Baird Public Schools to Join Statewide Observance of Week

Schools in Baird will join systems all over the state in observing Texas Public Schools Week next week. The week will end with a day off for students (next Friday) while faculty members attend the Oil Belt teachers meeting in Sweetwater.

Highlight of the week will come Monday night with open house in Baird Elementary School, from 7 to 9 p.m. Band music in the cafeterium at 7 p.m. will kick off the observance.

This year's observance will vary from past programs. In other years, specific times and days have been set for persons to visit various classes.

But this year elementary principal W. S. Talley has issued an invitation for interested persons to visit the classrooms any time during the week.

The invitation also holds for visitors to have lunch in the school cafeteria during Public School Week. Anyone wishing to have lunch should have their children give that information to the teacher during the regular morning lunch count, or should telephone the school at least an hour before lunchtime.

Refreshments will be served Monday night during open house activities in the school cafeteria by members of the Baird MFT. Assisting will be members of the Junior Beta Club and the student council.

Entertainment for the open house has been divided into three segments.

At 7 p.m., in the cafeterium, music will be provided by members of the school vocational agriculture classes. Dick Vestal is instructor. At 7:45 p.m., grade students will present a one-act play in the high school auditorium.

Winding up entertainment, at 8:45 p.m., will be an appearance by the Baird High School stage band, directed by Max Harper. The band will play in the cafeterium.

Freedoms Foundation Award Goes To Roberta Ross and Atrelle Dill

A coveted award for outstanding work in preserving the American heritage has been won by two Baird women.

They are Mrs. Hubert Ross, third grade teacher in Baird Elementary School and Mrs. Atrelle Dill, Baird artist.

The award is the George Washington Honor Medal, presented by Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. The organization annually gives awards to individuals, groups and organizations all over the nation for top work in Americanism.

Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Dill own Visual Aids for Young Americans and design vis-

ual teaching aids. They prepare booklets and packets of teaching aids, mostly on an Americanism theme, for use in elementary schools.

Mrs. Ross designs the teaching materials and Mrs. Dill illustrates them. They are distributed by Star Engraving Co. of Houston and have circulated throughout the Southwestern states.

Mrs. Ross is the wife of H. L. Ross, roundhouse foreman for the Texas & Pacific Railway in El Paso. Mrs. Dill is the wife of A. W. Dill, fireman for Abilene & Southern Railway in Abilene.

It was the first such award for Baird women.

Baird Tackles Copperas Cove Girls In Bi-District Tussle

Baird High School girls basketball team will lay its bi-district fate on the line in Brownwood for the second straight year next Tuesday.

The team will clash with Copperas Cove at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Brownwood High School gymnasium, scene of a victorious effort for the Callahan County girls last season.

Copperas Cove defeated Goldthwaite in a playoff game last Friday night at Lampasas after the two tied for district championship honors. Baird easily won its district title without a loss.

Winner of the Baird-Copperas Cove game will advance to the regional tournament this weekend at Denton.

The Baird team will carry one of the state's best season records into bi-district action. Going in to a tussle with Rock Springs scheduled for this Thursday night, Baird had a 33-1 record. The only loss was at the hands of Trent in the finals of the

Hardin - Simmons University tournament earlier this month.

Starting sextet for the bi-district encounter will be the same girls chiefly responsible for the team's fine record — Paula Corn, Karen Bearden and Elaine Hass at forwards and Betty Corn, Sue Howard and Sharon Jeter at guards.

Their chief relief will come from Dana Corn, Vicki Jones, Sally Green and Yvonne Shelnut. Other members of the travelling squad will be Kathy Townsend, Nadine Shelnut, Peggy Gordon and Joyce Howard.

Through 34 games, the Baird girls have scored 2,381 points, an average of 70.1 per outing.

Leading the point parade is Miss Corn, scoring an average of 35.3 points per game or 1,218 for the year. Miss Bearden has averaged 18.5 points, 617 for the year and Miss Hass has scored 292, 8.3 points per tilt.

The team's defensive unit — which has played most of the

season under the shadow of the high-scoring offensive threesome — has compiled an equally gaudy record.

Defensively, the Baird team has given up only 1,601 points for the year, an average of 47.1 per opponent. This means the team's victories this season have been by an average of 23 points.

Coach L. B. Howard said the girls will leave by school bus for Brownwood about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.

The Callahan County bombers made it two in a row against Wylie of Abilene last Thursday night, carving out a 73-66 decision in their home gym to go with a 43-40 squeaker earlier that week.

The game turned out to be a scoring duel between Baird's Paula Corn and Wylie's Kathleen Long. Miss Corn took the honors, however, by ripping the nets for 45 points. Miss Long wound up the night with 32 markers.

Karen Bearden meshed 17 for

Baird and Elaine Hass added 11. Held partially in check in their first match by Wylie's stall tactics, the Baird girls lost no time in racing out front in the return bout. After a quarter, the home team held a 23-14 margin, although Wylie narrowed it to 41-35 by halftime.

It was in the third quarter the Baird girls iced away the game, scoring 20 points to eight for the visitors for a 61-43 count when the final period opened.

Wylie's B team evened the score in a preliminary game Thursday with a 26-22 win over the Baird B girls.

Shirley Simmons had 11 points, Peggy Gordon eight and Joyce Howard three for Baird. Betty Hamilton led Wylie with 10.

Baird was in front after a quarter, 11-10, but Wylie made it 16-15 by halftime. Baird managed only one free throw, by Miss Howard, in the third quarter however to trail 19-16 as the final period started.

Basketball Game Will Benefit Baird's MFT

Regional qualifiers from Baird will participate in the state track and field meet in Austin in May.

At present 24 boys are working out for the Bear track team. It is the largest group for the track team during his tenure here, Coach Townsend said.

Bad weather has hampered the team in its early workouts. Although practice began Feb. 12 — the day after the basketball season ended — the team has been able to use its track only two days so far because of rain or snow.

Newton Leaves Sheriff's Race

Tod Newton, one of five candidates for the office of Callahan County sheriff to succeed the retiring Homer Price, announced Tuesday he is withdrawing from the race "due to circumstances beyond my control."

Newton's action followed advice from his doctor that he withdraw from the campaign because of health reasons.

His withdrawal leaves four hopefuls in the race. They are N. L. Long Jr., James E. Day, W. C. (Smoky) Edwards and A. H. Turner.

Newton is the second candidate who announced for the office to retire. Sheriff Price announced for reelection early in the campaign, then later decided to retire at the end of his current term.

Newton, chief deputy for Callahan County, has held that position four years. He is a former member of the Abilene Police Dept., is a veteran of navy service during the Korean War, and is a graduate of Cross Plains High School.

He was a rancher before entering the navy in 1951.


