## Regulations Jopardize Rural Hospitals "Including Yours"

The congress is being faced with a proposed set of regulations from the Health, Education and Welfare. (HEW) These regulations will literally close down the rural hospitals and fee upon the larger medical centers. The regulations are so strict that only these larger medical centers can survive and the regulations border on being ridiculous.

These regulations will soon be presented to congress and it is up to us to fight for our small town and our hospital. For, if we let these regulations pass as a law we will not have a hospital.

If the rural hospitals are closed the public will drive, on the average, 55 minutes to hospitals—some will drive for four hours. This could kill your loved one in an emergency situation, when the first few minutes are vital. Heart attack victims would no doubt die, pregnant women would face an uncertain situation and your burned or seriously injured child or loved one would have very little chance if any.

Plus, these new guidelines and regulations would not give the larger hospitals any competition, they would be running

their own small scale monopoly. We would also have to tolerate the impersonal care from the larger hospitals as well as their outrageous prices.

Let us not stand back and let the government take the lives of our loved ones—Let us not let these proposed regulations become law—Let us not wake up to this fact after we have lost a loved one because we could not reach medical facilities soon enough.

We have got to stop this BEFORE it gets started for if it becomes law we will be too late.

Take the time to care and take 10 minutes of your time to sit and write a letter to your congressman opposing this. It is time that we took a strong American stand against government control on every aspect of our lives.

For more information contact any Callahan County General Hospital personnel and it is imperative that you reply before November 22.

Do your part NOW or you can't complain when it is too late to do anything about it. Your voice does count but you have to use it.

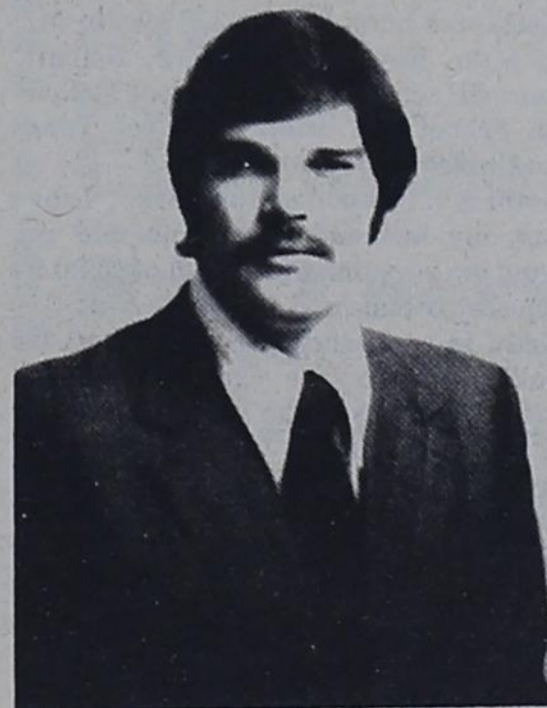
Mrs. Elliott had been in her pickup to

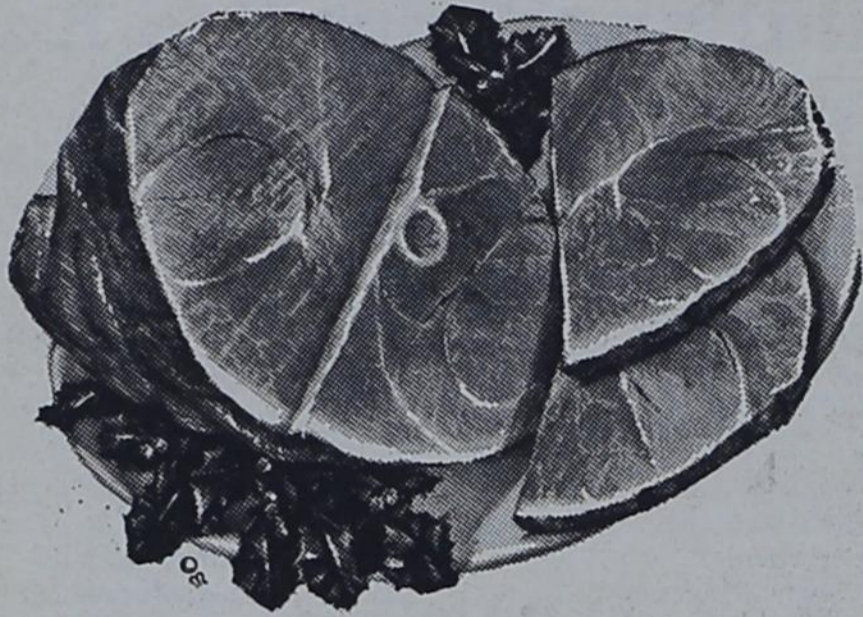

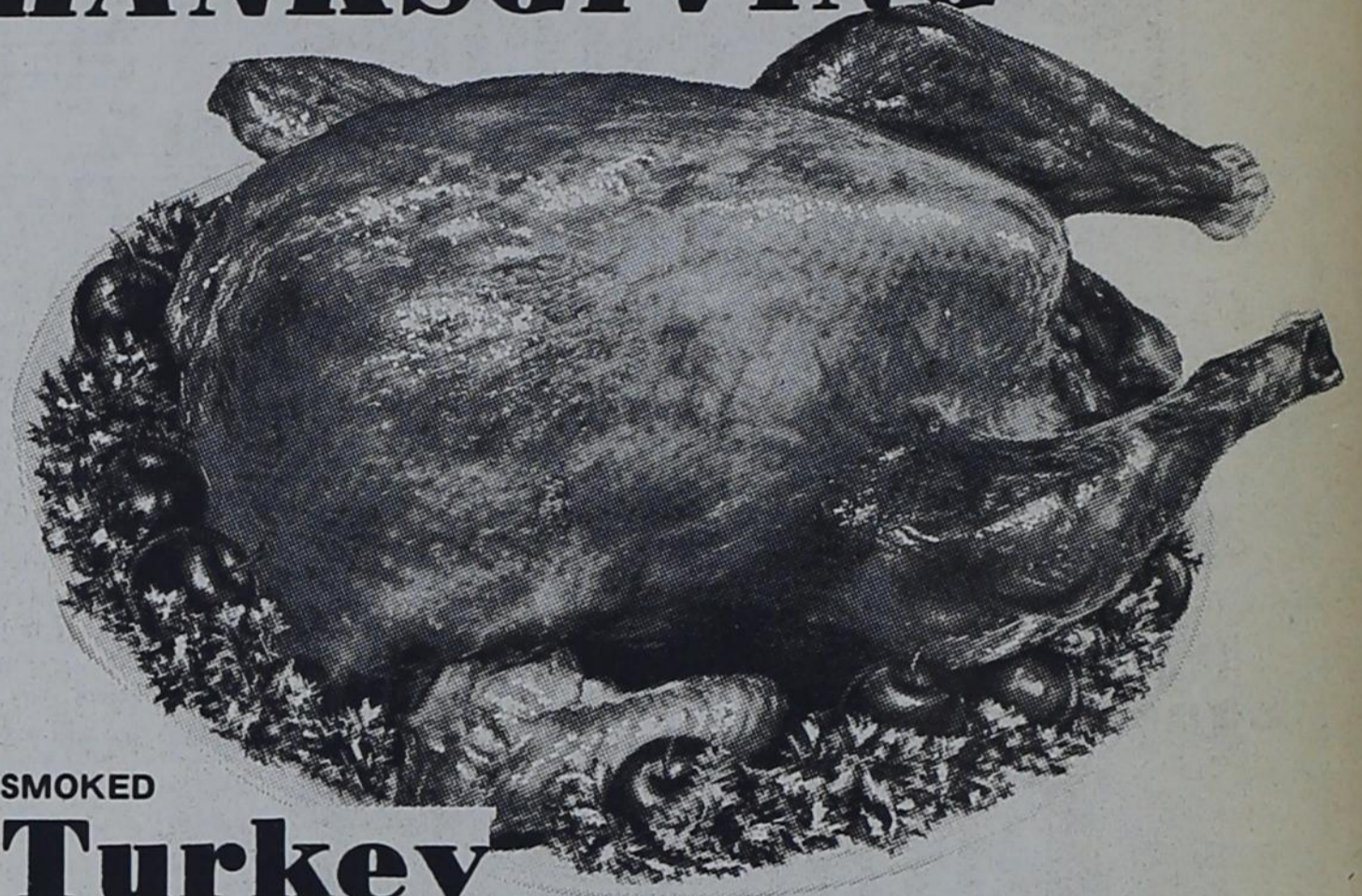

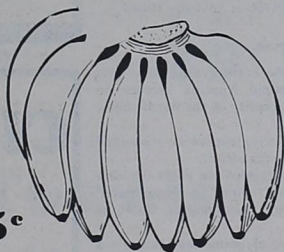

## Clydite Named Director

Gene Bland of Route 3, Clyde, Texas, is now a director of operations for the three fast food corporations headed by I.B. (Barney) Chapman II of Fort Worth.

Already director of operations for the Taco Plaza of West Texas, In., Bland has assumed additional responsibility as director of operations for the Dairy Queen of Taylor County, In., and as one of the two operations directors for the Dairy Queen of West Texas, Inc.

Announcement of Bland's new position was made by James L. Uteley of Misland, executive vice-president & chief operating officer for all three companies.

In his new job, Bland will be in charge of operations of 21 Dairy Queen and Taco Plaza restaurants.

His Dairy Queen territory encompasses six DQs in Abilene and one each in Borger, Clyde, Coleman, Dalhart, Dumas, Floydada, Haskell, Panhandle, Post & Stamford.

Bland's Taco Plaza assignment takes in all of the Chapman Mexican-style restaurants, of which four are now open in Abilene, Dumas, Midland, and Plainview. A fifth is under construction in Vernon.

The Chapman organization which also includes Dairy Queens of Central

Texas, In., extends throughout Central and West Texas and into New Mexico making Chapman the nation's largest operator of privately-owned Dairy Queen restaurants.

Bland has been with the Chapman organization for more than three years, beginning as a manager trainee in Abilene.

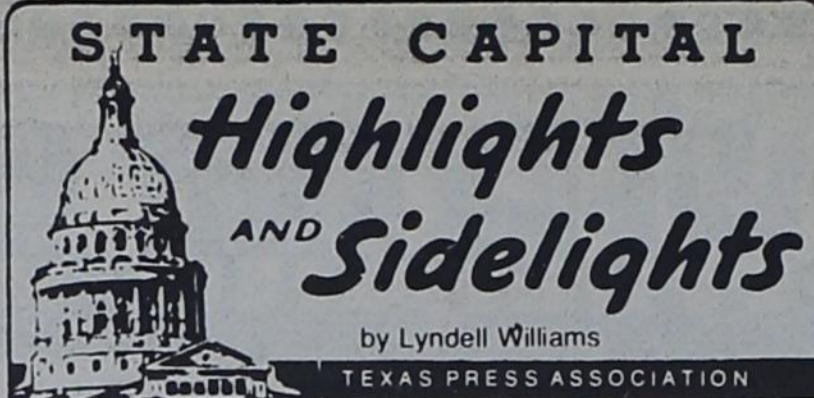
He was named manager of the Clyde DQ in August, 1974, and was promoted to area supervisor for the Abilene/Clyde area in September 1975.

Prior to joining Chapman Bland was assistant chief chemist with Occidental Petroleum in Houston and district manager of the National Linen Service in Abilene.

He is a graduate of Albany High School, Ranger Junior College and the University of Houston, where he earned his degree in chemistry. Bland also did post graduate work at Le College in Baytown.

An Army Veteran, Bland has been active in youth & civic organizations and is currently president-elect of the Clyde Chamber of Commerce.

He has two children—Bekky, 14 and Russell, 20, who works for the Chapman organization as a training manager in Midland.



AUSTIN—Texas voters have patched up the century-old state constitution five more times, but they balked at amendments to allow electronic banking and permit formation of assessment-levying agricultural associations.

These amendments were approved in a light turnout (about 12 per cent) November 8:

- Enlargement of the Court of Criminal Appeals.
- Addition of \$200 million in bonds to the veterans land program and allowing widows of servicemen who died in line of duty to participate in the long-term, low-interest land loans.
- Authorizing judges to deny bail to repeat offenders.
- Permissible tax relief for historic and cultural property.
- Strengthening and renaming the Judicial Qualifications (Conduct) Commission.

Voters rejected amendment six which would have authorized the legislature to let banks use electronic terminals at shopping centers and other locations for payments, fund transfers and money withdrawals.

Opponents claimed the amendment would open the door to branch banking and eliminate the cancelled check as proof of payment. Bankers, who championed the proposal, said it failed because of the light turnout and because voters were confused about it. Some small and independent bankers opposed the amendment too.

Also going down the drain was amendment five to authorize formation of associations of agricultural and marine commodities producers with power to levy mandatory assessments for product promotion. The proposal was little understood, and some feared it may lead to high food costs.

### Money Records Set

New revenue and expenditure records for state government were set in fiscal 1977, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock's annual report.

Nine billion dollars in revenues (and a starting cash balance) supported expenditures of \$7 billion, leaving a net cash balance of \$1.98 billion August 31.

"This favorable position was made possible by record revenues from all major sources, including \$4.42 billion in tax collections, \$1.85 billion in federal funds, \$372 million in licenses and fees, \$279 million in investments of state funds, and \$341 million in income from state-owned land," said Bullock.

Foundation school program grants accounted for 24.9 per cent of spending, salaries and wages of employees 25.4 per cent, assistance and medical care for the needy 12.8 per cent, other education 8.4 per cent and capital outlays for highways 5.7 per cent.

### Appointments Announced

Gov. Dolph Briscoe named Charles H. Schmidt of Amarillo and reappointed Dee S. Osborne of Houston to the board of regents of West Texas State University.

At the same time he reappointed Dr. J. K. Davis Armistead of Lubbock, Robert L. Grainger of Houston and James A. Elkins Jr. of Houston to the University of Houston board of regents.

He appointed Supreme Court Chief Justice Joe Greenhill, District Judge Herman Jones of Austin and C. Raymond Judice, executive director of the Texas Judicial Council, to the Criminal Justice Division Advisory Board.

### Courts Speak

A Nacogdoches County double murder conviction was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals because no separate hearing was held on the sanity of the handicapped slayer.

The Supreme Court held a lawyer cannot be disbarred solely for failure to file an income tax return.

The high court affirmed an intermediate court decision favoring Bastrop school trustees' effort to annex Paige Independent School District over objections of Giddings school authorities.

A suit by 11 bridge companies claiming the state owed them \$400,000 in extra cost for repainting bridges in 10 counties was turned down by the Supreme Court.

Retrial of a \$1 million products liability decision against General Motors was ordered by the Supreme Court in a Houston case.

### Short Snorts

The Governor's Committee on Aging awarded 30 grants totalling \$7.7 million in federal funds to support social service programs and nutrition projects for older citizens.

More than 8,000 attended a festive campaign kickoff rally for Gov. Dolph Briscoe in Dallas.

Texas slipped from third to fourth place in the national travel market in spite of a 14 per cent increase (to \$6.1 billion) in income from travellers last year, New York moved to third behind California and Florida.

Income from cigarette smoking to the State Treasury increased \$2.1 million last month—to \$24.5 million as compared with \$22.4 million in October 1976.

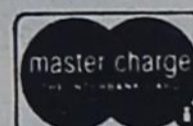

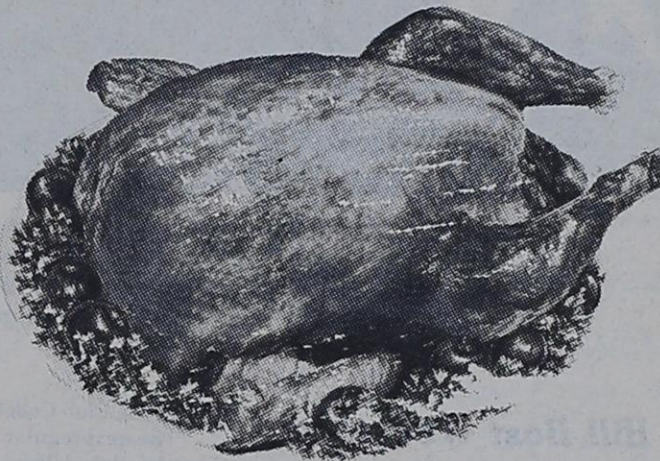

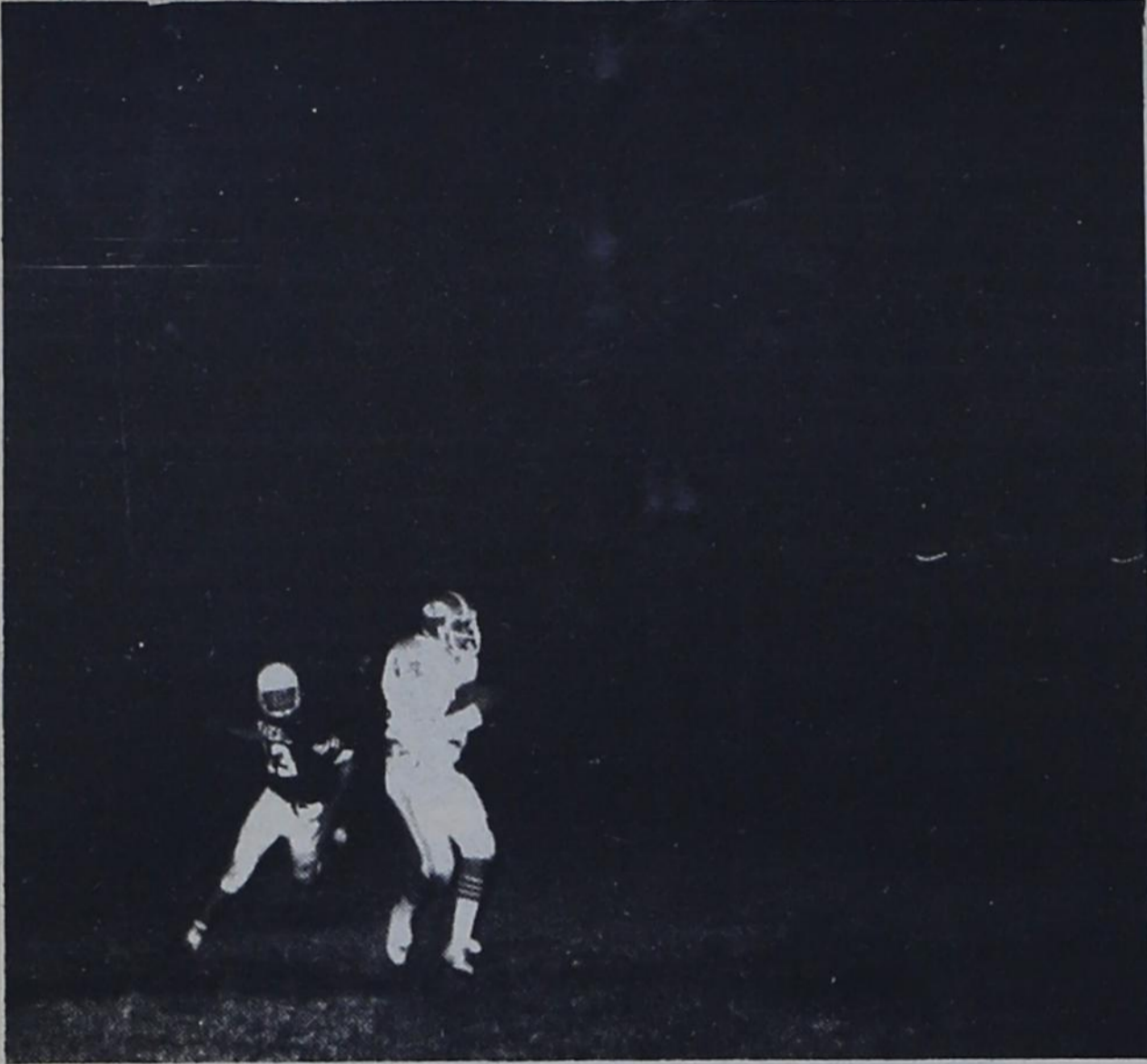

# What Is A HOSPITAL?

## Proposals May Close Small Hospitals

Hospital beds and services will be rationed if Department of Health, Education and Welfare (DHEW) proposed "standards" are adopted.

So said O. Ray Hurst, President, Texas Hospital Association (THA), Austin, as he described the DHEW proposals published in the Federal Register on September 23, 1977.

Hurst went to point out that these proposed regulations mean that within five years Texas will be required to reduce the number of hospital beds by approximately 17,500.

Hurst stated that "such loss of beds coupled with previously announced ceilings on allowable patient days means that one in every four patients that need to be admitted to a hospital will be turned away." He pointed out that this will be accomplished by forcing the closure of entire hospitals or portions of hospitals.

The proposed guidelines as published will require hospitals to have an occupancy rate of at least 80 percent over all. Also a hospital must have, in order to maintain obstetrics services, a minimum of 500 deliveries per year (2,000 in or near cities over 100,000). Hospitals will be required to comply with special restrictions on open heart surgery, cancer therapy, renal dialysis and cardiac diagnostic procedures. In addition, there are geographic restrictions on services that are available to a community with 45 minutes travel time.

Hurst pointed out that "a part of the stated purpose of these proposed guidelines is to reduce health care cost while improving the care of patients, yet no consideration is given to the medical needs of the community. The THA Statewide Hospital Productivity Center that has been in operation for two (2) years has saved Texas patients over \$100 million dollars. This type of voluntary system could be used as an example of efficiency by the private sector without Federal mandates for limiting and rationing of quality health care."

DHEW is giving the public, hospitals and physicians until November 22, 1977, to comment on these proposals. Comments will be received by Health Resources Administration, Room 10-22, 3700 East-West Highway, Hyattsville, Maryland 20782.

Hurst said, "THA is encouraging all persons interested in the continued availability in Texas of quality health care to respond to these proposed limitations. Although these proposals are from the bureaucrats, no doubt U.S. Senators and Congressmen will be interested in the public's views on these limitations and the rationing of health care."
