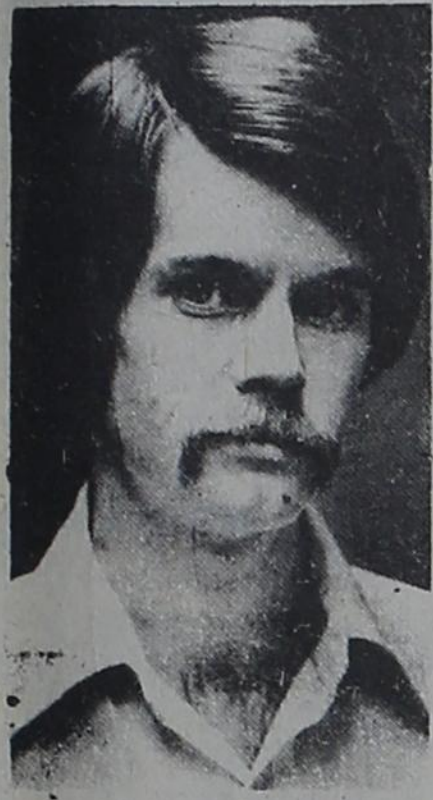

## Goree Elevator Gets First Wheat May 31

The first wheat of 1979 to be harvested in this area was received at month's end by Goree Producers Co-op Elevator. The first to arrive came from the J. W. Michels farm and was received Thursday, May 31. This load of 504 bushels tested 20% moisture content, but was taken by the elevator and dried out to 13.50.

Following Michels was Tom West, who farms the Cowan land southeast of

Munday. West's first load of 157 bushels tested 16.30 moisture and was dried out to the acceptable 13.50. West continued harvesting a 42-acre field, and the grain was accepted by the Goree elevator with moisture content of 14.15 to 15.37 for the 2,428 bushels.

West estimated this field was yielding from 25 to 30 bushels per acre.

Early this week, before the rain Tuesday, the Goree elevator had received grain from Elkin Warren, Floyd Bowman, Charles Pribyla, Dewitt Green and Wm. J. Goode. Altogether, their dryers had processed a total of 6,200 bushels.

First wheat to arrive in Munday was brought to Farmers Grain Co-op last Monday by Ernest Horton. This load of 82 bushels tested 61 pounds, with 13.8 moisture content.

This was followed by another load from J. W. Bellinghausen of 520 bushels. Test weight was

61½ pounds, with moisture content of 13.7.

## Former Rhineland Man Dies In Auto Accident

A 65-year-old Abilene man who was a native of Rhineland, was killed and two others injured in a head-on collision early Friday morning just north of Abilene.

Leonard Joseph (Lennie) Kuehler was dead on arrival at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene after the 12:41 a.m. accident on U. S. 277, north of Abilene. He was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Terry Spraberry of Anson.

The two injured men were reported in good condition late Friday. They are John Henry Perez, 19, who received facial lacerations, and Israel Jaquez, 20, who suffered leg and chest injuries. Both are from Abilene.

Kuehler, a department manager at Acco Feeds, was born March 8, 1914, in Rhineland and was reared there. He married Juanita Forehand on January 6, 1940, in Rhineland. They moved to Abilene in 1955 from Munday, where Kueh-

ler had become associated with Anderson-Clayton Co. He was assistant manager at Anderson-Clayton, having been with the company more than 40 years. He was a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, and a veteran of World War II.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday from Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Abilene, with the Rev. Alvin Wilde, pastor, and James Bridges, former pastor, officiating. Burial was in Merkel Cemetery.

**Mr. Farmer, Have You Seen Your Soil Inventory**

It has been said that a farmer needs to "know his soil" as well as he knows his family if he is to get the maximum response from management practices such as irrigation, fertilizers, and crop varieties.

It is very difficult for a farmer or a rancher to stay in business if he ignores the basis for his profit - the soil.

The Standard Soil Survey of Knox County is an inventory of the county's soil as a natural resource material. "The soil survey is a good tool for the farmer to use every acre of soil within its capabilities and treat it according to its needs," reports Arche Lieb, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City. In the survey, soils are classified according

to their characteristics and then given a soil type name. Miles fine sandy loam is one of the more extensive soils in the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District.

Land Capability Classification is used to show the

relative suitability of soils for crops, grazing, wildlife, and recreation land. It is a practical grouping of soils based on their needs, limitations, risks of damage, and their responses to principles of soil management. Capability Classes are

designated by Roman numerals I through VIII. The numerals indicate progressively greater limitations and narrower choices for practical uses. Classes I, II, III are soils suitable for cultivation of annual crops. Class IV soils should be cultivated only occasionally or under very careful management. Class V, VI, and VII soils are soils that should not be cultivated but can be used for pasture, range or wildlife. Class VIII soils should be used only for recreational areas or wildlife land.

For the rancher the soils are also grouped into range sites or "kinds of country." Different kinds of soil differ in their capacity to produce grass and other plants for grazing and range sites are groupings of these different kinds of soils. For example, Miles fine sandy loam is included in the "Sandy Loam" range site. Under ideal conditions the vegetative community is dominated by little bluestem, sideoats grama, plains bristlegloss and Arizona cottontop, and total air dry herbage yield ranges from 1800-3400 pounds per acre depending on rainfall. All the range sites and desirable range management practices are discussed in the soil survey report of Knox County.

Any farmer or rancher interested in information on his soils is cordially invited to come to the Soil Conservation Service Office in Knox City. SCS services are free and are available without regard to race, color, creed or religion.

**Bunton Goes To Seminar**

Pharmacist Don Bunton of A. L. Smith Drug of Munday, attended a Texas Pharmaceutical Association-sponsored seminar entitled "Therapeutic Aspects of Diseases of the Central Nervous System" on Sunday, May 20, at the Starlight Motel in Abilene, Texas.

Carlton Erickson, Ph.D., Professor of Pharmacy at the University of Texas at Austin College of Pharmacy spoke to seminar participants on therapy of selected diseases of the central nervous system.

Discussions aided pharmacists in fully understanding the appropriate use of psychoactive drugs to help them communicate the information to the patient, which is necessary for proper patient compliance with rational drug therapy. Discussions included schizophrenia, tardive dyskinesias, parkinson's disease and Huntington's chorea.

# Farm Ponds of Area Provide Fun For Many

Ponds, like any body of water, attract people. When the two come together, there always is the chance of a drowning or boating accident.

Ponds are an asset to the environment and have many uses, Danny Bell, Technician with the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service in Knox City, states. During the past 30 years, Texas landowners have built more than 360,000 ponds as part of their soil and water conservation plans. Some 340 ponds have been built in the Knox County area.

Families and friends are attracted to ponds because they are nice places to picnic, swim, boat, or fish, Bell stated. But a small boy passing by who is attracted by the water may do almost anything. This is why keeping ponds safe is so important.



FARM PONDS can provide fun and recreation, but the practice of safety can enhance their enjoyment, officials advise.

safety suggestions listed by Bell:

1. Before construction, find out about your liability. You may need to protect yourself with insurance and have your pond built by a reliable contractor who will

follow engineering specifications.

2. During construction, remove trees, brush, and anything else that might hinder safe boating or swimming. Eliminate sudden dropoffs and deep holes

in the swimming area.

3. Once a pond is completed, mark the safe swimming areas and put warning signs at danger points. Tell swimmers not to swim alone, and post safety instructions for swimmers and boatmen. Use boats that will float if swamped or capsized, and warn swimmers and boaters to stay out of ponds during storms and when spillways are flowing. Above all, recognize that farm ponds are hazards, to small children. Your farm or ranch pond can be a source of enjoyment as well as profit, but only if it is safe, Bell concluded.

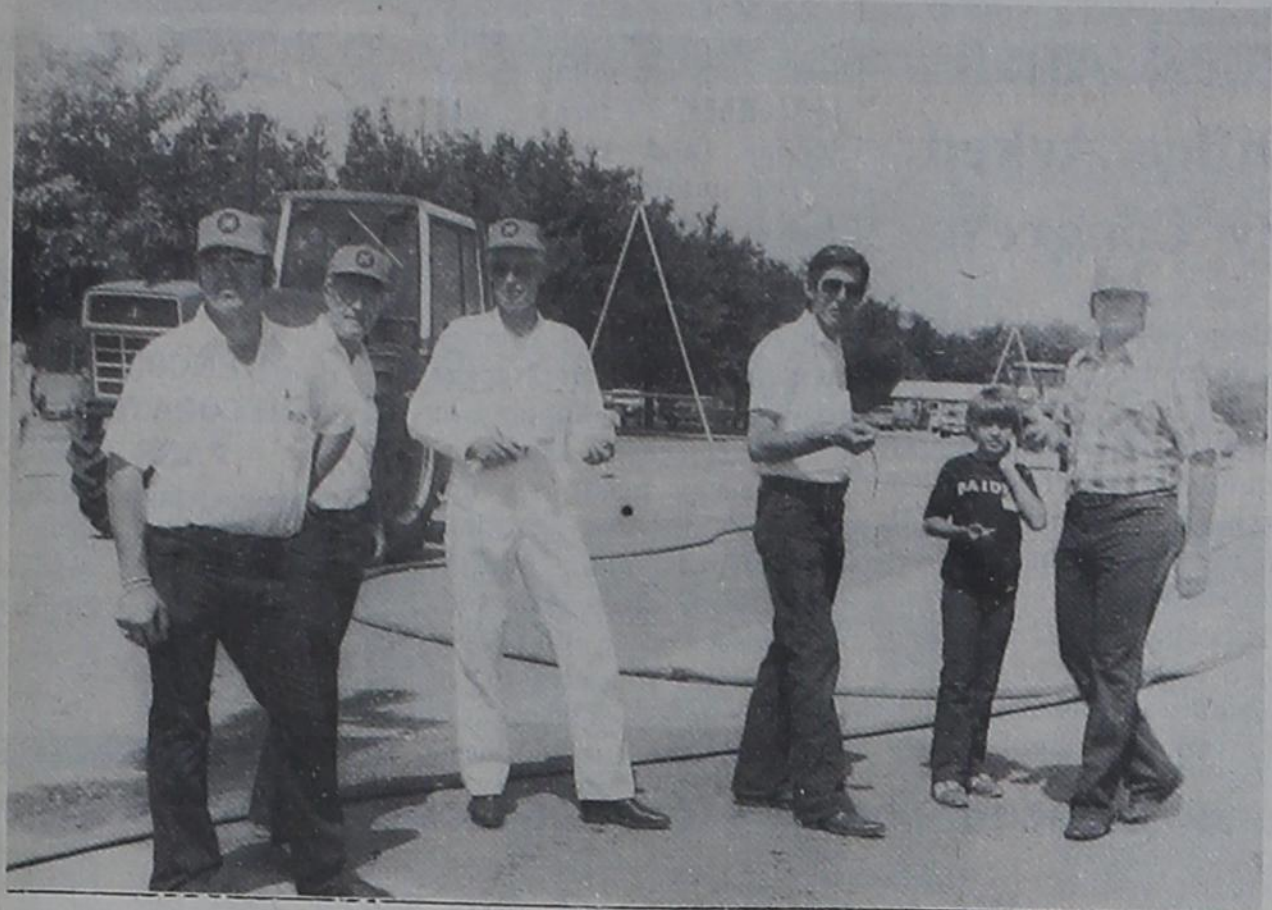

## Rural Affairs Office Asked By Congress

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has joined fellow members of the Congressional Rural Caucus in requesting the President to establish an Office of Rural Affairs within the Department of Energy.

It is their belief that this office is needed to identify problems and needs, formulate and implement appropriate solutions, and maintain a constant follow-up for agriculture, energy production, and related resource matters in small cities, towns, and rural areas. The proposed office should be at the top level of the Department of Energy to assure that rural areas receive adequate supplies of energy at critical times.

If energy needs are not satisfied at the right time then food and energy production are affected, farm losses occur and people in the cities and rural areas suffer from losses of production and, eventually, possible shortages of food and more severe energy shortages.

## TEXAS TALK



Fast food in the feedlot. Dairy scientists at the University of Illinois say that jawbone-shaped feedbowls for dairy cows may speed up eating time and help hold costs down. Ag engineers designed bowls for a fast feed service to increase the number of cows that can take their turns eating at a stall where feed is dispensed electronically throughout most of the day and night. Now, about 40 cows can eat where 30 once ate. Each additional cow fed through each stall reduces the cost of the feeding system per cow, and cows spend less time dawdling, eating their cereal grain and supplement faster if their bowl has a shape similar to their lower jawbone. Researchers theorized that the jawbone shape would allow feed to collect in front of the cow's muzzle where she could gather feed into her mouth faster with less licking, and it worked. Cows ate up to 7.9 ounces of feed per minute from the jawbone-shaped bowl compared to 5.9 ounces per minute from a conventional feedbowl.

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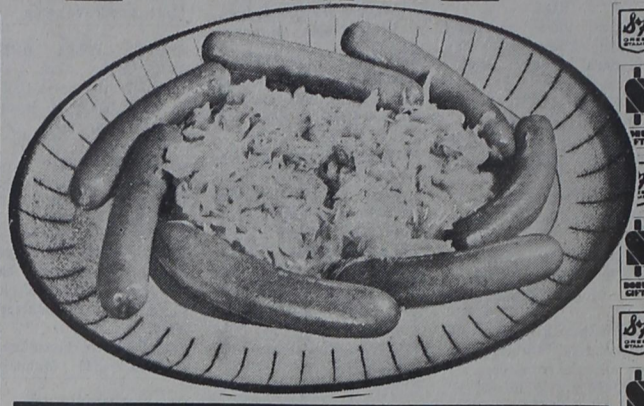
