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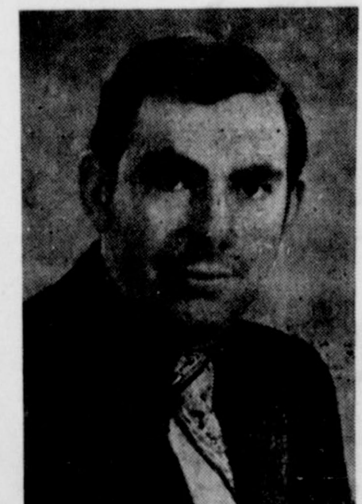

CLYDE — Clyde Bulldogs pulled off the upset of the week at Hamlin Friday night as they stung the Pipers 8-7 on a muddy field. The Pipers were state ranked and a 48 point favorite. This Friday the Bulldogs entertain the undefeated Anson Tigers at Clyde Field. The Tigers have laced Haskell 25-0, Rotan 43-6 and Albany 49-6. Their offense features half-back John Booker who has scored 10 touchdowns and halfback Jack More-

land who scored 3 touchdowns last week against Albany in the first quarter only. The Tigers have rushed for 1,006 yards and passed for 526 yards in their first three outings. Their backs are fast and linemen average over 190 lbs. on offense and defense. The Tigers are explosive on offense and stingy on defense. The Bulldogs will have to come off Cloud 9 and show even greater improvement this week in order to contain the Tigers and move the ball against them. Kick-off time is 8:00.
