

BAIRD GETS 5.9 INCHES OF RAIN OVER TWO DAY PERIOD

BAIRD — Baird was reported as having the heaviest amount of rainfall in the area over the weekend, measuring 5.9 inches.

Ranchers and farmers welcomed the rain as did city residents.

It was reported that the T&P lake ran around, while the City lake caught very little, due to the lack of rainfall south of Baird.

Some ranchers and farmers praised the rain, as it will provide them with an ample supply of water for stock, crops, and grassland, since the total amount of rainfall for the year has been far below normal, others stated they received less than a measurable amount of precipita-

tion.

For a while Sunday afternoon parts of town were covered with a thin layer of water, with some homes sustaining water damage. Gardens were uprooted and freshly tilled yards were washed away by the rushing water.

Luckily, there were no reports of damaging winds or a large amount of hail accompanying the welcomed rain.

Thursday afternoon, when area bands, riding clubs, floats, cars, bicycles, cowboys and cowgirls will be on hand, in western attire, for the parade, which will pass down the Main Street in Baird. Prizes will be awarded for the 1st three places in the float, car and bicycle competition.

has been done in preparation for the rodeo. The Posse has erected a new concession stand inside the rodeo grounds, along with much repair work on the arena. The main attraction is a new dance pavillion located across from the grounds.

The Queen for the 26th Annual Rodeo will be crowned Saturday night at the final performance. Unlike years gone by, the Queen will be chosen on her appearance and horsemanship. Hopefully contestants will be entered from Putnam, Cross Plains, Eula, Clyde and Baird. Each school will elect the girl

they think will best represent their town and school.

The Rodeo will get underway Thursday night beginning at 8 p. m., under the direction of Walt Alsaugh of Alamosa, Colo. Alsaugh, a well known producer, has put on many shows for the fans in this area. A specialty act will be featured each night. Information on the particular act is not available at press time.

Many exciting events will take place each night. Bareback riding, saddle bronc, barrel racing, calf roping, bull riding and many more events will be featured.

The Annual Sheriff's Posse Rodeo has been a famed legend throughout the state for many years, and is expected to be bigger than ever this year.

H. C. COTTON LONGTIME CLYDE RESIDENT SUCCUMBS AT 90

CLYDE — Harkley C. Cotton, 90, a resident of Clyde since 1922, died in Clyde Nursing Home at 12:20 p. m. Saturday, after a year's illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday in Clyde Church of Christ, with Roy Plemister officiating, assisted by Joe Wilson of the Baird Church of Christ. Burial was in the Clyde Cemetery under direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Born April 18, 1884 in Corley, Ark., the Cotton family moved from Arkansas to Dunn in 1896 in covered wagons. Mr. Cotton married Mabel Richardson Dec. 24, 1905 in Dunn, and they moved to Clyde in 1922.

Mr. Cotton organized the First Farm Loan Association at Snyder in 1917, and was a director of the Farm Loan Association in Clyde and Baird for 25 years. He was president of the Board of Directors for 20 years.

Mr. Cotton was a school trustee in Scurry County and in Clyde. He had been a member of Clyde Church of Christ since 1906 and was an elder of that church of 50 years.

Survivors are three sons: Herman of Belleville, Ill., J. C. of Pecos and Ed of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. J. L. (Eulala)

Ault of Baird and Mrs. K. D. (Neva) Brown of Lake Belton; one sister, Mrs. E. J. Richardson Sr. of Snyder; two brothers, Houston Cotton of Dunn and Loran of San Angelo; 12 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

His wife preceded him in death in 1965. Four brothers and four sisters also preceded him in death, as did a nephew, J. D. Harris who was reared in the Cotton home.


Saundra Rosengrants To Wed June 22

The principles and elements of design were covered point by point and some of the pitfalls were pointed out. A mass arrangement must have two thirds solids and one third voids while a line arrangement must have two-third voids and one-third solids. Remember to dry your container completely dry before trying to anchor a floral pin holder to a container with tacky tape or other adhesives. It will not hold if damp.

As your spring bulbs complete blooming give them a feeding of manure tea once every three weeks for nine weeks. This will insure good blooms for the coming year. It is best to make your tea with fresh manure in a plastic container with a tight fitting lid, dip from the top of the fluid and add water only half-way down. A plastic garbage can is ideal. Don't use a metal can, it will devour a metal container.

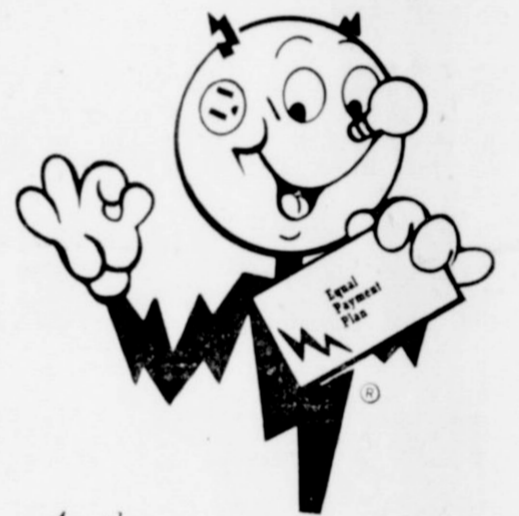

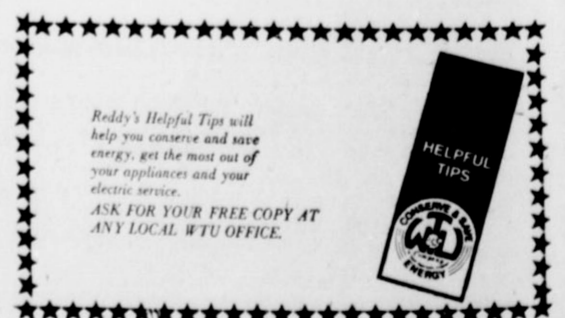

Certify Wheat, Oats Barley Now

BAIRD — Anyone who has a wheat, feed grain or cotton allotment, and has acreage of wheat, oats or barley planted should report such acreage and file an intention to participate in the programs at this time. This would establish eligibility for deficiency, and or disaster payments when and if conditions warrant and would protect future allotments on the farm.

An allotment will be reduced next year if the acreage credited to the allotment is less than 90 percent of the allotment. Various crops that are planted and the acreage timely certified will provide history credit for wheat, feed grain and cotton.

The final certification date for wheat, feed grain and cotton is before the applicable crop is harvested, or July 16, 1974, whichever comes first.

In the Conservation Program, requests for funds to help carry out approved conservation practices exceed the amount allocated to Callahan County. When and if additional money becomes available, everyone will be notified.

Remember, May 1st is the final date to transfer cotton to or from a farm.

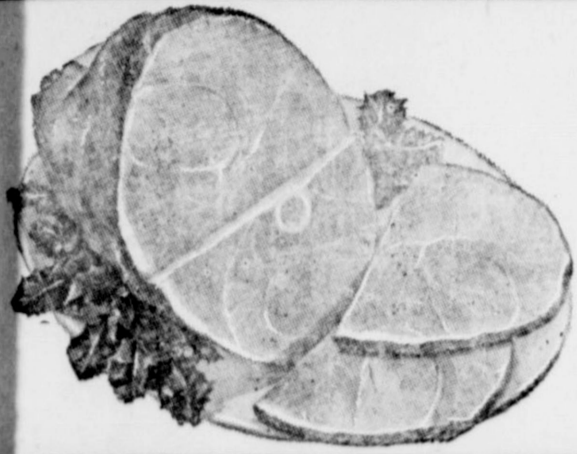
