Can A Righteous Man Become Unrighteous?

"The soul that sinneth, it shall die. The son shall not bear the iniquity of the father, neither shall the father bear the inquity of the son: The righteousness of the righteous shall be upon him, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon him. But if the wicked will turn from all his sins that he hath committed, and keep all my statutes, and do that which is lawful and right, he shall surely live, he shall not die. All his transgressions that he hath committed, they shall not be mentioned unto him: in his righteousness that he hath done he shall live. Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God; and not that he shall return from his ways, and live? BUT WHEN THE RIGHTEOUS TURN AWAY FROM HIS RIGHTEOUSNESS: and committeth iniquity, and doeth according to all the abominations that the wicked man doeth, shall he live? All HIS RIGHT-EOUSNESS THAT HE HATH DONE SHALL NOT BE MENTIONED: in his trespass that he hath trespassed, and in his sins that he hath sinned, IN THEM WILL HE DIE." Christ said to those who die in their sins "Whether I go, ye cannot come" (Jno. 8:21). In the above text, we find that some were righteous and turned from that righteousness and would die in their sins, and all their past righteousness would not even so much as be mentioned. They would be judged as an unrighteous person.

But, some one will say, "this was under the law of Moses" and we are not under that law today." That is true, but the apostle Paul said in the New Testament, in 1 Cor. 10:1-12 that these things happend as examples for those under the New Testament. Verses 11 and 12 in this text say, "Now all these things happened unto them for examples: and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come. WHEREFORE LET HIM THAT THINKETH HE STANDETH TAKE HEED LEST HE FALL.

The righteous under the old law who turned from their righteousness will not hear their righteousness even mentioned in the day of judgement. Paul said these things were "ensamples" for you and I. Read 2 Peter 2:20-22.

The Lord does not desire that any one should be lost, but He has left the choice to each one of us. "Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God: and not that he should RETURN from his ways, and live?" (Ezekiel 18:23). We read where Peter said these words, "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that ALL SHOULD COME TO RE-PENTANCE." (2 Pet. 3:9). Joshua, said, ". . . choose you this day whom ye will serve; . . ." (Joshua 24:15).


