Four Accidents Investigated In County For May

The Highway Patrol investigated 4 rural accidents in Knox County during the month of May according to Sergeant Frank Jirik, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,736.00.

The rural traffic accident summary of Knox County from January through May of 1962 shows a total of 17 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were no persons killed and 20 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$8,431.00.

Beginning with this month, the Texas Department of Public Safety lends its support each year to the national "Slow Down And Live" summertime safety campaign which, as its name indicates, has as its objective the task of emphasizing the need for motorists to control their driving speed. The veteran patrol supervisor said, "the hurry attitude frequently steers them into a speeding violation or, worse than that, a serious accident, or even death itself."

Deadline For New Wheat Farm Application Set

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" allotment for 1963 on a farm which does not now have a wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS County Office right away, Olie Iseng, Chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said June 6. Such farmers have until July 2 to file applications for such an allotment.

Under the wheat allotment-marketing quota program, a "new farm" is a farm on which there is no wheat acreage history, including acreage considered as wheat under the Conservation Reserve or the Great Plains program, for any of the years 1960, 1961, or 1962.

The Chairman emphasized that formal application for a "new farm" application must be made in writing on a form provided for that purpose, and the application must be filed at the ASCS County Office by the July 2 deadline.

Insect Control Guides Revised

Three popular insect guides have been revised and may be obtained from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station. They are the Vegetable Guide L-255, Livestock Guide L-256 and Pink Bollworm Guide L-219.

The Vegetable Guide has been revised and the insecticide Sevin is now recommended for use on cantaloupes and watermelons as well as other crops listed under the Cucurbit group.

Ronnel (Troleone) is now recommended for grub control in the Livestock Guide. It may be used in a feed mixture to control grubs in beef cattle. Directions for mixing the material with feed can be found on the manufacturer's label.

Also, the recommended waiting time from last application of Co-Ral to slaughter has been reduced when used on beef cattle, sheep and goats.

The insecticide Sevin has now been recommended for the control of lice and mites on poultry. The chemical Dibrom has been added to the list for use to control flies in the dairy and livestock barn. The Pink Bollworm Guide now contains the suggested optimum planting dates for cotton. This is in addition to the planting periods and stalk destruction deadlines, which are also found in the guide.

"Old Warriors" Of 1917-18 Will Meet In Corpus Christi

The "Old Warriors" of 1917-18, and the Ladies Auxiliary will assemble in Corpus Christi, Texas July 13th, 14th, and 15th. Commander Roger Q. Evans of Baird, Texas, who has headed the organization for the past three years, states that this convention promises to be the largest gathering of "Old Warriors" since the State Department for the Veterans of World War One was organized in Texas some seven years ago.

There are many issues to be settled at the Convention; but, the issue taking the spotlight is a report about the delegation to Washington. Two chartered buses carried 65 Veterans from our great state to the nation's capitol to obtain first-hand information from our twenty-two Congressmen. This information from the Congressmen concerns the reasons why the warriors of 1917-18—the defenders of our freedoms who are now unemployed, and facing the ravages of diseased bodies, and an average age of 68—are forced to live under the new law PL 86-211. Commander Evans states that this law covers approximately twenty-two million veterans. A large majority of these veterans are twenty to thirty years younger, and are more fully employed than are the "Old Warriors" of 1917-18.

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Screw Worm Cases

There has been only one confirmed screw worm case in Knox County while in some of the other surrounding counties there have been more. There were several cases of nonscrew worm infections reported in early May and several cases reported in early June that no samples were available for collection.

There was a sample from the Knox City area sent in on June 12 that was definitely determined as screw worm. Stockmen in the area should be sure to make regular periodic checks for worms and doctor the cases as soon as possible.

The screw worm eradication program is in full swing and it is reported that in the usually very severe infestation area of the state that there has been exceptionally few cases this year. The Southwest Animal Health Commission has requested that a sample of worms from infected cattle be sent to them for positive identification.

All livestock men are being asked to collect a sample of 10 worms in a bottle of water or alcohol and take to their county agent. Each county agent in the state has the necessary shipping information, shipping bottles and packages.

Bull Weevils

There have been overwintering bull weevils found in some of the turn rows and in areas along and adjacent to cotton fields here in Knox County. With the present situation of a late cotton crop in the process of being planted in parts of the county and almost all of the existing cotton being set back so that it will be late, this poses an even greater threat to the cotton producer.

County Agent B. T. Haws from Wichita County has informed Knox County that there vegetable producers have been invited to participate in their annual Wichita County Vegetable Show, to be held in the 4-H Barn in Wichita Falls June 30. Dear editor:

Kosse Man Fishing Enthusiast, Named Baptist Father Of The Year For 1962

DALLAS — A 70-year-old fishing enthusiast from Kosse, Texas is Limestone County, who says his greatest desire is to be "a fisher of men" has been named 1962 Texas Baptist Father of the Year.

He is Albert Lee Lewis, an ordained Baptist deacon for 50 years and semi-retired salesman in the little town 50 miles southeast of Waco.

The oldest, Albert Brady Lewis of Austin, works for the Texas Employment Commission and is a deacon and Sunday School superintendent in his church. Larry Brooks Lewis, who works with the General Dynamics Corporation, and Miss Francis Lewis, district field worker for the State Child Welfare Division, both live in Abilene. Another, Mrs. N. B. (Mary) Inman of Iran, is a former teacher whose husband is with the U. S. Aid of Agriculture division.

Special Father's Day services Sunday at the First Baptist Church of Kosse honored Mr. Lewis. An engraved plaque praising Lewis for "his contribution to Christianity through his family, church and community" was presented to the Father of the Year.
