Pioneer Hall Is Enjoyed By Town And Area Men

Pioneer Hall was the name decided on for the building which is located on the northeast corner of the City Hall lawn. Funds for the building were acquired through donations of from \$1 to \$25 dollars from approximately 100 individuals and businessmen.

Alex Jones, one of the instigators, appointed committees to ask for contributions. W. R. Moore was Mayor at that time, in the year of 1952, and the City Councilmen, offered financial assistance to complete the building. The estimated cost of the building and fixtures was between \$1000 and \$1200.

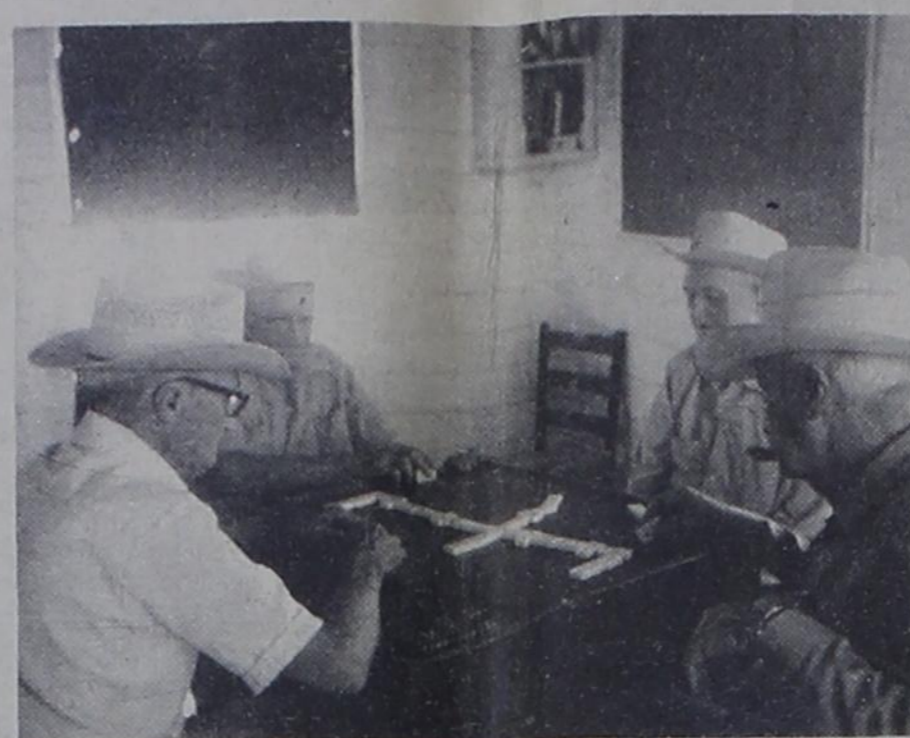

MEDICARE INSURANCE NOT TO BE INCREASED
The monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance, scheduled to be increased in July, has been rolled back in keeping with President Nixon's 60-day price freeze policy, according to Henry Chustz, Social Security manager in Vernon. "The higher amount will continue to be charged until the premium record for each beneficiary can be corrected," Chustz said. "Refunds in full will be made at a later date. This also applies to Railroad Retirement, beneficiaries and Civil Service Annuitants who pay premiums for Medical Insurance under Medicare."


