"City Safe From Vandals And Burglars", Assures Mayor Payne

Establishing a municipal court and officer certification were among the subjects discussed in Monday nights City Council meeting regarding the recent resignation of night watchman Glen Curtis. Sheriff Bill Skinner appeared before the council and presented some possible alternative steps that the city might consider in remedying the problem.

The City having limited funds wants to provide local merchants with the best possible protection. Skinner's first proposal was for the city to establish a city municipal court. He said he would like to see Baird have a two man unit plus a night patrol. He felt it would pay for its self in a years time. Mayor Payne expressed his doubts to this referring to the problems Rising Star was experiencing with theirs at this time.

Another alternative would be to hire someone, preferably a retired or semi-retired law officer, who was certified or could be certified. Bill said a person in this position with no authority would not be able to carry out any duties other than checking doors and watch for fires. To carry a gun and make arrest one has to be certified. He also pointed out the chance the city would take in hiring someone and having them certified only to have them go else where and work for more pay.

Mayor Payne ask Skinner if his department could provide a night patrolman. He responded that he was short-handed, but could be of service temporarily.

The council said that it had been costing the city \$1,100 a month to provide a night watchman. Mr. Curtis was paid \$608 a month (bring home pay \$528) plus 150 gallons of gas a month, health insurance, retirement, social security and workman's compensation. This was for working 5 days a week with 2 days

off, 16 days sick leave and a 2 week vacation a year.

Sheriff Skinner was then ask if he could provide a night patrol if the city allotted him the funds. Skinner said he would look into the possibility and get back with the council. The members agreed to call a special meeting if necessary.

Mayor Payne said, "contrary to the article printed in the Star last week, Baird was being provided with the temporary service of County Sheriff's department and the Texas Highway patrol." He went on to say that someone had contacted KTAB television station and it was now to be on public T.V.

The October financial statement was next on the agenda. It was approved by the council.

The council members and the hand-full of citizens that attended the meeting had their spirits lifted when Buddy Bouldin requested to approach the council. He suggested having Baird sponsor a "Gravy Cook-off". The council referred him to the Chamber of Commerce.
