Water Attracts Children

Owning a swimming pool is becoming rather common in Texas and it places some legal duties on the owner. Your main duty hinges on the "Doctrine of attractive nuisance" under which you become legally responsible to young children who trespass on your land.

As a rule you owe no duty to trespassers. They must take your property as they find it: if dangerous, that is their tough luck. Not so for children who wander on your land. The attractive nuisance doctrine says that if you have some man-made right sorry for him because he's things on your land which entice eating with the memory still youngsters you have a legal duty to make your land safe for them.
