Courier To Have New Look July 12

On Thursday, July 12, the Munday Courier will have a brand new look! There will be a six column format for both advertising and editorial. This is the same format which our front page has had for the past couple of years. However, the inside pages, and advertising columns, have been based on eight columns. The uniform column widths will greatly enhance the appearance of the newspaper.

Throughout the nation, newspapers in every size market are making the change or will do so by the end of the year. This new look is the result of extensive readership studies conducted to determine the needs of readers and advertisers.

The new, wider column offers better readability, fewer hyphenated words, more even spacing between stories, and less wasted space. This ease of reading will result in greater reader interest in both news copy and advertising.

The American Newspaper Publishers Association has developed a system of modular advertising units called Standard Advertising Units (S.A.U.). They were developed specifically to allow a greater compatibility for various advertising units in

all six column newspapers. As an advertiser or reader, you have always been a partner in many of the Courier's newest technologies and innovations, from printing from metal type to the conversion to offset printing and computerized type setting and more pages of news and advertising with larger and easier to read print.

The new format affects both ad rates and mechanical requirements. The advertising rates will reflect only the change from eight to six column. There is no rate increase. The moderate increase in cost per column inch will be reflected in the increased width of the column . . . approximately 37.5 percent more space than the old column size ad. Currently the width of the inside column is 1 5/8 inch, under the new format the width will be increased to 2 1/16 inches.

Some advantages for the advertiser are . . . National advertisers and ad agencies are changing from the complicated "line" billing to standardized "inch" billing. This removes the mystery of picas, points and agate lines from buying newspaper space. The page makeup will enable more attractive placement of

ads and a one-column-ad will actually be more attractive to the reader. It won't be as easily overlooked.

Advantages for the reader will be . . . 1. The news content will be set on the new wide columns allowing for fewer hyphens and broken sentences. This should make reading the news contents easier. The longer lines of type possible in the six-column format have been proven to be more readable because the eye does not have to make as many back and forth movements in going from one line to the next. 2. Photos will also be wider which will add more impact. 3. There will be less "wrapping" of stories around each other which will also make reading easier.

It is the hope of the newspaper management that the end result will be "an easier to read newspaper that will attract more thorough reading of news and advertising".

We realize that a few headaches will accompany this change, but we hope that this one will not be too involved. We are excited about the change and believe the benefits in terms of a better, brighter product for our readers and advertisers far outweigh any complication entailed during the changeover. We think you will like the six-column format. Newspapers in other neighboring cities which have gone to the new format say both advertisers and readers alike have applauded the change.

We would be happy to explain the changes and hope that your viewing of the new six-column format in our next issue on Thursday, July 12, will meet with your approval and give you an idea of what to expect. *****

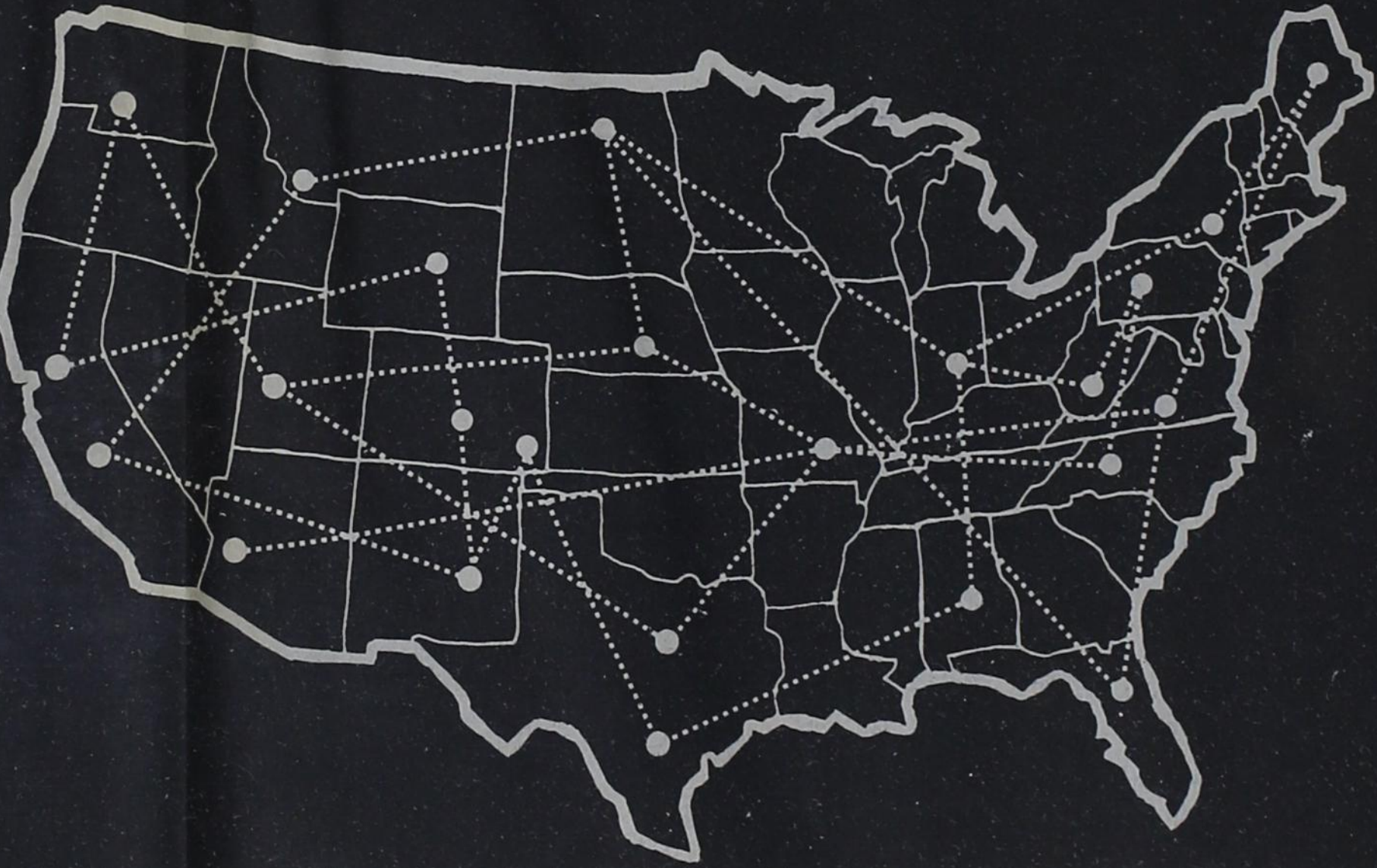

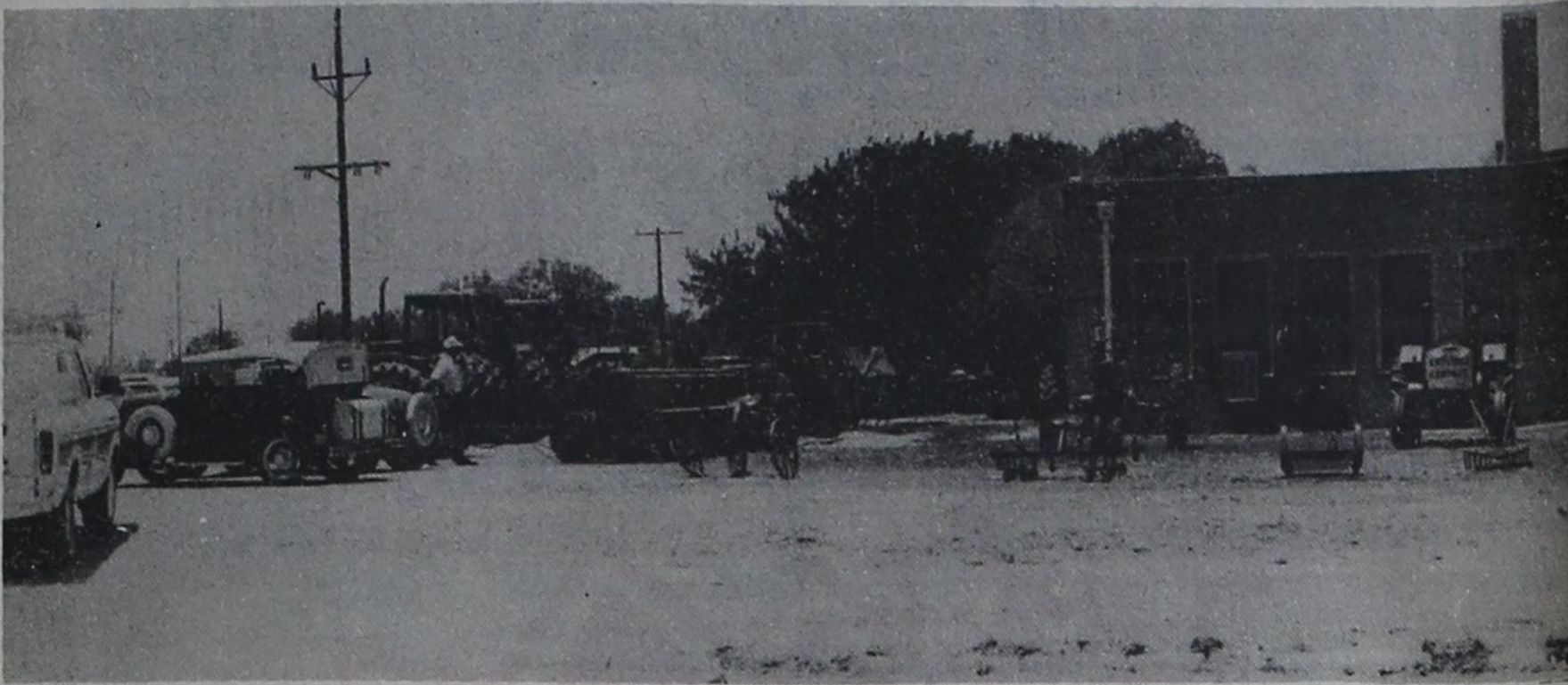


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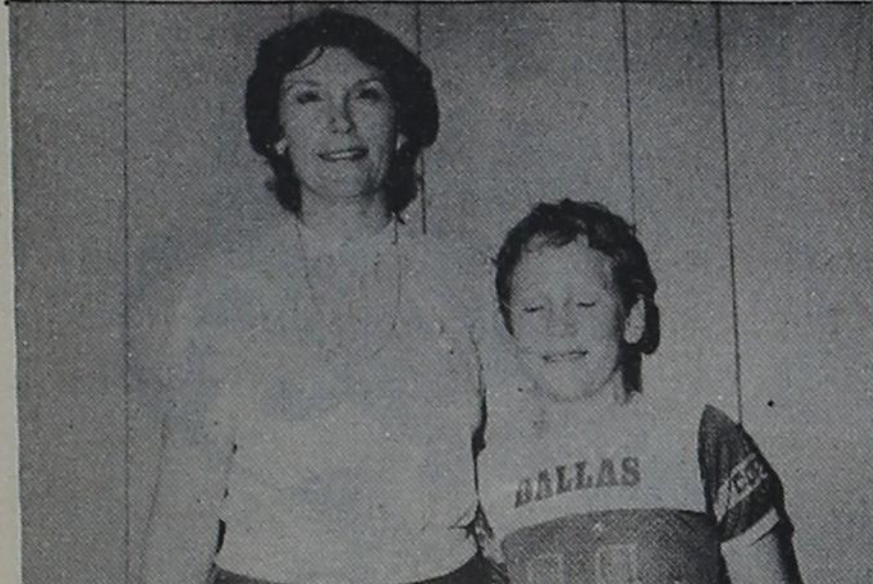


A VARIETY OF antique cars and farm equipment was displayed at the Munday Elementary School during the Knox County Vegetable Festival. Several area collectors

Veteran Publisher Dies June 21

Afton E. Richards of Ralls, a west Texas newspaper publisher for almost 50 years, died Thursday, June 21, in the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a short illness. He was 70 years old. At the time of his death, Richards was editor-publisher of his hometown weekly newspaper, The Ralls Banner, and also published the Lorenzo Leader, Aspermont News and Jayton Chronicle, and the Primitive Baptist Church paper, the Banner of Love.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 23, in the Lubbock Primitive Baptist Church. Elders G. H. Crain of Arlington and George Johnson of Idalou officiated. Burial was in the Anton Cemetery under the direction of Carter-Adams

Funeral Home of Ralls. Hank Matthews of Munday was a pallbearer, along with Steven Bloyd, Dale Johnson, Joe Yarbrough, O. J. Neely, Alvis Bass, Morris Nowlin and Leon Watson. Born May 12, 1914, in Haskell County, Richards grew up in a rural environment. When his father acquired a newspaper at Anton in the early 1930's, he and his two brothers, all teenagers, began working with newspapers and all made careers of the business. His twin brother, Alton Richards, was editor-publisher of the Rule Review until his death in 1970, and another brother, Edwin Richards, is a retired production department employee of the Dallas Morning News.

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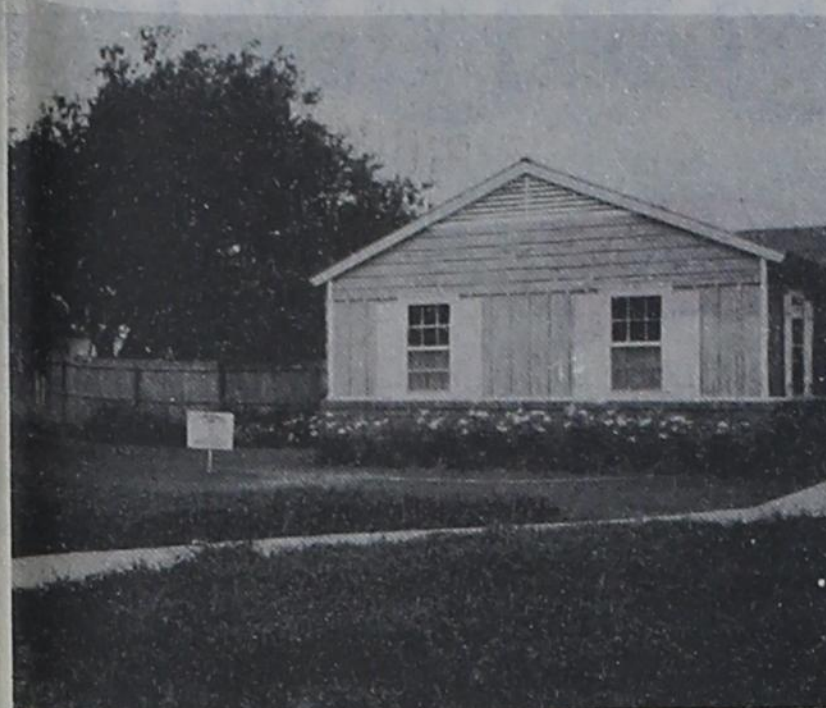

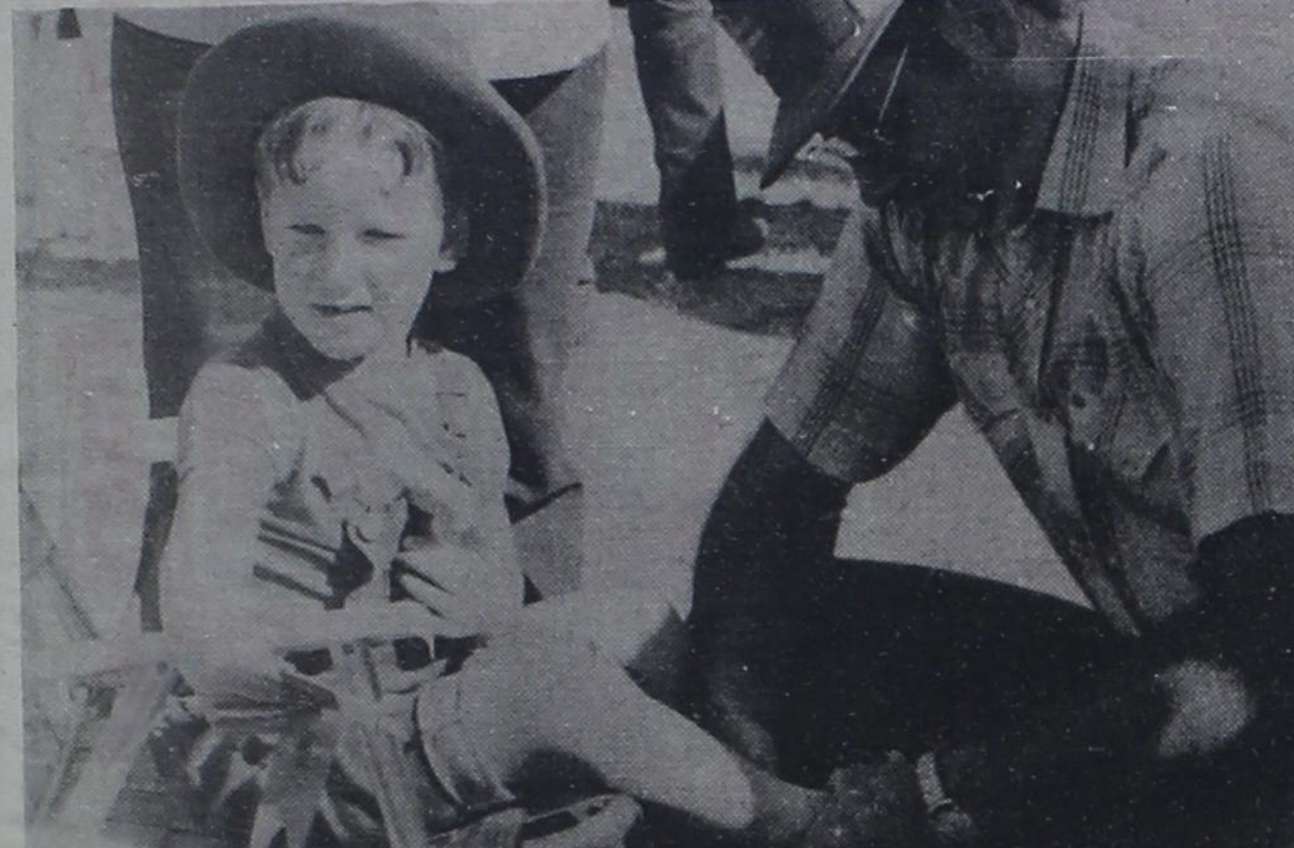

Time To Battle Mesquite

The time for foliar application of herbicides for control of mesquite and mixed brush is here, provided growing is good, according to Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist. Many ranchers are trying to determine if they should spray.

To determine if conditions are right for good control of mesquite, it's necessary to take a look at weather conditions beginning last fall, says Welch. Herbicides used to control mesquite and associated brush are growth-regulating chemicals that must move from the leaves to the stems and roots, and this process is strongly influenced by growing conditions when the herbicide is applied. Mesquite growth appears to be closely related to climatic conditions which precede the spraying date.

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station studies show that average results in mesquite control by aerial spraying of herbicide occurred when monthly rainfall was average or slightly above average for at least three months before the herbicide is applied. Highest plant kills occurred when monthly rainfall

exceeded the average for six months prior to spraying, while poorest results occurred following conditions when only two or less months exceeded the long term average prior to spraying. Most if not all areas of Knox County were well below average in rainfall for April and May.

With only a few exceptions, 1984 does not appear to be a good year for spraying mesquite. Each individual must evaluate conditions on their ranch with respect to moisture and growing conditions.

Recently Bob McWhorter of Munday asked me about the use of kerosene or diesel fuel oil to control mesquite trees. This is one of the older methods used to control mesquite. Kerosene or diesel oil kills mesquite by translocation within the tree.

To achieve best results, McWhorter will apply the oil around the base of the tree in sufficient quantity to penetrate the lowest underground buds. Large trees may require one-half gallon for complete coverage of underground buds.

Mesquite should be treated when the soil is dry, preferably during the summer. Kerosene or diesel oil works best on sandy loam or gravelly soils. On bottomland or

heavy clay, penetration is much slower and requires higher application rates. Kill may be poor on these types of soils.

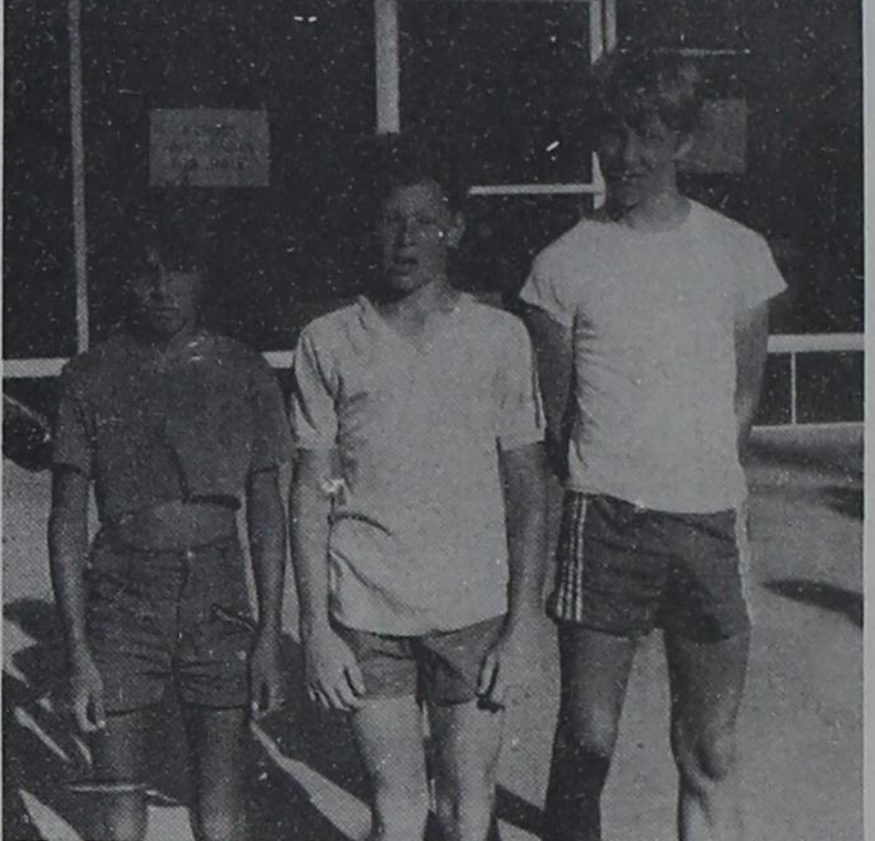
