since the law went into effect.

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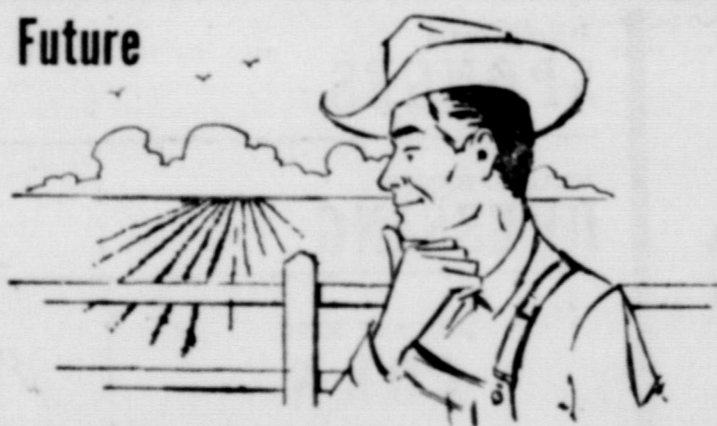

Knox Prairie Philosopher Claims Tourist Business Is Fine Until All The Other States Get In On It

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek takes a backward look at the tourist business, his letter this week reveals.



Dear editor:
I read the other day that a state official said Texas isn't getting all the tourist dollars it ought to and more effort ought to be spent getting more people to visit us, that not only is the state worth seeing but tourists leave a lot of money around when they come through.
This made sense, but then the next day I read where another state was making the same plea, then the article went on to list the amount of revenue several other states report they get from tourist dollars.
Now I'm no mathematician, but if Texas pulls a hundred thousand visitors from New Mexico, and then that state pulls a hundred thousand from Texas, it looks to me like the net gain will stay about what it was before the tourists left home, although filling station people in both states won't agree.
If all 50 states are going to increase their wealth by increasing their tourist business, each one pulling visitors from all the others, it looks to me like it'll wind up with about the same total revenue every state had to start with.
For example, if Oregon pulls a million tourists from Texas, and Texas pulls a million from Oregon, or New York gets a million from California and vice versa, or any other combination you want to name, won't this be about like everybody in Munday trying to make money by taking

in each other's laundry? Understand, I don't blame the states for trying to pick up some tourist money, every state I ever heard of needs more revenue, and the tourist business is here to stay, come summer and the people will strike out, but I hope no state is looking to me to help them out. Frankly, I ain't going. I intend to stay right here on this Johnson grass farm and see it on television.

Interest In Soil Tests Increasing

Soil testing is definitely on the increase in the Rolling Plains area, Roy L. McClung, Baylor County Agent, reported this week. McClung stated that the soil testing lab at Seymour had the biggest February they had ever experienced and second biggest month since opening the lab in January, 1956. This lab serves all the counties in the Rolling Plains area.

McClung, Baylor County Agent, who operates the lab and makes the recommendations says the more samples they receive the more evidence they find showing a definite need for soil testing. Many of the soils are showing an unbalanced condition in fertility. Many of the soils show a need for both nitrogen and phosphorus, some show a need for nitrogen only, while many of the sand soils show a need for nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

Until the lab started operation it was generally understood that the soils in this area contained plenty of potash but many of the sandy fields all through the Rolling Plains area are showing a definite need for potash. "There is no method of telling what the soil needs until you have the soil analyzed," McClung stated. "Just as an oil gauge measures the oil level in your car or truck; a soil test measures the fertility level in your soils."

This soils lab located at Seymour to serve the rolling plains area has recently added another \$1,500.00 worth of equipment to increase the speed and accuracy of the tests. "We are now in a position to make the analysis and get the reports back to the

farmer within 3 days to a week," McClung stated.

Jack Moore, Knox County Agent reports that more and more Knox County farmers are using the soils lab and getting good results. Moore urges Knox County farmers to have their soils tested and try small demonstration plots according to the recommendations as shown by the test. In this way you can see for yourself whether or not it will put more dollars in the bank for you. Moore says his office has a supply of soil sample bags or cartons, information sheets and will be glad to assist in any way possible in the taking of the samples or establishing the demonstration plots.

The fee for testing the soils is \$2.00 per sample. One sample should not represent more than 30 to 40 acres and should be taken in several places in the area being tested, mixed thoroughly and a composite sample taken and sent to the lab. Samples should be mailed to Soil Testing Lab, Seymour, Texas.
