The prison system sold 5239 bales of cotton at an average price of \$165.17 to remit a total of \$865,362.16 to the general revenue fund of the State of Texas.

Dr. Beto said also that the prison system retained 1100 bales, valuated at approximately \$176,000, for prison use in the manufacture of inmate uniforms, sheets, pillow slips, and mat-
