When completed, their coloring book will feature pictures from the six main eras of Texas the birth of their daughter, the history, as symbolized by the six flags so well known to Texans.


From an early look at the pictures, we predict the book will be well accepted by the thousands who visit Six Flags Over Texas this year.


Their only loss this season was at the hands of Trent - a team they have beaten several times during the year - in the finals of the Hardin-Simmons University invitation tournament.
