Meals-On-Wheels To Receive Funding From City

With Mayor Payne residing in Monday night's City Council meeting, members of the board discussed the possibility of bringing in a new cable company to supply Baird with better cable TV. Jim Former, a representative with B&F Communications, told the council that his company was interested in Baird and could supply the town with a 12 station system. He stressed

to the council the importance of having the City's attorney negotiate the termination transactions with Brownwood Cable Systems. The current systems offer 4 channels plus HBO at an extra charge, but has promised a 35 channel system. A 120 day extension was granted to Brownwood in 1979 for the purpose of updating present equipment. Members said some equipment had been replaced, but only where the electric and telephone companies had replaced some poles. The representative of B&F told members when a decision had been made with the present supplier they would certainly be interested in supplying Baird with Cable TV. Also on the agenda was the opening of the sealed bids for the dam repair. About 800 feet of dam has settled approximately 2½ feet and requires fill dirt.

The 3 bids opened were rejected and it was decided by the members to look further into other alternatives. Fern Lee reported to the council the progress of the Meals on Wheels program. She said an average of 61 meals were prepared each day at a cost of \$2.69 each. The government has given the program freeze dried lunches. This will cost the program \$5000 up front, but will all be reimbursed. Mrs. Lee asked the council if the city would donate \$3,000 to the program. A unanimous vote of yes on the donation was received from the council. After the council discussed July's financial statement, Citizen Buddy Bouldin asked the council when the city would fix the potholes in the street. Mayor Payne informed Mr. Bouldin that the street work had begun on 3rd Street.

County Subsidizes Funds For EMS, Approves Precinct Judges

The County Commissioners met Monday and approved the payroll deduction for an voluntary employee insurance offered by the Deferred Compensation Program. B.J. Weatherly represented the company at the meeting. A \$1,850 subsidy was approved for a backup used ambulance and equipment for EMS. Clyde Chief of Police, Bing Miller, and Director for Citizens EMS was present. Election judges for Precinct 2 and 8

were appointed and Leo Dixon replacing Gaston Swafford in #2 and Sybil Johnson replacing alternate judge John Armor, in #8 was also approved. Rosa Hass, representing, Callahan County Nutritional Project, was present for the approval of a \$5,000 donation for the project. An application by Butch Woodard and Calvin Poindexter for the use of county equipment for terracing in Precinct 2 was approved by the court.

Callahan County Schools Set Pre-Registration Date

School districts in Callahan County have set registration dates for elementary junior high and high school students. BAIRD Registration for Baird elementary through 12th grade will be August 16-17. All students in grades 1-8 must be registered by their parents Monday and Tuesday from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. in the Junior High Library. New students must bring copies of their immunizations, and new first graders must also bring an official copy of their birth certificates. All new high school students who did not attend Baird Public Schools last year may register on August 16 or 17 in the principal's office. These students should bring a transcript of previous school work and their

immunization records. Teachers report for workshops August 23 and the first day of class is August 26. CLYDE Pre-registration for new students in the Clyde Consolidated Independent School District is now going on in the principal's office of the elementary, junior high and high school. Classes are scheduled to start August 23. Faculty and staff are to report August 17 for the first of three consecutive in-service training days. CROSS PLAINS First day of class for all students in the Cross Plains School District is August 23 at 8:20 a.m. Registration for all new students is the first day of school.

Clyde Lake Claims Life of Abilene Man Saturday

Jerry Wayne Hughes, 21 of Abilene, was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Lee Savell after search teams recovered his body about 7:20 p.m. Saturday. Hughes drowned when he strayed too far from the shore while playing with a frisbee. Fishermen joined county deputies, Clyde police, Baird Fire Department and Department of Parks and Wildlife volunteers in searching for Hughes' body. All but one of the boats in the 4½ hour search were donated by local residents. Services for Hughes were at 10 a.m.

Tuesday at Bailey Funeral Home Chapel. Willard H. Bone, officiated, assisted by Don Patton. Burial was at Oplin Cemetery. Born Aug. 29, 1960, in Brownwood, he moved to Abilene in 1971. He attended Abilene public schools and worked for M&M Dry Wall. He also coached Abilene Little League baseball for several years. He is survived by his mother and stepfather; three brothers; a step-brother; three half-brothers; a step sister; two half-sisters; two grandmothers; a stepgrandmother; and 13 nieces and nephews.

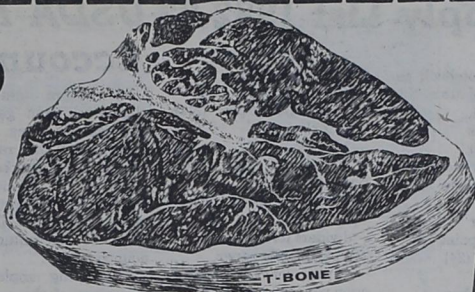

To ensure that only eligible children get free and reduced price meals, parents will be required to provide social security numbers on applications for free and reduced price meals, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

The ruling implements provisions of the omnibus budget reconciliation act of 1981, which requires that applicants include the social security number of all household members or an indication that none is available.

In accordance with the Privacy Act of 1974, all state agencies and local school food authorities will be required to disclose how the social security numbers will be used and by what authority the information is required. In addition, the individuals must be informed that the disclosure is required in order for the application to be considered.

Prior to the reconciliation act, applications for free and reduced price meals required only family size and income information.

The change in the application procedures has been initiated in order to improve the integrity of the school feeding programs, Assistant Secretary Mary C. Jarratt, said. "We are very concerned about the potential abuse that can be caused if parents misreport their incomes on free and reduced price meal applications," she added.

To implement the revised application procedures in the beginning of the 1982-83 school year, the regulations will be published interim final. This means they are effective upon publication but USDA will accept comments on the procedures in order to make any necessary changes. Comments should be sent by December 31, 1982 to Stanley Garrett, Branch Chief, Policy and Pro Development Branch, FNS, 3101 Park Center

School Meal Prices Set, Reduced-Price Meals Offered

Students may buy breakfast each morning between 7:45 and 8:10 in the cafeteria for 45¢. Lunches will be priced as follows:

Kindergarten through grade 3-70¢
Grades 4-6-75¢
Grades 7-12-80¢

Children from families whose incomes is at or below the level shown on the scale below are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out the application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions of the form. Each family will receive an application form at the time of registration or one may be picked up in the principal's office.

For an application to be complete, you must provide: the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or state that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member.

The information of the application may be checked by the school of other officials at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when

your household size decreases. You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for free or reduced-price benefits for them, please tell the school.

Children who get meal benefits are treated the same way as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have a right to a fair hearing.

This scale should be provided parents with the letter and application form.

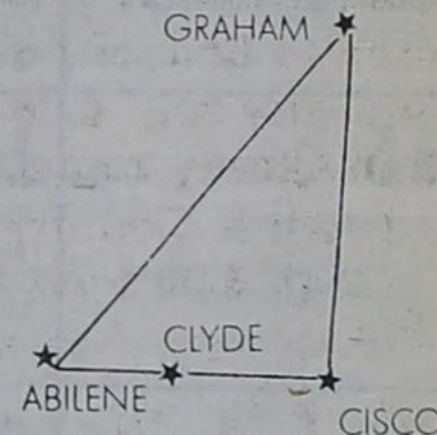

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. 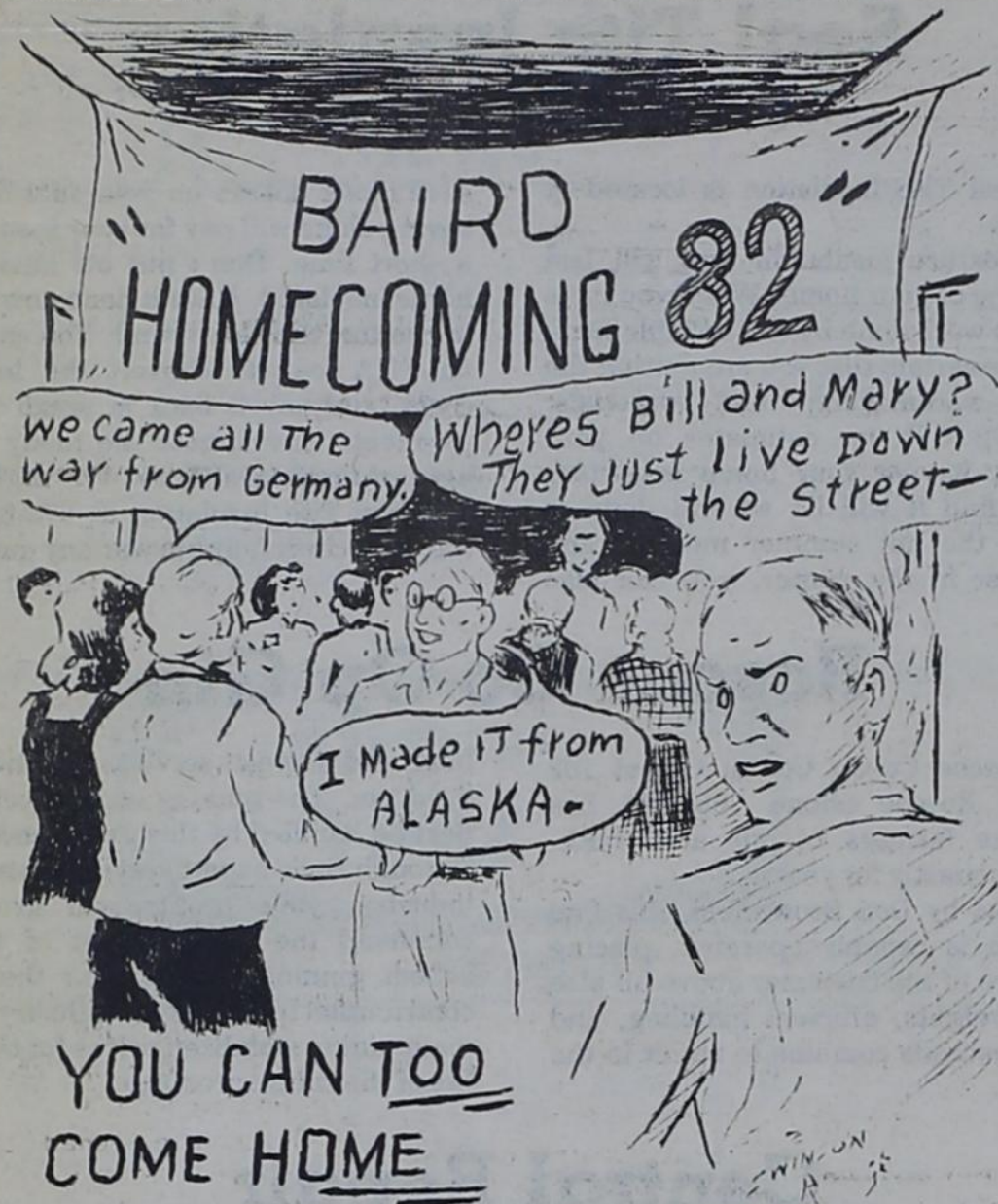
