

INVALUABLE PROTECTION

A spokesman for the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has something of unusual interest to say about the drive to repeal section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act—the section which permits states to adopt Right-to-work laws. Last year, he recalled, Congress passed a law outlawing job discrimination on the basis of color, race, religion, or sex. But now, he went on, the present Congress is debating "whether to legalize discrimination in employment because of membership or the lack of membership in a private organization -a labor union." It will be interesting to see how Congress can double-talk this issue.

It is difficult to see how anyone could reconcile repeal of 11(b) with Congress' previous legislative action. To discriminate against man because he does or does not want to join a union is certainly as bad as to discriminate against him because of the color of his skin or the church he attends. No man is free when the right to earn a living is conditioned upon forced membership in any organization.

A good union has nothing to fear from 14(b) It will gain and hold its membership on the basis of services rendered. But when membership is compulsory, there is no need to provide good and effective service—the rank and file are helpless.
