Look To The East

We don't have much incentive for voting, come Saturday, June 5.

But vote we should!

You see, we don't have much to vote for, speaking from the numerical standpoint.

But the six persons trying to determine who is the winner and who's the loser since the elimination contest of the first Democratic Primary think Saturday's election is just as (or more) important than the one in May.

Here in Knox County, those who live in Commissioners Precinct One have an important choice to make—one that should bring a large number of qualified voters to the polls. They have to determine who will serve as commissioner of this precinct for another term.

Johnston look upon Saturday as a most important date.

Those of us who can't vote for these boys just don't have anything of local interest to draw us to the polls.

Statewide, we have two offices to fill. These are the Texas Railroad Commission and a judgeship on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. We reckon these two offices are important, but these are not "drawing cards" for voters, like when we can vote for a whole batch of local candidates, as well.

In areas where we have numbers of Republicans as well as Democrats, there is some harping on the matter of having voted in the Democratic election in May; then, deciding to go Republican on June 5. That's a no-no, you know!

You just can't switch your party allegiance that way, and that quick. It's either Democratic or Republican all the way in the primaries.

For a registered Republican—one who voted in the GOP primary May 1—to vote in the Saturday Democratic runoff would be a misdemeanor offense and punishable by fine. Likewise the other way round—switching from Democratic to Republican. The "hole card" is that there won't be a Republican runoff next Saturday, since all the Republican candidates were named in the May primary without a runoff.

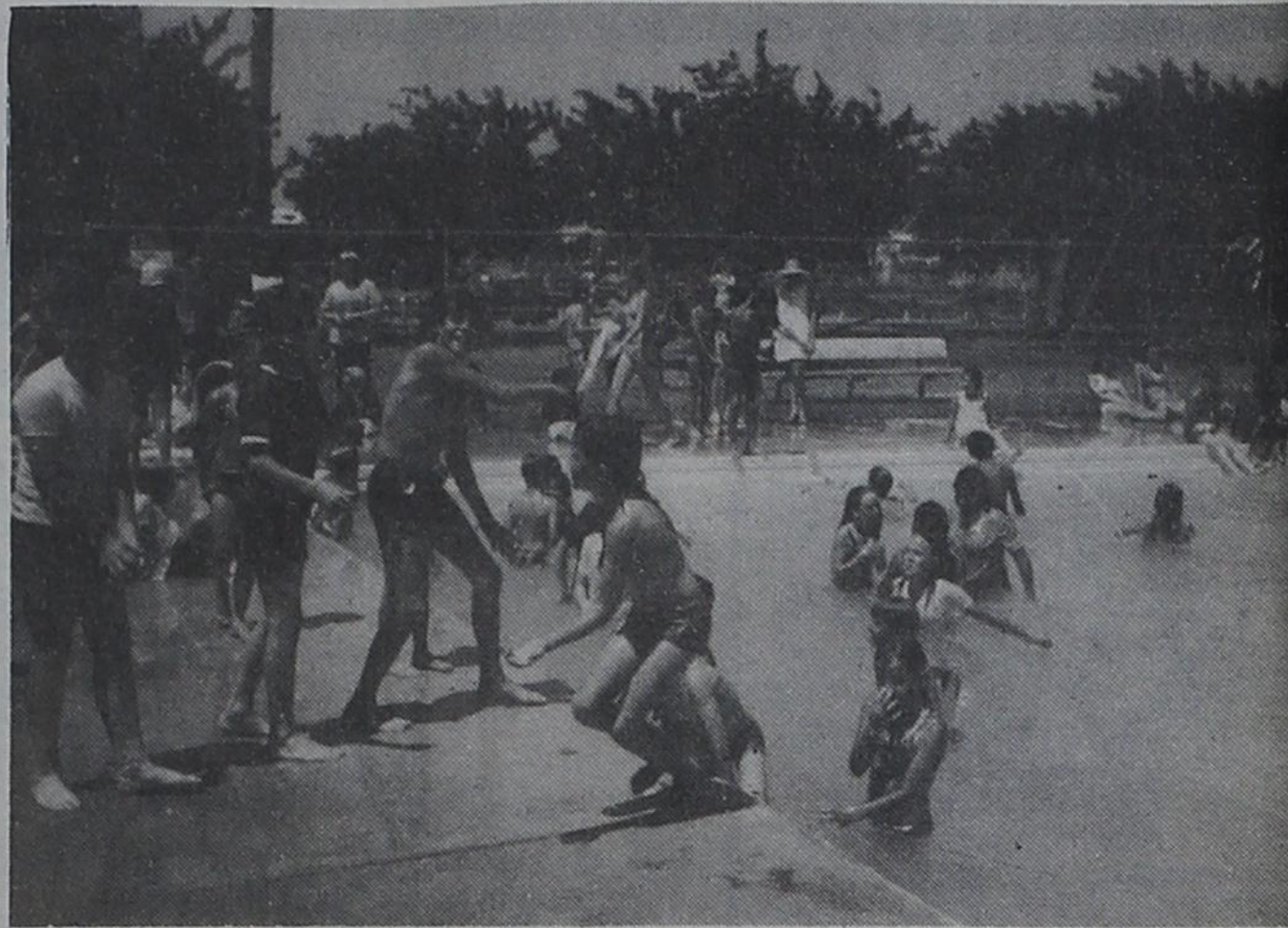
But that wouldn't have worried we folks in Knox County none! We didn't even have a Republican primary in May, since there were no local candidates on the Republican ticket.

Guess, then, we're going to have to depend on our loyalty as a citizen, the fact that we should exercise our "God given" right, and deem it a privilege instead of a task to get out the vote for two of these four people seeking state office.

A big pile of sand looks more impressive than a cupful, so let's build up the sand pile for the boys who were not fortunate enough to win out in the first primary. Don't let anyone on either side have occasion to say that we in Knox County just didn't give a hoot.

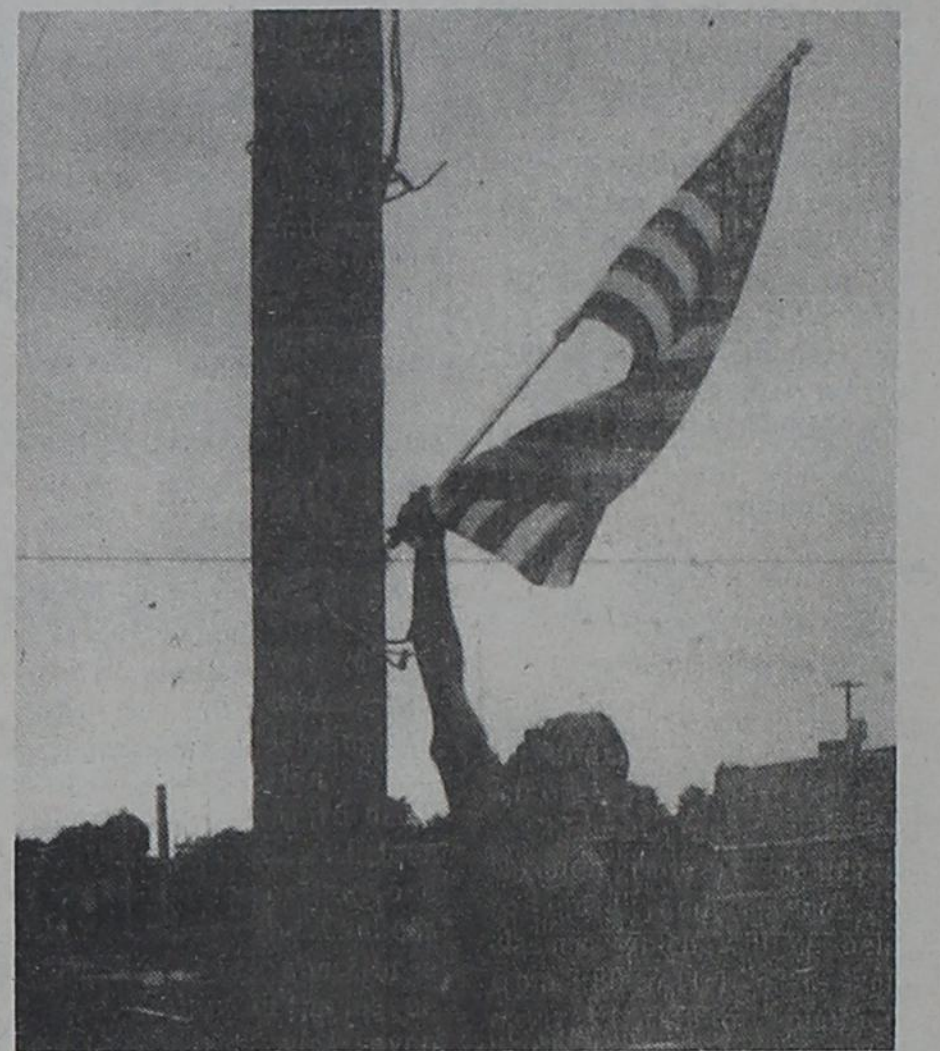
"bleachers" or in the shade of the building.

Munday Observes Flag Day Monday

Memorial Day was a day for flag waving in Munday! More flags were unfurled to the breeze here last Monday than at any time within the memory of many people. The problem in the past has been that many merchants are just not conscious of the fact that we should display our flags on certain days.

A project that was started several months ago by the

Munday Lions Club took on aspects of completion last Monday, when some 25 new flags were placed along the business section of town. A number of local merchants joined in the effort, with some 30 or more flags being flown during the day.

It is the plan of the local Lions Club to see that these flags are displayed "at all proper occasions" during the year.

Harvesting Of Potatoes Begins

Harvesting of the 1976 potato crop for the Munday area was started last Monday morning, when operations were begun by the Munday Vegetable Growers Coop. The co-ops have 550 acres in potatoes this year.

The machinery first entered the field of Joe Lynn Phillips, southwest of Munday, but found the soil too wet for harvesting. "It's the

only place in the area that got a rain Monday night," those in charge said.

They then pulled into the field of Keith Offutt, northeast of town, and continued operations. The first harvest is of chipping potatoes that are being sold to Ballentine Produce of Alma, Ark. Transport trucks were on hand to be loaded out Monday.

Jack Colville of Colville and Wilson arrived on the scene last Sunday to help supervise operations here.

He said Monday afternoon he hoped to begin harvesting the 315 acres here on Wednesday, on a limited basis, since his complete crew of workers will not arrive for several days longer.

Conville said he plans to start "on one of the Austin Tomlinson fields", then proceed to J. W. Michels. The firm specializes in growing table stock potatoes.

James Smith of B. E. Smith and Son, independent operators, said they plan to begin harvesting next Monday. They have 200 acres planted in potatoes this year.

Busy days are in the offing

for all spud farmers of the area until the entire crop is finally harvested and processed.

To Be Opened Local Theatre

Announcement was made Monday that B. L. Huckabee of Fort Worth, owner of the local theatre, has agreed to open the theatre by arrangements with the Knox County C-B Association to furnish entertainment for people of this area.

This is a volunteer effort on the part of the association, with Mr. Huckabee agreeing to furnish recommended features for local showing. The association will operate the concession stand while the theatre is open.

Friday night's show will feature an Evel Knievel production, "Funny Car Summer" will be shown Saturday and Sunday.

This is a new venture for the association, and members hope to furnish good entertainment for the family during the coming weeks.

Munday Is Host For Knox 4-H Horse Show

The Knox County 4-H Horse Show will be held in Munday, at the Lake Creek Arena, on Friday and Saturday of this week. Registration will be at 7 p. m., with the events beginning at 7:30.

Entry fee is \$4 per youth, who may enter one horse only in one or all classes.

Awards will be made for champion and reserve mare and gelding, and for first place in each class. High point individual and runner-up will also receive awards.

Tom Gibbs of Wichita Falls will judge the events. Showing will be registered

ed mares and geldings, five years of age and over, grade mares and geldings, each showing to grand champion; showmanship, western pleasure, western horsemanship and reining, all slated for Friday night.

Barrel racing and pole bending are events to be held on Saturday night.

The horse show is being rotated to the three arenas in the county this year. In this manner, it is hoped that more youth will be participating.

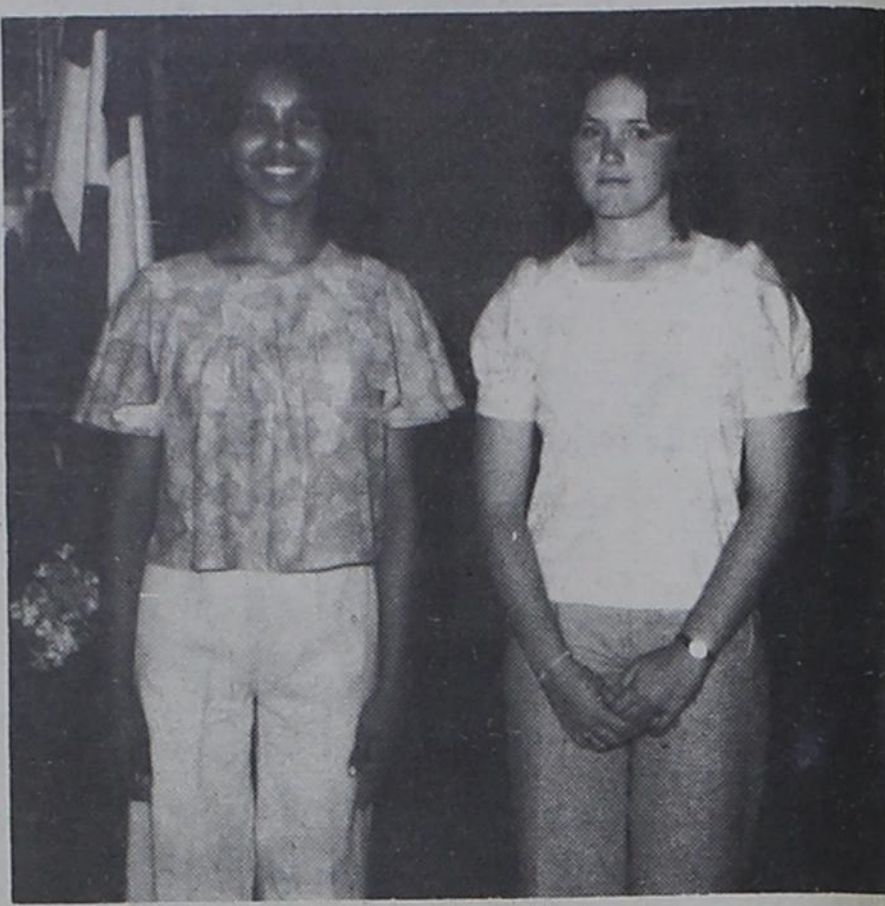
