Plane Crash At Amarillo Fatal To Four Persons

An airplane crash early Sunday morning at Amarillo took the lives of four military personnel from Amarillo Air Force Base. One of the four, Sgt. Perry L. Cooke, was the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Hudson of Knox City, former residents of Munday.

The aircraft left Municipal Airport with the four airmen aboard, and was not heard from again until early Sunday when a search was begun. The wreckage was sighted in a plowed field two miles west and two miles south of Amarillo about 9:00. Discovery was made by Major Cecil Ingram of Civil Air Patrol. Apparently all aboard had died instantly.

Full military services were scheduled for Sgt. Cooke at 10 a.m. Wednesday in Amarillo.

Surviving him are his wife, Mona, two brothers, one sister and his parents.

Mr. and Mrs. Hudson and Andrea and Mrs. E. Y. Johnson left immediately for Amarillo when news of the accident was received Sunday.

Five Accidents Are Investigated

The Highway Patrol investigated five rural accidents in Knox County during the month according to Sergeant Frank Jirlicek Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wreck accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,030.00.

The rural accident summary for Knox County from January through September of 1962 shows a total of 39 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were no persons killed and 30 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$18,526.00.

"Accidents Go Up When The Sun Goes Down," is a slogan so true. Darkness hides danger, giving the driver a false sense of security. That is the reason traffic accidents increase during October's shorter days and longer nights. National Statistics show that the traffic death rate at night is three times the daylight rate, and more than half of all accidents occur after sundown, despite reduction in the volume of traffic.

At sundown, long shadows and fading light make it increasingly difficult for drivers to spot traffic hazards and stop in time. The veteran patrol supervisor said, "make it a habit to turn on your driving lights at the first hint of dusk and always use them properly."

Type II Sabin Polio Vaccine To Be Administered In Knox County Sunday

Sunday, October 21, is S. O. S. Sunday again!

That's the date on which the Type II Sabin polio vaccine will be administered to the people of Knox County.

This type will be administered as was Type I—at the Munday elementary school and the Knox City school gymnasium. The same method will be followed—those receiving the vaccine will take the usual three drops on a cube of sugar or diluted in water. The vaccine will be dropped directly in the mouth for small babies.

The vaccine for this area was delivered to Wichita Falls last Tuesday and will be received by Knox County authorities on Saturday in order to be ready for

Sunday's program.

Type II is being given at this time because there is still some doubt as to the safety of Type III, which was originally scheduled for this date. This type will not be given until it is proven there is no danger, then it will be offered to the public.

Sunday, October 28, is scheduled as "make-up Sunday" for those who are not able to receive the vaccine next Sunday.

The vaccine will be given free of charge, but the customary contribution of 25 cents toward the expense of administering it will be accepted. This is strictly up to the individual, and the entire public is urged to request to receive the vaccine in this polio preventive campaign.

If you did not receive the Type I vaccine several weeks ago, you may take the Type II vaccine next Sunday, then take Type I at a later date.

A total of 5,646 persons received the Type I vaccine in Knox County, and it is expected that equally as many will receive Type II during the next two Sundays.

Cotton Harvest Is Moving Ahead

Harvesting of cotton is moving ahead but at very slow pace. Rains the past week slowed harvest in the Haskell and Weinert area. Other parts of the Munday Classing area received no moisture.

The USDA Cotton Classing Office at Munday, Texas has classed 21,100 bales this season, according to A. D. Peebles, in charge.

Grades have improved some as the undesirable lower crop is being removed and the later crop opens.

The past week grades ran 22 percent Mid Lt Spot, 37 percent SLM Lt Spot, and 18 percent LM Lt Spot. Staples ran about 39 percent 31/32 and 33 percent 15/16. Micronaire readings continue to improve with 11 percent under 3.5, as compared to 15 percent last week.

Markets are very slow in those areas where neither the buyers or gin has access to a "mike" machine.

Prices averaged 30.50 for Mid Lt Spot, 29.75 for SLM Lt Spot and 28.75 for LM Lt Spot 15/16 and 31/32.

Romping Moguls Down Holliday Eagles, 26-8

The romping Moguls, paced by halfback Pete Alcala and quarterback Douglas McGardy, trounced the Holliday Eagles by a score of 26 to 8 last Friday night to maintain a perfect District 11-A record.

The slippery Alcala put the Moguls ahead to stay in the second play of the game when he broke loss for a 60-yard scamper to pay-dirt and to the excitement of Mogul fans.

He hit again for a 30-yard touchdown sprint with 3:30 remaining in the half, and McGardy passed to halfback Bruce Pruitt for the two-pointer.

McGardy hit end Paul Reid with 32 seconds left in the half to give the Moguls a 20 to 0 lead. After a scoreless third period, McGardy added another six-point tally to the score with a one-yard plunge to end the Mogul scoring.

Holliday got its first feel of pay-dirt with 1:24 remaining in the final period when Jimmy Pautsky broke loss for 70 yards, then passed to end J. Franklin for the two-pointer.

The Moguls led in first downs 18 to 7, in rushing yardage 203 to 156, in passing yardage 79 to 52. Munday completed four of five passes, while Holliday connected with five out of eight and had two intercepted.

Munday punted three times for a 19-yard average. Holliday had a 29-yard average out of three punts. Munday was penalized 4 times for 30 yards. Holliday 3 times for 25 yards.

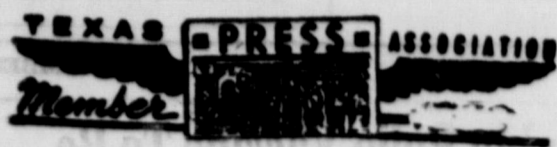

BUT WHEN THE RIGHTEOUS TURN AWAY FROM HIS RIGHTEOUSNESS; and committeth iniquity, and doeth according to all the abominations that the wicked man doeth, shall he live? All HIS RIGHTEOUSNESS THAT HE HATH DONE SHALL NOT BE MENTIONED: in his trespass that he hath trespassed, and in his sins that he hath sinned, IN THEM WILL HE DIE." Christ said to those who die in their sins "Whether I go, ye cannot come" (Jno. 8:21). In the above text, we find that some were righteous and turned from that righteousness and would die in their sins, and all their past righteousness would not even so much as be mentioned. They would be judged as an unrighteous person.

But, some one will say, "this was under the law of Moses" and we are not under that law today." That is true, but the apostle Paul said in the New Testament, in 1 Cor. 10:1-12 that these things happen as examples for those under the New Testament. Verses 11 and 12 in this text say, "Now all these things happened unto them for examples; and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come. WHEREFORE LET HIM THAT THINKETH HE STANDETH TAKE HEED LEST HE FALL."

The righteous under the old law who turned from their righteousness will not hear their righteousness even mentioned in the day of judgement. Paul said these things were "ensamples" for you and I Read 2 Peter 2:20-22.

The Lord does not desire that any one should be lost, but He has left the choice to each one of us. "Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God; and not that he should RETURN from his ways, and live?" (Ezekiel 18:23). We read where Peter said these words, "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that ALL SHOULD COME TO REPENTANCE." (2 Pet. 3:9). Joshua, said, ". . . choose you this day whom ye will serve; . . ." (Joshua 24:15).

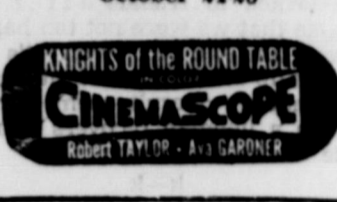

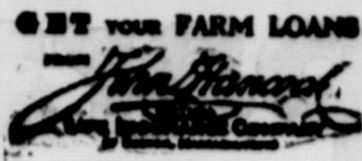

Maybe it's better to worry with all these little crisis. Now you take the Cuban problem . . .
