## Look To The East

"We're tired of the old way of doing things!"

The comparatively new way--the 21-hour telethon--seemed to appeal to Democrats on the week end of June 29 more than anything else.

More than Watergate, even! This was a nation-wide fund-raising television program to help get the Demos out of debt and to raise funds for their present-day political campaign. And it seemed they had fun doing it!

This was the third time it had been tried, and the most successful of any, because the 21-hour period ended with a total of over \$6 million being raised.

The event brought about the early appearance of Stamford's own Robert Strauss, Democratic National Committee Chairman, who also made a last minute appeal, along with Sen. Hubert Humphrey for the Demo party fund.

The party's efforts to wipe out the Democratic debts raised a total of \$220,000 for the cause in Texas, but the party loyalists faced this year's telethon with a deficit of \$2.5 million from the 1968 presidential campaign.

They were asking for pledges and donations in small amounts, but they were talking big money all the way through. Their views seemed to be that the small giver was less likely to bring about corruption within the party than were those who could plunk down tremendous amounts of some sort of gimmick attached.

There were references to Watergate, other problems in Washington, the president, and even his secretary, Rose Mary Woods.

A lot of big brass in the Demo party, and a whole gob of celebrities from the TV and movie world were taking part in this fund raising melee.

And they didn't neglect to point out that two thirds of the money raised will go to state party coffers, and the one-third remaining to the Democratic National Committee.

Youngsters in event took part in the contributions, as it would come "over the tube" that little fellows would donate Coke money, or something, and challenge those of their age and acquaintance to do the same.

Periodically, the figures that most of the states had raised flashed on the screen. Donations came in the form of quarters and half-dollars, dollars, and five bucks in Texas, with the largest one, a \$10,000 gift, from a Big Spring man. Several \$1,000 pledges were recorded in Texas also.

Some of the big gifts were made by persons who wanted to insure the success of the effort.

Last year's fund-raising effort to wipe out Democratic debts raised \$220,000 in Texas. This year, this figure was just about doubled.

Neil Spence, a Texas Telethon spokesman, said one contributor said he felt individual contributions "this way is the proper way to finance the political system."

United Auto Workers president, Leonard Woodcock, remarked that the Democratic party was "the one that cares about people", and called on union workers to contribute.

One thing is for certain--by contributing to the party and not to the campaign of an individual candidate, the person is less likely to go into office "behind" to some political figure or faction.

We don't know whether that's the way to do it or not, but say or think what you may, it's a pretty good fund-raising circus at that.

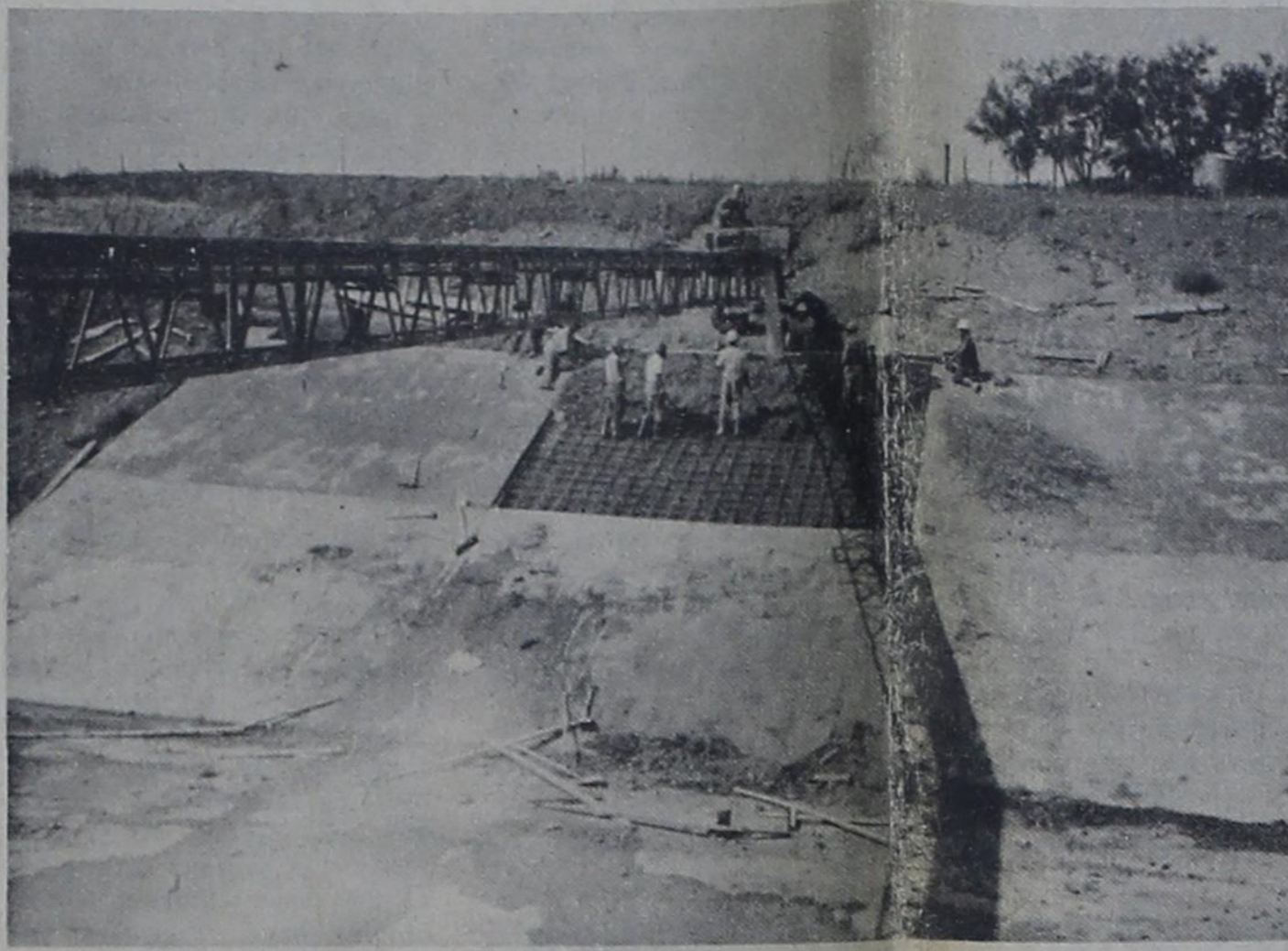

## Work Underway On Highway Projects For Knox County

Several projects for highway construction in Knox County are presently under way, according to an announcement by the Texas Highway Department. Lewis H. White, district engineer of District 25 in Childress, stated that work was recently begun on two projects on State Highway 222 that will improve travelling conditions, especially in Knox City.

One of these concerns downtown Knox City. White said State Highway 222 will be moved over a block to provide a more direct route through the town, and that the new route should relieve congestion. When the work is completed, gutters will be curbed downtown, he said.

Another project on State Highway 222 involves four miles of work from the Knox County line to four miles southeast of the King-Knox County line, with general improvements being made. White said the road will be widened from 22 to 24 feet and will be rebuilt.

Work started on these projects about a month ago and should be completed in about a year. Cost of both projects according to White, is about \$238,000. Cooper and Woof-russ, Inc., of Amarillo is the contractor.

When the projects are completed, State Highway 222 will extend from Highway 380 west

of Throckmorton to Highway 82 in King County.

Another project presently underway in the county will result in the new F-M Road 1608. This farm road will extend from F-M 226, 3.4 miles south of Goree, to the Millers Creek Reservoir in southwestern Baylor County. The Knox County portion is 2.5 miles and the

## Bank's Deposits At High Figure

Although below the record high of over \$10 million, deposits in the First National Bank in Munday remain at a high figure, according to the bank's financial condition issued on June 30.

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$8,266,000 in Knox county were reported today by County Bond Chairman M. L. Wiggins. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$62,842.00 for 30% of the 1974 sales goal of \$160,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$18,911,460--while the year-to-date sales totaled \$99,368,274 with 42% of the \$236.8 million 1974 sales goal achieved.

## Short Course On Pesticide Safety Set July 25th

A pesticide handling safety short course is scheduled for July 25, 1974 2:00-4:00 p.m. in the Soil Conservation Service meeting room in Knox City, according to Knox County Extension Agent Herman H. Collier.

The short course is especially designed for all people applying or handling agricultural pesticides. However, all interested persons in Knox or surrounding counties are invited to attend, Collier stated.

Baylor County portion is 4 miles.

Arnold Oliver, resident engineer in Graham, said a new roadbed would be built along the old county road. Work began on April 25 and is expected to take about seven months to complete.

Knox and Baylor County commissioners requested this new road, Oliver said, mainly to serve the new reservoir. J. H. Strain and Sons, Inc., of Tye, have both contracts for a total of \$306,000. This firm also constructed the Millers Creek Project.

A project which has just been completed in Knox County involved work from 7.6 miles north of Benjamin into Benjamin, on highway 283. The road was widened to 24 feet and 10-foot paved shoulders were added, culverts were lengthened and bridges widened.

This project was completed last month at a cost of about \$924,000. Ivan Dement, Inc., had the contract.

## Water Problems of Area Are Presented To State Agencies in Austin Last Thursday

The following presentation of water problems confronting farmers and individuals in Haskell, Baylor and Knox Counties was made in Austin on Thursday of last week in a meeting with the Texas Water Quality Board, the Texas Health Department, the Water Development Board and the Texas Railroad Commission:

### Should Underground Water in the Rolling Plains of Texas be Sacrificed?

Landowners of Knox, Haskell and Baylor Counties have long been concerned about the quality of underground water found in the Seymour aquifer located in the Rolling Plains section of Texas. The supply of water has been highly mineralized and has not met standard health requirements.

Since irrigation came to this area in 1951, the taste quality of underground water has improved, although the need for "State approved" water is of vital importance to the area principally because of the growth of food products. To process and pack our agricultural products on a local level, industrial prospects have rejected the area because of the quality of water.

Reference is now made to the "Study of Groundwater in Haskell and Knox Counties" by Ogilvie and Osborne for the Texas Water Commission in August, 1962. This report reflects little of what is now known about the Seymour aquifer in that the Study limited the area to 10 years to deplete the water with only 300 irrigation wells at that time. Today we know that the 3,000 irrigation wells found in this three-county area are still all pumping and the only wells that are not now pumping at the same, or increased capacity, are those on the extreme edges of the aquifer where very little water was found at all.

The Boyd Meers well located eight miles northeast of Munday was the first irrigation well drilled in 1951. This well has never had the pump removed or repaired, and is still pumping from the same depth. It has been used extensively for irrigating vegetables and other crops. It is an example of many other wells drilled in 1951 and subsequent years.

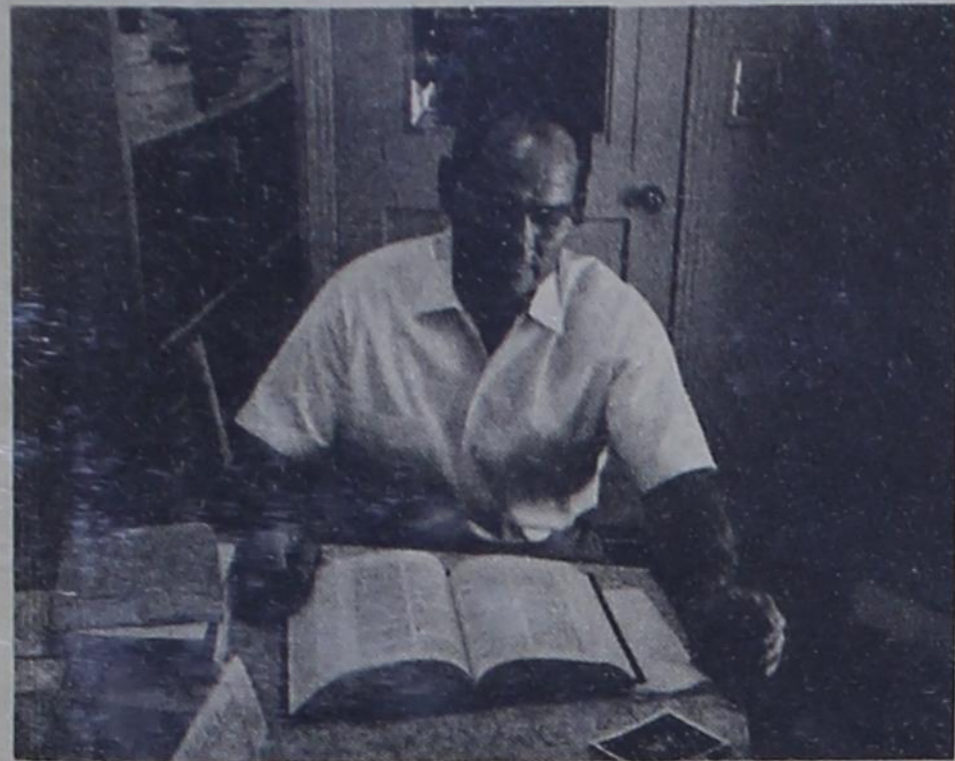
Presently, more than 3,000 irrigation wells are used to irrigate almost 200,000 acres of land. The wells have never "broken suction" during drought years when irrigation seasons were lengthy. Water levels have risen as much as 10 feet in these wells after normal to heavy rainfall.

In 1956 oil was discovered in this shallow water belt. With the leasing and drilling operations came another hazard to underground water, oil-field brine. In many cases we know of independent drillers who pulled casing from a dry hole and moved to other sites in their rush to find oil. Brine was dumped into barrow-ditches or hauled to river bottoms. Holes were abandoned, unplugged, or covered with a tin bucket. In many cases plugging meant a little mud, some cement and a cap.

In 1960 the Munday Chamber of Commerce expressed concern to the Texas Water Quality Board and to the Texas Railroad Commission. We were discouraged about the extent or ultimate danger of any real problems. In 1970 when water-flooding really began, many of the unplugged or improperly cased wells, began to bleed salt brine. True, the Railroad Commission assisted in seeing that the wells were properly plugged, but injection wells were leaking and only when the soil showed damage could the salt leaks be detected.

Certainly the oil production stimulated the economy of this area, however, the total production created little real wealth to a large number of persons. There just simply

was not enough oil available to offset the concern of the majority of farmers who made their only living from agriculture. At this time, many farmers who were members of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, requested help from the Organization in preventing further damage to land.

An attempt was made to get tests set up on salt content of water samples through a project with the Environmental Protection Agency and Texas A&M University using the lab facilities at Munday. This study has been concentrated on nitrates and no work has been done on the salt problem.

We call your attention to the formation of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority which is near completion at this time. This Authority was formed some fifteen years ago to complete a surface lake to furnish water for four towns in Haskell and Knox counties. From the Miller's Creek Reservoir these towns expect to have an adequate water supply of "State approved" water. The lake is designed to impound 25,500 acre-feet of water with a maximum capacity of 40,000 acre-feet, and should be completed in August, 1974 at a cost of \$6,000,000. The North Texas Municipal Water Authority has now been requested to furnish water for two other towns, Rochester and O'Brien due to the nitrate content of water in their city wells. County health officers in Haskell and Knox counties have warned residents of certain health hazards in drinking this water, particularly for young children, expectant mothers, and babies.

Representing the residents of 10 towns and communities, and the rural residents of this three-county area, we believe our water problems can be solved. We are not

interested in just another study of the area. We need action!

Land is precious in our country--it is not a manufactured product. We believe every precaution must be taken to keep it productive. Underground water is attached to the value of the land. With recharge from rainfall, our supply is continuous and this area is an important link within our state for vegetable production. Some \$1.5 million in vegetables alone are shipped from this area annually with a very definite potential for increasing as world food shortages are becoming known.

The Seymour aquifer found in the Rolling Plains of Texas is different than others in our State. We want it protected from pollution. Are we asking too much from a society who has already become environmentally concerned?

Attending the meeting were Mrs. Callie Ann Combs, Chamber of Commerce manager; Clint J. Norman, M. L. Wiggins, Robert Nix and Edward Smith, all of Munday, and John M. Edwards of Seymour.

The Munday Chamber of Commerce has long been working for studies of pollution in the area's water supply, and the organization was able to get a study of the underground water problems made last summer. This study was very conclusive as to actual pollution, although no preventative program was undertaken.

The attending group reports that their presentation received very favorable comment and were advised that funds are available for a preventative program which will be presented to the full board of the Texas Water Quality Board for approval in the very near future. After this meeting, the projected outline of the program and funding will be announced by the board.

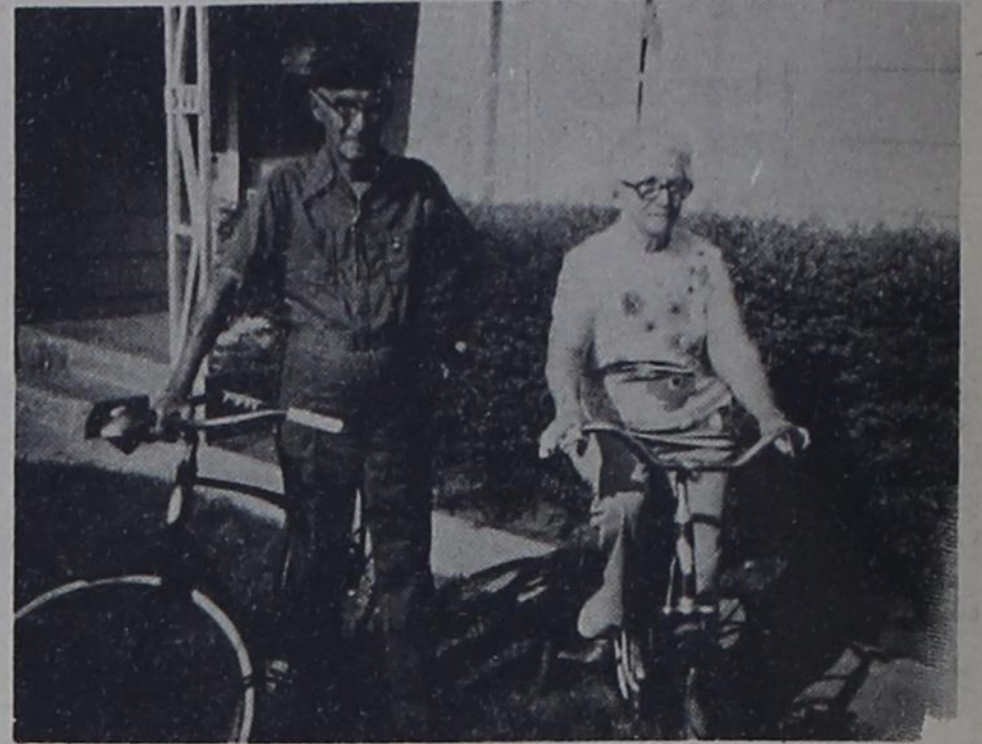

**Crops Residues Provide Alternative To Winter Wheat Grazing**

An estimated two and a half million acres of irrigated corn and grain sorghum stubble should be considered along with winter acreage for cattle grazing on the Texas High Plains, says John Shipley, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Researchers at the North Plains Research Field at Etter have developed comparative beef for grazing crop residues during the fall and early winter months compared to irrigated wheat. These data were collected both with and without supplemental feeding, Shipley says.

Studies showed that stocker steers weighing 350 to 450 pounds gained 1.8 pounds per day when grazing out irrigated wheat from mid-November to mid-May. The stocking rate per acre was 1.5 animals from November to mid-March, then two animals per acre until graze-out.

Shipley reports that the same weight steers only averaged 1.4 pounds per day on the winter wheat pasture from mid-November to early March, but when fed two pounds of mlo per head per day, their average daily gain jumped to 1.7 pounds during that period.

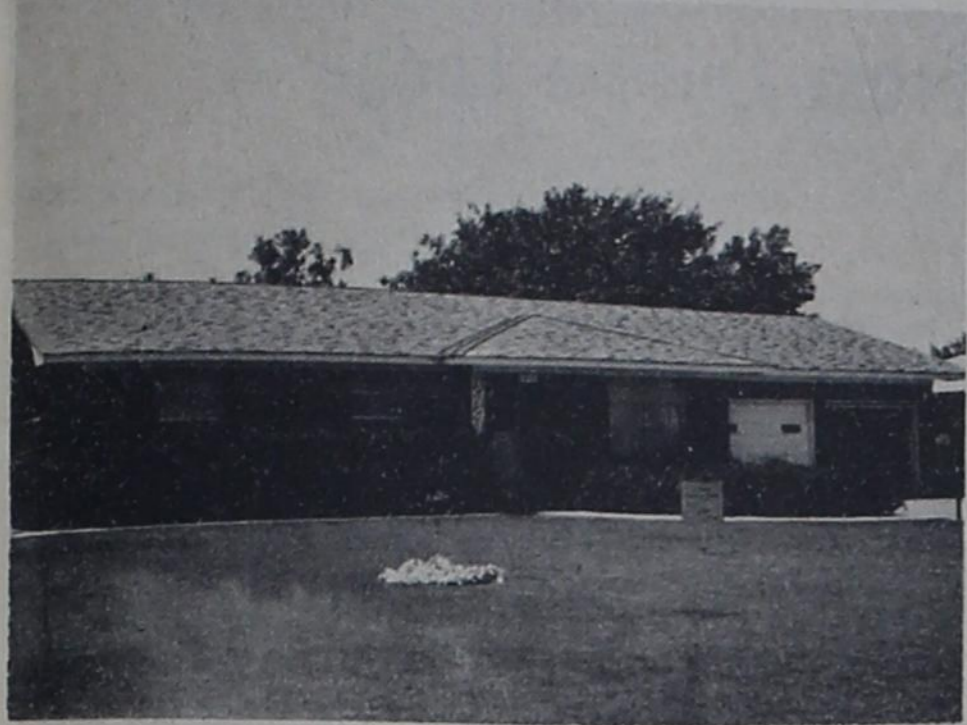
The scientist adds that the same weight cattle grazing irrigated wheat and corn or grain sorghum stubble on a one to one acreage gained only 1.1 pounds per day without supplemental feed.

Another test using corn stubble and grain sorghum stubble showed that when fed four pounds of 20 percent protein supplement mix per head per day, the cattle gained 1.3 and 1.6 pounds daily, respectively. Shipley figures that the 1.6 pounds gain from the grain sorghum stubble may have been higher than would normally be expected due to an exception-

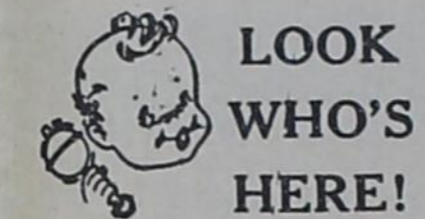

# Farm, Ranch Safety Systems Are Needed

Since family members themselves are the victims in most farm and ranch accidents, farm and ranch operators should consider developing a "safety system" to eliminate these accidents.

Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests the "Three E" approach to such a system; engineering (elimination of hazards), education (obtaining knowledge) and enforcement (supervision of workers).

Keese cites figures by the National Safety Council which show that 89 per cent of all farm and ranch accidents happen to family members while

only 8 per cent occur to employed farm workers and the remaining 3 per cent to family guests and other visitors. Thus he cites the need for a safety system for family members to reduce farm and ranch accidents which cause more than 500,000 disabling injuries and 6,000 deaths each year.

According to the Texas A&M University System specialist, the "education or knowledge" factor of developing a safety system is of utmost importance as it is based on locating accident hazards and then correcting them.

Almost two-thirds of the injuries of farm and ranch families are work-related. About

20 per cent occur in barns and other structures around the home, 15 per cent in home yards, 14 per cent in both barn yards and fields, 10 per cent in homes and 8 per cent on public roads.

Farm machinery is involved in 20 per cent of all injuries with tractors having a hand in one-fourth of these accidents. Power and hand tools and motor vehicles each cause 12 per cent of all farm and ranch accidents, and animals are involved in 11 per cent of the injuries.

"Start your farm and ranch safety system by inspecting your complete operation and eliminating any and all hazards," advises Keese. "Eliminating such things as trash, litter and junk in and around the home and other buildings can prevent many injuries. Also, be a stickler for the safety features on various power tools and equipment. Keep

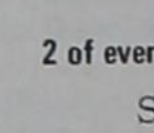
all guards and shields in place and observe the safety rules listed in the operator's manual for each piece of equipment.

"Of course, involve all members of the family in developing the safety system.

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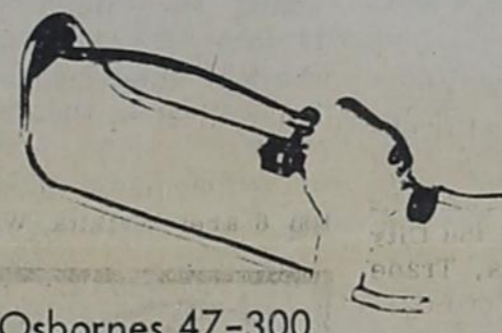


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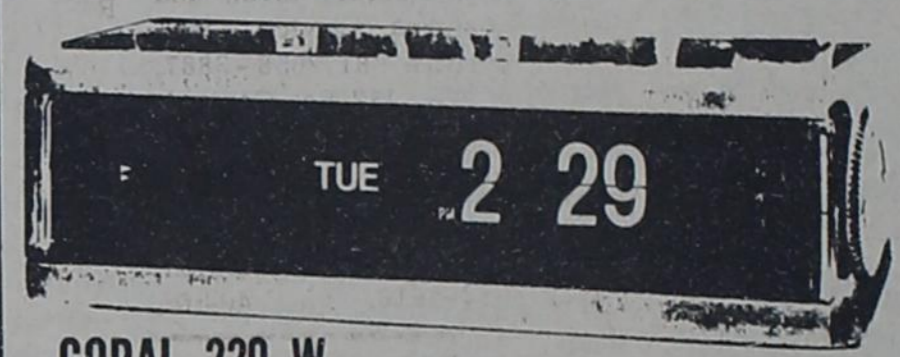
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## Two Accidents Listed In June

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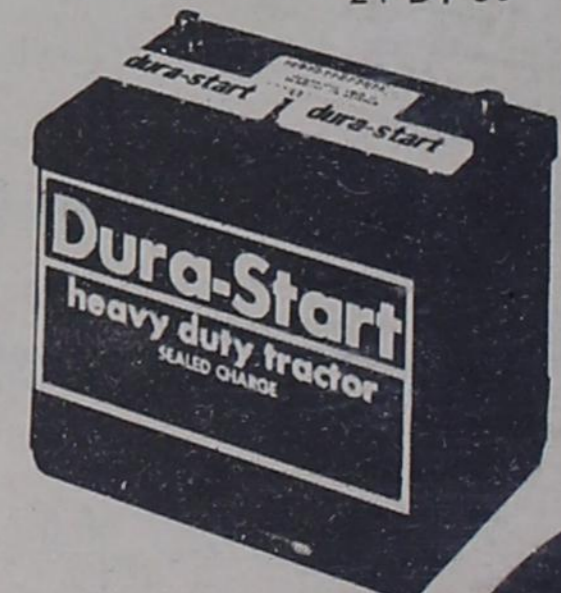

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# Farm And Ranch News

## COTTON REVIVAL

Cotton is one of the biggest revivals on the fabric market, according to one specialist.

"Aesthetics, technology and practicality are all elements which have enhanced the cotton fiber," Marilyn Brown, consumer education-clothing and textiles specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, noted this week.

Cotton blended with either wool, polyester or acrylic gives these fibers an all-seasons quality which they don't have alone, she explained.

A cotton blend wears better because it snags less and is cooler. Cotton blended with another fiber makes a softer fabric and one that accepts color better.

"Cotton blends offer increased marketing versatility in everything from men's shirts to women's dresses, in all fabric weights and for all seasons," she concluded.

## CROP DEASTER CLAIMS AVAILABLE

Grain and cotton producers in Texas are eligible this year for a federal program designed to compensate for losses incurred through crop shortfalls. This is the natural disaster provision of the new 1974 farm program.

A farmer who is enrolled in the wheat, feedgrain or cotton programs is eligible for disaster payments if he is prevented from planting or his total actual crop production is reduced to less than two-thirds of his average production. Thousands of Texas wheat producers already have reported damages to their county ASCS offices, and other producers who think they may be eligible for some compensation should check with the ASCS before putting the land to other use.

If a farmer qualifies, disaster payments will be based on the difference between the actual

amount of the crop harvested and the normal production. If harvesting is not economical, an appraisal by an ASCS official will assess the extent of damage.

Total payment per acre then is determined by multiplying the payment rate for the crop by the difference between the normal production and the actual or appraised yield per acre. Payments will only be made on allotment acres. Payment rates per bushel are: corn, 46 cents; barley, 38 cents; and wheat, 68 cents. The rate for sorghum is 78 cents per hundredweight and cotton is 13 cents per pound.

These rates are still well below current costs of production, but they will help some. However, producers who plant another crop on disaster acreage (such as planting sorghum or cotton behind wheat) will not receive any payments if the second crop is near normal production.

Producers are urged to contact the local ASCS office for additional details on this new disaster provision if summer crop yields are real low.
