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TOWN ORDINANCES.

(Continued from last week.)

ART. 32.—That the property of a minor shall be listed by his guardian or by any person having charge of such property...

ART. 33.—That persons listing lands for others shall do so in the same manner in which they are required to list their own...

ART. 34.—That all persons listing property are hereby required to make and sign a statement sworn to before the Marshal...

ART. 35.—That no person shall be required to list or render a greater portion of his credits than he believes will be received...

ART. 36.—That all real property subject to taxation shall be assessed to the value thereof in the manner provided, but no such assessment shall be illegal by reason of the same not being listed or assessed in the name of the owner.

ART. 37.—That all taxes due upon real property shall be a lien upon such property until the same shall have been paid...

ART. 38.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Baird: That the marshal before entering upon the duties of his office shall execute a bond of \$1,000, payable to the corporation of Baird...

ART. 39.—That every person owning property within the limits of the town of Baird shall, within two months after published notice, hand in to the marshal a full and complete inventory of the property...

ART. 40.—That should any property be listed or assessed for taxation after the 1st day of June, 1889, or should the marshal fail to administer the required oath, or attest the same in the manner prescribed...

ART. 41.—That in all cases of failure to obtain a statement of real and personal property from any cause it shall be the duty of the marshal to ascertain the amount and value of such property and assess the same as he believes to be the true and full value thereof...

ART. 42.—If the marshal discovers any real or personal property within the corporate limits subject to taxation which has not been listed to him, he shall list and assess such property, and such assessment shall be as valid as if rendered by the owner thereof.

ART. 43.—That the marshal shall use such forms as may be furnished him by the board.

ART. 44.—That the board shall appoint three property holders, resident citizens of Baird, who shall constitute a Board of Equalization, who shall have power to supervise the assessment, to increase or diminish same as they may see fit, and their action in such cases shall be final and not subject to revision by said Board of Equalization or any other tribunal.

ART. 45.—That the marshal shall furnish the Board of Aldermen on the 10th day of June, 1889, or as soon as possible thereafter, a certified list of all those persons who either refuse to swear or to qualify, or to sign the oath of affirmation, those who refuse to render their taxable property as by ordinance required, and any person so failing or refusing to take the oath prescribed...

ART. 46.—That the marshal shall submit all the lists of property rendered to him prior to the 1st day of June to the Board of Equalization on the second Monday in June, or as soon thereafter as practicable, for their inspection, approval, correction or equalization, and after the Board shall have returned the same the marshal shall proceed to assess all unreturned property and shall then proceed to make out and prepare his rolls or books of all real and personal property listed to him in form and manner prescribed by the Board...

ART. 47.—That the marshal shall, on or before the 17th day of June, 1889, return his rolls or assessment books of the taxable property rendered to him or listed by him for this year to the Board of Equalization, verified by his affidavit, in this form: I do solemnly swear that the rolls (or books) contain a full and correct list of all property within the corporate limits of the town of Baird, subject to taxation so far as I have been able to ascertain the same; that the assessed values are true and correct valuations thereof and that this report is in all things true and correct, as I verily believe. [This oath to be signed and sworn to before some officer authorized to administer oaths.]

ART. 48.—Should the marshal fail to comply with any of the provisions of any of the foregoing articles he shall be punished as prescribed by ordinance. That this ordinance shall go in effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Approved Feb. 23, A. D., 1889. F. S. BELL, Mayor.

CHAPTER V. OF THE COLLECTION OF TAXES.

ART. 49.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Baird: That when the marshal shall have received his assessment rolls or books of the corporation he shall receipt the Board of Equalization therefor, and said rolls or books shall be full and sufficient authority for the marshal to receive and collect taxes in said corporation levied.

ART. 50.—That the marshal shall begin the collection of taxes on the 1st day of July, 1889, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and he shall post up notices, not less than three, in as many different places in the town of Baird, one of which shall be at the court house door at least twenty days before the tax-payers are required to meet him to pay their taxes, stating in such notice the place and time the same are required to be paid, and the marshal shall give to each tax-payer so paying his tax receipt therefor in the form prescribed by the Board.

ART. 51.—That the marshal, whenever he has as much as \$10 belonging to the town, shall turn same over to the treasurer and take his receipt therefor. That this ordinance shall go in effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Approved Feb. 23, A. D., 1889. F. S. BELL, Mayor.

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ART. 52.—When an injury is caused to injure or presume, and it rests with accident or innocent intention. The injury, pain, constraint, sense of shame or other disgrace, and any person charged with the violation of this ordinance to the same defense as under the laws of the State of Texas.

ART. 53.—That if any person shall violate the provisions of the town of Baird, he shall be deemed guilty of an assault and an assault, as the case may be, and on conviction shall be fined in any sum less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

ART. 54.—If any person shall in the presence or hearing of another, in the town of Baird, curse or abuse such person, or use any violently abusive language to such person concerning him or any of his female relatives, under circumstances reasonably calculated to provoke a breach of the peace, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5 nor more than \$50.

ART. 55.—If any person shall beat or otherwise cruelly mistreat any dumb animal in the town of Baird, or shall wilfully kill, maim, wound, poison or disfigure any animal or domesticated bird, he shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$25. Provided, That any one may kill any vicious dog running at large when said dog is attempting to bite anyone, or the marshal may poison any dog running at large contrary to the town ordinance.

That this ordinance shall go in effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Approved Feb. 23, A. D., 1889. F. S. BELL, Mayor.

CHAPTER VII. OFFENSES AGAINST PROPERTY, PUBLIC PEACE, MORALS, DECENCY AND REVERENCE OF THE TOWN.

ART. 56.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Baird: That if any person in the town of Baird shall follow or pursue or be engaged in following or pursuing any employment, occupation or avocation upon which a tax is imposed by any ordinance of the town, without first paying all taxes due, such person shall be liable, and upon conviction, shall be fined not less than \$10 for each day such violation of said ordinance may continue.

ART. 57.—That if two or more persons shall fight together in the town of Baird in any public place they shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Mayor's Court, shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$50.

ART. 58.—That if any person shall go into or near any public place or into or near any private house, or on or along any public street or alley, and shall use loud and boisterous or obscene, vulgar or indecent language, or swear or curse, or yell, or make any unusual noise, or expose his person or rudely display any pistol, dirk or dagger or other deadly weapon in or near such public place or private house, or on or along any public street or alley in a manner calculated to disturb the inhabitants thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Mayor's Court shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.

ART. 59.—That if any person shall discharge any gun, pistol, firearm or fireworks of any kind, on or across any public place, or near any private house in the town of Baird, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction in the Mayor's Court, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25.

ART. 60.—That if any person shall discharge any gun, pistol, firearm or fireworks of any kind, on or across any public place, or near any private house in the town of Baird, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction in the Mayor's Court, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25.

Art. 99.—It shall be unlawful for any person within the limits of the town of Baird to create or cause to be created, or permit to exist or remain upon his premises, or upon premises owned or controlled by him any nuisance of any kind whatever.

Art. 100.—It shall be unlawful for any person in the town of Baird to keep or permit to be kept in, on or about any premises owned or controlled by him, any privy, privy box, privy drawer or other vessel in such a manner as to be unwholesome or offensive to any person.

Art. 101.—It shall be unlawful for any person to permit to be kept on his premises, owned or controlled by him, any privy vault or sink so constructed that surface water may run thereon.

Art. 102.—It shall be unlawful for any person to remove any box or other thing containing the contents of any privy, or anything creating a nuisance to any point within the town limits or within four hundred yards from any point of the boundary lines of the town of Baird, and there to permit said contents, or thing creating a nuisance, to remain in such a manner as to be offensive to the inhabitants of said town. Such contents and nuisance shall be buried or burned by such person.

Art. 103.—All privy boxes, or other vessels used for like purposes anywhere in the town of Baird, shall be moved by and at the expense of the owners or controllers of the premises upon which the same are situated, once every month.

Art. 104.—The owner or controller of any premises in the town of Baird, on which a privy or privies are situated, shall thoroughly cover or cause to be covered with sand, lime or ashes, once each day, all deposits made in them.

Art. 105.—It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, place or deposit or cause or direct to be thrown, placed or deposited, or suffer or permit any person to throw, place or deposit in or on any street, alley, gutter, ditch, lot or other place, public or private, in the town of Baird, the carcass of any dead animal or fowl, or any meat, fish, hides, skins, bones, offal, dung, manure, fruit, vegetables, melon rinds, fruit peelings, slop or any unsound or offensive matter, or any matter or thing liable to become offensive or injurious to the health of the people of the town, or shall allow any such substance to remain in, on or about any premises owned or controlled by him, or to throw or place or permit or cause to be thrown or placed by any person upon any public place or upon premises not controlled or owned by such person, any tin cans or other cans, bottles and any trash.

Art. 106.—It shall be unlawful for any person in the town of Baird to permit any dead animal or fowl, which, at the time of the death of the same, was owned or controlled or kept by such person to be thrown in any streets, alley, lot or other place in the town. Such person shall cause said dead animal or fowl to be removed out of the town limits; provided, that dead fowls may be buried by such persons on their premises, but not less than one foot deep under the earth.

Art. 107.—It shall be unlawful for any person in the town of Baird to permit any dead animal or fowl, which, at the time of the death of the same, was owned or controlled or kept by such person to be thrown in any streets, alley, lot or other place in the town. Such person shall cause said dead animal or fowl to be removed out of the town limits; provided, that dead fowls may be buried by such persons on their premises, but not less than one foot deep under the earth.

Art. 108.—It shall be unlawful for any person in the town of Baird to carry on or permit any stagnant water to remain or accumulate in, on or upon any premises owned or controlled by him.

Art. 109.—It shall be unlawful for any person in the town of Baird to carry on, or permit to be carried on, or be interested in carrying on any trade or occupation which is dangerous or injurious to the health of the people in that vicinity.

Art. 110.—It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit, or permit to be thrown or deposited on his premises, or in any lot, yard, street, alley, square, or any other place in the town of Baird, any excrement from any sick person, but such person shall bury said excrement, not less than one foot in the earth, and on failure of such person to comply with the provisions of this ordinance he shall, on conviction, be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$10.

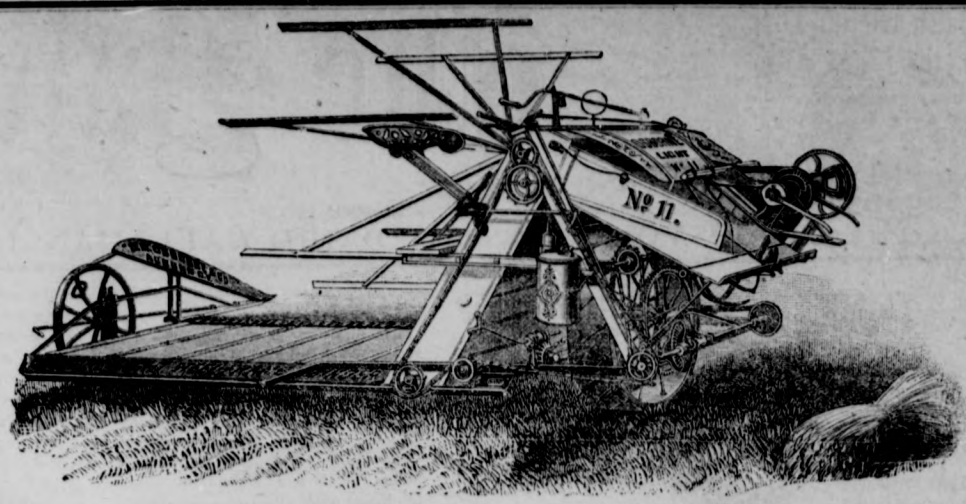
Art. 111.—When any animal belonging to any person shall have been killed by any engine, train of cars, or otherwise, within the corporate limits of the town of Baird, it shall be unlawful for the railroad or person so killing said animal to permit the carcass of said dead animal to remain within said limits of said corporation.

Art. 112.—Any person who in any way shall violate any of these provisions of the several articles under this chapter, either by act or omission, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$100, and each day any of the nuisances shall continue, shall constitute a separate offense, and in all cases of conviction, the same shall be held an order and a notice to abate the same.

Art. 113.—Whenever any nuisance has been declared to exist and the mayor has ordered the same abated, corrected or removed, and the author of said nuisance shall fail or refuse to obey such order, the marshal shall proceed to carry out such order, calling in such assistance as he may need, and all expenses and costs accruing therefrom shall be taxed against the said author of such nuisance and collected as other costs.

That this ordinance shall go into effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER VIII.
PROSTITUTION AND HOUSES OF PROSTITUTION.
Art. 85.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Baird: If any person shall keep, run or operate any room or house in the town of Baird for the purpose of prostitution, he shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

TEAMS HARNESS TO WAGONS STANDING ON THE STREETS.
Art. 119.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Baird: That it shall be unlawful for any one to leave any horse, mule or team harnessed to any vehicle on the streets of the town of Baird, and anyone violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$1 nor more than \$5; provided, however, that the marshal shall first request said owner or controller of said animal or team to fasten or stay with the same, and on failure of said owner or controller of said animal or team to comply immediately with the aforesaid request, he shall then be guilty and punished as aforesaid.
That this ordinance shall go into effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER XV. DOG TAX.—FAILURE TO PAY, ETC.

Art. 120.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Baird: That there is hereby levied upon every dog within the corporate limits of the town of Baird an annual tax of \$1, and upon every bitch an annual tax of \$2, which tax shall be due on the 1st day of August, 1889, and collectible from the owners of said animals in like manner as occupation taxes are collected. It is hereby made the duty of any owner of said animals to pay over to the marshal on or before the 1st day of August the said tax, and to obtain from said marshal a tag; and any person failing to comply with the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$2 nor more than \$5.
Art. 121.—That upon payment of said tax the marshal shall furnish the tax-payer with a tag, on which are stamped the words "tax paid," and for the year for which said tax is paid, and while said tag is on the neck of said animal said animal may run at large in the town, except as hereinafter provided. Provided, that when any bitch is in heat the owner shall keep her in a suitable place, building or pen; and any person so failing to do so shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5 nor more than \$10; and it shall be the duty of the marshal to take up and kill any such bitch thus running at large.

Art. 122.—It is hereby made the duty of the marshal to capture and impound any dog or bitch running at large within the corporate limits of Baird without a collar and tag, as heretofore prescribed; and it is further made the duty of the marshal to kill all such dogs and bitches remaining in the pound or place of confinement for twenty-four hours after being captured and impounded or confined, being unclaimed and unredempted, as hereinafter prescribed. All moneys collected shall be paid to the town treasurer.

Art. 123.—The owners of all dogs or bitches captured and impounded or confined, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be permitted to resound, redeem and receive possession of said dogs or bitches upon payment to the marshal the sum of \$1.50 for each dog or bitch; provided, there shall be allowed a fee of \$1 to be taxed in the bill of costs, to be paid to the marshal or to any other person capturing, or contributing to the capture, of said dogs or bitches. This ordinance nevertheless shall not apply to dogs or bitches following countrymen into the town, nor to dogs that have become lost from their owners, when said owners live in the country.
That this ordinance go into effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER XVI. TOWN PRISON AND THE TREATMENT OF PRISONERS.

Art. 124.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Baird: That whenever any person is convicted in the mayor's court of any offense against the ordinances of the town of Baird, and is unable or refuses to pay the fine and costs adjudged against him, or to give such security therefor as will be accepted by the mayor, such person so convicted shall be compelled to work out such fine and costs upon the streets or alleys, or any public work in the town of Baird under the direction of the marshal, and for each day of labor on said street, alley, or public work, he shall be allowed a credit of two dollars on his said fine and costs.
Art. 125.—If the mayor is satisfied that the person convicted is physically unable to do manual labor, then said person so convicted shall be confined in any place so provided by the Board of Aldermen, and for each day so confined, he shall be allowed a credit of two dollars, and no prisoner shall be discharged until the marshal shall certify to the mayor that said person so convicted has worked his fine and costs out, or remained in prison for the required time to fully satisfy the fine and costs.

Art. 126.—If any person so convicted fails or refuses to work as herein provided, is unruly or guilty of refractory conduct, he shall be allowed a credit of fifty cents per day on his fine and costs, and shall be put on rations of bread and water.
Art. 127.—That the marshal shall be allowed the sum of forty-five cents per day for boarding said prisoners.
That this ordinance shall go into effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER XVII. ADOPTING A DIGEST OF ORDINANCES FOR THE TOWN OF BAIRD.

Art. 128.—Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Baird: That the foregoing digest of ordinances, and the same are hereby adopted as the digest of ordinances of and for the town of Baird, and that the same, after their approval by the mayor, be published in THE BAIRD STAR, a newspaper published in said town.
Art. 129.—That this digest of ordinances take effect and be in force from and after approval and publication, and further, that thereafter, for convenience, the same be put in pamphlet form, and that the mayor furnish a copy thereof to each officer of the town.
