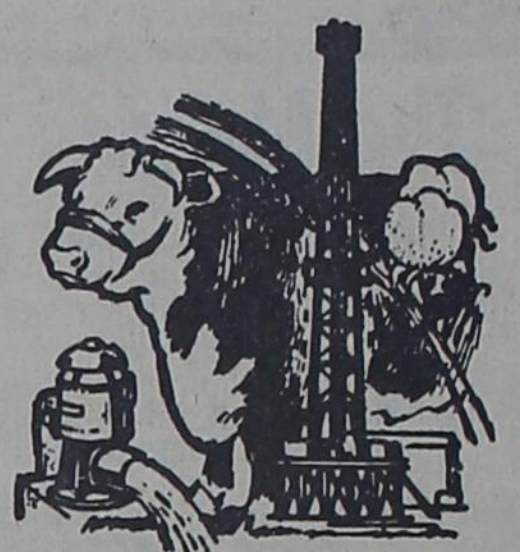

Election Approves Sales Tax For City Of Munday

In the City Election, April 6, Munday citizens okayed the one percent sales tax by a 2-1 plus margin. The measure carried 138-62.

J. E. Reeves, unopposed, was re-elected as mayor.

W. O. Smith and Dr. W. H. Stewart were re-elected to the City Council with 157 and 173 votes respectively. Joe Morrow received 60 votes.

After the election had been held and votes cast were favorable by a large majority of our citizens indicating to the City Council that all steps shall be carried out as requested by the State law and instruction to the State Comptroller as to results of the election.

The next procedure will be filling all records pertaining to said sales and use tax election to be filed with the State Comptroller, including a map of the City of Munday. This map will designate the boundaries of all business and residences areas within the cooperate limits of Munday.

The law so states that election held within one quarter shall finish that quarter and wait another complete quarter of a year until tax collections will be in force.

In our case, this will make the date fall on October 1, 1968 as the date to begin collecting the one cent sales and use tax within the City of Munday.

When entering into a contract with the Housing Authority of Munday, Texas, within intent of making application to the Housing Urban Development Agency, it became necessary for many requirements to be complied with, as set-out in the HUD Agency of the Federal Government. At this time, we have on file with HUD an application which has been acknowledged by the secretary for 60 low rent housing units for aged persons.

Knox Co. Hospital District To Enforce Visiting Policy

Due to the number of emergencies this past weekend, the Knox County Hospital District has been forced to enforce visiting policies in the hospital.

Visiting hours will be strictly enforced. The permitted visiting times are from 10-11 a.m., 2-4 p.m., and 7-9 p.m. Hospital authorities are asking that everyone confine visiting to these hours as the patients are ill and need rest and quiet. Also, only "immediate" family will be allowed in the halls and patient's room following an accident or emergency.

All friends and relatives are asked to please stay OUT of the halls and patient's room during this time. There will be no one allowed in the halls by the X-Ray and Emergency Rooms. The reasons behind this policy is that the doctors are hindered in going from one department to another, and the patients cannot be transferred from one department to another with bystanders filling the halls. A spokesman said, "We are fully concerned about the welfare of the patient and his recovery, and if others are, they will please abide by these stated policies. Also, we have the welfare of other patients in the hospital, and they deserve as much quiet as we can possibly give them."

Blood Mobile To Visit Our City, Thurs.

The Red Cross blood mobile will be in Munday, Thursday, April 25. It will be located at the Church of Christ's Fellowship Hall. The local blood bank officials have set a goal of 70 pints of blood. This is a very good time to give blood, because there has been little sicknesses.

The Red Cross blood bank furnishes blood to any resident of Knox County, anywhere in the United States without charge for the blood. The Red Cross blood bank also maintains a supply of fresh, whole blood at the Knox County Hospital at all times. In cases of emergency, the hospital has had the blood bank at Wichita Falls rush blood to the hospital at night.

If you are between the ages of 19 and 61, you can insure that you will have blood available to you at all times, by participating in this "Bleed-in" and giving a pint of blood. The bank will visit Munday only twice each year, and Knox City only twice each year. No matter where in the county you live, we urge you to give at either of these locations every time that it is possible.

Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the twentieth day and the fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

Accidents Plague Area During Easter Weekend

In a rash of tragic accidents which began last Friday, several area youths were injured and some critically.

Friday at 4:15 p.m. a two-car collision on FM 2229 about 3.4 miles west of O'Brien injured two O'Brien boys and two Knox City students. Clint Fletcher, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Fletcher of Knox City, was driver of a 1956 Chevrolet traveling east. Passengers in his car were Duane Bradford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Bradford of Knox City, and Jim Edd Adkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Adkins of O'Brien and sophomore student at Cisco Junior College.

Lanny Covey, traveling west in a 1967 Dodge was alone in his car. Investigating officer, Bill Lusk of the Texas Highway Patrol, described the collision as "near head-on", and both vehicles were a total loss. All of the youths were admitted to the Knox County Hospital. Jim Edd Adkins was transferred by Smith Funeral Home ambulance to the Wichita Falls General Hospital in Wichita Falls Saturday at noon where he was placed in the intensive care unit. Relatives described his condition as of press time as "real good". Clint Fletcher was transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, Monday and authorities report that he is slightly improved. Duane Bradford was dismissed from the hospital on Monday, and as of Tuesday afternoon, Lanny Covey was still a patient in the Knox County Hospital and reported to be doing well.

About 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning, Martha Pape of Munday was brought to the Knox County Hospital by a Smith Funeral Home ambulance following a one-car accident about four miles south of Gilliland on FM 267. John Lee Nelson, student at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Oklahoma, was owner and driver of the car. Other passengers were Johnny Smith and Johnny Hunter. All of the 19-year old youths were from Munday. Miss Pape was admitted and kept for several hours for observation and released.

Sunday afternoon about 5:30 p.m. Miss Peggy Duke, 19, of Munday was taken to the Knox County Hospital by McCauley-Smith Funeral Home Inc. ambulance of Munday and later transferred to Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls following a two-car accident in Munday.

Miss Duke was a passenger in an auto driven by Greg Oustad, 19, also of Munday. Other Munday youths injured in the accident were Kathy Welch, 19, student at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and Beverly Stewart, 19. Wayne Birkenfeld, 19, of Goree was also injured. As of Tuesday afternoon, Miss Welch and Birkenfeld had been dismissed from the Knox County Hospital. Miss Stewart is still a patient there, but reported to be in good condition.

Miss Duke was reported by hospital authorities in Wichita Falls Tuesday evening as being in "fair" condition, after listing her condition as "poor" on Monday. She is in Room 430.

Bill Lane of Haskell was the driver of the auto which was in collision with the Oustad auto. Lane was uninjured.

Mack Stout, highway patrolman of Seymour, investigated the accident.

Regional Conference For Veterans

A Regional Rehabilitation Conference for Veterans Service Officers will be held in Lubbock on April 18 and 19, 1968. This announcement was made today by Mr. Charles L. Morris, Executive Director of the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission.

This two-day meeting will be conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission, in cooperation with the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Veterans County Service Officers in the 79-County West Texas Region. The purpose of the Conference is to acquaint Service Officers with the latest changes in the laws and regulations pertaining to veterans' benefits. Present for the meeting will be representatives from the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, Texas, from the Veterans Administration Hospitals in Amarillo and Big Spring.

During the Conference there will be discussions concerning the various veterans' benefits programs, such as disability compensation and pension, VA hospitalization and medical treatment, survivors' benefits, educational assistance for veterans and their children, and others. The meeting is open to the public, and will be held at the American Legion Post #148, located at 2412 Avenue Q, in Lubbock, Texas.

ROLLING PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.



A scheduled hearing of cotton growers before the Senate Agriculture Committee has been delayed due to uncertain conditions in the Nation's capitol, according to Charles G. Bragg, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Bragg, with other representatives of Texas cotton producer groups, was to have flown to Washington on Monday where they had been scheduled to appear before the Senate Agriculture Committee to present testimony favoring an extension of the present cotton program.

After careful consideration of the situation in the District and telephone conversations with Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls and George Mahon of Lubbock, it was decided to cancel the trip. Congressman Mahon was furnished copies of the testimony and agreed to be personally responsible for presenting it for the Texas growers when the hearings are finally held.

Senator Ellender, chairman of the Committee, was notified by wire of the cancellation and extra copies of the testimony sent to him by mail.

Late Monday Congressman Purcell said that due to the turmoil created by the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King in Memphis, Tenn., the legislative programs in both House and Senate had been revised. He was unable at the time of the call to contact Senator Ellender or any other member of his staff. Congressman Purcell assured Bragg that he and Mahon would lend whatever assistance they could in getting the Texas' growers' testimony before the Senate Committee.

"For the first time in history," said Bragg, "Texas growers will present a united front on major provisions of the new cotton program whenever the testimony is presented."

Details of the presentation were worked out at a meeting of Texas Association of Cotton Producers Organizations held early last week in Dallas.

Bragg said TACPO's program, to be presented to both the Senate and House Agriculture committees, would include practically every detail of the legislative proposals approved by the RPCG executive directors and legislative committee at a March meeting in Stamford.

Specific recommendations to the Ellender Committee included the following excerpts from the testimony to be given:

"Most important, any extension of the present program must be designed to maintain the current level of producer income . . .

"This should be an absolute minimum income for cotton producers, and while we agree that provisions of the program must be flexible, we believe it is essential that this amendment (the Ellender Amendment to the 1965 act guaranteed cotton producers 65 percent of parity) remain intact in new legislation.

"A program must be designed for domestic and export consumption that will lead to a return to a profitable production from legal minimum of 16 million acre national allotment. "Texas cotton farmers export approximately 65 percent of their crop each year. On the farm, they cannot separate domestic from export bales. They cannot separate export acres from domestic acres. The cost of producing for the two markets is the same . . . Therefore we recommend that the price support payment provisions be modified to include the total needs of the market, both export and domestic.

"Authority to transfer cotton allotments between farms by sale or lease should not only be extended, but liberalized. It can be made more efficient by removing the 100-acre limitation and extending the time period during which transfers can be made."

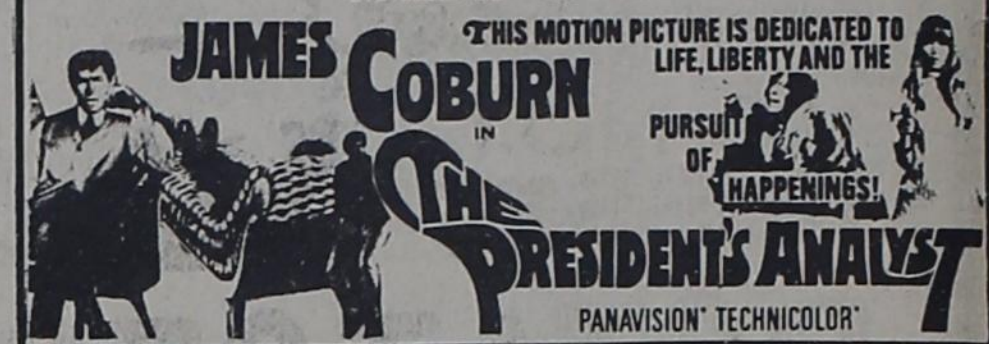

It is wise to remember that safe use of herbicides on early germinating weeds in the spring aids full grass production. But he says that late germinating weeds should be allowed to grow to provide a food supply for game birds.

GAS A HAZARD IN CONFINED HOUSING

Livestock producers using slatted floors, partially slatted floors or any system of confined housing which permits the storage of manure for extended periods within the building have a potential gas hazard.


W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M University, says toxic gases produced by the bacterial decomposition of animal manure include methane, carbon dioxide, ammonia, and hydrogen sulphide. Each of these is toxic

to farm animals if present in the atmosphere in excessive concentration.

The absolute effect of these gases on farm animals, and animal tolerance to these gases may not be definitely defined at present. Numerous studies and experiences have shown decreased growth rates, decreased production and more susceptibility to respiratory infection. Animal death has been attributed to these gases, he notes.

Until more information is available, producers using confined housing with interior manure storage should avoid excessive concentration of these gases in their facilities. To prevent such concentrations, the engineer suggests providing adequate ventilation with good air distribution; installing traps or baffles to prevent gases from underground liquid manure storage tanks flowing back into the building; ventilating underground covered storage areas; adding water to be sure all solids are covered; and

Unpalatable weeds should be controlled to allow better forage plants to increase for livestock and wildlife grazing.

A dense growth of weeds can cause deterioration of a range within a few years. To improve these conditions, control in the early growing season with herbicides. This early season control means that the soil moisture can be used for good forage production.

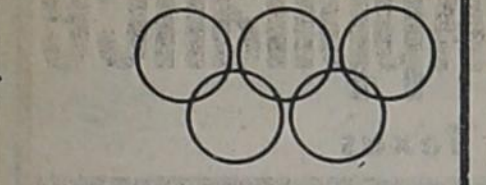

PO Dept. Can Stop Your Un-Wanted Mail

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, Postmaster Chan Hughes said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet, "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements", which is now available at the Munday post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when

Two Accidents Investigated During March

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Frank Jirck, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$840.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1968 shows a total of nine accidents resulting in one person killed, no persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$4,360.00.

The final entry in the 1967 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. There were 3,367 persons killed, 205,308 persons injured and an estimated property loss of \$793,094,000.00. This compares to the 1966 record of 3,406 persons killed, 208,310 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$557,414,000.00.

1967 marks the first decline in traffic deaths and injuries since 1960. The Sergeant stated, "With new traffic laws and the willingness of the public to drive defensively, traffic deaths and injuries can be further reduced in 1968."

sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

Postmaster Hughes said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."

"Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable, they are often offensive and are usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," Postmaster Hughes said.

He added that "because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech."

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster Hughes believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists."

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.
