**EPA improvements guzzle funds from small station owners**

Small business owners in rural areas of the country are feeling the pinch as larger businesses in the more metropolitan locales thrive. Very often these establishments can offer products at lower prices due to volume purchasing and lower transportation fees. And now service station operators are feeling an even tighter pinch as they struggle to comply with underground gasoline storage tank upgrades required by federal and state environmental agencies.

December 22 is the final deadline for a series of upgrades faced by owners of underground storage tanks that hold petroleum products or hazardous chemicals. The state has adopted similar standards to the mandates that were imposed nationally by the federal Environmental Protection Agency which have been implemented to curb groundwater pollution.

"We've been in business for eleven years and I've known about the requirements and the deadline," says P & W Service Station owner Charles Pankhurst of Munday. "I've been planning

and investigating what would be necessary, but of course I was hoping it wouldn't be so expensive."

It is feared that the expense of the requirements could administer a death blow to small station operators leaving only the big super stations to service the customer. Initial costs for a site assessment is approximately \$1,500 which is the cheaper end of the work required. Most stations have three tanks, and installing corrosion protection and spill and overflow protection can run an owner about \$10,000. If the owner must yank the tanks and replace them with newer rust-proof ones the expense mounts - typically around \$50,000.

"We don't have to replace tanks but the cost of the protective equipment and the new lines that are required for us will be a financial difficulty," says Pankhurst.

The requirements have undergone a ten-year phase-in. The problems associated with underground storage tanks began

to be addressed in December of 1988. Many owners have either completed or already began the upgrading but others are still scrambling to meet the December 22 deadline. According to Anton Rozsypal, an engineer in the TNRCC's petroleum storage tank technical services section, as many as half of the owners have not completed the work. The national compliance rate was recently estimated to be higher, about 60-70 percent.

Rozsypal recently told another newspaper service, "This set of deadlines has been coming up for ten years. People have had adequate notice."

EPA spokesman David Bary in Dallas explains, "The rules are important to maintaining the safety of the nation's drinking water. Half of the population of the United States rely on groundwater as a source of drinking water." He also

said "Years ago, before underground storage tank rules were written, it was very common for steel tanks without any rust or corrosion protection at all to be used to hold petroleum products. They rusted away and leaked into the drinking water supply."

The immediate requirements have caused members of the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association to spend \$500 million to comply with the upgrade rules. While some rural area service stations will "dry up" from the hefty costs of the improvements others will manage to keep their heads above water because of a strong customer base.

"About 90% of our business is from local, loyal customers and we appreciate that," adds Pankhurst. "It will take us a long time to recoup the money that we will have to spend for the upgrades but we're dealing with it," says Pankhurst. "If we didn't do this we couldn't remain in business. If we weren't here people in Munday might still be able to obtain gasoline services but who would be here to fix flats and repair their vehicles?" asks Pankhurst.

Pankhurst's son and business partner, Jeremy Wilson, adds, "It's hard for small businesses to stay alive, especially when people go to larger communities for goods and services that are cheaper there. But this is our livelihood and we'll be here for our people. All businesses have problems," he says.

Pankhurst points out, "When the farmer's have a drought - we have a drought. It's a financial strain but we're dealing with it."

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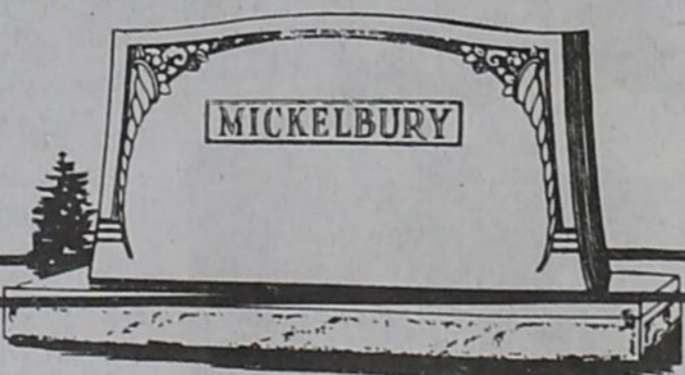

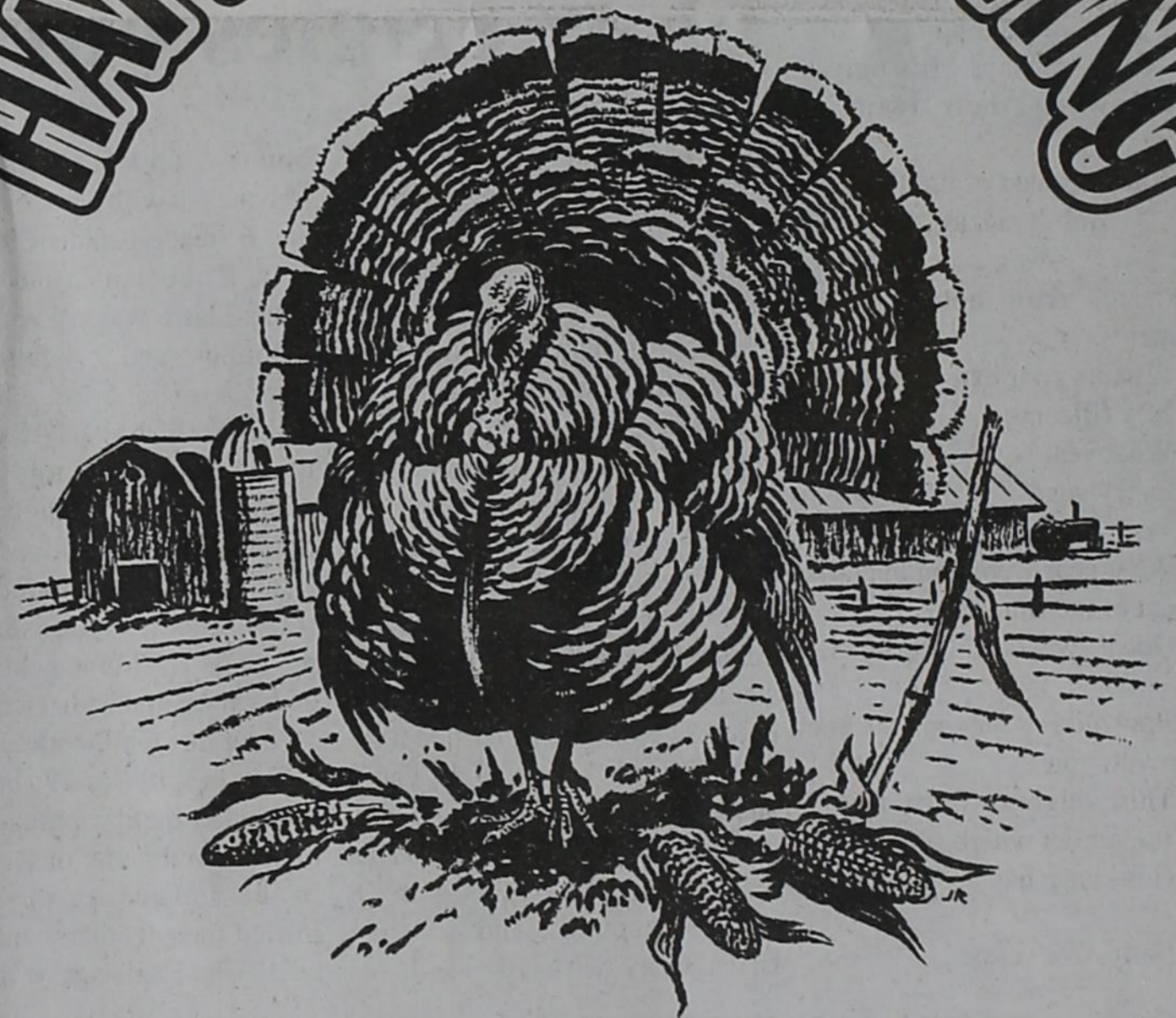

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# Give thanks with a grateful heart

Thanksgiving is the only

official holiday we celebrate that is strictly of Christian origin. This special day does not have ancient pagan roots mixed with the Christian themes as do Easter and Christmas, nor is it simply an annual celebration of a momentous

occasion such as July 4.

Thanksgiving has been from its beginning a day of turning to God and giving thanks for His goodness. Similar festivals are held around the world as part of the harvest celebrations, but in America this festival was historically connected to the church of Jesus Christ.

The American Thanksgiving began with the Pilgrim settlers in 1620 in Plymouth Colony, Massachusetts. This struggling

band of believers in Christ came to this continent seeking the freedom to practice their religion according to the dictates of the word of God as they understood it. They were related historically to the Baptists and Separatists in England and Holland.

Only half of the original group that sailed across the Atlantic in the Mayflower survived that first grim winter. After the successful harvest of the next year, Governor William Bradford proclaimed three days of prayer and giving of thanks.

The Pilgrims invited to their feast an Indian chief and 90 of his men. They brought turkey and venison for the celebration. The custom of this yearly celebration spread throughout the colonies and continued after the American Revolution, although the day of the festival varied among the states. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day, and the date was fixed by Congress in 1941.

The Thanksgiving celebration is similar in nature to the Old Testament Feast of Weeks, or Pentecost. This is called the Feast of Harvest in Exodus 23:16. The weeks from Passover to Pentecost actually covered the entire period of the grain harvest, beginning with the first cuttings of the barley harvest and continuing through the completion of the wheat harvest. This was an agricultural society, and the various crops were of great importance to them.

I suggest that you treat Thanksgiving as a celebration of the goodness and bounty of God - as a Harvest Celebration, so to speak.

You may do this in several ways.

First, on Thanksgiving Day make the reading of Scripture and the offering of prayers to God a central part of the family gathering. I suggest reading one or more of these passages: Psalm 100; I Chron. 16: 7 - 12, 23 - 36; Psalm 105: 1 - 7; Psalm 118: 19 - 29; Psalm 136: 1 - 9; I Thess. 5: 12 - 24; an Phil. 4: 4 - 13.

Second, rehearse the wonderful works of God within your own family. Give testimonies of God's goodness around the table.

Third, sing around the table a song of thanksgiving such as the Doxology, Count Your Blessings, We Gather Together, Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart, of Thank You, Lord, for Saving My soul.

Fourth, make much of the bounty upon the table,

acknowledging it as a gift from God.

Fifth, consider making a special offering to the Lord your God in connection with Thanksgiving as a concrete expression of your praise and gratitude.

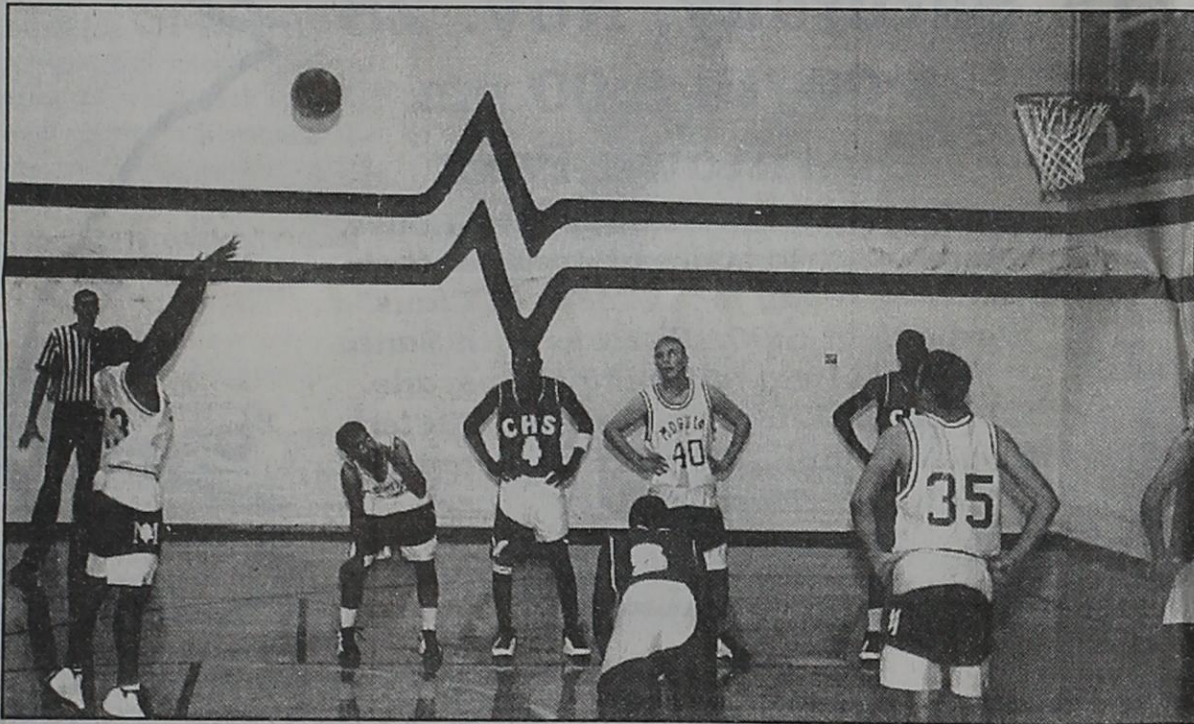

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## Goree School given 'acceptable' rating on annual report

Goree ISD received an accountability rating of "Academically Acceptable" on the state's Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) report. The rating is based on Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) scores, attendance, and dropout rate. Another important element of the AEIS is the Comparable Improvement section of the report where schools are compared to other schools with similar demographics using the Texas Learning Index (TLI) Average Growth of TAG in math and reading as a means to rate schools into 4 Quadrants. Quadrant 1 schools show the largest growth, while Quadrant 4 schools show the least growth. Goree ISD is proud to announce receiving a rating of Quadrant 1 in math for the second straight year. TLI growth in reading was measured at 2.75 points.

Goree ISD student scores on the TAAS test taken this past spring showed a general improvement over last year's results. As in the past, the results show the percentage of students taking the tests that met the State's minimum expectations in the subject areas tested. Reading and math skills were tested in grades three through eight and ten, while grades four, eight, and ten were tested additionally on writing skills. In order to "pass" the TAAS, students must maintain a TLI of 70 for each portion of the test. The State has designed the tests so that all students scoring at or above the 70 TLI should be on a skill level that will enable them to pass the exit level test as a sophomore.

The percentage of all students in grades three through eight and ten passing the Reading and Math portions of the 1998 TAAS were: Reading - 88.5%, Math - 92.3%. The percentage of all students

passing in these same grades on the 1997 TAAS are: Reading - 81.5%, Math - 74.1%. Of the students in grades four, eight and ten, 70.0% passed the Writing portion of the TAAS in 1998, while 83.3% passed the Writing exam in 1997. In addition, 20.8% of all Algebra 1 students passed the End of Course Algebra 1 exam compared to the State average passing rate of 18.5%.

Goree School recorded an attendance rate for the '97-'98 school year of 97.7% as compared to the state average of 95.2%. Also, an outstanding 75% of Goree High School graduates of the class of 1996 met the requirements of the Recommended Program of graduation as compared to a state average of 1.4%.

Overall, the administration and staff were pleased with the students' performances, although higher TAAS scores will continue to be a major focus for the current school year.

## Myers takes Lady Chaps to National tournament

Coach Julie Myers has been with the Lady Chaparrals Volleyball program at Vernon Regional Junior College since the onset. She started the VRJC program ten seasons ago and now she has seen her work and determination pay off. The Lady Chaps are the winners of District III and have earned a berth in the National Junior College Volleyball Tournament which will take place in Orem, Utah, on November 23 through 25.

The VRJC Ladies first-ever regional championship came from winning the Region V volleyball conference championship tournament at Collin County Community College, Plano, Texas. Seven teams competed in the two-day tournament. VRJC went in seeded second (actually tied for first) to North Central Texas College. They beat seventh place Frank Phillips College in three games in the quarter finals. Then in the semifinals, VRJC

After the regional championship the Lady Chaps defeated the Redlands Community College Lady Cougars three out of four games and captured the District 3 crown, which put the team into the national tournament.

"It was just an outstanding job for the whole team. That includes everyone. Those who were on the court or on the bench," Myers said. "It took all 14 players to get here. It's not only outstanding for the team and the volleyball program, but also for Vernon and VRJC."

Results of the national tournament were not available at press time.

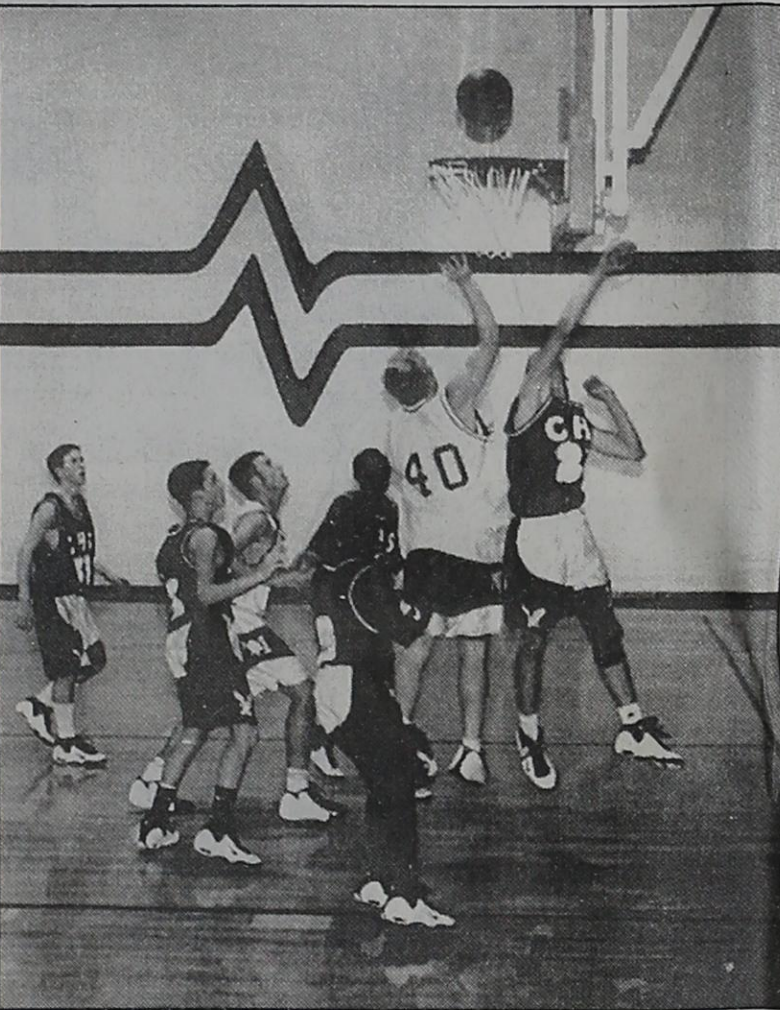
