Odd Bits Salvaged

We used to swim in the old salt water hole near Estilline.

We thought nothing of it being such a nuisance as to cause expenditure of \$125,000 in an effort to contain the water. It was just the safest place to swim for us. The water was so salty that a person would float in it; therefore, the danger of swimming was somewhat minimized.

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Several couples of us would prepare picnic lunches and hike to the old salt hole for a picnic and swim. Of course, we needed another bath when we got home in order to get the salt off our skin.

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Yes, we've had lots of fun at the old salt water hole. That's why the story in last Sunday's feature magazine of the Wichita Falls Times, written by Charles Wolston, state editor, had more than usual interest for us, Mr. Wolston said:

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The salt hole is what engineers believe an underground spring which has forced its way to the surface and passed over a salt formation in the process. The water contains more salt than sea water and is pouring 2.9 million gallons of salt water into the Red River each 24 hours.

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It is responsible for 20 percent of the pollution in Lake Texoma. The water travels to the Red River, only a short distance away in a small, but fast moving stream where it dumps approximately 300 tons of salt each day.

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Citizens of the area recently appealed to the Department of Health and Welfare, and they in turn called on the U. S. Army Corp of Engineers. The Army called in some 27 engineers and went to work to devise some plan to halt the salty flow of water. After much spent money, the engineers constructed a dyke 18 inches high completely around the 60-foot pool.

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The dyke was constructed of plastic and earth at the cost of aforementioned \$125,000. It lasted all of 43 minutes before it began to leak.

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In 1961, skindivers from Wichita Falls tried to aid the cause by diving some 125 feet down in efforts to find the bottom of the pool. At the depth, they could not find the bottom, but did report a mass of caves below the surface.

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Some day they may find a salt conversion plant to convert the 2.9 millions of gallons per day into good water to be used by the citizens and partly solve the Lake Texoma pollution problem, but they'll never take from me the memories of joyous summer evenings at the old salt water hole!

Our date was of the Catholic faith, and when we started "spreading the table", all sandwiches contained meat. We had to rush off to the nearest grocery store and get something our date could eat.

"I'm not going to get all this read before Sunday School — maybe not before church time," we said.

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Monday morning, Chan Hughes remarked about how full our P. O. box gets when we're away on Sunday. Guess he tried stuffing all that mail in our box before we got back from Wichita Falls.

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We still haven't waded through all this mail. Sunday was just a sample of what we get. The Dallas Morning News contained 160 pages, Fort Worth Star Telegram, 168; Wichita Falls Times, 84; and Abilene Reporter-News, 84. Then, there's all that "file 13" stuff and first class mail to be considered.

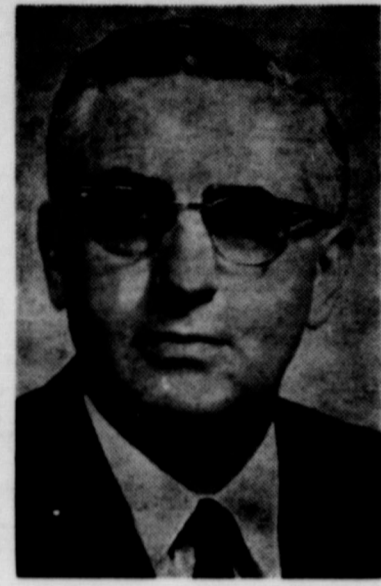
## Annual Conference Meets May 28th At Big Spring Church

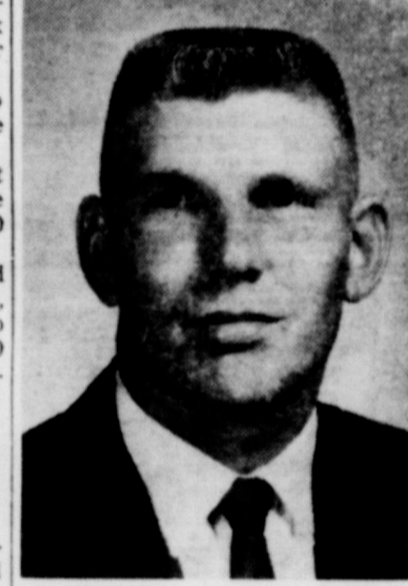
Anyone who has been disabled for more than a year may lose all of his rights to cash disability benefits before June 30. One out of every three disability applicants risks the loss of some disability insurance benefits because he waits more than 18 months before applying.

Please advise those people you know who have been disabled more than six months to check with their social security office right away.

Your Wichita Falls social security office will provide assistance in filing a claim to help disabled people obtain their rights.

Would Peter be "called by psychologists a 'Messiah complex' and standing in judgement upon fellow human beings and Christians?"

Cornelius was told to send men to Joppa for Peter who would come and tell he and his house words whereby they might be saved. (Acts 10:1-6; 11:13-14). What did Peter tell them to do? Note, "And he commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord." (Acts 10:48). Did this make Cornelius a "sullen and belligerent 'Christian'?" Before Peter commanded Cornelius and his house to be baptized, he had preached to them the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. (Acts 10:39-40). In this would we recognize in Peter "that such an attitude is not a good witness to Christ,"? Or was he just "playing Christ"? Or did he just have a "Messiah, complex?"

Paul says that there is one body, and that that one body is the church, and that we are all baptized into one body (church). (Eph. 4:4; Col. 1:18; 1 Cor. 12:13). Keep in mind that there is only one church and that there is only one way to become a member of that church. On the day of Pentecost about three thousand of those who heard the gospel of Christ, upon their faith and repentance were baptized into Christ for the remission of their sins and the same day the Lord added them to the church. (Acts 2:37-47). Was the church in Jerusalem a narrow denominational group? Had Peter preached a "narrow denominationalism"? No! It was not a denominational church at all. It was THE CHURCH in its entirety. Where there the Lord added to the church in Jerusalem "sullen and belligerent 'Christians'?"

It is surprising how much some people can say or write about religion and never use one verse of scripture.

expected increases in labor and material costs. Could he get out of his contract? No. Unless the contract says what is to be done if there are unexpected costs, the contract is binding and the law will hold the builder to it. From the builder's standpoint, a good contract would provide that, in case of increased costs, the buyer would pay them.

Suppose you agree to sell 100 steers which you own for a certain price, and hoof and mouth disease kills off most of them. Scarcity may boost the cattle price. Since you can buy steers, even at sky-high prices, you will either have to do so and perform the contract, or pay the buyer damages for your failure to perform.

Things which the law says the parties should have thought about, such as increased costs or strikes, are no excuse for not going ahead with the contract unless the contract says that it is an excuse. An exception to this rule is where performance is prevented by an irresistible, superhuman cause—as where the citrus crop which was sold failed because of a severe freeze. The law itself—without anything being said about it in the contract—excuses you from carrying out your contract if the law forbids the thing called for in the contract—for example, a building in violation of a zoning law.

Where the very thing contracted for is destroyed, as when the house to be sold burns down, the law excuses performance.

Contrary to popular opinion, death will not excuse performance, unless the contract calls for the personal services of the decedent, such as those of an author, actor, or lawyer.

And so the law will enforce most agreements against the estate of the decedent. This is true even if the contract calls for the payment of money over a long period of time, as in the case of a lease. The result may well be to impoverish the decedent's family. A good lease pro-

vision, from the lessee's standpoint, would be one giving his estate the right to cancel in the event of his death.

Where fraud exists, the innocent party who entered into the contract can, on learning of the fraud, cancel the contract and be excused from performing his part of the agreement.

With warmer weather, the job of keeping lawns neatly trimmed and mowed will become a regular chore. Power tools are readily available for doing jobs and power mowers are regular equipment around most homes. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council offers this word of advice about their use—"Improperly used mowers can run up the cost of lawn mowing by being accident hazards. They can even

become lethal weapons when used on lawns or weed patches not checked before mowing for objects which might be hurled by the mower into the operator or persons nearby. Be careful," warns the Council.

## GM's Global Futurama At 1964-65 N.Y. World's Fair



THE WORLD OF TOMORROW will be revealed to more than 70,000 persons each day at the General Motors global Futurama exhibit in the 1964-65 New York World's Fair, GM Chairman Frederic G. Donner has announced. The GM exhibit (above) is now under construction on a seven-acre site at Flushing Meadow. The building has a 10-story entrance canopy of metal spars. The 240,000-square-foot structure extends more than two football fields in length to a seven-story, 250-foot diameter product pavilion. It is surrounded by more than three acres of landscaped area, including reflecting pools and waterfalls. The 70,000 persons-a-day capacity of the new Futurama ride compares to 28,000 daily capacity of the first Futurama ride at the 1939-40 New York World's Fair. More than 25 million persons were entertained at the GM Highways and Horizons exhibit at the last New York fair. Mr. Donner said the new global Futurama will "suggest the great strides forward that are entirely possible if mankind exercises its full potential."

### Fish Bait Production Offers Possibilities

Texans love to fish. There are over 1 1/2 million fishermen in our state and they spend an average of 123 million dollars annually in pursuit of this popular sport. A sizeable amount of this money is spent for bait, especially minnows. Many of these minnows are raised in Texas, but the demand is so much higher than the domestic supply that millions must be imported annually, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

Since this deficiency in the supply of home-grown minnows does exist, there is some opportunity to make a profit in the commercial minnow business. Minnow raising is not a "get-rich-quick" operation, Cooper warns. It has been the experience of those in the business that a considerable investment in time, labor and capital is necessary for a successful operation.

In order to be successful, you must have minnow ponds of the correct size and depth. There must be an adequate, dependable water supply available and you must have pumps, water lines, drainage structures and other equipment to completely control the movement of this water. Cooper says that the use of well water instead of runoff or stream water usually assures a more uniform chemical composition and reduces the likelihood of introducing undesirable fish, minnow diseases and parasites. In general, the initial cost of equipment and engineering is rather high.



A person interested in going into the commercial minnow business must have or acquire some knowledge of water chemistry and the biology of minnows and other aquatic animals. Experience in fish cultural methods is vital to success, thus you must be prepared to accept some failures and even financial losses the first few years. For these reasons it usually pays to visit successful minnow farms to learn techniques and obtain advice instead of plunging into the business ill prepared, Cooper points out.

Information on licenses required for commercial bait operations can be obtained from the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Austin, Texas. Cooper also says that a booklet entitled "Raising Bait Fishes" can be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. This publication sells for forty-five cents per copy.

### Fishing Arrests Top Violations In Report For April

Three South Texas telephone fishermen last month dialed the wrong number. One was fined \$160, and lost his fishing license, and two were fined \$80 each and lost their licenses. They were charged with using an electric device to take fish, a practice commonly known as "telephoning."

Game wardens during April made 251 arrests, and court fines and costs amounted to \$7,049.50, according to the monthly report of J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

Most of the month's violations were made by persons fishing without a license. There were 141 sports fishing violations, 7 fish dealer violations, one commercial fisherman and one oyster dredging violation.

Night hunters also continued to plague game wardens, and 19 persons were arrested for hunting at night and headlighting game. Eleven persons were arrested for hunting from an automobile. Ten oyster fishermen

were fined for possession of small oysters.

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Explains How Candidates Can Spend More For An Office Than The Office Pays Them

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek explains the financial end of politics this week, how accurately, we can't say.

Dear editor:  
I was talking with a neighbor of mine the other day and he said there was a problem puzzling him.

He said he'd been reading some figures on how much candidates spend in a big campaign and what he wanted to know was, how can a man afford to spend four or five times as much running for an office as the office pays?

"You take when a man runs for some big office, Governor or Senator, say, why some times he'll spend more getting elected than the office will pay in fifteen or twenty terms, and nobody has ever held on that long. This doesn't make sense to me," he said.

Some of them wind up in better shape than before they got elected, which only proves they must be financial geniuses. When a man can spend \$100,000 running for a job that pays \$50,000, and still

come out ahead, you can see he's got something that you and me haven't. Of course, what he's got may have belonged to you and me once, but I don't have the facts to go into all that.

Of course, politicians explain their knack for spending more to get a job than the job pays, by emphasizing that their friend put up the money, without, they always say, any strings attached. I don't know about this. But if there aren't any strings attached, they sure get hold of plenty of it from some place, to string us along with.

## Farm Facts

There are some exciting new developments in food processing, according to Philip B. Dwozskin of the Marketing Economics Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In "dehydrefreezing," fruits and vegetables are dried to about 50% of their original weight and then frozen and kept frozen. Quality of the thawed and cooked food is equal to that of the normal frozen product, and there are savings in freezing, packaging, storage, and shipping costs.

"Freeze-drying," another development, offers even more convenience and produces foods of high, fresh-flavor quality.

Food (cooked or uncooked) under this process is dehydrated under vacuum while frozen. Freeze-dried foods apparently do not become toughened or shriveled, and when rehydrated, regain their original flavor and texture. Properly sealed, these foods can be stored at room temperatures for long periods of



time. Although present emphasis is on meat products, fresh-dried shrimp are available for the institutional market, and sportsmen can buy complete, already cooked entrees.
