Baird Hosts Political Forum



Jim Keffer and Paul Jaworski in Baird Tuesday Night

A small crowd gathered Tuesday night in the Baird Cafetorium in order to meet the candidates for local and state offices and discuss their views and objectives if elected. Jim Keffer, Republican candidate for state representative was present, along with Paul Jaworski, Republican candidate for Callahan County Sheriff.

David Holmes of Cross Plains began the forum by asking the audience to fill out a questionnaire with simple questions regarding the intended purpose of our government and why elections are held. The questions were (1) What is, not was, the purpose of the Constitution of the United States? (2) What is the purpose of the Supreme Court of the United States? (3) Why are elections held every four years? (4) What is the purpose of the first ten amendments to the Constitution known as the Bill of Rights?

After reading some surprising answers to the questions, Mr. Holmes gave a brief

talk after which he introduced Mr. Paul Jaworski candidate for Callahan County Sheriff.

Mr. Jaworski began by saying that "He was not running a campaign directed against the incumbent Sheriff, but rather one for an improved Callahan County Sheriff's Department." He went on to say to discuss the importance of proper training for Peace Officers and the 1993 law which mandates that Sheriffs must be licensed Peace Officers in the State of Texas. Mr. Jaworski said that "if elected he would work to see that county prisoners serving sentences for violent crimes and crimes against people would serve their sentences day for day with no good time earned. That he would work to see the Deputy's Office in Clyde re-opened." He also said that one of his programs if elected would be to "establish a county wide disaster plan to cope with emergencies such as floods or tornadoes." When

questioned about domestic violence Mr. Jaworski responded, "the current family code is a policy of Zero Tolerance and requires that when law enforcement receives a call for a domestic violence, that one of parties be arrested to insure no further violence." He says that he agreed with this law, that it was a good law and would be strictly enforced. One last item that Mr. Jaworski brought forward was his plan to "establish an inmate work program in Callahan County, which would allow for inmates to be used as labor for community projects." At this point Mr. Jaworski thanked the people for coming and Mr. Holmes introduced Jim Keffer candidate for state representative.

Mr. Keffer began by saying that "District 60 is a conservative district based on their voting record at both the state and National level." He contends that "his opponent is not a conservative, and that his voting record in Austin proves it".

Mr. Keffer went on to say that "he does not feel that his opponents voting had accurately represented the wants of this district", and that he felt "we need more business men and women in Austin and less lawyers."

When asked about his attacks on John Cook's voting record and Mr. Cook's rebuttal claiming slander, Keffer replied, "with one exception, a mistake on Cook's vote concerning sharing information on juvenile arrests, he stand behind every single claim of liberal voting by John Cook". Mr. Keffer did apologize for the one error saying that it was made by the people gathering this information and that as soon as it was known he made it public.

Mr. Holmes then thanked everyone for coming and closed the forum after Mr. Jaworski offered a prayer.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Mr. Clinton, quoted in *Newsweek*, said "I find it amazing that anybody could question whether I have core beliefs." In 1979 when he was governor of Arkansas, he established a training school, state-funded and free to selected students.

The following information is from an article in *Human Events* written by Peter LaBarbera. After extensive examination of the curriculum, speakers, films and interviews with ex-students, he states and documents that the school's teachings are proatheist, feminist and

pacifist. The 1991 "text-book" titled *Free Book*, states that the school's intention is to promote "reflective thinking." A review of the book's essays, the program of guest speakers and films shown, suggest the real purpose is to "uproot" traditional beliefs and replace them with liberal skepticism and secular relativism, with a heavy anti-Christian element.

Among teachings in 1991 were: a blatant diatribe from a radical feminist "witch" who likened Jesus Christ's death on the cross to necrophilia and sadomachochism; Pro-homosexual readings, films and discussions; a lesson in "Animal Liberation" group; readings praising pacifism.

According to a student

who left the school out of utter disgust said, "It's almost a mind-bending process that takes place. It was an attack on Christianity, but more so it was an attack on conservative thought. They very strongly put out the implication that if you want to be considered an intel-

lectual by your peers, you have to be a liberal. You can't be conservative."





Last October I was selected to participate in a statewide program called Leadership Texas. The program is for women currently serving in leadership roles and is sponsored by the Foundation for Women's Resources, an Austin-based organization. The Leadership Texas Class of '96 consisted of 110 women from many walks of life... doctors, lawyers, public servants, professionals in finance, health professionals, entrepreneurs, business owners, corporate executives, university professors, elected officials, executives of non-profit organizations and community volunteers.

The opportunity to participate in Leadership Texas was a result of my work with Texas Midwest Community Network, a non-profit regional organization that covers a 20 county area around Abilene. My tuition was covered through a scholarship *from the

Foundation for Women's Resources and a grant from Texas Rural Communities, Inc. I will be forever grateful to these two groups for covering the major cost of this fine program and leaving only travel and lodging for me to cover personally.

Our class was an awesome group of

women, very diverse in culture and ethnic backgrounds. Through a year of experiences we bonded together developing mutual respect and sincere friendships. Most of the class membership came from metropolitan areas of the state. Less than 10% were from rural Texas.

We were required to meet for five sessions, each session being three days filled with lectures, tours and skills training. Locations and themes for each session were: Austin - "Putting the Governed Back in Government", Laredo - "Creating a Seamless Border", Fort Worth - "Bridging the Generations", Amarillo - "Examining Traditions in Transition" and

Houston - "Embarking on Tomorrow's Texas".





AUSTIN — The U.S. Census Bureau confirmed last week that Texas is growing and won't stop anytime soon.

Agency statisticians predict that from 1995 to 2000, Texas will gain 1.4 million residents, the largest net population gain in any state. Texas stands to pick up two seats in Congress after the 2000 census is conducted, if the predictions come true.

Following Texas are Florida, 1.1 million; California, 932,000; Georgia, 674,000 and North Carolina, 582,000.

Also, the Census Bureau predicted, Texas will grow 8.5 million residents by the year 2025, bringing the state population to about 27 million. And, by then, 4.5 million Texans will be 65 and older.

It's time to plan for the large number of people who will be near retirement age as the first quarter of the next century ends. Paul Campbell, a demographer with the Census Bureau, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "We must prepare by investing in quality nursing homes and health facilities."

Tomorrow's Fund Rate Increase
State Comptroller John Sharp announced last week new rates for prepaid college tuition to be offered beginning Nov. 18, the first day of the Texas Tomorrow Fund's next enrollment period.

A prepaid tuition contract paid in a lump sum today for a

class of 2019 graduate will cost \$9,625.98, according to figures provided by the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board, which controls the Texas Tomorrow Fund.

The new rate, which reflects in part the rise of required fees at the state's public four-year universities, is about 16 percent higher than last year's.

"When Sir Isaac Newton said that what goes up must come down, he obviously wasn't talking about college costs," Sharp said. "That's why this plan makes so much sense. It's a great way to beat tuition inflation."

The fund, sponsored by Sharp and approved by the state Legislature in 1995, allows families to lock in the costs of their children's future college tuition.

The new rates cover more credit hours, with the four-year public university plan expanded from 120 hours to 128 hours.

Uptick in Reported Crime
The number of crimes reported in Texas during the first half of 1996 increased 4 percent over the first half of 1995, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The increase is also reflected in the crime rate, which increased 2.1 percent over the period.

"This is the first increase we have seen in four years," said DPS Director Dudley Thomas.

"This is certainly a matter of concern, but crime figures tend to fluctuate, and this may or may not indicate a trend," Thomas told the *Houston Chronicle*. "The volume of crime in Texas is still down 18.2 percent compared to the first six months of the peak year of 1991."

The only major crimes to decline were murder, down 13.3 percent, and robbery, down 1.9 percent.

Thumbprint Program Works
Texas Bankers Association says the amount of noncustomer check fraud being reported by Texas banks has dropped 71 percent since the Thumbprint Signature program was initiated last December.

One hundred and 70 financial

institutions in the state require thumbprints of nonaccount holders who request check-cashing services. Many retailers also use the system.

Customers who have accounts at participating banks are not required to give their prints.

"We don't have to rely on the memory of a teller viewing a police lineup," said Mark Smith, a detective with the Austin Police Department's forgery unit.

"In the past, it could take as long as six weeks — if at all — to identify (fraudulent check writers). With Thumbprinting, the process can now take less than 48 hours."

Convict Labor Improves Parks
Parks and prison officials report that convict labor provided more than \$2 million worth of work in maintaining and restoring state parks in the past year.

Prisoners worked at 23 state parks, 12 wildlife management areas and one state fish hatchery. The Parks and Wildlife Department said that prisoners contributed 304,164 hours of work, valued at \$2.12 million, during the fiscal year that ended Aug. 31.

Allan Polunsky, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, said, "We find that the vast majority of inmates respond very positively to the opportunity to do something worthwhile for society."

Other Capital Highlights
Gov. George W. Bush named a state jail in Humble for Pam Lychner, an "absolute warrior" for victims rights who died in the TWA flight 800 crash in July. A victim of a brutal assault herself, Lychner founded Justice for All in 1993 to campaign against early release of prisoners and for programs to aid victims.

State Farm Insurance agreed to pay some of its Texas policyholders about \$22 million in a dispute with Attorney General Dan Morales over automobile deductibles. About 75,000 policyholders who paid deductibles and were not at fault for wrecks between Sept. 1, 1991, and Feb. 28, 1996, will get back their deductibles plus 10 percent.

Area Schools Score Big On Peer Evaluation System

There are those who argue that it is impossible to compare schools - that each one is unique, and that the important lessons students learn, about themselves and about life, cannot be measured, certainly not by any test. We disagree. The fundamental job of an elementary school is to teach kids to read, write, and compute, and those skills can be tested. Education is so important, and the sums the state spends on it are so vast, that measuring the success or failure of each school is a necessity. There is no other way to hold schools accountable for their performance.

The following list rates 3,172 of the elementary schools in Texas. The rating system is based on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, the one consistent, uniform statewide measure of what students are learning. Several hundred schools were excluded from the ratings because they tested fewer than fifty students or contained only one or two grades and thus did not meet the Texas Education Agency's definition of an elementary school. But TAAS scores alone do not tell us much about how good a job a school is doing. To compare a suburban school with an inner-city

school, even in the same area, is to compare apples and oranges. A good rating system has to compare a school with others whose students have similar characteristics.

This rating system, developed by Darvin M. Winick of the Center for Houston's Future (an affiliate of the Greater Houston Partnership) and Larry Toenjes, a University of Houston sociologist, is based on two numbers - the percentage of children who passed all sections of the TAAS test and the percentage of kids on the free- or assisted-lunch program. The latter number is an accurate reflection of how many students in the school come from backgrounds of poverty. These students are generally at a cultural and an educational disadvantage and tend to score lower on standardized tests. The Winick-Toenjes system compares a school with, say, 80 percent disadvantaged students against other schools with a similar number of disadvantaged students. The question is, How does a school compare with its peers?

The rating system assigns stars for meeting certain goals. The best schools in Texas earned four stars; the worst, none. These are the requirements for earning a star:

* One star if at least 30

percent of the students passed the TAAS test.

* A second star if the school ranked at or above the median passing rate on the TAAS test for schools with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students.

* A third star if at least 70 percent of the students passed the TAAS test.

* A fourth star if the school had a passing rate on the TAAS test in the top 15 percent of schools with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students.

The Texas Education Agency has its own way of rating schools, but its method is designed to identify the ones that are succeeding grandly or failing badly. That's useful information, but it doesn't help the parent who wants to know, "Is my kid's school just average or pretty good or excellent?" The Winick-Toenjes method answers that question.

We believe in this list because it measures the quality of a school by how far the school took its kids compared with where the kids started. Thus, a school with 0 to 10 percent disadvantaged kids needs a passing rate of 94.4 percent to be a four-star school, while a school with 90 to 100 percent disadvantaged kids needs a passing rate of 72.2 percent. Any school with only 0 to 10 percent disadvantaged kids that gets just one star must have some serious problems. Any school that earns four stars is doing a great job. Any school that has 90 to 100 percent disadvantaged kids and earns four stars is doing a great job in the face of adversity.

- 4-Star: Cisco/Cisco; Eastland/Siebert; Gorman/Maxfield; Clyde/Clyde; Comanche/Elementary.
- 3-Star: Baird/Baird; Ranger/Ranger
- 2-Star: Rising Star/Ward; Cross Plains/Elementary.

Baird City Council Met October 24th

BAIRD-The Baird City Council met in regular session Thursday October 24th at Baird City Hall. The meeting had originally been scheduled for Tuesday but was changed due to an error in the posted agenda. Mayor Jon Hardwick called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. with these officers present; Councilmen Brenda Mitchell, Rudy Rodriguez, Pat O'Brien, Terry Hunter, and City Secretary Nancy Turnbow. The City Council approved an Emergency Medical Service Contract with Citizens EMS Thursday night during a regular session. Clyde Mayor Merv Warrick presented the contract to the Baird Council for approval, the City of Clyde had approved the agree-

ment at their October 10th meeting. No representatives of Citizens EMS were present at the meeting.

Citizens EMS has recently become a non-profit organization Warrick said. This was done to separate the City of Clyde from direct liability for ambulance activities. Citizens EMS will now operate as an independent non-profit service subsidized by the cities of Clyde and Baird along with Callahan County, if the county approves the contract at their October 28th meeting.

Citizens EMS has exclusive rights to their service area, all of the north and western portions of Callahan County not served by Cross Plains EMS, unless Citizens EMS calls for backup.

The three supporting entities will each contribute \$1,750 a month

for subsidy payments and also appoint two board members to represent them on the board of directors that will oversee the operations of the service.

Warrick said an independent ambulance service would cost approximately 30% more than the present arrangement.

In the case of failure of the service or if one entity resigned from supporting the service, the City of Clyde would assume responsibility and ownership of the EMS service.

The ambulances will continue to be housed in the present quarters at the corner of South 1st and Stephens streets in Clyde. The contract was unanimously approved on a motion by O'Brien and seconded by Hunter.

Other items taken care of Thursday night were:

Approval of changes to the Articles of Corporation and By-Laws of the Baird Economic Development Board. This changed responsibility of appointing board members from the Mayor to the City Council and also broadened requirements for individuals seeking appointment to the board.

The council accepted the changes as read by Kim Vestal, secretary for the Development Board, on a motion by Rodriguez and seconded by O'Brien.

The Council approved the Economic Development Boards request to make a \$58,000 bid on the 178 acres of rail-road land south of the tracks through Baird. Board President Felix Manion gave the council a report on progress with the land purchase.

Manion was asked if the main goal for the land was industrial development and he answered yes. When asked who's name would be on the title of the land if bought Manion told the council he would have to "check on that". Manion said their were not any prospects for tenants on the land yet but the board would start looking for business's to locate on the property after it was purchased. The Motion by Rodriguez and seconded by Mitchell met unanimous approval to make the offer on the land.

An Interlocal Agreement between the Cities of Baird and Clyde was approved and signed. Clyde Mayor Merv Warrick presented the council with the agreement that authorizes the sharing of equipment and manpower between the two cities as might be needed. The council gave unanimous approval to the motion by Hunter and seconded by Rodriguez to approve signing the agreement.

The Council took no action on the Tax Appraisal District Board of Directors Resolution to change the Board from a 5 member to a 7 member board. By taking no action the Council voiced its approval for the resolution.

The council approved a motion by Mitchell and seconded by Rodriguez to hire Charles Aggar and Associates to be the City's auditor.

Financial Statements and bills were reviewed and approved on a motion by Rodriguez and seconded by Hunter.



So, keep those fires glowing for this Guadalupe Beef with Salsa.



Beef is still the choice of restaurant diners and is still a major choice for grilling, which is why we chose it for this grilled meat with a southwestern flavor. The beef is marinated in an unusual blend of dark beer spiked with hearty spices. The cooked meat is served with a homemade fresh tomato salsa.

A nice accompaniment would be grilled sweet potato chips.

GUADALAJARA BEEF

- 1 12-ounce bottle Mexican dark beer*
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 4 beef bottom sirloin steaks (4 to 6 ounces each)
- Salt and pepper
- Red, green and yellow bell peppers, cut lengthwise into quarters, seeded, optional

SALSA

- Flour tortillas, optional
- Lime wedges
- Combine beer, soy sauce, garlic, cumin, chili powder and hot pepper sauce in a large shallow glass dish or large heavy plastic bag. Add beef, cover dish or close bag. Marinate in refrigerator up to 12 hours, turning beef several times. Remove beef from marinade; discard marinade. Season with salt and pepper.

Oil hot grid to help prevent sticking. Grill beef and peppers on covered grill, over medium briquets, 8 to 12 minutes, turning once. Beef should be medium done and peppers tender. Serve with salsa, tortillas, if desired, and lime. Makes 4 servings.

* Substitute any beer for Mexican dark beer.

- 2 cups coarsely chopped seeded tomatoes (about 1 1/4 pounds)
- 2 green onions, with tops, sliced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 to 2 teaspoons minced, seeded jalapeno or serrano chili pepper, fresh or canned
- 1 tablespoon olive or vegetable oil
- 2 to 3 teaspoons lime juice
- 8 to 10 sprigs fresh cilantro, minced, optional
- 1/2 teaspoon salt or to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar or to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper

Combine tomatoes, green onions, garlic, chili pepper, oil and lime juice in a medium bowl. Stir in cilantro. Season with salt, sugar and black pepper. Adjust seasonings to taste, adding lime juice or chili pepper, if desired. Makes about 2 cups.


GRILLED SWEET POTATO CHIPS

- 2 medium sweet potatoes
 - 1 teaspoon olive oil or olive oil cooking spray
 - Salt
- Peel sweet potatoes and slice into 1/2-inch thick slices. Brush or spray lightly with olive oil to prevent sticking. Place rounds in the center of the cooking grate and grill 7 to 10 minutes, turning once halfway through cooking time. Remove from grill, sprinkle with salt and serve immediately.

Getting The Most From Your Money

DON'T RETIRE BROKE

How much money do you need to retire, and how do you plan to accumulate it? It is a fair bet that your social security and/or your company retirement plan will not be adequate.

Everyone should make provision for additional savings and an investment program with an adequate growth factor. Poorly placed investment dollars are very destructive to your overall financial plan.

It's essential that you develop an investment plan with a rate of return (cash return and/or appreciation) greater than the current inflation rate. Failure to do so means that you could have less purchasing power on the date of retirement than the total purchasing power you gave up in all your years of savings.

Consider for a minute the effect of inflation at various percentages over a number of years.

Inflation Rate	% REDUCTION IN PURCHASING POWER				
	1	5	10	15	20
2%	-2	-10	-18	-25	-33
4%	-4	-18	-32	-44	-54
6%	-6	-26	-45	-60	-70
8%	-8	-33	-55	-70	-80

Note that the loss in purchasing power at 4% for ten years is 32%. This means that in ten years, one dollar will buy about 68¢ worth of goods if inflation averages 4%.

This loss in purchasing power affects not only the retired person on a fixed income, but also the individual trying to accumulate assets for future retirement.

Since permanent and total disability could be the one factor which keeps you from carrying out your financial plan, see that you have a good disability insurance program. The chances are substantially greater that you will be disabled before retirement age than they are of your dying before that time.

Commissioner's Court Meets

BAIRD-Callahan County Commissioners met in regular session Monday at the courthouse in Baird. County Judge Bill Johnson called the meeting to order at 9:30am with these officers present; Commissioners Charlie Grider Prct. 4, Bryan Farmer Prct. 2, Tommy Holland Prct. 3, Harold Hicks Prct. 1, and County Clerk Darlene Walker.

County Commissioners turned down signing a three year contract with Citizens E.M.S., the present ambulance service for northwestern Callahan County, until they can look into other options.

Clyde City Administrator Tim Powers presented the court with a three year E.M.S. contract from Citizens EMS, the cities of Baird and Clyde have already signed the agreement. After much discussion the commissioners approved signing a 90 day EMS contract, after some changes in wording, and within the 3 month period will meet with Rural Metro Ambulance Service to discuss their possibly taking the service over. The City's of Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde will be invited to

attend the meeting so all can look at the options and come to an agreement beneficial to the whole service area. Cross Plains Ambulance Service is a volunteer service that covers the southeastern portion of Callahan County and commissioners wanted to give them an opportunity to also look at this option. The date and time of the gathering will be announced later. There was not a representative from Citizens EMS present at the meeting.

Other business attended to Monday was; Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved.

Commissioners took no action on the County Tax Appraisal Board resolution to change the board to seven members from a five member board. By taking no action commissioners voiced approval for the resolution. This resolution will give each taxing entity in the Callahan County Appraisal District a member on the board.

One and 4 tenths mile of County Road 406 was closed at the request of a land owner. There was no opposition to this closing. County Road 406 lies in the south eastern part of Callahan County in precinct 4.

The next Commissioners meeting was set for November 14th.

Letter to the Editor

For 18 years, I have had the privilege of representing the 17th District of Texas in the U. S. Congress. During that time, I have kept in close contact with the folks who sent me to Washington, D.C. I am proud of what we have accomplished together thus far, but much more remains to be done. For that reason, I am seeking a renewal of my two-year contract to be your Congressman.

On January 25, 1995, the House of Representatives passed the bill I authored to require a balanced budget amendment to the U. S. Constitution. Having spent years trying to reform federal spending, passage of this amendment was my proudest

day in the House. The defeat of this amendment in the Senate two weeks later, by one vote, was one of the most disappointing days.

The federal deficit is one of the most serious problems facing our nation today. It is encouraging that the Congress and the White House have now agreed to bring the federal budget into balance by the year 2002. There is work to be done in the areas of trade, risk management, research and rural development. In addition, we must also help encourage and provide investment in rural infrastructure and economic development to spur rural job creation. In the next Congress I will be either the chairman or the ranking Democrat on the House

Agriculture modern and complex society of 260 million people with an annual \$6 trillion economy. To do my job effectively, I have had to learn about health care, banking, finance and tax policy, farm problems, weapons systems, the environment, foreign affairs, justice, crime, education, welfare and immigration, just to name some.

Whether you are a parent, a school teacher, a farmer, a businessman, a doctor or a Congressman, you should be performing your job better today than you were 5 years ago. Experience is not something you learn over night; it comes with time, patience and commitment. It has been an honor and a privilege to represent the 17th Congressional District in the U. S. Congress, and I respectfully ask for a renewal of that contract this election day.

At the federal level, I will continue to work to see that Medicare reimbursement rates for rural areas equal the rates in urban areas. My staff and I will assist rural communities in their efforts to secure physicians and other health professionals. Drilling Permits Up, Production Down

With oil prices up to almost \$26 per barrel, more drilling permits are being recorded across most areas of Texas. Production on crude oil is still down, but gas production is up, according to a July report from the Texas Railroad Commission.

Statewide, Texas preliminary July 1996 crude oil production averaged 1,364,271 barrels daily, down from the 1,364,271 barrels daily average of July, 1995.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 471, 410,155 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas, based upon preliminary production figures for July, 1996. This

was up from the July, 1995 preliminary gas production total of 463,820,726 Mcf.

Railroad Commission totals from local counties showed the following production for July:

Callahan County - 156,309 Mcf of gas; 35,372 barrels of crude oil.

Eastland County - 597,480 Mcf of gas; 37,168 barrels of crude oil.

In September operators around the state reported that total well completions year-to-date are 6,522, about 5 percent above the 6,208 recorded during the same period in 1995.

The most completions were in the Midland area, with Lubbock second, North Texas third, and West Central Texas fourth. Close behind was
