District Winners Named at 4-H Roundup

Angelo State University was abuzz with activity May 7 during Texas Cooperative Extension's annual District 7 4-H Roundup. More than 500 4-H members, their parents, adult leaders and Extension personnel from the district's 23 counties attended the event. Roundup is the final step in a series of contests of various disciplines held across the district in recent months.

The event consists of 39 contests meant to test the skills of 4-Hers from 8-19 years-old. Contest events ranged from shooting sports to public speaking. The annual event lets 4-Hers compare their skills with those of others and to their own past performance.

Senior winners in the May 7 event qualify for Texas 4-H Roundup June 7-11 on the Texas A&M University Campus at College Station. To qualify for state, individuals or teams must have placed first or second in the District Senior Division for youths 14-19 years-old. Juniors don't compete past the district level.

Paige Galindo of Eula 4-H participated in the junior division and came away with a 1st place in the Individual Junior Horse category with her presentation focused on Limenitis which is an inflammation of the laminae of the hoof of horses.

Africanized Honey Bee Seminar Set for May 23rd

Despite their value as pollinators and producers of honey and wax, honey bees are generally unwelcome in and around homes because of the possibility they may sting people and animals. Due to the recent bee encounters in Callahan County a special Africanized Bee Seminar has been scheduled for May 23rd at 6:30pm. This meeting will take place in the District Courtroom located on the 3rd floor of the county courthouse in Baird. This seminar is being presented to teach community members as well as emergency service personnel important facts about honey bees. Some of the topics that will be discussed will include; Biology and Habits of Honey Bees, Characteristics of Africanized Honey Bees, Control of Bees and Safety issues as they relate to emergency situations.

At this seminar we hope to provide general information about bees, answer frequently asked questions and solve common problems associated with honey bees. We also hope to dispel some of the myths that are associated with honey bees while at the same time helping citizens and emergency personnel establish a safe and effective manner of handling and dealing with Africanized Honey Bees.

Spray Scheduling For Pecan Nut Casebearer

Time is approaching to start scouting for one of the most important nut-infesting insects of pecans, that is the pecan nut casebearer. The adult casebearer is a gray almost black moth about 1/3 inch long. The moths are active at night, when they lay eggs on pecan nuts. From research and working with producers we are confident that an egg lay will occur 7-10 days after the first catch of the moths using pheromone traps. In Callahan County our first significant catches were made around May 8-11. Eggs are oval, flat and tiny, just large enough to be seen with the unaided eye. Nut clusters with eggs can be tagged with a piece of ribbon and checked each day to determine an exact hatch date. Insecticides need to be applied 1-2 days after first egg is hatched. With catches on May 8-11, nut entry is predicted to occur 12-16 days after this catch which would give us the spray schedule of May 20-26. Proper scouting is suggested to determine the best time for insecticide applications. However, homeowners have very few choices in products to use for casebearer control. Malathion 50 % EC at 2 tablespoons per gallon or several of the BT products are labeled for use by homeowners for casebearer control. Before purchasing and applying any insecticide, always read the label to determine if the product is labeled for use on the target plant site. 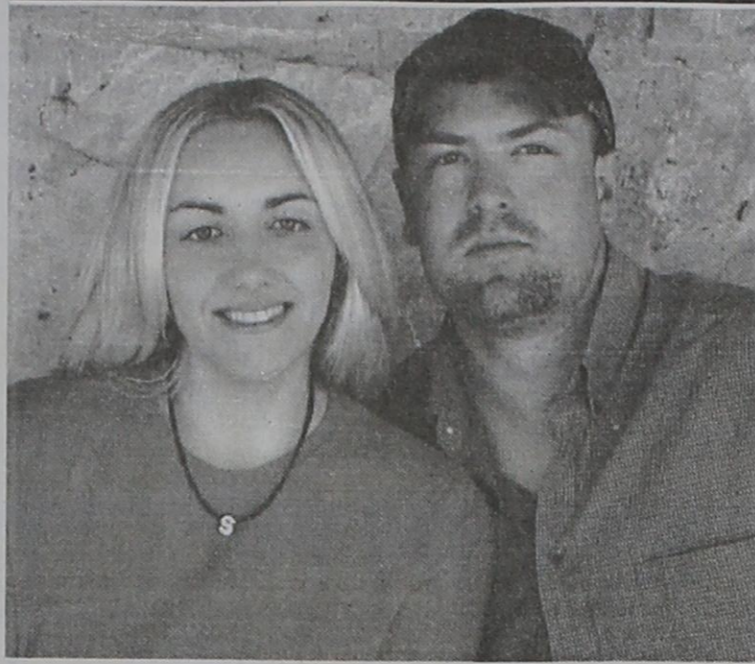

Cheers To Consumers, Producers For June Is National Dairy Month

Prepare to uncup a jug of milk or dig into a big bowl of ice cream—just in time for the first uncomfortably warm Texas weather, June is National Dairy Month.

This is a time to thank the consumer for his or her support and recognize the state's dairy farmers for their hard work, day in and day out.

Milk and milk products have been an important part of our nation's diet and livelihood since the first cows were brought to Jamestown, Va., in 1611. Dairy Month has been celebrated annually in the United States since 1939.

Much has changed in the industry in the past decades. More products are available now than ever before. And the products are safer than ever before, thanks to advances in refrigeration, technology and food packaging. Technology has also had a tremendous impact on milk production, although some aspects of farming haven't changed for generations.

With so many beverage, especially soft drink, options available to consumers, they still haven't lost their desire for milk, nature's most nutritionally perfect food. They also are continuing to eat plenty of butter, cheese and ice cream, even though more are turning to lighter or lower fat versions.

The most recent statistics available show that each of us annually consumes about 22 gallons of fluid milk, almost 1 pound of yogurt, 4.5 pounds of butter, 30 pounds of cheese and almost 27 pounds of frozen dairy products.

Of course, without the commitment of our dairy producers, the stores' shelves would be bare.

In Texas, about 800 dairy farmers produce more than 656 million gallons of milk a year, ranking Texas 12th in milk production nationwide. Those same producers (and their cows) also help make Texas the fourth leading producer of ice cream in the country.

These farmers also are contributing to the Texas economy as a whole, and even more to their local communities. The economic impact of the dairy industry on Texas is estimated at \$772 million in goods produced and 10,926 jobs.

Dairy farming isn't easy. Cows don't take a day off—they always have to be fed and cared for. And the work isn't glamorous. These days, being a farmer also means coping with new technology, rising business costs and increasingly complex and stringent environmental regulations.

Yet our farm families wouldn't choose any other life.

The Texas Association of Dairyfarmers thanks our farm families for their dedication to feeding our nation. And we thank those who drink milk and eat other dairy products for appreciating the fruits of our farmers' labor.

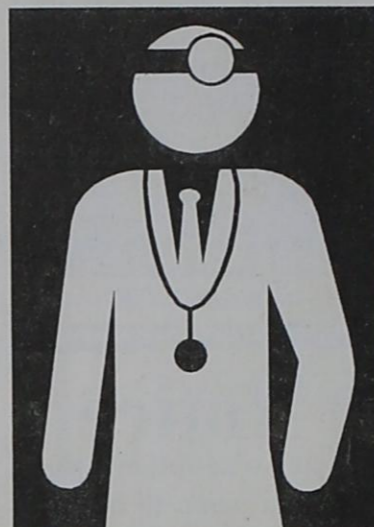

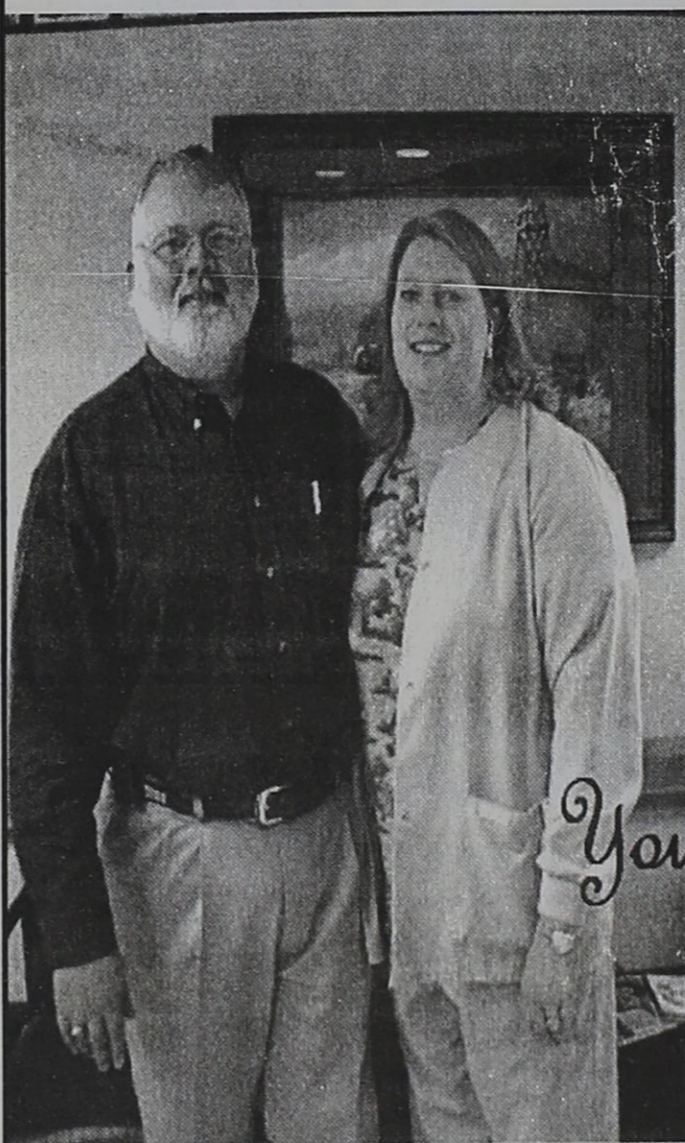

Some Things Never Change...

Folks of a certain age can while away hours talking about what 25 cents bought in "the good old days." Conversations typically are reasonably accurate if allowances are made for slight stretches of exaggeration. Verbiage sometimes flows in tandem with boastful stories of "catching a fish this big."

Often, Saturday afternoon movie matinee memories are re-visited. When they are, the race is on as braggarts swear that a two-bit piece in the 40's would buy a child's ticket for a double-feature movie (complete with cartoons, newsreels and serials)—with money left to buy popcorn, drink and candy....

In those "black and white" days—precursors of technicolor, cinemascope, 3D, stereoscopic sound, wide screens and stadium seating—youngsters' movies of choice were "horse operas." In these epics, the guys in white hats always won, riding into the sunset with the most winsome women. Their revolvers,

fired hundreds of times, rarely ran out of bullets.

We weren't sticklers for accuracy and loved to see the good guys chasing the bad 'uns. We cheered when they pursued the scalwags across the same draws, down the same trails and through the same trees a half-dozen times in the same chase. We yelled for the white hats to "cut 'em off at the pass"....

We booed the projectionist when the film broke, then broke into applause if the film splice held. Glitches abounded and the sets were far short of life-like.

Like horseshoes and hand grenades, "coming close" was plenty good. Despite technological advances, we're still settling—more than a half-century later—for movies that are fairly accurate. And now, 25 cents will buy exactly nothing at the picture show....

Give "movie goofs" some strong recollecting and you can make your own list, but a couple of movies—one classic and one current—are cited. They are The Sound of

Music and Friday Night Lights.

We were so dazzled by the music, high drama and sheer beauty of the former, geographical accuracy became secondary. Captain Von Trapp, escaping with his children from the Germans, points to a tall mountain, proclaiming, "Freedom lies just over the mountain!" Trouble is, crossing it would have been back-tracking to the heart of Germany, from whence they sought escape! (In the immortal words of admonition to Forrest Gump, "Run, Von Trapps, run—in the other direction!")...

"Lights," from the book detailing Permian High School's football prowess in Odessa, TX, has more fumbles than a junior high game on a muddy field. For starters, fans of Marshall High School admit that their team fell to the mighty Panthers. But their mascots are "Mavericks," not "Dawgs." And the Mavs' school colors are red and white, not purple and gold.

Another "goof" was diagnosed by Dr. Thurston Dean, a pioneer of orthoscopic surgery in West Texas. (The long-time physician marched up and down the sidelines of high school games in Midland, TX, every Friday night for 36 years, a tradition continued by his son, John....)

When Boobie Miles of PHS suffered a serious knee injury in 1988, coaches wanted to "get him over to Midland for an MRI." Indeed, Dr. Dean examined the grid star in the arch-rival city about 20 miles away. He had no fuss with the youngster

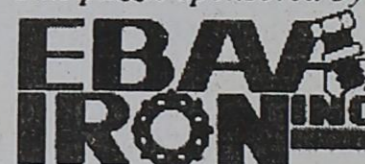

SBA Economic Injury Loans Available

Business owners urged to apply

Businesses in some Texas counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Excessive rain that occurred November 15, 2004 and continuing, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on business depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Jones, Shackelford, Taylor

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing

Due to the weather, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the di-

saster no occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program. The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources. Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.
