BAIRD—The Callahan County Farmers Co-op held their 28th annual Stockholders meeting and banquet Monday night, Nov. 25 in the Baird School Cafeteria.

Manager Jimmy Roppolo opened the meeting by welcoming over 200 guests, stockholders and employees.

Borden Duffel, C.P.A. of Abilene, gave the auditors report and noted the cooperative had more than \$60,000 in earnings through the fiscal year ending July 31, the most earnings in the cooperative's 27 year history.

Then began the new business and what seemed to be the hardest task of the night, that of choosing the three new directors. Charlie Thomas Straley of Oplin was re-elected on the first vote, and Lowell Johnson, also of Oplin became a new director after the first count, but the sticky part came in choosing the third director to the board. The deadlock was between Dale Wilson and E. A. Franke, both of Baird, but Franke finally won out by a margin of one vote. This was determined after about four run-offs and much voting.

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Baird Sanitary Landfill To Open December 3

BAIRD—February 13, 1891, the town of Baird was incorporated as provided to cities and towns, as contained in the Civil Statutes of the State of Texas. At this time there was a place provided for the public to dump their trash, which through the years has been known as the Dump Ground.

Beginning December 3, 1974, Baird will no longer have a Dump Ground. It will be known as the "Baird Sanitary Landfill". This will be the same location as the present Dump Ground.

Starting December 1, 1974, Mr. Virgil Sadler will be in charge of the new operation. One of the duties Mr. Sadler will have is, to instruct the people where they should unload their trash. All trash, rubbish, etc. must be put in a pit that will be dug and maintained for that purpose.

All brush will be piled in a designated place. This brush will then be run through a chipper and will become a pile of chips instead of a pile of brush. The chips will be free to the public to haul off to place in flower beds and gardens or to burn in fireplaces if they so desire.

All the rubbish that is put in the pits will be compacted and covered with at least 6 inches of sand at the end of each day. When the pit is full it will be covered with 2 feet of soil and another pit will be dug to receive additional rubbish.

The City of Baird is doing this to meet the regulation requirements of the Texas Air Control Board and the Texas State Department of Health. They are requesting the city to discontinue outdoor burning

and initiate a satisfactory disposal system which is to provide a city dump under the same regulations governing metropolitan areas and larger cities.

For the City of Baird to meet this request it required manymonths of planning and work, as well as much more time and labor in clearing the old rubbish that has been dumped all over the area in past years. The old rubbish will have to be disposed of the same as any new rubbish that is now being dumped.

The Sanitary Landfill is open to the public to use five

days a week and all that is required is that you unload at the proper place! The Sanitary Landfill will be open Tuesday through Saturday and closed Sunday and Monday.

This landfill is made possible by the City of Baird with an initial expenditure in excess of \$40,000.00, for equipment and \$80,000.00 in land value. In addition \$500.00 is spent each month for operation expense, which does not include Baird's normal twice a week trash pick-ups.

Please put your trash in a pit and not along the road-way.

Blair Odum of Baird, the Cooperative's president, presided for the meeting.

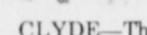

Grass and weeds are an eyesore when coming up through the gravel and spoil the eye-appeal instantly. When selecting rocks look for irregular shapes, pleasing colors, and unusual appearances, choose rocks with personality. Rocks should be sunk into the soil 1/3 of the greatest dimension of the rock, so that they look like they are growing in the selected spot. This setting into the soil is also a safety factor, be sure that the rocks are stable. In a rock garden, the border should be well defined. Curving edges are more interesting than straight lines."

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Annual Pecan Show Dec. 12-14

BAIRD—The annual West Texas Regional Pecan Show will be held in Odessa on December 12-14, according to Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent. The Pecan Show is open to any producer in this region of Texas.

Pecan shows were organized to permit owners of pecan trees to enter pecans in competition with each other. In recent years emphasis has shifted toward education for the exhibitor and the viewing public. Modern pecan grading demonstrations supply the much data for growers and others on such things as variety adaptation, quality of kernel, shelling percentage, and evidence of disease and insect damage to name only a few factors important to pecan growers and consumers.

In general, entries are selected and prepared in the following way for county shows.

1. Select not less than 40, preferably 45, pecans of each variety. (Some county rules

require a greater number of units).

2. Try to eliminate off-color, ill shaped, and lightweight units, as well as any that show any evidence of disease or insect damage.

3. Pecans should not be polished, or have variety shell characteristics removed.

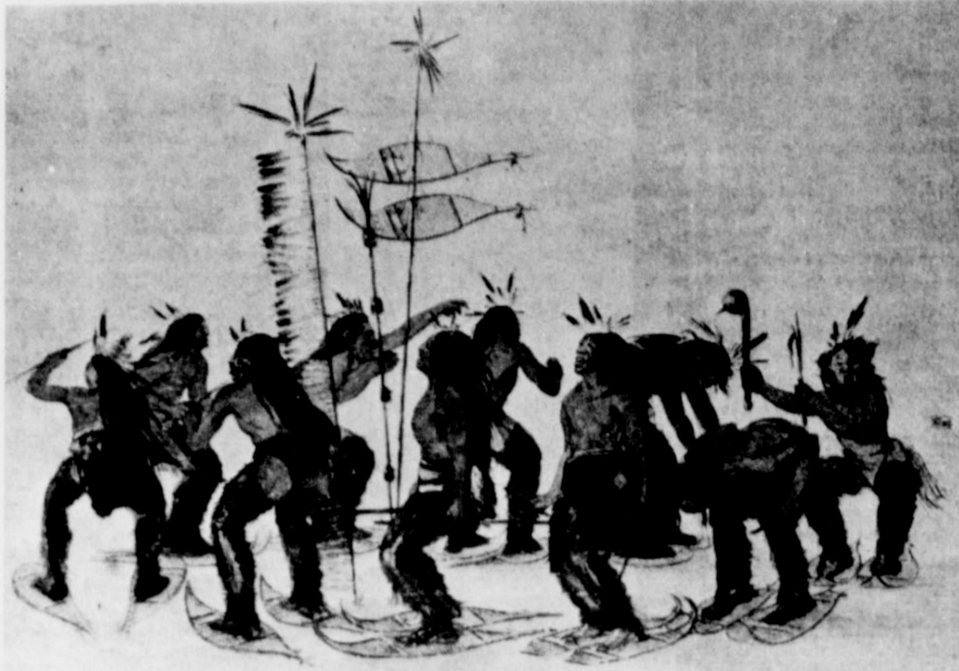
4. Pecans should be packaged, by variety, in clear paper bags.

5. Paper bags should be labeled with exhibitors name and address and the variety of pecans, if known.

6. Entries should be stored in a cool location away from fumes and other contamination agents.

7. County show entries should be delivered to the show committee as specified by the rules.

All entries for the West Texas Regional Show must be delivered to Maurice Black, County Extension Agent, Odessa, by 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, December 9, 1974. Entries arriving later will not be eligible for processing or exhibit

Peanut Allotment

Proposed Program Changes

WASHINGTON—Nov. 20, The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced a national marketing quota of 1,899,800 tons and a national acreage allotment of 1,610,000 for the 1975 peanut crop. USDA also announced a mail referendum will be held Dec. 9-13, 1974, to determine whether marketing quotas will be applicable to the 1975, 1976 and 1977 crops of peanuts.

Only those producers growing peanuts in calendar year 1974 will be eligible to vote in the December referendum. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve quotas if they are to be made effective.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect each year since 1949. The last referendum was held in December, 1971 when 97.4 percent of the 43,641 growers voting favored marketing quotas for the 1972, 1973 and 1974 crops.

The national peanut acreage allotment is apportioned to states, and the states allotments are apportioned among individual peanut-producing farms within each state.

Legislation under which the Peanut Price Support Program is administered provides the Secretary with discretion regarding certain portions of the program. In view of this discretion, some administrative changes are being considered for the 1975 program.

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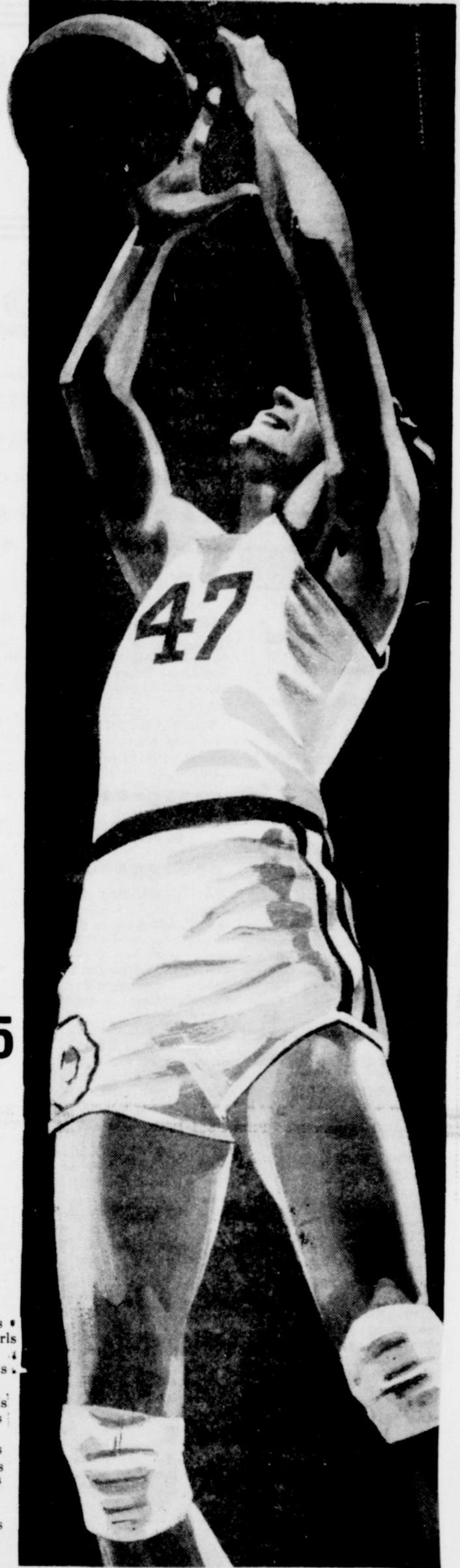
