

Look To The East

We were quite happy about the elections recently. Not that everything coincided with the markings on our ballots. We won some and lost some—a usual procedure when we're voting!

But what we were happy about was the interest that seemed to be manifested in our city government and our schools.

When around (or better than) 325 voters cast their ballots in a local election, either city or school, it is something to sit up and take notice of. Not that we are voting our full voting strength when this happens, but that it indicates a trend for the better.

People are becoming involved, as they should be.

None of us hit the nail on the head every time when it comes to the person receiving our vote becoming a winner in the election. But we can vote, then go along with the majority and accept the election.

Too often have we experienced our city or school officials being elected here in Munday by a light turnout of voters. Too often has the total vote in a city election been around 25. It kinda makes us ashamed to make the statement that this is a democracy and that those who govern the affairs of city or school office are elected by the people.

Too often in our 37 years of residence in Munday have we experienced events at the city hall when an irate citizen takes an official to task for "outrageous" charges for water or sewer service or for oppressive taxation, etc., then when a check is made that citizen had nothing at all to do with electing those who govern our city.

Quite often have we been inclined to express our belief, that if you don't care enough to express yourself by the privilege of marking a ballot, then keep your trap shut if affairs of government don't go to suit you.

We're just "popping off steam" here in the hope that more people will become aroused to their duty and privilege.

The turnout in the April 3 elections, we hope, is a turning point for we people of Munday. It might have been a little embarrassing that those holding the city election and those in charge of the voting for members of the hospital board ran out of ballots. Our guess is that those who ordered the ballots were going by past records instead of the legal aspects of voting. It does seem foolish to print one and one-half times as many ballots as there are qualified voters, then have 25 to 30 people come out and vote.

We will soon have an opportunity to visit the polls for the purpose of again casting our ballots.

The first democratic primary will be held on Saturday, May 1.

Then's when we will elect our precinct, county, district and state officials—or signify by our ballots who will be qualified to enter the second primary. Then we go into the general election in

Grass Judging Team Tops In District

The Munday FFA grass-judging team was in Throckmorton on Tuesday,

March 23, for the Tri-District Soil and Water Conservation Contest. Members of this tri-district are the Miller-Brazos, Wichita-Brazos, and Throckmorton Districts.

The Munday team placed first with a total score of 1174 points out of a possible 1200. Second place honors were taken by Throckmorton with a total of 1160 points, while Knox City was third with a total of 1036 points.

Individual honors went to the following top 5 contestants: 1st, Jackie Steadham of Throckmorton; 2nd, Carey Shawver of Munday, a tie for 3rd between Wayne Pennartz and Danny Brown, both of Munday; 4th, Tony Urbanczyk of Munday; and 5th, Charles Ray of Throckmorton.

On Tuesday, March 30, these same team members returned to Throckmorton for the Oil Belt District contest. Of a possible score of 1260 points, Munday's team scored 100%. The top three scores of each team are used and the following points were made by Munday: Danny Brown, 420; Carey Shawver, 420; Wayne Pennartz, 420; and Tony Shawver, 419.

Chief of Police Is Relieved of Duties

John L. McMaster, who served as chief of police for the City of Munday since February 1, 1976, was relieved of his duties as such at a called meeting of the City Council on Friday, April 9.

A representative of the city's governing body stated that the police chief was given an opportunity to resign, and upon refusing to do so, was dismissed. Following his dismissal, a "town meeting" was held by interested persons on Friday night at the Community Center in Munday to discuss the matter. No definite plan of action was arrived at.

The following official statement by the city officials was issued following the action and was approved at the regular meeting of the City Council on Tuesday night of this week:

"Mr. McMaster is a young man with a good education in law enforcement, but the City Council feels he is lacking in maturity of judgment to put his education to practical use. He was also unwilling to cooperate fully and to follow the guidelines of employment set out in writing by the Munday City Council and as agreed upon by him when he was hired as Chief of Police under the city's usual 6 months probationary period.

"For these reasons, his employment was terminated by unanimous action of the Council as of April 9th in

order to protect the best interests of the citizens of Munday whom we represent as their elected officials.

"It would not be in the best interests of Mr. McMaster or the citizens of Munday for us to make further comment."

New Scout Leaders Working

Richard Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Moore, has been selected as assistant scoutmaster for the Munday Boy Scout Troop, according to Curley Awalt, scoutmaster.

Richard has just completed his scout work, reaching the age at which he is no longer eligible for membership, and his knowledge and qualities of leadership will be of great value to the Boy Scout program.

Another important person in the program is Till Burnett, who is senior patrol leader. Till is just completing work on his Eagle Scout Badge, the highest to be offered in Boy Scouts of America. He received his God and Country award almost four years ago, and has been working on his Eagle Scout award for about seven years.

The judging will get underway at 9 a.m. and will wind up at 11 a.m. This will be the second year for the community to participate in the TCIP contest. Last year they placed second in district competition.

Program is to stimulate individual, family and community effort toward community improvement. The objectives are to make rural life more profitable and stable, as well as more desirable and satisfying.

Higher Potato Harvest Is Predicted For Area

Austin--A late frost and insufficient rain have resulted in decreased yield per acre of Texas spring potatoes, but a 24 percent increase in acreage will pull production over last year's

harvest, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Yield per acre is estimated at 125 hundred-weight (cwt), down from 150 cwt. in 1975.

At 6,800, compared with 5,500 last year. Potato

production is expected to reach 850,000 cwt., up from only 825,000 cwt. in 1975.

Planting in all commercial areas was complete by late February except in the Knox-Haskell area, where a few acres were planted in early March, Commissioner White said.

In the San Antonio-Winter Garden area, early potatoes were emerging by March 1.

Across the United States, harvested acreage is expected to increase 16 percent, to 97.6 thousand acres, with production estimated at 23,403,000 cwt. This is a 17 percent increase.

Bogus Money Explained To Lions Membes

J. Weldon Smith, who had charge of the Lions Club meeting and program last Tuesday, gave the members an insight into detecting bogus, or counterfeit money.

He showed picture slides of various denominations of money, giving the "real thing" and the bogus bills. He said a little town like Munday receives very few counterfeit bills, but the cities are plagued with them quite often.

Most of these are discovered by counters in the Federal Reserve Bank, he said, before they go out to the member banks. The bogus money is determined most likely by a flaw in the portrait on the bill.

A large percent of the bogus bills are turned out by the offset method of printing. Tremendous profits are available in them, if one is willing to take the risks, Smith said.

Losses in the passing of bogus money amounted to \$100,000 in 1958, \$3 million in 1968, and \$2 million in 1969, according to Smith.

GED Tests Set For April 24th

General Educational Development Test will be given in Rule High School April 24th at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for College entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15. is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 year old) and has been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen. For additional information call the superintendent of office at Rule.



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Farm Accidents Due To Unsafe Practices

Accidents on Texas farms and ranches claim more than 200 lives each year. Nationally, there are about 1,400 accidental deaths and 140,000 disabling injuries per year involving farm residents.

An agricultural safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service points out that recent studies show that many farm and ranch accidents are related to falls, use of tractors and other machinery, drownings, electrocutions, fire arms and motor vehicles used in work activities. About 30 per cent of all farm and ranch injuries result from falls.

Dr. Gary Nelson cites tractor turnovers as causing the highest fatality rate involving farm machinery. In almost two-thirds of these tractor related accidental deaths, the victim first fell from the tractor. This points out the importance of a protective rollover cab and seat belt.

"Although accident prevention begins with the design of safe equipment and facilities to fit man's needs and capabilities, safe operating procedures are also paramount," emphasizes the Texas A&M University System engineer.

Agricultural workers need to recognize "high risk situations" and conduct their work accordingly to avoid accidents, maintains Nelson. He lists a number of poor work procedures that often lead to accidents on the farm and ranch: failure to secure objects or machines from unexpected movement, operating at an unsafe

speed, removing or making safety devices inoperative, using defective tools or equipment, using good tools or equipment improperly, assuming an unsafe position

or posture, working with hazardous materials, using hands or feet instead of tools, creating dangerous combinations of objects or materials, and deviating

ranches," points out Nelson. "Accident prevention involves correcting these practices as well as recognizing hazardous conditions."

If LACIE is the answer, then what is the question? Well ... it might end up as the answer to "How can the government spend a lot of money?", or it could be the answer to "How can we accurately predict crop results without on-sight inspection?". Scientists are hoping it answers the second question since, if so, planning for U.S. farmers could be greatly simplified. LACIE is the fast way of saying Large Area Crop Inventory Experiment. Purpose of the experiment is to determine better ways of obtaining information on growing crops by satellite surveillance. Specifically, the tests involve a special kind of "photography" ... using instruments which measure the amounts and intensities of heat or light reflected from the land. Researchers say there is a good chance the new devices can become sophisticated enough to accurately report crop conditions not only in the United States, but from any place in the world.
