Odd Bits Salvaged By The Editor

Are you concerned about the constitutional amendments to be voted on next Tuesday?

To sum up our situation more accurately, we're confused.

Number One On The Ballot—Provides workmen's compensation insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

Number Two: Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from forty-seven million dollars to fifty-two million dollars—an increase of five million.

Number Three: Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

Number Four: Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

Number Five: Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

Number Six: Authorizes retirement disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve years or more.

Number Seven: Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

Number Eight: Establishes a ceiling of two million, five hundred thousand dollars per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

Number Nine: Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two hospital districts in Brazos County.

Number Ten: Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a public school board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

Number Eleven: Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

Number Twelve: Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

Number Thirteen: Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

Number Fourteen: Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions, of administrative or executive agencies of government. This, we believe, is one of the most controversial of the amendments and is opposed by many leaders in the Legislature.

So there they are. When you go to vote Tuesday, look them over, scratch your head—then scratch out either the "For" or "Against" portion of the proposed amendment.

In our humble opinion, if you scratch them all you won't be too far wrong. But as we said in the beginning, we're confused!

Moguls Trounce Wildcats By 14 to 0 Score In Important Conference Game

A powerful defensive attack by the Munday Moguls, led by Jackie Booe, pretty well contained Wildcat Dale Doyle last Friday night as the Moguls rolled to a 14 to 0 victory over the Crowell Wildcats on the home field. Booe, 160-pound junior, set the stage for Munday's first touchdown just before the half, after both teams had battled each other with little success for almost 21 minutes. Booe came up with a Wildcat fumble that stopped a surging Wildcat drive, and was in on at least half of the Mogul tackles during the game. Booe's recovery, with just four minutes left in the second quarter, started the Moguls on their way to victory. Munday had just punted out of bounds at the Crowell 20, and on the first play, Booe slipped through the Wildcat line from his middle guard position to smash down Dan Mike Bird, Crowell quarterback. Bird fumbled, and Bobby Curry fell on the ball at the 12 to give the Moguls possession. From there it took the Moguls four plays to score, with quarterback Douglas McGrady hitting end Charles Patterson in the end zone for the tally. The same pass combination added two more points to the Mogul score as the half ended. Munday struck again after seven minutes and 40 seconds had elapsed in the second half. Crowell miscued a snapback at its 32, and by the time the scramble was over, the Wildcats had been pushed back to their own nine. Larry Henry, Crowell half back, punted out to Ricky Couch, 120-pound Mogul halfback at the 45, who took the ball to the left, then reversed the field behind a wall of Mogul blockers and went all the way to score. Halfback Bruce Pruitt's extra point kick was wide, but the Moguls had a 14 to 0 lead. Crowell had two chances to score in the fourth, but Booe, Curry and guard Ronnie Hardin spearheaded the defensive stands for Munday. All in all, it was Munday's defense that decided the game. Other than Booe's and Curry's recovered fumbles, the Moguls dropped on one other Wildcat fumble during the game and McGrady intercepted a Crowell pass to kill still another drive. Munday's fleet of fine backs led by scamperer Pete Alcalá kept Munday's offense moving most of the night, although the Moguls could never really get their running game started. Alcalá emerged the game's second leading rusher with 67 yards and teammate Luis Flores had 50 steps to rank third. Archer City Next The Moguls, and a large crowd of enthusiastic supporters, will journey to Archer City on Friday night for another conference game. According to records of the two teams, the Moguls are slated to take this one. The game which will likely decide the district will be with Chillicothe here on November 9. The Eagles will be idle Friday night.

### "HOW TO LOSE JOBS"

The Altoona, Pennsylvania, Mirror, recently devoted an editorial to the highly important topic of "How to Lose Jobs."

A proposed law in Maine would raise the employer taxes which are used to meet unemployment benefits from one-half per cent of payroll to an eventual 2.7 per cent.

An iron works in that state says that this would increase its cost of doing business by \$230,000 a year. Recently the works, as low bidder, received a \$72 million contract.

However, its bid was less than \$90,000 below that of an out-of-state competitor. Had the newly proposed unemployment taxes, with their influence on overhead costs been in effect, it would have lost the contract. And numbers of its 3,000 employees would have joined the ranks of the unemployed.

This is just one of many examples that could be listed of taxes and tax rates that are self-defeating and destructive by their very nature. This country wants and needs more job opportunities. The over-all tax picture has a great deal to do with whether or not those opportunities will be created.

Robert Moses, head of New York City's liaison in federal-state-city arterial planning, and a prominent expert on transportation, has something to say about railroad mergers and the Interstate Commerce Commission: "If consolidation of large railroads will forestall nationalizations, why let a somnolent agency (ICC) that inspires little confidence stall the merger of the New York Central and Pennsylvania railroads?" He also called for repeal of discriminatory legislation, excessive regulation, and reorganization of federal agencies under central supervision.

### MAKING CRIME UNPROFITABLE

Crime, which is a major and growing problem in this country, can be curbed and made unprofitable—if those concerned display the needed determination and dedication.

The Acme Markets, Inc., (formerly American Stores Company), a retail chain, tells the encouraging story of what happened in Philadelphia.

Beginning in 1949, and continuing for eight years, the company's small neighborhood stores were subjected to 95 armed holdups. Two managers were murdered, and two police officers died in line of duty.

The District Attorney and the Police Department, aided by full company cooperation, brought all their resources to bear. One result: all 83 of the bandits participating in the 95 holdups were arrested. All were convicted and sent to prison, 10 for life terms.

A second result: In the succeeding four years and two months, there were but two armed holdups in company stores, and one has been solved. The thugs have learned that this is a case where crime doesn't pay. Here is the kind and quality of law enforcement, backed by citizen cooperation, the whole country needs.

OCHEYEDAN, IOWA, PRESS: "Official word has it that the United States government wound up its 1962 bookkeeping year with a budget deficit of \$700 million less than estimated in January. The final figure was \$6.3 billion—that's more than the entire budget of 25 years ago."

From the Portland, Oregon, Journal: "The longer the debate continues over a federal withholding tax on income from dividends and interest, the clearer it becomes that it would be an unfair burden on low-income taxpayers, and that collecting it would be a giant pain in the national neck."

### Saving Religion:

The more religion some people have the further they are from worshipping God in keeping with His word. The people of Athens were extremely devoted to their gods. It is said that they worshiped thirty thousand deities. They were sincere and had an abundance of zeal. The apostle Paul said to the Jews, "Brethren, my hearts desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they may be saved, For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." (Rom. 10:1-2).

While the Athenians were very religious, they were far from being Christians. Christianity is religion, but all religion is not Christianity.

Saving religion is a religion of faith—faith that is specific and exclusive. It is believing that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. It is believing every thing Jesus Christ has said. But saving religion is not a religion of faith only. It is just as much a religion of obedience as it is a religion of faith. "But wilt thou know, O Vain man, that faith without works is dead?" (Ja. 2:20). Neither obedience without faith, nor faith without obedience, is saving religion.

Man's obedience to God must be complete. Partial obedience saves no one. If God commands three things, and a man obeys two of them, he has not obeyed God. "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all. For he that said, Do not commit adultery, said also, Do not kill. Now if thou commit no adultery, yet if thou kill, thou art become a transgressor of the law" (James 2:10-11).

## Storage Methods Influence Quality Of Cotton Seed

It is time to think about next year's cotton plant seed. Some growers, reports Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, have already placed in storage seed of good quality. Others will do the same as the harvest moves into their areas.

To those who have not yet saved planting seed, Elliott suggests a first class house cleaning job for the storage facilities. Cottonseed, he points out, should be stored only in bins that have been cleaned thoroughly of waste material such as old grain, trash, feed sacks or other seed or debris which furnish living quarters for insects. It is a good practice to "sweep down" the ceiling and walls and clean the floor of the bin to remove hidden waste. Use builder's molding to cover cracks to eliminate seed collecting in them, he explains. Waste grain, seed and other materials beneath and near bins should be destroyed.

For those who have stored seed, Elliott suggests that regular checks be made of the seed and facilities to make sure insect pests haven't moved in. Insects, he adds, are more likely to become a problem if a large percentage of the seed are cracked and if stored in bins which harbor insects at the time the seed were placed in storage.

The specialist says several chemicals are recommended for use in and around the storage bins before seed are stored. Others may be used as a dust to treat the seed when they are placed in storage while other insecticides can be used to fumigate cottonseed which may have become infested with stored

grain pests.

Seed treated with chemical dust should not be crushed or used for feed, emphasizes Elliott. Use caution, he adds, in fumigating cottonseed which will be used for planting purposes. Under certain conditions fumigants may lower the germination of the seed. Studies indicate that germination of seed fumigated at high temperatures—80 degrees F. or above and at high moisture content—11 percent or above may be reduced. Because the use of chemicals involve hazards, Elliott suggests that the local county agent be contacted for complete details on what and how to use recommended insecticides.

Mr. Khrushchev has been badly advised. Somebody should have told him, everybody watches westerns over here, but nobody believes them. In these days, pouring concrete is the same as going for your gun.

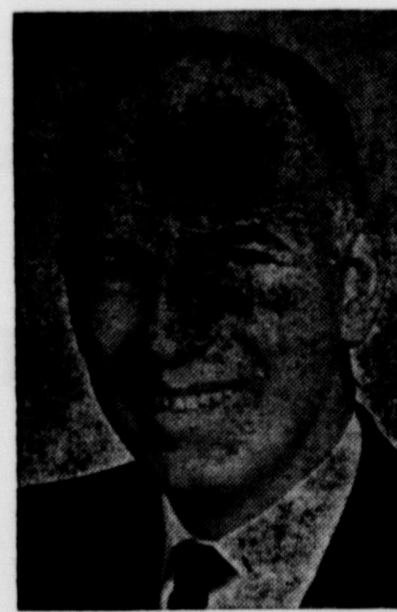
