

Connally underwent chest surgery at Parkland Hospital on Friday night, was reported out of danger next day, and is now recovering in the hospital, where temporary governor's offices have been establish-

Funeral services for President Kennedy were held in Washington on Monday, being attended by over 50 representatives of foreign nations, and people from all over the world. Gov. and Mrs. Connally designated their son 17year-old John, as their representative at the funeral.

An eternal flame is now burning over the resting place of President Kennedy. It was Mrs. Kennedy, still bearing up under her grief, who touched a torch to the eternal light on the grave of her husband.

As Dallas became the scene of whirlwind events, police within a short time after the shooting arrested a 24-year-old suspect with a pro - Communist background. His name was listed as Lee Harvey Oswald.

Oswald was also charged with the murder of Dallas Patrolman J. D. Trippit, who was slain shortly after the President's assassination. Trippit, who was buried in Dallas Monday, reportedly left Patients in the Knox County his patrol car to intercept Oswald, "who looked suspicious,"



The urging came from railroad spokesmen. It years ago. had to do with regulation of railroad shipments of agricultural and bulk commodities. At present, regulations prevent the rails from lowering rates charged, even when they could do so on a fair and profitable basis.

An Administration-backed bill to correct this situation-to the advantage of consumers everywhere—is now before the Senate. It would reduce federal regulation over the minimum level of rates for these shipments. And there can be no justified concern as to the results. For one thing, as the railroad spokesmen made clear, existing antitrust restraints against any dangers of predatory pricing practices. And, for another, the bill would leave untouched the Interstate Commerce Commission's powers to block unjustified increases in those rates once they had been lowered.

National Infant Testing Program Helps Prevent Mental Retardation

A major advance in early detection of one of the hidden causes of severe mental retardation is fast proving its worth, thanks to the "help" of thousands of newborn babies.

These children are among the first to benefit from a new, nationwide screening program for early detection of PKU (phenylketonuria), an in-herited error in body chemistry which causes severe mental retardation unless treated in

The screening program, started in recent months, will eventually include some 600,-000 newborn babies in the United States. Already 157,000 newborns have undergone the simple test which was devised by Dr. Robert Guthrie of Children's Hospital, Buffalo, N. Y., with the help of a grant from The National Foundation-March of Dimes.






