State Men Agree To 5 Requests

Twenty Callahan county men carried five requests before the State Highway Commission at Austin Monday morning regarding the routing of Highway 80 through the county and a favorable answer was given by the commission in each case. Not only did the Highway Commission give favorable answers, but were courteous and cooperative to the Callahan group.

The key questions to insure passage of a shoestring district bond issue to be voted in November for purchasing right of way for the new super-highway through this county were:

1. That the state assume the bonds on the present highway 80. The answer was "yes, and especially will this be fixed if the good roads amendment is carried in the forthcoming election."

2. That the state continue maintenance of the present highway to the schools. 80 from Baird to Abilene after the new highway is built. (The highway east will hold close to the present right of way and this will not be necessary east of Baird.) The answer was "Yes, if the county will cooperate by furnishing right of way for the new, highway."

3. That a paved loop will be built through Clyde instead of a "leg" as was first proposed. The answer was "Yes, this will be done."

4. That the highway department move the watermains. etc., east of Baird city limits which lie under the right of way of the new highway. Answer from Highway Engineer Greer: "I think we can either miss the lines or take care of moving them."

5. That a farm-to-market road be built from Denton to Clyde. The answer was: "We cannot answer this question now because that will depend on your commissioners court at the time the factured products at less cost. farm-to-market project comes up. 




