Mauldin around, and we weren't a bit unhappy to learn that he was coming back as pastor of the First Methodist Church of Munday for his fifth year. We used to figure that after four years we'd better be ready to "break in" a new pastor, but the Conference doesn't do that now as much as in years past.

Rex allowed in his newsletter this week that this is his first fifth-year charge, and the first time in the history of the Munday church that a pastor has been appointed for a fifth year. "We covet your prayers," he said, "as we begin this new year."

The Mauldins have been a part of the church, school and community life while in Munday, and we believe the community will be greatly benefitted by Rex and Letha and their fine boys sojourning and working with us for another year. We hope they will be happy here, too. It seems to us that they fit into the community better than a lot of "parsonage families."

Jackie Booe performed the funniest dive for first place, with Johnny Mayfield as second.

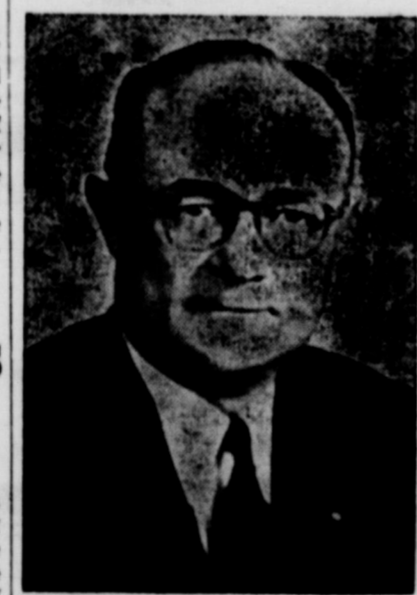
Jesse G. Smith, president of the Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies and presented merchandise certificates to the winners. He didn't suit out!

## Connally, Smith Wins State Posts

John Connally of Fort Worth, who was nominated Governor of Texas over Don Yarbrough in last Saturday's runoff, plans still another campaign against Republican Jack Cox in the November general election. Connally received 51.17 per cent of the vote last Saturday, the Texas Election Bureau reported Monday in its final figures.

Preston Smith of Lubbock was nominated lieutenant governor over James Turman.

Connally received 564,731 votes to the 538,827 garnered by Yarbrough, a margin of 25,904 votes. Totals in the other statewide races are as follows: Lieutenant Governor: Preston Smith, 553,344; James Turman, 502,737.

Attorney General: Waggoner Carr, 610,960; Tom Reavley, 445,677.

Congressman-at-large: Woodrow Bean, 448,857; Joe Pool, 571,225.

## Munday Soldier Is Honorary Kentuckian

Fort Chaffee, Ark. (AHTNC)—Army PFC Bobby F. Killian, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Killian of Munday, recently was made an Honorary Kentuckian by the 100th Division, a Kentucky reserve unit on active duty at Fort Chaffee, Ark.

A citation signed by Kentucky Governor Bert T. Combs and division commander Maj. Gen. Dillman A. Rash, reads: "PFC Bobby F. Killian having served with honor, distinction and devotion as a member of Kentucky's 100th Division, is hereby adopted as an honorary Kentuckian."

Killian is one of 300 non-Kentuckians attached to the 100th Division, which has given basic and specialist training to more than 20,000 soldiers since being recalled to active duty last October.

He is a supply clerk in Company L of the division's 398th Regiment.

Killian is a 1954 graduate of Munday High School and attended Texas Technological College.

## Parker And Thompson Elected By Narrow Margins In Saturday Runoff

A narrow margin of slightly more than 100 votes separated the winners and losers in two important Knox County races in last Saturday's runoff primary. Interest in these races, as well as the three state races, brought more votes to the polls than was anticipated. Almost 1,800 ballots were cast.

L. A. Parker, incumbent, won over Joe Reeder, Jr., of Knox City in the race for county judge by 118 votes. Parker received 950 votes, while Reeder polled 832.

Ed Thompson, running for his second term as county treasurer, won over Mrs. Clara Sue Bum-

pas by a narrow margin of 103 votes. Thompson's vote was 943 to the 845 received by Mrs. Bumpas.

In the county's vote of the 83rd District state representative race, Roy Arledge of Stamford beat out incumbent J. C. (Carl) Wheatley of Haskell by a vote of 950 to 786.

Rex A. Patterson won over the incumbent, W. W. Trainham, in the race for commissioner of Precinct 2. Patterson received 262 votes, while Trainham received 182.

In the state races, Knox County went as follows: Governor—Connally, 1,034; Yarbrough, 696.

Lieutenant Governor—Smith, 1,322; Turman, 359.

Attorney General—Carr, 1,307; Reavley, 370.

Congressman-at-Large—Bean, 736; Pool, 853.

The committee will meet again within a few days to consider the poll, and all persons who have not returned their cards are urged to do so immediately.

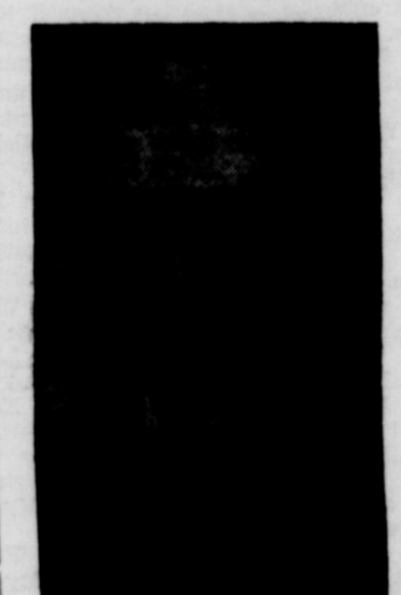
## SUFFERS INJURY

## Arledge Wins Over Wheatley

Roy Arledge, Stamford business man and prominent rancher, upset J. C. (Carl) Wheatley of Haskell, incumbent, in last Saturday's runoff primary when he polled a total of 4,514 votes in the 83rd District state representative race.

According to the complete unofficial returns, Wheatley mustered a total of 4,262 votes in the closely contested race. The incumbent led the balloting in the first primary, getting a total of 4,521 votes to 3,082 for Arledge and 2,711 for Foy H. Easley of Anson, the third candidate in the race.

In Saturday's election, Arledge carried Jones and Knox Counties, while Wheatley carried Baylor, Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The vote by counties:

Baylor—Arledge 562, Wheatley 696; Haskell—Arledge 822, Wheatley 1,540; Jones—Arledge 1,931; Wheatley, 853; Knox—Arledge 950, Wheatley 786; Throckmorton—Arledge 249, Wheatley 387.

## Tornado Warnings For Your Safety

Members of the Munday Fire Department pointed out last Tuesday that the tornado warnings are being given for the protection of the people of Munday. The alert sounded by the fire siren does not mean that a tornado has been sighted, but that people should keep careful watch on approaching clouds.

It was pointed out that several complaints have been made to the chief of police protesting this alert. The warning is given by members of the fire department—not the police chief.

Firemen, who pointed out that the alert at Haskell possibly saved many lives, said they would continue giving the alert. One long blast means that a cloud, with possible high winds and hail, is approaching; short blasts at intermittent intervals means a tornado has been sighted and is headed our way.

Those who have complaints regarding the tornado warnings are invited to meet with the fire department at 8 p.m. next Monday at the city hall.

Mayor V. E. Moore has also emphasized that people should

never call the fire departments number to inquire of a fire. This is an emergency number, and should be dialed to report a fire, and for no other purpose.

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Claims Farmers Can Stand Stock Market Fluctuations Better Than Tycoons

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek looks at the stock market this week, from quite a distance.

Dear editor:  
I know farmers aren't supposed to be as, well, let's say, mentally alert as big business men, they're supposed to use brawn more than brain, but sometimes I wonder.

For instance, when the stock market took a nose-dive recently, what happened? Why, big business men all over the country began shuddering, members of the Stock Exchange got jittery, the newspapers were full of expert advice and explanations, and people began wondering if the bottom was going to fall out of things. Is this another 1929? they asked.

Some people with stocks even became a little panicky, and the more worried they got the more they said, "Why, just think," one man complained, "yesterday my stock was worth \$70 a share. Now it's worth \$40," he was plenty worried.

But here's the point. Every time somebody sold a stock, somebody else bought it, and after it was all over the stocks apparently climbed back up to about where they were before. People were kicking themselves at first for not selling sooner, then kicking themselves for having sold.

Business people ought to associate with farmers more and they'd come to learn how to be calm under such situations. It happens all the time in farming. Many's the time I've had a crop in the field I figured was worth so much money, only to find out when I hauled it to market it was worth 30 percent less. Every farmer knows what it is to have a steer worth \$100 today and \$70 tomorrow.

If farmers got panicky under such a situation, they'd stay that

way most of the time. Wild fluctuations in the stock market may run big business men berserk, but fluctuations in farm prices are as ordinary to a farmer as dry weather when he needs a rain and rainy weather when he needs sunshine.

On top of this, most of the losses in the stock market are paper losses, a stock will keep, it's not like a hog that's ready for market. In farming, the losses aren't paper losses. This doesn't necessarily prove that farmers are smarter. They just don't scare so easy.

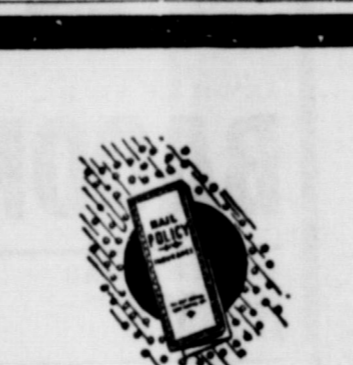
