Divide dough in thirds and form each into a ball. Wrap each ball in Reynolds Plastic hours, until firm. TO BAKE, preheat oven to

350°F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Roll chilled dough to ¼-inch thickness between two lightly floured Cut dough with 4 or 5-inch cookie cutters; place 1 inch apart on parchment-lined cookie sheet.

edges are barely browned. Let cookies stand one minute; transfer to cooling rack. Cool completely. Decorate as until icing dries.

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
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

Baird VB now stands with a District record of 3-2.


This week sees Baird VB, VG, JVG, and JVB teams meeting Gorman and Ranger.
