Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Cotton Variety Texas Demonstration

A cotton variety demonstration was planted on the Gene Thompson farm, one mile south of Munday, about two weeks ago. This demonstration plot will be clearly marked after the varieties have obtained a good stand, and the public is invited to watch its progress during the growing season.

All varieties in the demonstration are open bolls, or picker, varieties of cotton. This will be harvested with a mechanical picker so a picker efficiency can be determined on each variety.

In addition, other information that will be observed include the pounds harvested, pounds ginned, turn out, grade and staple, loan price, gross per acre, and if possible the fibre strength and quality will be determined.

A second demonstration plot has been planned for the Lloyd Waldrip farm near Knox City. Both of these plots are to be irrigated, and a third, but dry-land, demonstration is planned at Vera or Gilliland with closed bole varieties.

Springtime is clean-up time! And it's time for the annual clean-up drive in Munday. The week of May 1 to 10 has been designated as clean-up week, and all citizens are urged to cooperate in this important drive. Place plows, hoes, rakes and other tools into use next Monday and continue until your premises are thoroughly cleaned.

Clean-up week is sponsored jointly by the City of Munday and the Munday Chamber of Commerce.

Salvation Without Baptism?

It would be difficult to name a false doctrine more widespread and universally taught than the doctrine of salvation apart from baptism.

Saved Without Having Sins Remitted

If the sinner is saved without baptism, then he is saved without having his sins remitted. For Peter, inspired by the Spirit, said: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the REMISSION of your sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38). Baptism is here stated to be "for". So until one has been baptized for the remission of his sins he has not had his sins remitted! Thus no salvation.

Saved Without Being In Christ

If sinners are saved without baptism then they are saved out of Christ! "For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ. For as many of you as have been BAPTIZED INTO CHRIST have put on Christ." (Gal. 3:26-27). But can one be saved out of Christ? Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man can come unto the Father, but by me." (Jno. 14:6). Again we read, "And this is the record, that God hath given us eternal life, and this life is in his Son." (1 Jno. 5:11). Even as we put on Christ in baptism, so we put off the "old man" mentioned in Col. 3:9-10 "Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds; And have put on the new man . . ." We can't put on Christ without baptism, and we can't put off the old man of sin without baptism. Read Romans 6:3-6. It is when we come into Christ that we have every spiritual blessing. (Eph. 1:3) not out of Christ. It is in Christ that we become complete (Col. 2:10). It is in Christ where we become new creatures (2 Cor. 5:17); and have salvation (2 Tim. 2:10). Now, if one is saved without baptism, he is saved OUT of Christ where every spiritual blessing has been located by the God of heaven.

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

Last year 11,348 Texans died from the effects of malignant neoplasms, the statistical designation for all forms of cancer. For many years now, cancer has been the second ranking cause of death in Texas—and in the rest of the United States.

The only disease that ranks ahead of cancer, is heart disease and its associated vascular conditions.

Latest evaluations on the effectiveness of cancer treatment indicates that one out of every three persons discovered with the disease is cured.

But, using the conservative estimates which characterize the medical profession, half of all cancer victims could be saved if the disease were discovered early enough.

Cancer can attack almost any part of the human body. Experts in the cancer research field say that for nearly every different body tissue there is probably a separate type of cancer cell.

The leading body sites of death-dealing cancer, listed in order, are: digestive organs and the peritoneum, respiratory system (male), breast (female), genital organs (male), genital

The "Pap" test is simple, inexpensive, painless, and absolutely reliable. It involves the physician taking a uterine smear which is carefully analyzed by a pathologist. Uterine cancer could be almost completely eliminated if adult women have a "Pap" test at least once a year during a thorough physical examination.

There's no doubt about it, a yearly physical examination could save thousands of lives every year.

NEW LIFE GIVEN TO A FORMER BAYLOR CITIZEN

In the March 29th issue of the Dallas News appeared an article, with 3-column head, which featured a former Seymour citizen, L. S. Phillips. Mr. Phillips underwent a delicate, and expensive operation for the purpose of relieving a heart condition that had him pretty well doomed. The story was also carried by other papers, and the story was also carried over TV. The following paragraphs are taken from the article carried by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram:

"A week ago a complete heart block threatened to end the life of Samuel Lee Phillips, 80, a former stockman whose home in at Denton.

Then surgeons installed a heart regulator.

Before the operation, Phillips' overworked heart was trying to pump blood through arteries narrowed by hardening.

Phillips' heart had slowed to a dangerous level of 32 beats a

minute. The normal rate is about 80 beats a minute. He was suffering blackouts because his heart couldn't pump enough blood to his brain.

His doctor in Denton told Phillips about the Pacemaker, an eight-ounce machine that can be worn either inside or outside the body. Through two wires sutured into the heart, it keeps the heart beat normal.

Other paragraphs in the article told about the 2½-hour operation, which was quite an ordeal for a man who will be 81 years old this month. But the patient has done marvelously, and was released from the hospital the past week end. The article stated that not more than six people in Dallas are wearing these regulators. The little regulator is operated by a battery, which is good for five years.

Mr. Phillips was an early day citizen of the Bomarton community; and he married another early pioneer, Miss Thomas. She is a sister to Hershel Thomas of Seymour and John Thomas of

Wichita Falls. They were married in 1902. After having lived in Seymour for a short time, after selling their Bomarton farm, Mr. and Mrs. Phillips bought a place in Denton County, where they have lived since. —Baylor County Banner

Mr. Phillips came to Haskell County with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Phillips, in 1894 and lived there until his marriage to Hattie Thomas, when he moved to Baylor County. He is a brother of Mrs. Walter Patton.

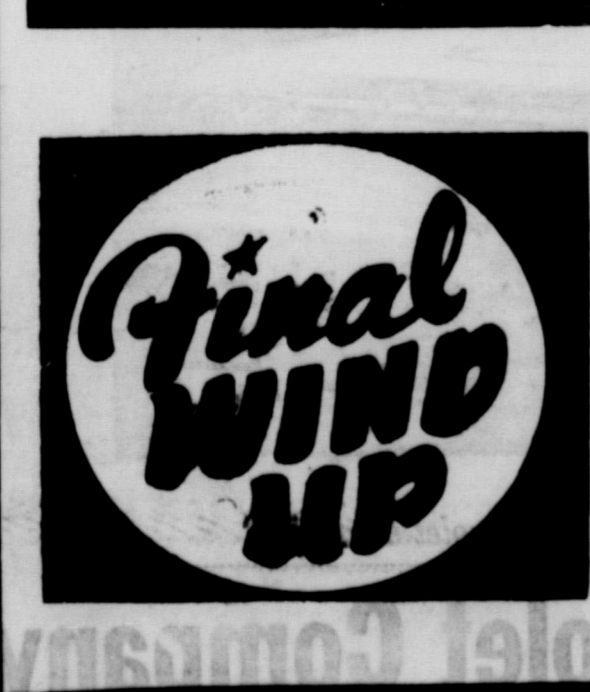

Knox Prairie Philosopher Can't Figure Out Any Advantages Of The New Plan To Finance The Candidates

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek tries to throw some light on a complicated problem, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:
According to an article I read last night, the farmers aren't the only people suffering from the high costs of operating. High costs have now hit politics.

As I understand it, the cost of running for office has gotten so high that there is a move on for financial relief to candidates. It just costs too much to wage a national campaign, not to mention a state or even local one. I can see the county can't afford to have a lot of public offices unfilled because it costs too much to run for them, although I for one have been unable to detect any shortages along this line. As far as I can determine, every public office we've got is filled and there's always a good many defeated candidates left over and willing to try again next time.

At any rate, a commission in Washington has been studying this situation and has come up with the suggestion that more people ought to contribute to campaigns, to ease the burden on the candidates, and the commission has suggested that people be allowed to deduct a part of their campaign contributions from their income tax.

For instance, it suggested, if you contributed \$25 to a campaign, you could take \$10 off your income tax.

Now I have thought this matter over and, while I have a great deal of sympathy for candidates and believe it'd be an unwholesome situation if we ever got to the point where only a wealthy man could afford to run for office, still, looking at it from the voter's standpoint, we've got high costs staring us in the face too and spending \$25 on a candidate in order to save \$10 on your income tax, ain't exactly the way to balance your personal budget. The way I figure it, you're still out \$15, and maybe even more, if the candidate gets elected and raises your government expenses by \$10.

As I see it, the situation is involved. The candidates are asking the public for financial relief

in running, and then after they get elected the public needs financial relief from what happens after they get there.
This makes the farm problem look simple.

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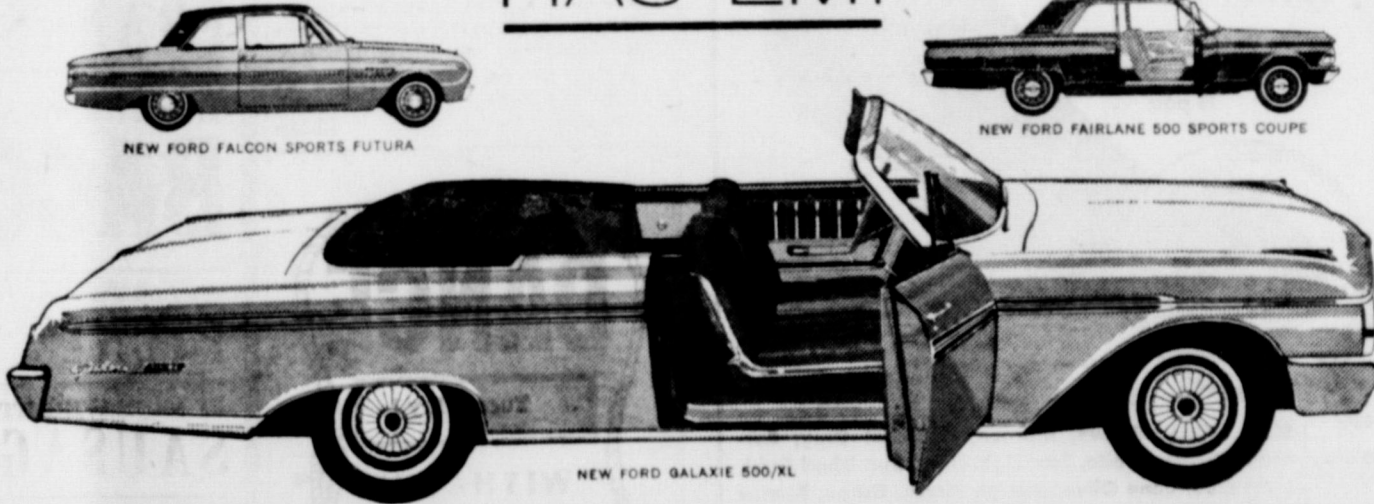

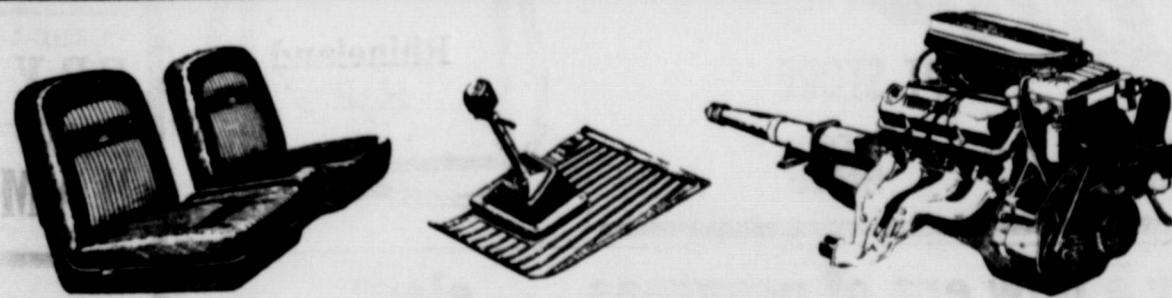

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Control Insects For More Income

Want to increase the income from your cotton crop? One proven way to do this, says H. A. Turney, area extension entomologist, is to control insects. A properly performing spray rig is a must, and now is the time to get in top working order.

Here are suggestions from Turney on getting the rig in order. Clean all nozzles by washing them in kerosene or soapy water. Check to see that all nozzles are the same kind and size. Replace all worn nozzles and hoses. Test the pump and pressure gauge. If they are not working properly, replace them. A breakdown during the growing season could mean dollars lost in time and cotton.

For the application of early season insecticides, Turney recommends the use of one cone-type nozzle per row. Nozzle spacings of 20 inches on the boom are adequate for late season control. Good foliage coverage can be obtained by placing the boom 10 to 15 inches above the tops of the cotton plants, he says.

The per acre output of a spray machine must be known before the correct insecticide mixture can be maintained or even mixed in the spray tank. The rig's output can be determined by spraying a measured acre. Local county agents can supply a chart which shows how far your spray

machine must travel to cover an acre, and this will make the job of adjusting the machine for output of insecticide easier.

Turney suggests that you also ask the county agent for other information on insect control and especially for a copy of L-486, Insecticidal Spraying of Field Crops with Ground Machinery. He has other information proved by research and farm demonstrations that good cotton insect control programs are income producers.

No License Tops Fishing Arrests

This is fishing season, and too many are going fishing without buying licenses, according to recent reports of game wardens for the month of March.

There were 94 arrests for fishing without a license during the month. In all, game wardens arrested 257 persons, and the courts assessed fines and costs amounting to \$8,889 for the month.

Although the deer hunting season has been closed since December 31, 1961, a number of arrests were made for killing deer in closed season, killing does, and hunting at night. In fact, there were 36 arrests made in connection with night hunting.

The licenses were suspended on 18 violators, and some of them paid fines amounting to \$200.

A fishing license is required

of all persons between 17 and 65 who fish outside their home county or who fish with rod and reel or other winding device any place in the state. The price is \$2.15 for either resident or non-resident.
