NOTE: "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience. by the things which he suffered: and being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation UNTO ALL THEM THAT OBEY HIM." (Hab. 5:8-9.) AGAIN: "But God be thanked, that ye were servants of sin but ye have OBEYED FROM THE HEART that form of doctrine which was delivered you. BEING THEN MADE FREE FROM SIN; ye became the servants of righteousness." We are going to have to clip this out of the Bible or else admit that a man is justified by a faith which works, and NOT BY FAITH ONLY. Let us not be "Bible clippers," but accept all of God's word.






