Chemical Plant To Hold Formal Opening May 12

The new fertilizer manufacturing plant of Wood Chemical, Inc., at Knox City will hold its formal opening on Saturday, May 12, from 5 to 9 p. m., it was announced Monday by A. A. Cox, manager.

The new plant, which manufactures agricultural fertilizers, represents an investment of some \$80,000, according to Mr. Cox, and will serve a large area in Knox, Haskell and adjoining counties. This is a new industry for Knox County and area.

Fertilizers will be formulated at the plant in 50-pound bags or in bulk, as the customer desires. There are seven bins in the building, each with 150-ton capacity for storing fertilizer. Mixing and formulating the fertilizer is done automatically—with the push of buttons.

Mr. Cox stated that fresh catfish with all the trimmings will be served during the opening hours. "There will be no sales talks," he said, "just come, eat, visit and enjoy band music. This invitation is for all the public—men, women and children."

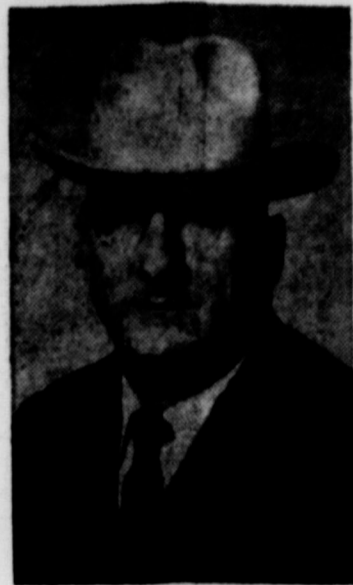
In Run-off For Representative

J. C. (Carl) Wheatley, present state representative, will meet Roy W. Arledge of Stamford in a run-off for the 83rd legislative post.

Unofficial returns announced Tuesday for the five-county district showed Wheatley leading with a total of 4,374 votes, with Arledge receiving 3,170 votes over the district. The third candidate, Foy H. Easley of Anson,

received 2,834 votes.

The 83rd district includes the counties of Knox, Baylor, Throckmorton, Haskell and Jones, with Jones being added in the redistricting this year.

Wheatley led the ticket in all four counties which he served in the legislature. Arledge, a former Stamford city commissioner, led in his home county of Jones, with Easley being second.

The 1960 census of housing counted 3,103 housing units in Knox County with the following statistics:

1,853 were in second condition with all plumbing, 2,516 were occupied, 1,574 were occupied by owners, \$5,400 was the median value of owner-occupied places, 942 were occupied by renters, \$49 was the median gross rent of rented places.

2,230 had hot and cold running water, 2,312 had flush toilet and 2,280 had bathtub or shower, 101 had basement, 16 were trailer homes.

1,825 households had air conditioning; 1,933 had TV, 2,279 radio; 1,214 telephone; 1,417 had washing machine and 64 clothes dryer.

640 had one or more home food freezers, 1,254 had one automobile, 807 had two automobiles and 108 had three or more automobiles.

JOHN EDWARD REID BORN APRIL 26th

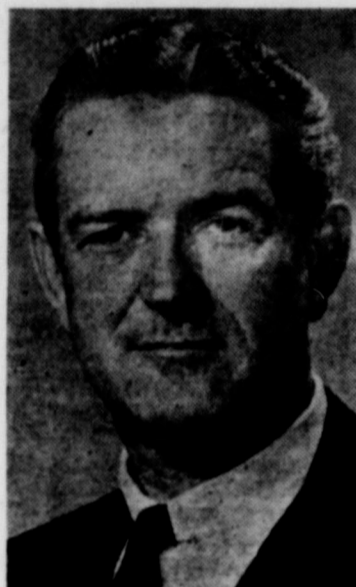

Two county-wide runoff and one precinct runoff in the June primary resulted for Knox County by the balloting of voters in the Democratic primary last Saturday.

Luckiest of all candidates in the county was H. C. Stone, presently serving as sheriff, who received a majority over his two opponents and won the nomination without a runoff.

Complete, but unofficial returns showed Stone polled 1,340 votes, compared with 309 for Olen Coffman and 421 for D. E. Whitworth.

There were no Republican primaries in Knox County.

L. A. Parker, the incumbent, led the ballot in the race for county judge with 867 votes, and will meet Joe Reeder, Jr., in the

Ed Thompson, incumbent, led the field in the race for county treasurer. He polled 1,005 votes as compared with 865 by his nearest opponent, Mrs. Clara Sue Bumpas. John M. Stockton, the third candidate, received 180 votes.

No runoff will be required in the race for commissioner of Precinct 4. With two candidates in the race, incumbent George Nix received 472 votes, while Alfonso S. Cartwright polled 420 votes.

A runoff will be required in the race for commissioner of Precinct 4. Rex Patterson, with 142 votes, and W. W. Trainham, with 153, remain in the race. The third candidate, Lee Snailum, received 84 votes.

Carl Coulston won as Democrat chairman of Vera, Box 4, with 83 votes. His opponent, F. H. Wiles, polled 41 votes.

In the race for state senator, 23rd district, George Moffett received 1,463 votes to 434 for George Corse, Jr.

In the contest for state representative of the 83rd district, J. C. Wheatley, incumbent, polled 703 votes, Foy H. Easley received 644 and Roy Arledge polled 598.

On the state level, voters gave Connally 651 votes and Formby 524 in the governor's race. Daniel was third with 308 votes, Wilson polled 230, Yarborough received 177 and Walker received 78.

Smith led the candidates for lieutenant governor with 999 votes and Baker was second with 290. Turman polled 255 votes in the race, Martin received 170 and Seceet garnered 97.

Carr led in the attorney general's race with 1,226 votes. James followed with 220 votes, Reavley 115, McDonald 103, Proctor 85 and Looney 21.

Knox County voters put Bean first in the race for congressman-at-large with 501 votes. Stevenson Jr. gathered 227 votes and Pool followed closely with 219. Moore polled 172 votes and Head received 107.

Meade F. Griffin was favored in the contest for associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, Place 1, with 926 votes. Jesse Owens received 592 in the same race.

For railroad commissioner, Ben Ramsey gathered 1,003 votes and Keith Wheatley gathered 790.

John C. White led the race in Knox County for commissioner of agriculture with 1,356 votes. His opponent, Evetts Haley Jr., polled 400.

For associate justice of the Supreme Court incumbent Zollie Steeley led with 995 votes to 442 for Willard G. Street.

In the referendum vote, 1,186 voters opposed the first proposal to submit a constitutional amendment to legalize pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing. There were 494 votes in favor.

On proposition No. 2, 1,180 votes were in opposition to the legislature enacting a law legalizing pari-mutuel betting on horse races. There were 475 votes favoring the proposal.

The third proposal, advising the legislature to submit a constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax in Texas, received 945 votes against and 701 for.

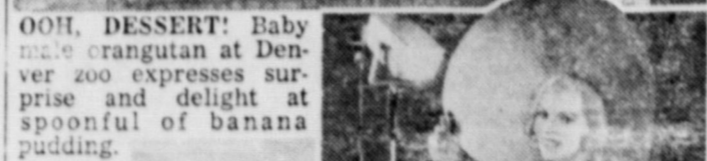

Hurricane Hit Areas To Get Quail Stock

More than 20,000 bobwhite quail from the State Game Farm at Tyler are scheduled for release in eight coastal counties swept by Hurricane Carla last September. After inspection by Game Department personnel, areas covering 656 square miles were declared to be in need of the brood stock quail, to take the place of those destroyed by water during the Carla hurricane.

Approximately one fourth of the number has already been distributed, and the remainder will be put on to selected areas as soon as available. The planting is being done in Orange, Jefferson, Galveston, Brazoria, Matagorda, Jackson, Calhoun, and Aransas counties.

An inspection was made of the stricken areas by wardens and biologists. Sites for release of the birds were based on the amount of cover, food and protection. This restocking will not be carried out in areas that were not flooded by water, because it was found that some brood stock remains.

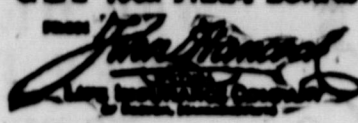

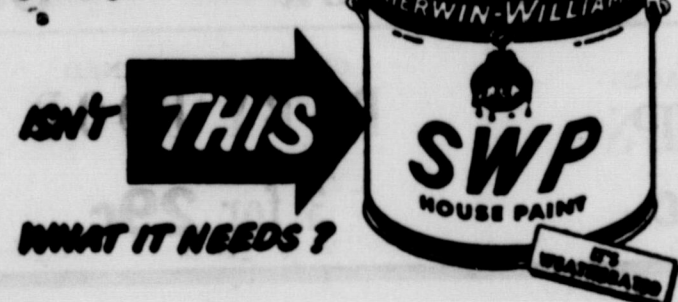

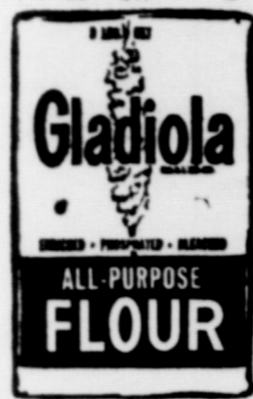
