### City Purchases Land For New Water Tank

A 200x250-foot site for a new water storage tank has been purchased by the City of Baird from Earl Burks of Abilene.

The city also received easement for a road to the tank site, and easements for a water pipeline and utility pole for servicing the tank.

Bids on construction of the new storage tank will be opened by the city Feb. 18, at 2 p. m. Financing for the tank and the land is by municipal improvement bonds recently approved by Baird voters.

The tank site is some 230 feet north of Old Highway 80, about halfway up the side of Mt. Airy.

Mrs. Jennie Weeks passed away Saturday in Golden Age Nursing Home in Baird. Our deepest sympathy to the family.

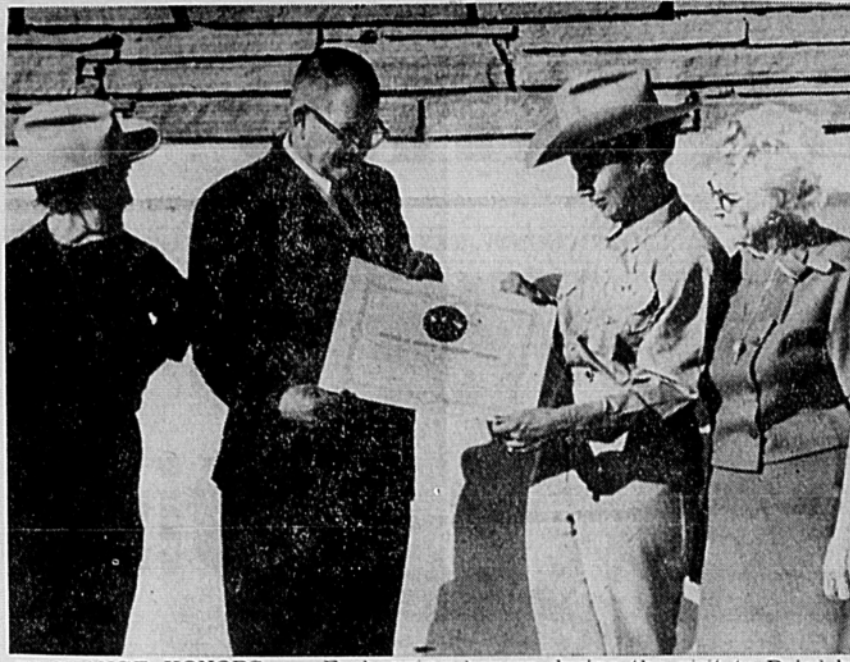

# Re-Entry Project Is Completed As Moran Sand in Callahan Co.

A Callahan County re-entry project has been completed as a Moran Sand discovery five miles northwest of Clyde.

It is Rhodes Drilling Co., Abilene, No. 1-P A. E. Dyer. Location is 1,718 feet from the north and 1,548 feet from the west lines of Section 55, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 56 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and

perforations at 3,494-96 feet. The well had a gas-oil ratio of 900-1.

It was originally drilled in 1952 as Sam G. Dunn No. 1 A. E. Dyer.

The well will be prorated in the regular field.

A Mississippian producer was completed 3½ miles southwest of Baird and prorated in the regular field.

The new owner is John B. Hawkins Jr., Trust No. 1, of Corpus Christi No. 1 Eula Davis. It spots 467 feet from the north and 707 feet from the east lines of Lot 18, Victoria CSL Survey 336 No. 1 Davis had a daily potential of 37.06 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Flow was through a 10-64-inch choke with 190 pounds tubing pressure. It is producing from 16 perforations at 4,566-70 feet. The pay was topped at 4,556 feet.

The 4½-inch casing is set at 4,634 feet and the hole bottomed at 4,636 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,154-1.

Location is one-fourth mile northeast of H. L. Chamberlain, et al, No. 1 A. J. Sharp, wildcat re-entry completed as a Mississippian discovery and prorated in the regular field.

A proposed 2,000-foot rotary Cook Sand wildcat was taken three miles southwest of Clyde. It is C. P. Burton, Dallas, No. 1, H. W. Tarrant.

Drill site is 2,310 feet from the south and 1,376 feet from the west lines of Section 49, BBB&C Survey. It is on a 160 acre lease.

Another wildcat was staked two miles east of Eula as L. E. Edwards, Abilene, No. 1 E. A. Connell.

Te planned 1,900-foot rotary test is on a 185.7 lease.

Drill site is 2,392 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 12, BBB&C Survey.

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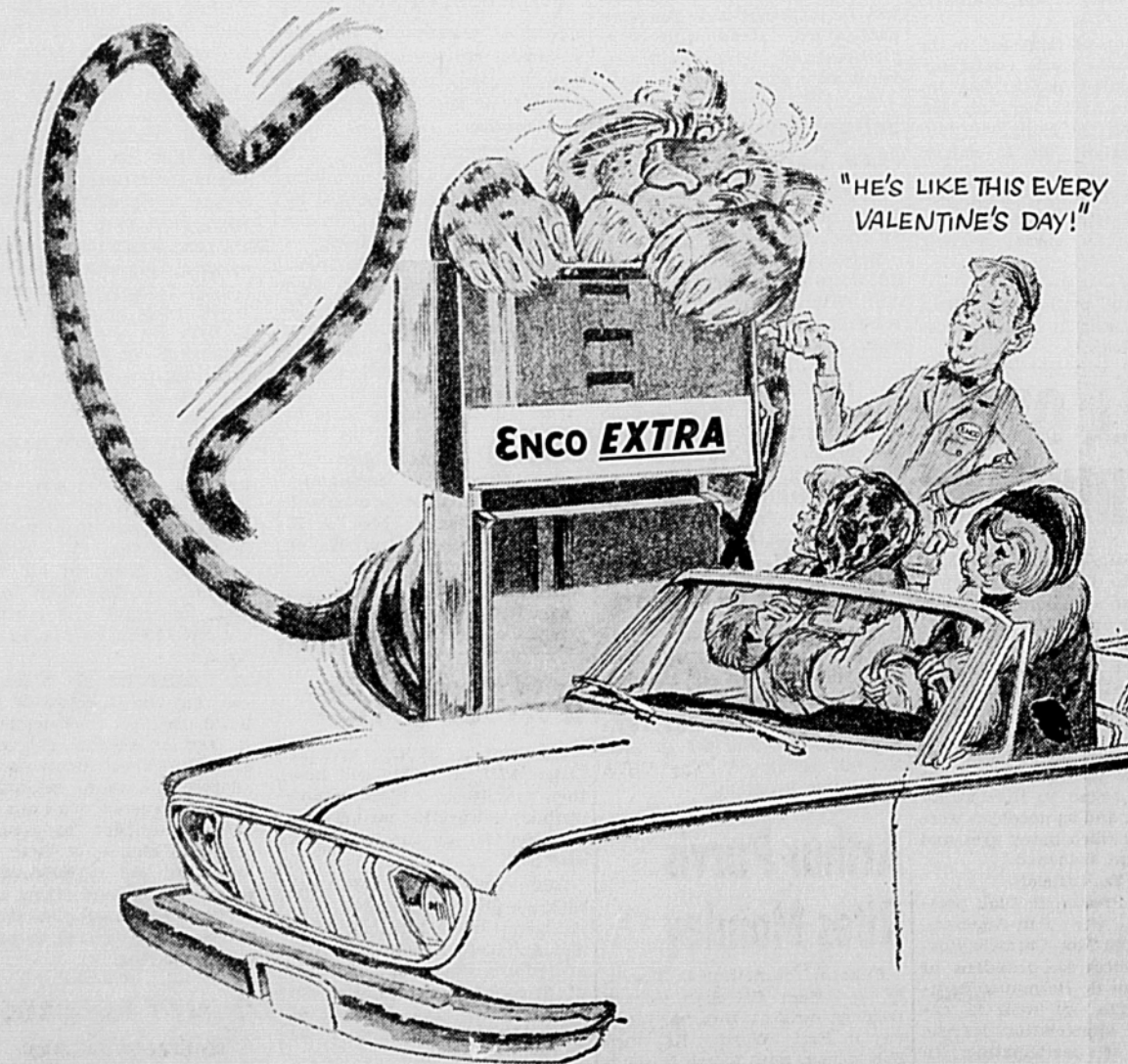

**Public Notices**

An Ordinance Defining Garbage and Refuse; Requiring Garbage To Be Placed In Metal Containers; The Disposal Of Garbage And Rubbish; Fixing A Charge For The Collecting And Disposal Of Garbage And Rubbish; Providing A Penalty For Violations Of The Provisions Of Such Ordinance; Providing A Saving Clause.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OR CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS.

**SECTION I. Definitions.**

Item 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "garbage or-

dinance" of the City of Baird, Texas.

Item 2. The term "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist camps, apartments, sanitariums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots and other places within the city limits of the City of Baird, Texas, where refuse, either garbage or rubbish, accumulates.

Item 3. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all solid wastes, including garbage and rubbish.

Item 4. The term "garbage" as used in this ordinance shall mean all putrescible wastes, except sewage and body wastes, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

Item 5. The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), papers, etc., from any premises within the city limits.

Item 6. "City Health Officer" as used herein shall mean the City Health Officer of the City of Baird, Texas, or his authorized agent.

**SECTION II. Accumulation of Garbage and Rubbish**

Item 1. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corpora-

tion owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where garbage or rubbish accumulates, to provide, and at all times to maintain in good order and repair on any said premises, a portable container or containers for refuse, which shall be made of galvanized metal not easily corrodible, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accommodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may accumulate between collections; provided, that each container shall have a capacity of not less than twenty gallons nor more than thirty-two gallons. Provided further all containers shall be kept clean and free from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosquitoes or any other insects.

Item 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place the daily accumulation of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers required in Section 2, Item 1, and it shall be the duty of every person placing garbage in any such container to eliminate as far as possible all water and liquid from such garbage and so securely wrap garbage in paper before placing same in such container.

Item 3. All ordinary accumulations of rubbish such as tree limbs, paper boxes, and scrap lumber which cannot be conveniently placed in the containers required under this ordinance shall be gathered together, tied or sacked in compact bundles and placed in a location easily accessible for the collector.

**SECTION III. Collection of Garbage and Rubbish.**

Item 1. The City of Baird, Texas, shall collect from the residential areas of the city not less than twice weekly and from the business area of the city each business day, all garbage and rubbish; provided it shall be the duty of any person in possession or control of any premises to place the containers required in Item 1, Section 2, in a location easily accessible for the collector as directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 2. The places of excessive accumulations of garbage and rubbish, such as killing and dressing plants for fowl, may be excluded from the service provided by the City Garbage Department and such accumulations shall then be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge, provided, that the owner or person having such accumulations in charge shall secure from the City Health Department a written permit for removal and disposal of same. Said permit shall be issued only after said Health Officer has satisfied himself that the licensee is capable of complying with the requirements of this ordinance. The permit may be revoked by the City Health Officer when deemed necessary to the public welfare.

Item 3. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses, and mules, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner

or person having same in charge and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 4. Heavy accumulations such as brush, broken concrete, ashes, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials shall be disposed of at the expense of the owner or person controlling same under the direction of the City Health Officer.

Item 5. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts, and other animal or fowl pens, and waste oils from garages or filling stations shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the person controlling same in the manner and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 6. The placing of garbage or rubbish or any refuse material in any street or alley within the city limits or the disposal of such refuse at any place within the city limits, except at the City Disposal Ground, or at such other place as may be directed by the City Health Officer, is prohibited.

Item 7. The meddling of refuse containers or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

Item 8. The collection of garbage or rubbish or any kind of junk within the city limits is prohibited except as provided for in Section 3, Items 2, 3, 4 and 5 of this ordinance.

**SECTION IV. City Dump Ground To Be Locked.**

The City of Baird maintains a Dump Ground for the purpose of disposing of the rubbish and garbage from said City and for the citizens of Baird who have additional trash they desire to haul themselves.

BEGINNING MARCH 1, 1965, the City Dump Ground gate will be locked and for citizens who have additional trash they desire to haul, it will be necessary to come to the City Hall, between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 4:00 P. M. Monday through Friday, to obtain a key.

Item 1. No heavy dead animals such as horses, cows, mules, hogs, etc., shall be placed in the City Dump Ground without a written permit by the General Superintendent of the City of Baird, who will issue detailed instructions.

Item 2. Removing junk of any kind from the City Dump Ground without a written permit from the General Superintendent is hereby prohibited.

Item 3. The Dump Ground will be maintained in keeping with the recommendation of the City Health Officer, or his authorized agent.

Item 4. Trash and rubbish shall be dumped in the proper area as per signs indicating dumping areas.

**SECTION V.**

It shall be the duty of the City Health Officer of the City of Baird, Texas, or his authorized agent, and he is hereby directed, to make all necessary inspections and investigations of any and all premises to see that the terms of this ordinance are complied with.

**SECTION VI.**

The disposal of garbage and rubbish shall be by an approved method of incineration (not open burning) or by landfill and cover.

**SECTION VII.**

There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential premises within the city limits the monthly amount of \$1.00 and from each business premises within said city limits the monthly amount of \$2.50 to \$3.00. The city secretary shall collect these garbage and rubbish fees either through the water department as a separate item on each water bill or by any other practicable means of collection.

**SECTION VIII.**

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00 and each day that any such person shall violate any of the provisions of this ordi-

nance shall constitute a separate offense and be punishable as such.

**SECTION IX.**

This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances or regulations of the City of Baird, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in

which case the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

**SECTION X.**

That if any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

**Hearing Scheduled for March 15 On Permit for New Lake at Clyde**

A public hearing on a request for a water permit by the City of Clyde has been set for 10 a. m. March 15 before the Texas Water Commission in Austin.

After the hearing, the commission will decide whether or not to grant the permit, which was requested by the City of Clyde in connection with a proposed lake to provide a new municipal water supply.

**Municipal Use**  
Proposed as a 5,748 acre-foot reservoir, with Clyde requesting a permit to appropriate 5,000 acre-feet annually for municipal and recreational purposes.

If the permit is granted, a dam will be constructed some six miles south of Clyde on the Upper Pecan Bayou.

Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture is cooperating with Clyde on the project, which means the dam would also be used as a flood retarding structure.

The public hearing was called after the water commission ruled Clyde's application for a permit to build a dam and water use from the resulting reservoir was properly done. The application was studied by both legal and engineering experts of the Texas Water Commission.

**Make Plans**  
Engineers from the Soil Conservation Service have already done extensive study and planning toward the proposed lake.

If the permit is approved by the Texas Water Commission, next big step will be land acquisition.

The dam and lake, if constructed, will be partially financed with \$400,000 in bonds on the City of Clyde. Voters here approved issuance of \$325,000 in revenue bonds and \$75,000 in tax bonds last March by an overwhelming majority.

Since the proposed structure would be used for flood retardation as well as for Clyde's municipal and recreational needs, a portion of construction costs can also be met by the Soil Conservation Service.

**Overall Program**  
The flood retardation portion of the planning is part of an overall SCS program on Pecan Bayou and its tributaries in this area. In all, the program calls for building of

33 flood detention structures to go with the 13 on Turkey Creek, in Brown and Callahan counties.

The Turkey Creek project is nearing completion.

Overall, the flood retardation program is to cost an estimated \$4,930,000 and will provide some 71,785 acre-feet of water storage.

## Bonds Good Way To Take Refund

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally's alternate teacher pay proposal has drawn fire from the Texas State Teachers Association. And Connally has reciprocated.

Connally wants less of an immediate pay raise than the \$45 a month the teachers ask. He wants to set up a 10-year program for steady and regular increases which in time would amount to greater rewards for more experienced teachers.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Rep. George Hinson of Mincoia, who is sponsor of the TSTA-backed "\$45 in '65" program, both called for a cooling-off period. Compromise seemed unlikely due to strong feelings on both sides.

Sen. Jack Strong of Longview and Rep. W. S. Healy of Peducach, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, introduced the Governor's 10-year pay plan -- with substantial support. Among sponsors of the two bills are 17 House members who endorsed both measures.

Teachers complain the Connally program offers too little, too late. They charge it would put 70 per cent of raises on local school districts.

Connally produced figures showing cost of the 10-year program at \$40,200,000 for the next biennium. He said the state would pick up \$32,100,000 of the tab and local districts \$3,000,000. His financing plan suggests that local school boards start paying a share of the cost of textbooks and teacher retirement, now paid wholly by the state.

Connally believes his program would maintain the 80-20 cost

ratio between state and local districts.

Meanwhile, teachers launched a campaign for their \$85,000,000 salary adjustment program (geared to an additional \$68,000,000 state out-lay for the biennium).

Pressure is intense on legislators, both from the Governor's office and from the teachers back home. Mail is piling high on lawmakers' desks.

Speaker Barnes said it will be three months before the Legislature can even consider a teacher's pay raise, since it has to pass the complicated appropriations bill first.

An all-out war now would injure all educational efforts under consideration, Barnes emphasized.

**REDISTRICTING RESOLUTION PASSED** — Both houses of the Legislature overwhelmingly adopted a resolution calling for a federal constitutional convention to permit one legislative chamber to be apportioned on factors other than population.

Thirty-four states must adopt the identical proposal before Congress has to consider calling a convention on a specific amendment. Three-fourths of the states must ratify any amendment thus submitted.

At least half a dozen proposals for congressional redistricting have been filed so far, plus bills for Senate redistricting and House redistricting.

Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham told his House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts he will canvass all representatives for their views on reapportioning the state.

House members are trying to

work out a cooperative redistricting plan, taking into consideration those who do not plan to run next time and those who plan to run for other offices.

Other two -- congressional and senate -- redistricting jobs will not be settled so amiably. As one legislator put it, "It's going to be a mean session."

**BILLS TO GOVERNOR** — The Legislature acted fast on two emergency budget requests by Governor Connally.

One called for \$702,785 in emergency appropriations to run some dollar-short agencies and programs. Included were \$250,000 for carrying on the state's share of the screwworm eradication program for three months after April 1 and \$290,000 for speeding up the Texas Water Commission's planning program.

Other bill set up procedures and a library plan by which cities take advantage of a \$2,500,000 library building appropriation voted by Congress for Texas.

Both requests were granted in a matter of days.

**TAX BILL PUSHED** — Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, Chairman of the House Revenue and Tax Committee, is pushing a bill to raise \$15,300,000 under present tax laws.

Bill would repeal sales tax exemptions on farm machinery and telephone and telegraph service; revise inheritance tax laws; repeal chain store tax (\$7,200,000 loss) and theatre admissions tax (\$1,200,000 loss); and grant a tax exemption for natural gas used in exploration and production in the same field where it is produced.

Serious consideration of tax bills must await passage of the general appropriations bill, Atwell said.

**SALE OF STATE LEASES** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports \$39,000,000 in high bids on 475 tracts were received by the State School Land Board. It was the biggest oil and gas lease sale in Texas history.

Highest single bid was Dow Chemical's \$1,077,000 for a sub-

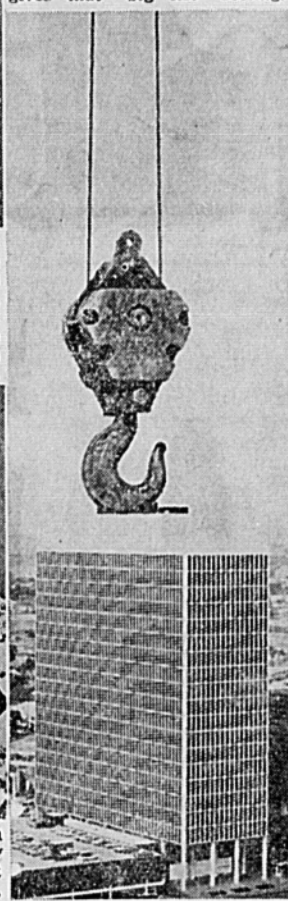

merged Gulf tract in Matagorda County. Second high was from Will Odom of Austin -- \$1,066,000 for another Gulf sub-merged tract in Kenedy County.

**GOVERNOR'S PROGRAM INTRODUCED** — Most of the governor's program already has been introduced in some form in one or both houses.

Bills or constitutional amend-

ments filed would:

- Set up an 18-man coordinating board over the state system of higher education;
- Repeal state property and poll taxes;
- Establish a State Department of Mental Health;
- Tighten driver license laws;
- Provide four-year terms for state officials;
- Combine the Migrant Labor Council with Texas Good Neighbor Council;
- Insure equal rights for women;
- Establish a \$10,000,000 college building fund;
- Set up a college student loan fund;
- Create a Fine Arts Commission;
- Revise the Texas election code; and
- Free the Texas Water Commission for water rights administration and make Texas Water

Development Board responsible for all water planning, financing and development activities.

**BUILDING HIGHEST** — Building shattered all records during 1964. Total permits issued in the state came to \$1,600,000,000 or seven per cent more over 1963, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Bulk of the increase came from a 25 per cent in non-residential buildings, principally industrial structures which were up a sensational 92 per cent. Home building authorizations dropped three per cent, while permits for alterations and repairs were up two per cent.

Non-metropolitan areas led the construction surge with a 30 per cent gain over the previous year. Metropolitan areas gained only three per cent.

The city with the biggest gain was Longview. Other big gains were shown in San Angelo, Lubbock, Tyler, Fort Worth, Odessa and Irving.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Bill authorizing the State Railroad Commission to order pooling of separately-owned oil and gas interests in standard proration units has cleared the Senate Oil and Gas Committee.

A four-system geographic grouping of colleges, rivaling a three-system setup proposed by Governor Connally, is called for in a bill by Sens. Dorsey Hardeeman of San Angelo and H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock.

Continuation of the Veterans' Land Program was another \$200,000,000 bond program is proposed in constitutional amendments introduced in both the House and Senate.

Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur is author of a bill to establish a Texas mediation service for voluntary settlement of intrastate industrial labor disputes.

Updating of workmen's compensation law is proposed in a bill by Rep. David G. Haines of Bryan.

Fewer Texans are driving over 70 m.p.h. these days than did in late 1963, according to a Texas Highway Department radar check.

Package store operators are making a second try to get an 8 p. m. closing time for liquor stores because 8 to 10 p. m. is when the majority of holdups occur, they claim.

Parks & Wildlife Department reports that 1964's record number of hunters had only 10 fatalities, a decrease of eight from 1963.

Continued storm activity in the Plains area and in the north-central part of the state contributed to a 4.0 per cent

statewide average increase in fire and allied insurance last year, according to the Board of Insurance.

Mrs. Elbert Crawford has been having some teeth pulled, and she has had the flu, but was able to start back to work Monday.

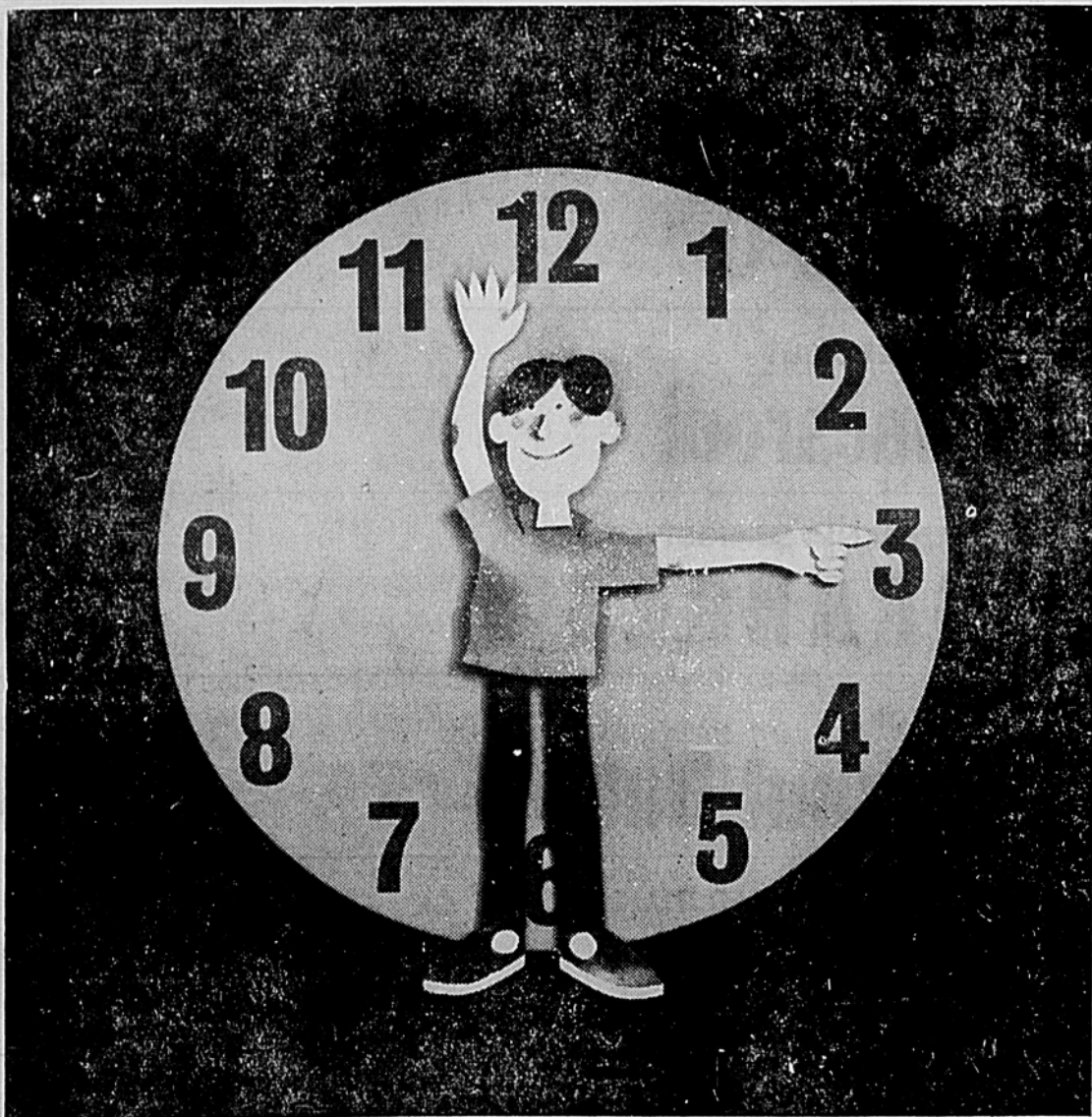

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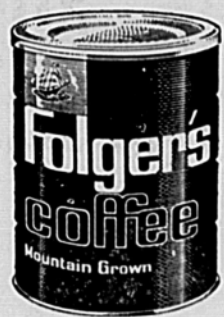
