## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Although Knox County is not in the area where Sterile Screw-worm Flies are currently being dispersed, farmers and ranches in this county are still deriving the benefits of the Southwest Screw-worm Eradication Program.

A number of local livestock producers have expressed the feeling that they have contributed or are being asked to contribute to a program in which they are getting none of the results. This is not the case. Sterile flies are being dispersed in the 80,000 square miles of Texas and New Mexico where native screwworms normally spend the winter, while winter temperatures are expected to kill them out outside of the overwintering area. In all but a few abnormal years, screwworms do not overwinter in Knox County.

You could disperse millions of sterile flies in this county, but you wouldn't accomplish a thing if you didn't eradicate them in the "incubator" of southern Texas and southwestern New Mexico from which they can move into the northern areas each spring. I dare say if sterile flies had not been released in the southern part of the state this past year, the screwworm infestations experienced in this county would have been many times more numerous than they were.

It is projected that the barrier of sterile flies along the international border shall be in full operation, weather permitting, by February 15, 1963. The outer half of the barrier will receive 600 flies per square mile per week, and the inner half, 400 sterile flies per square mile. The estimated size of the barrier is 100,000 square miles. It is estimated that about 50 million flies per week will be needed within the barrier until July 1, 1963.

## Emergency Loans Available To Knox Farmers Suffering Severe Crop Damage

Congressman Graham Purcell announced in Washington that emergency loans are being made available to nine counties in North Texas, seven of them in the 13th Congressional District, for farmers who suffered severe crop damage during the 1962 crop year.

The Farmers Home Administration Administrator, Howard Eertsch, said the counties designated as available for emergency

loans include Baylor, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, Knox, Throckmorton, Wilbarger, Dickens, and Kaufman.

The action was taken, said Purcell, because of substantial damage and losses to crops, pastures, and livestock as the result of adverse weather conditions during the 1962 crop year, including freezes, drought, hail, and wind storms, and excessive rainfall and floods.

## Cotton Classing Office Cites Methods Of Special Conditioned Cotton Bales

Insufficient samples were classed during the week ending December 7 to give a summary on grades and staples according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Munday.

Market activity was about normal with middling light spot 15/16 averaging 30.56; middling light spot 31/32, 30.84; strict low middling light spot 15/16, 29.33; strict low middling light spot 31/32, 29.84.

Farmers lose money each year as a result of "special conditioned" bales of cotton. Most of these special condition bales that create problems in classing and marketing can either be avoided or corrected.

As the name implies, a "special condition" bale is different from an ordinary bale and requires special attention. They may be repacked, false packed, water packed, small "plates" and numerous other conditions. In most cases, it is necessary to correct these conditions before the farmer can

market his cotton advantageously.

Repacked cotton is common throughout the harvest season. "Repacks" are a result of combining two or more remnants or small bales regardless of whether they belong to the same farmer or whether they may be of the same quality. In other words, anytime that a bale is put back into the gin press and more cotton is added, the resulting bale is considered to be repacked and must be identified as such. These bales are not eligible to be put into the CCC loan program.

Water-packed and false packed bales are not too common as they can usually be prevented. Water packed bales are bales damaged by water, usually caused by being exposed to the weather or standing in water while in storage.

False packed bales are bales that have the appearance of normal bales on the outside but the interior is made up of lower quality cotton, inferior cotton, lint, or even substances entirely foreign to cotton.

Small plates of inferior cotton on one side of the bale are very common. These "plates" may be caused in many ways. One of the most common causes is turning the gin press too quickly between trailers of cotton.

When samples from special condition bales are sent to the USDA's cotton classing office the class cards that are then returned to the farmer will indicate that such a condition exists. These bales may then be corrected by the ginner or warehouseman by removing the inferior portion of the bale.

Such bales are then eligible for a review classification. The form requesting that the bale be reclassified must indicate that the bale has been "reworked" and exactly what was done to the bale.

Any operation short of the addition of cotton is called "reworked." Where the sample from a reworked bale is added, the resulting bale is card will carry the notation "reworked to remove plate."

The bale is then a normal bale and can be sold or placed in the CCC loan program.

Not all bales can be "reworked." They may be damaged beyond repair. Usually this can only be determined after the bale is opened and inspected.

### THE "IF" IN TAX REDUCTION

Writing in Nation's Business, Walter W. Heller, who is chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, says that taxes must be cut. In his words: "It now seems clear that one of the chief reasons for the sluggish behavior of our economy over the past five years or so is the persistent drag exerted by our present federal tax system."

There will be general agreement with that statement. And a tax reduction will come as welcome news to all of us—if!

The "if" lies in whether or not the tax saving is offset and more by increased living costs, due to a new surge of inflation. And one of the surest ways to produce inflation is found in successive, growing and huge government deficits.

The intelligent—and safe—way to institute tax reductions is to accompany them with the most stringent possible reductions in non-essential government spending. This means less welfare state—a renewed dependence on local government to handle local problems—a similar renewal in individual self-reliance and responsibility—and the elimination of government from business operations which can and should be conducted by tax-paying, self-supporting private enterprise.

You may, or may not, like this prescription. But, either way, it is the one the national health demands.

"The credit for our ability to meet the tremendous demands of our forces does not belong to the Military alone. We are heavily dependent upon the petroleum industry . . . It is absolutely essential that the United States have a healthy and vigorous oil industry in the interests of national defense."—Rear Admiral O. P. Latu, U. S. Navy.

### BROAD WINGS

American retailing has broad wings. They are reaching out over much of the civilized world.

A traveler in England, for example, will notice how the concept of mass distribution has crossed the seas. Supermarkets, American-style, are appearing in ever-increasing numbers. So are variety and other types of stores. Some of these, in fact, are owned by American chain companies with overseas subsidiaries. Others are locally-owned. But all follow, one way or another, the American Pattern and they are proving enormously attractive to consumers.

This does not mean that old ways of retailing have vanished. The ancient system of shopping where the housewife went to one store for fruits and vegetables, another for meat, still another for bread, and so on down the list remains. But it is gradually giving way to the new. So big volume, low-unit-profit mass distribution is bringing about a gradual retail revolution abroad, precisely as it has done here.

American exports consist of more than goods. Ideas—the kind of ideas that help to improve living standards for all—are among them.

LIBERAL, KANSAS, DAILY TIMES: "The plight of the unemployed American, although not a happy one by American standards, is Utopian compared with that of the Russian who is unemployed . . . Wages paid Russian workers in 1959-60 averaged about four rubles per hour of labor, the equivalent of \$80 per month at the rate of exchange at that time, according to latest international labor data . . . Remembering that all necessities of life are by far cheaper in the United States, even the unemployed person in this country is about as well off as the full-time employed average Russian worker."

### Our Plea

The basic plea made by the church of Christ is the restoring of New Testament Christianity in its purity and simplicity. Since we have the inspired word of God to direct us in each age we can know the principles and examples which came from Christ, God's Son. Our worship reflects this basic plea.

For example we observe the Lord's Supper as a vital part of our worship each Lord's day as we have the approved example in Acts 20:7. The early church practiced this. Each worshipper is given an opportunity to partake of both the fruit of the vine and the bread, which represents the blood and body of our Lord. "Let a man so examine himself, and so let him eat of the bread, and drink of the cup . . ." (1 Cor. 11:28).

Each Lord's day a collection is taken (1 Cor. 16:2). Each Christian is encouraged to give cheerfully and as God has prospered him (2 Cor. 8:10-11; 9:2). The Jews under the Old Law were required to give a tenth. Christians are not under the law of Moses, but under the law of Christ. They should not be demanded (by man) to give a certain amount as a matter of law, but should give even more liberally than the Jews as a matter of love. It is more blessed to give than receive.

Music in the worship of the church of Christ is vocal. The New Testament teaches us that every Christian should sing and make melody in his heart (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16). We do not use instrumental music in worship because it is not commanded and we have no approved example of its use in the New Testament church. This is in keeping with the worship of the early Christians as we read in the scriptures, and we are not to add to or take from God's plan (Rev. 22:18-19).
