One more classer will be added early next week to bring the total classing force to four.

Grades for this week continued to improve as 5 percent White cotton showed up. Middling Light Spots made up 27 percent and Strict Low Middling Light Spots 30 percent of the weeks classing. Staple lengths dropped some to give 20 percent 29/32, 43 percent 15/16, and 19 percent 31/32 for the week.



CHURCH OF CHRIST GOREE, TEXAS **Baptized At What Age?** "How old should a person be before he is baptized?" This is a question that cannot be answered in terms of years. The Bible does not answer it that way. We are not even told the approximate age at which one becomes accountable before God. The Bible does tell us that one must hear the gospel before he can be baptized. Christ said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them . . ." (Matt. 28:19-20). It was said of the Samaritians, "But when they believed Phillip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both man and women" (Acts 8:12). One must believe before he can be baptized. Christ said "He that beliveth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mk. 16:16). After Phillip had preached Jesus to the eunuch, the eunuch said, "See here is water, what doth hinder me to be baptized? and Phillip answered and said, "If thou believeth with all thine heart thou mayest" (Acts 8:36-37). Repentance is necessary before being baptized. "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins . . ." The faith in the heart of the one to be baptized must be confessed. "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, mm will I confess before my Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 10:32). The eunuch made this confession before being baptized. "See here is water what doth hinder me to be baptized?

And Phillip answered and said, if thou believeth with all thine heart thou mayest. And he answered and said I BELIEVE THAT JESUS CHRIST IS THE SON OF GOD. And he commanded the chariot to stand still, and they went down both into the water, both Phillip and the eunuch, and he baptized him" (Acts 8:34-38).
