Moguls Defeat Everman; Are Regional Champions

Albany-Munday Regional Game To Be At Stamford

The Munday and Albany Class A regional play-off game has been set for Bulldog Stadium at Stamford at 7:30 p.m. next Saturday.

Officials of both schools met at Stamford last Sunday afternoon and agreed upon the site. Albany, the 10-A champion and state titlist for the past two years, slipped past Burnett in bi-district play Friday night. The two teams played to a 28-28 tie, but Albany won on first downs, 20 to 16.

Munday, the 11-A winner, had little trouble in routing Everman 32 to 0 in bi-district action at Jacksboro on Saturday night.

Tickets for the game went on sale at Munday, Albany and Stamford on Wednesday. They are \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

The Munday Moguls went to Jacksboro Saturday expecting a rough situation with Everman. It wasn't long after the game started until they had the situation well in hand, and one newspaper commented that it was their "easiest of the season."

Behind the running of speedy Pete Alcalá, the Moguls knocked off the Everman Bulldogs, 32 to 0, in the Class-A bi-district game and won their first bi-district contest in history.

After a tough defensive battle the first quarter, quarterback Douglas McGrady broke the ice with a one-yard quarterback sneak. The Moguls had no trouble after that moving the ball over the muddy field which had been rained on approximately two inches earlier in the day.

Everman could never get started offensively and managed only two first downs and 40-yards around left end.

After taking over on downs from Everman on the Bulldog 38, Flores chalked up the final touchdown with a four-yard plunge through right tackle.

Coach Wayne Bingham sent his second unit into action in the fourth quarter but they were unable to score. It was also in the last period that Everman made its deepest penetration to the Munday 34.

Alcalá scored on a 28-yard run after the Moguls had driven from their own 42. McGrady passed to Patterson for the two points.

Skip Lane intercepted a Bulldog pass on the Everman 38 and ran to the 13 to set up the final tally in the first half. Fullback Lewis Flores carried from three-yards out for the score. McGrady passed to Bruce Pruitt for the two points.

Alcalá, who was responsible for most of the Moguls yardage, scored again early in the third quarter on a 24-yard scamper around left end.

Four Accidents Are Investigated In October

The Highway Patrol investigated 4 rural accidents in Knox County during the month according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,450.00.

The rural accident summary for Knox County from January through October of 1962 shows a total of 43 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 1 person killed and 31 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$19,976.00.

November and December signal the start of our Holiday season and the cold grim "Traffic Facts." During the last five years there has been a total of 11,902 traffic fatalities in Texas. Of this total 2,354 or 20% were killed during the months of November and December. For the year thus far there has been 1,841 traffic fatalities as compared to 1,766 for the same period of 1961, an increase of 75 or 4% with deadly December yet to come.

Dallas Man Is Killed Sunday Near Benjamin

A 22-year-old Texas Tech student from Dallas was fatally injured seven miles west of Benjamin on U. S. Highway 82 in a head-on collision at about 7:10 p.m. Sunday.

He was identified as Albert Fay Withrow, Jr., driver of a 1958 vehicle, traveling west and apparently enroute back to the Lubbock campus after the Thanksgiving holiday.

Reported in "fair condition" at the Knox County Hospital was Herbert Allen Forsythe, 57, of Fort Worth, who was traveling east on the highway in a 1962 vehicle.

A spokesman at the hospital said Forsythe suffered a fractured forearm and nose, contusions about the face and body and several broken ribs.

Both drivers were traveling alone in their vehicles at the time of the accident. Patrolman Arthur Mason of Seymour, investigating officer said.

Withrow's body was taken to Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home at Knox City and was later transferred to Dallas, where funeral services were held.

Light general rains over the territory slowed receipts most of the week so that the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Munday, classed only 3,046 samples for the week ending November 23 according to A. D. Peebles in charge.

The micronaire showed a slight drop with 10 per cent dropping below 3.5, 27 per cent 3.5-3.9, 36 per cent 4.0-4.4, 20 per cent 4.5-4.9, 7 per cent 5.0-5.4.

Grades ran 36 per cent Middling Light Spot, 27 per cent Strict Low Middling Light Spot, and 6 per cent Low Middling Light Spot.

Staple percentages for the week were 9 per cent 29/32, 37 per cent 15/16, 37 per cent 31/32, and 10 per cent 1 inch and longer.

Market activity remains slow with Middling Light Spot 15/16 averaging 30.49, Strict Low Middling Light Spot 15/16, 29/32; Middling Spot 15/16, 29/10 and Strict Low Middling Spot 15/16, 28.85.

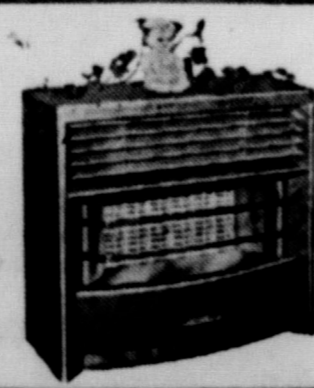

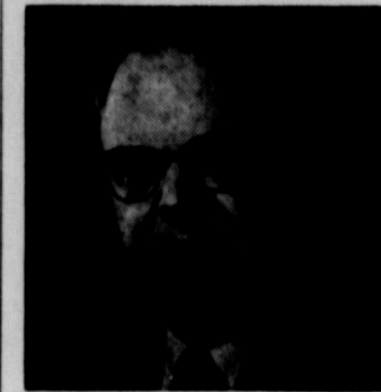

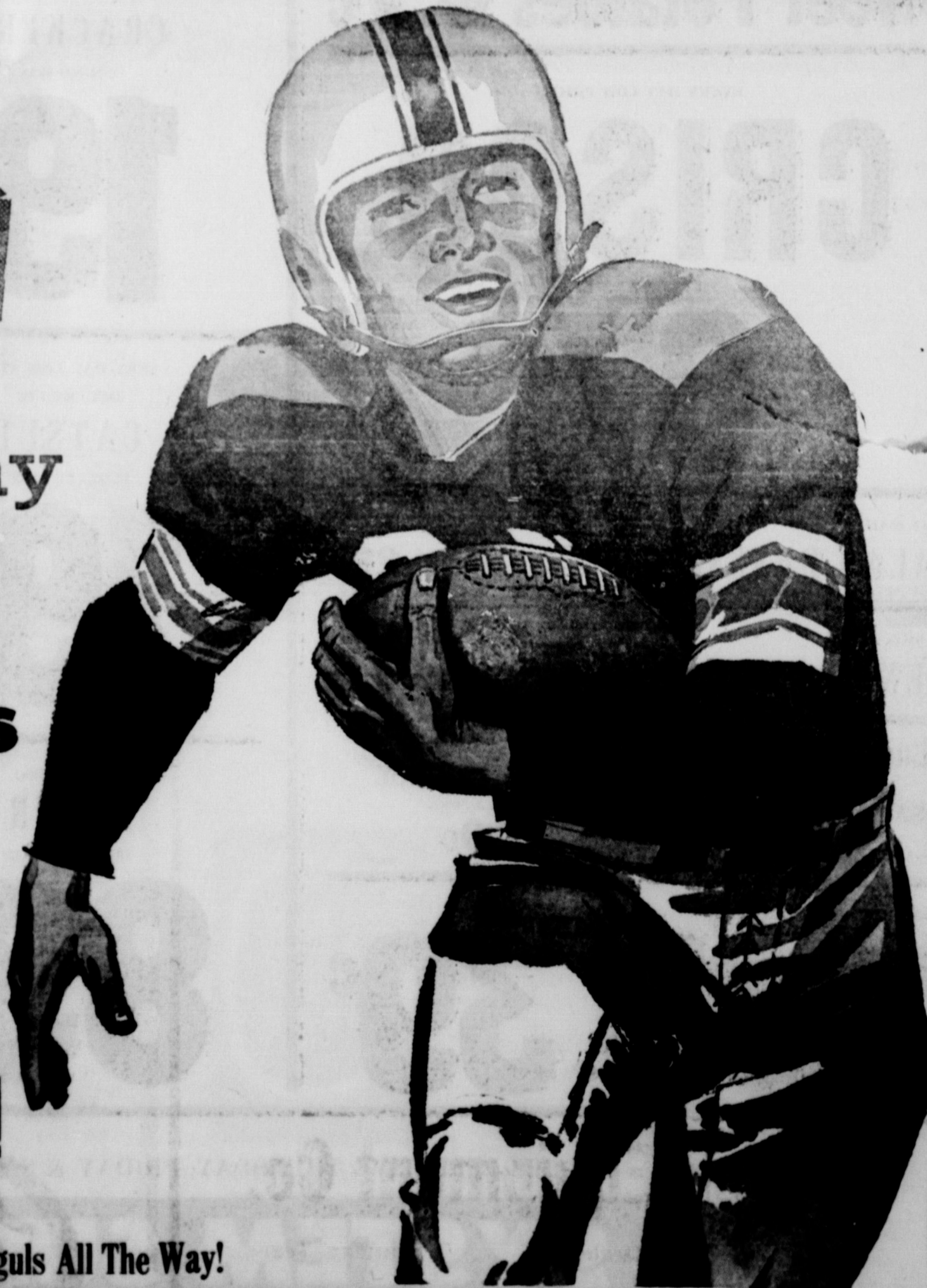

Dear editor:
When Mr. Khrushchev's man in Washington, I forget his name, well, I haven't forgotten it but I can't spell it, was telling Mr. Kennedy a while back that Russia had no missiles in Cuba, he knew at the time, as everybody knows now, that he was lying.

Now you might think this would be embarrassing to the Russians, but on the contrary they just laugh about it. Lying is one of the handy devices the Communists use whenever they get ready, and they've found it works plenty of times.

The Communists have found out that telling the truth is in such high standing in the free world that you can gain lots of territory by deliberately abusing it. India is the latest country that can tell you about this at the moment.

But here's a point I'm afraid the Communists have overlooked. They know quite a bit about human nature, but not everything. For example, if you can fool one group of people with a deliberate lie, what's going to keep one



Communist from lying to another Communist? What makes one Communist assume another Communist doesn't have some human nature too?

I'm no more a candidate for the job of expert on international affairs than I am for an award as an outstanding farmer, but I have a notion that the Russian and the Chinese Communists are now learning something about human nature, that if you can fool free countries by lying to them, you can also fool other Communist countries with the same tool. This may explain why Russia and China aren't too happy with each other. One has believed the other when he shouldn't have. They've forgotten that a liar on one front is pretty likely to be a liar on another front.

When Khrushchev says Communism will dominate the world, he's talking about Russian Communism. When the Chinese say the same thing, they're talking about Chinese Communism.

When a nation establishes throat-cutting as a national policy, it never knows when its own throat will be next.
