SHIPS AND MOTORS

If anyone thinks this country doesn't need ocean shipping, take a look at the automobile industry—an industry which is one of our major employers and which, directly or indirectly, contributes to payrolls and business activity everywhere in the country.

In a recent year close to \$579 million worth of U. S. passenger cars, car chassis and trucks were shipped abroad, along with about an equivalent value in parts.

At the other end of the line, merchant ships brought us imports essential to auto production. These include iron ore, manganese, aluminum, all manner of alloys, raw materials used in paints

and lacquers, and so on.
 What is true of motors is true to a varying degree of a list of other enterprises that would fill many pages—U. S. agriculture among them. We must have merchant shipping—and, to be more specific, merchant shipping flying the U. S.—flag which is under our control and can be used to maximum advantage in any kind of world emergency.

YOU, THE LOSER

There is one important aspect of excessively high taxation of incomes which has been given much less attention than it merits.

In a recent symposium on tax reform, Dan Throop Smith, Professor of Finance in the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration, touched on it in these words: "Excessive tax rates distort business decisions and personal decisions on investments. They distract attention from productive work which creates more income to efforts to minimize tax burdens. At a 90 percent tax rate, it is as important to an individual, though certainly not to society, to save a dollar of taxes as it is to earn ten dollars of income."

This individual, in sum, is more concerned with trying to improve his tax position than in trying to develop enterprises which would produce more jobs, more and better goods and services—and, ultimately, more sources of taxation for government at all the levels. And the whole nation, and everyone in it, is the big loser.

Ralph T. Moore writes, in the Oregon Voter: "There has been much of pious pronouncement and noble platitude but little of real accomplishment in coping with our unemployment problem to date. This writer is convinced that this is because we are going at it from the wrong end by using government when we should be using American industry itself. We give exclusive attention to the drum-majorettes who lead the cheering when we should be developing the team that has to play the game, and upon whom the winning or losing exclusively depends. Our nation's growth has been best and strongest during periods of least governmental interference with business. Yet now we are staking our chances on the very government intervention that so hampered us at times in the past."

Church of Whose Choice?

Occasionally we hear encouragement to "attend the church of your choice," or to "go to church Sunday, any church but go." Although this well meant, it is out of harmony with God's word.

God's word does not support every doctrine taught by man (Matt. 15:9). Every "plant" which the Father did not plant "shall be rooted up" (Matt. 15:13). And Jesus warned of blind leaders in Matthew 15:14.

It would be much better if all men would say "attend the church of Christ's choice." Or, "go to the Lord's church Sunday." After all Jesus does have a choice. He promised the church of His choice (Matt. 16:18). He gave Himself for the church of His choice (Eph. 5:25). He shed his blood for the church of His choice (Acts 20:28). And he is coming again for the church of His choice (Eph. 5:27).

But how may we know which is the church of His choice? We have the New Testament which declares it. We know what it was called (Rom. 16:16). We know those in it had repented and had been baptized for the remission of their sins (Acts 2:37-47), before being added to it. We know that all the saved were members of it (Acts 2:47). We know that it was to be one undivided body (1 Cor. 1:10; Eph. 4:4). We know that members believed and followed the apostles' teaching (Acts 2:42). We know that the members partook of the Lord's Supper and contributed on the first day of the week (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 16:1-2). We know that it was to teach no other doctrine than that taught by the apostles and inspired men (Gal. 1:7-9).

Following the New Testament it would be simple to locate His church today. We only need to look into the word of God for the New Testament church. We need to encourage men to look for, and go to the church of the Lord's choice.

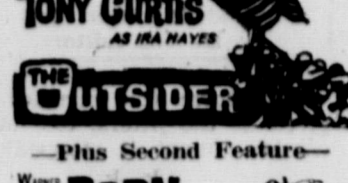

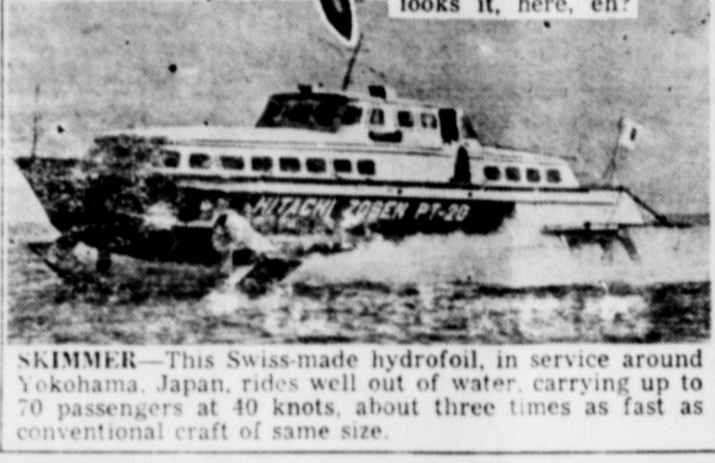

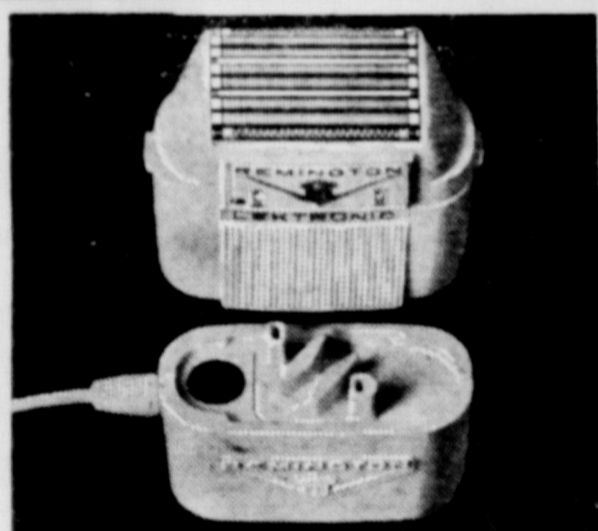

SHELTER PROGRESS RAPID

The national civil defense program of surveying fallout shelters for up to 60 million Americans is ahead of schedule, and should be completed before the end of 1962, according to officials of the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense.

By October 1 OCD expects to have in the hands of local civil defense authorities complete information on the number and location of shelter spaces available in each community. From information obtained by the Federally-financed National Shelter Survey, local civil defense officials will know also how many persons in each community could be sheltered, how many could not be sheltered under present conditions, what additional shelters could be modified into shelter areas, how much it would cost, and similar data.

Local architects and engineers surveyed shelter areas under contract to the Army Corps of Engineers or the Navy Bureau of Yards and Docks.

Under present plans, civil defense authorities receiving this information would then be responsible for marking shelter areas with a nationally-standardized sign. They would stock shelter areas with specially-prepared 14-day supplies of food, water, sanitation and medical items, and fallout detection instruments—all provided by OCD.

The shelter survey, marking, and stocking program, announced last August and put in operation Dec. 1, 1961, is the first part of a broader plan to provide fallout shelters for virtually all Americans over the next five years.

Farm Facts

Out of each 8-hour day, Americans work 2 hours and 19 minutes to support the government, according to The Tax Foundation. In fact, taxes take a greater proportion of our earnings than any other category of expenditures—more than food, clothing, and medical care combined.

Taxes take about 29% of the total workday as compared with 17.3% for food and tobacco, 6.9% for clothing and accessories; 17.5% for housing and household operation; 4.4% for medical and dental care; 8.1% for transportation; 3.9% for recreation; and 12.9% for all other expenses.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that the cost of food has risen less than most other items on the cost-of-living index.

For all items other than food, the increase is 30.9% since 1947-49. Transportation costs have gone up 45.7%; housing, 32.5%; rent, 43.1%; medical care, 68.6%. For all food, including that sold in restaurants, the increase is 21.2%.

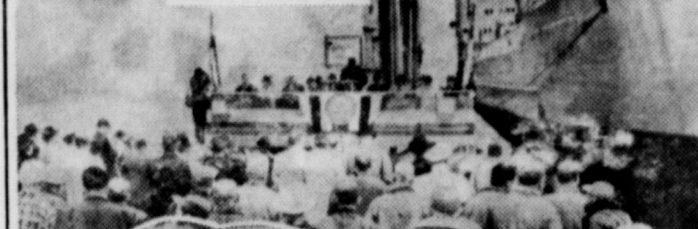

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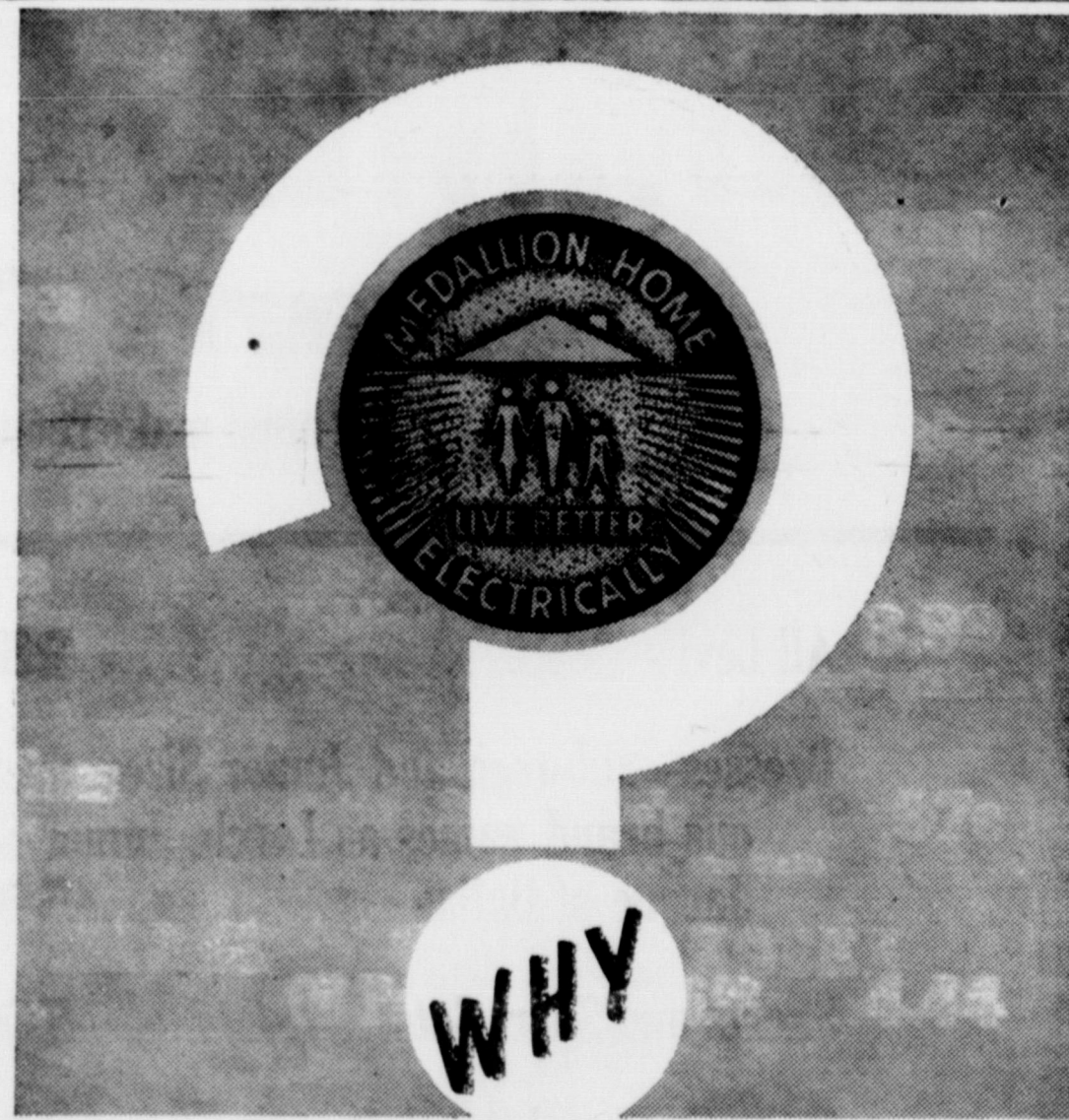

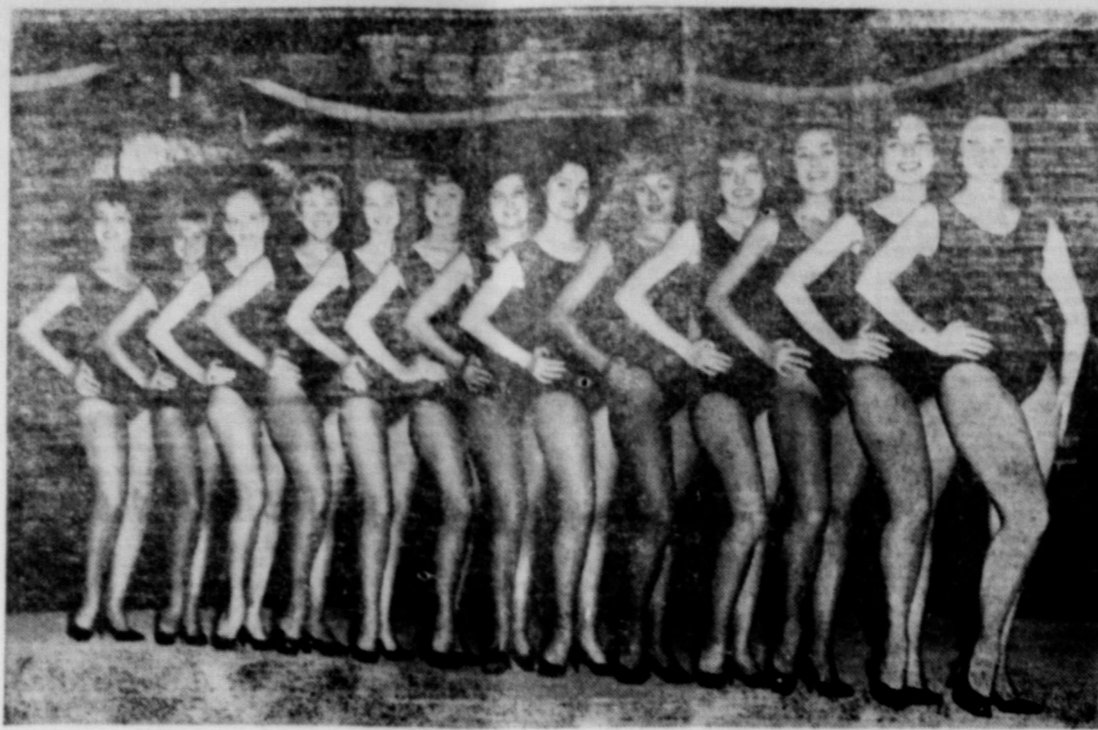

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Knox Prairie Philosopher Ponders The Strange Ability of Russians To Worry About Their Well-Fed Bosses

Editor's note: The Knox Prai-
rie Philosopher on his Johnson
grass farm on Miller Creek
takes a look at Russian agricul-
ture this week. We guess that's
what he's doing.

Dear editor:
As everybody knows, if Ameri-
can space scientists were as far
ahead of Russian space sci-
entists as American farmers are
of Russian farmers, we probably
would already have conquered
the moon and been eyeing Mars
or Venice. In fact, we might
have been to those places too
and come back saying there's
nothing out there worth con-
quering.

I don't know why this is, un-
less it's just that farmers are
smarter than scientists, al-
though maybe not as well paid.
But what brought this up was
an announcement last week by
Mr. Khrushchev that he was
raising the price of meat and
butter in Russia by 30 per cent,
and what interested me was the
little speech the dictator gave
following the increase.

"I wouldn't say this is pleas-
ant for the people," he said,
"but the people understand that
this is far more unpleasant for
the Central Committee and for
the rest of the government."
Now this type of "understand-
ing" baffles me. If the Russian
people can understand how it's
more painful and unpleasant to
the Communist bosses, who al-
ready have all the cars, all the
best apartments, and all the best
food, to raise prices on food be-
cause there's not enough to go
around, then they're far more
sensitive than the rest of us.

I can see an ordinary Russian
walking past a Communist of-
ficial's house and imagining him
inside eating a steak and butter-
ing his bread and feeling down-
right sorry for him because he's
eating with the memory still
fresh in his mind of having to
vote to raise the price of meat
and butter by 30 per cent. It's
enough to take away his own ap-
petite for the cabbage soup wait-
ing for him in his one-room
apartment.

With this type of understand-
ing, there's no limit to what the
Russian bosses can pull off. In

in Texas

Water Attracts Children
Owning a swimming pool is
becoming rather common in
Texas and it places some legal
duties on the owner. Your main
duty hinges on the "Doctrine of
attractive nuisance" under which
you become legally responsible
to young children who trespass
on your land.

As a rule you owe no duty to
trespassers. They must take
your property as they find it: if
dangerous, that is their tough
luck. Not so for children who
wander on your land. The attrac-
tive nuisance doctrine says that
if you have some man-made
things on your land which entice
youngsters you have a legal duty
to make your land safe for them.

A high tension line, an old
mineshaft, a railroad turntable,
a pool of clear acid may be ir-
resistible to children. If they are
likely to be attracted and unable
to grasp the dangers, you have
an "attractive nuisance," and
you must make your premises
safe.

Recently a court held that a
swimming pool may be an at-
tractive nuisance. In this case
a toddler drowned in Jones' pool.
Jones and the boy's parents lived
across the street from each
other. About 30 feet from the
street, the pool was fenced but
with openings through which
children could enter. On week
ends the Jones were not home,
only the Jones' children. Animals
often played near the pool.

The pool and the animals
could attract a youngster; he
could not grasp the water's dan-
ger. The Joneses could have had
a locked gate. A jury properly
held Jones responsible for the
drowning.

How young is the child? Can
he appreciate the dangers? How
easy is it for the owner to make
the place safe for children?

There are times when an older
child should appreciate dangers.
An older child playing on a scaf-
fold should appreciate the dan-
gers in height. In another case a
twelve year old boy tried to
jump on a train which was mov-
ing along a public street. When
he fell he could not get damages
for his injury. He should have
seen his danger. Besides how
could one put up a barrier along
a public street which could keep
out twelve year old boys.

A land owner may have other
duties to trespassers. He cannot
set a "trap" on his land, create
hazards on his land on purpose;
he cannot put a pit on his land

where people frequently tres-
pass, put in spring guns, or other
traps to harm trespassers.

Sometimes a condition on your
land may be a trap to children
but not one for adults. The adult
may grasp the danger of slip-
pery algae growing in a partially
drained pool, but not a child. But
even with a trap on your land
the attractive nuisance doctrine
will not apply without some al-
lurement or enticement to bring
children to trespass on your
land. Such attractions are, in
effect, an implied invitation to
enter. Check your place for such
attractions, and in any event
consider measures, such as in-
surance, to cover harm that may
come from things on your land.
And above all, keep your place
safe. For all the money you not
under the harm.

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Weed Control Makes Good Pastures Better

Weeds compete with pasture and meadow plants for moisture, plant nutrients, light and space. They often reduce yields by half, says E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist.

Weed control is necessary for top returns from productive pastures and meadows, he adds, but may not prove profitable where yields are low.

The specialist points out that weeds are best controlled through preventive measures. Practices which encourage dense, vigorous stands of grass are the best preventive measures and include thorough seedbed preparation, using adapted plants, planting the right amount of high quality seed by the best known method at the proper time, using adequate fertilization and proper grazing and forage use.

Both mechanical and chemical weed control methods are outlined in a recent Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication, L-476, "Weed Control in Cultivated Pastures and Meadows." Trew and John A. Long are the authors. Copies are available from the offices of local county agents or by mail from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

In connection with weed control, Trew says that rotary hoes do an excellent job of controlling seedling grass and weeds in new plantings of Coastal and Midland Bermudagrass. Killing the weeds when they are small will conserve moisture for use by the grass, he adds.

If new plantings of Coastal and Midland are grazed before a complete cover or stand is obtained, it can mean that two years instead of one will be required to establish a good stand.

This, he adds, is costly and multiplies the weed problem.

Trew recommends topdressing summer temporary and permanent pastures with nitrogen after each grazing or cutting if soil moisture is adequate. This practice he lists as one of the cheapest ways to get increased forage production and quality.
