BAIRD ALIVE WITH SCOUTS

Weslth Lying Deep Buried In Callahan's Bosom

During the past thirty days Baird has been alive with oil scouts representing all the major oil companies. Leasing has been at a high tension. RED CROSS YEAR A RELIEF RECORD

Huge Relief Work After Midwest Tornado the Greatest in American Annals.

DISASTERS DROP IN 1925

Ranged From Fire to Earthquake and Covered Wide Area at Home and Abroad.

Virtual completion of the largest peace-time project of post-disaster rehabilitation ever known has been ac complished by the American Red Cross in less than a year, as a part of its relief work in the more than 90 disasters in which it served in the past year.

This great program was undertaken following the tornado which struck five mid-western States last spring killing 796 people, injuring 2,239 more and causing inestimable property loss. It left a huge area of devastation in its wake, presenting a real problem. The Red Cross, however, went to work on the heels of the storm, caring for the injured, sheltering and feeding whole communities, and helping every individual sufferer from the destruction back to normal.

The magnitude of the problem is in-

dicated by comparison of its huge cas ualty list with that of the entire preceding year, whose combined losses were 735 dead and not quite 2,000 injured, as a result of the record num-ber of 192 catastrophies.

The story of the Red Cross service in the past year, recounted by the re port, ranges from fires heading the list of destructive forces with 29 disasters, mine explosions, tornadoes, ty phoons, floods and earthquakes.

The Santa Barbara earthquake was among the outstanding events record ed in the report. The Red Cross had completed its relief organization on the scene within a few hours of the disaster, and in addition had launched a program designed to permanently restore every person affected by it, to his former status once more.

The Red Cross service in the period following the wreck of the Navy air-"Shenandoah" was typical of its promptness and effectiveness. Serv ice in this instance was afforded by Red Cross chapters in the vicinity of the wreck, and by representatives of the national organization. It demonstrates graphically the value of each of the more than 3,000 chapters of the society which are at work in vir-tually every part of the country, in the facility they afford the national organization in emergencies.

There were 61 domestic disaster operations reported in which the Red Cross rendered service either through chapter or national staff personnel during the year. In 34 of these the national organization appropriated a total of \$3,047,256.49, the greater portion of which was received as direct contributions for the relief of specifled disasters. The relief operations following the northern Ohio tornado of June, 1924, were brought to a close in May, 1925, after an arrangement had been made with the Lorain chapter to provide expert services to the families of any tornado sufferers who required such assistance in the next two years. In this single disaster the relief work, as finally accouranced a total of \$1,019,751.23.

The mid-western tornado of this year, covering a strip of territory 400 miles long involved an expenditure up to June 30 of \$774,000, while the total amount turned in to the fund through the agency of the Red Cross was \$2.845,000. In addition to this sum specifically collected for the pur pose, the Red Cross had expended

from its regular reserves \$124,000. In all these disasters, Red Cross workers have been impressed by the spirit of determination and hopefulness shown by the people. Once they recovered from their grief and bewilderment, they began at once to rebuild, materially and otherwise, and always on a better scale where poss: ble. Another significant feature of these occurrences, as noted in the report of the Red Cross, was the promptness with which the local chapters organized emergency relief before help could be received from outside sources. A direct effect of their example has been to stimulate disaster relief preparedness among chapters all over the country.

The services of the American Red Cross are performed invariably in the name of the American people. On the effectiveness of this representation during the past year, it will launch the ninth annual roll call this year on November 11, to continue until Thanksgiving, November 26, during which support through membership will be invited for 1926.

CREEK INDIANS USED NO JAILS

Lash and Gun Constituted Only Penalties.

Okmulgee, Okla .- The ancient whipping tree and the old capitol of a vanished Indian nation still are doing service in this city.

In the heart of Okmulgee stands the council house of the Creek nation. erected in 1878. The Young Men's Christian association and the chamber of commerce have their headquarters in the building, and a bus line uses one corner for an office.

The building and its grounds occupy a block in the center of the business district. Among the numerous trees on the grounds are two where the executions and the legal whippings took

The Creeks had no jails. They had only two methods of punishment—whipping and shooting. The punishment for robbery, for instance, was 50 lashes for the first offense, 100 fashes for the second, and death for the third. In cases of execution, the condemned Indian was tied to the tree and shot.

Damage sults were settled in cash, work or 50 lashes on the bare back. The council house is a two-story

building of native sandstone. On the first floor were the departments of government; on the second, the legis lative halls.

The Creeks were one of the five civilized tribes moved by the government from the southeastern part of the United States to this territory about 1830.

They established here a complete system of government, similar to the American republic, but with much simpler forms.

Their legislature was composed of the "house of kings" (senate) and the "house of warriors." The head of the state was the principal chief, elected for four years by a majority vote of the males of the nation. His assistant was the second chief elected in the

same manner. There was a high court and a district court, each district having a prosecuting attorney, a judge and a company of light horsemen, who were in

the nature of mounted police. The council house belongs to the city of Okmulgee. Efforts are now being made among the remaining Indians to move the building to a national Indian park planned near here.

TEN CITIES CONTINUE VISITING TEACHERS

Demonstration Aids in Wiping Out Delinquency.

New York.—Ten cities in which three-year demonstrations of visiting teacher work have been completed under the auspices of the commonwealth fund program for the prevention of delinquency have determined to continue the use of visiting teachers as a regular feature of their public school systems.

According to Howard W. Nudd, director of the Public Educational association of New York city and chairman of the national committee on visiting teachers which has administered these demonstrations, the communities thus convinced of the value of the visiting teacher and planning to continue her services include Burlington, Vt., Lincoin, Neb.; Richmond, Va.; Red Bank, N. J.; Kalamazoo, Mich.; Sioux City, Iowa; Bluefield, W. Va.; Sioux Falts, S. D.; Warren, Ohio, and Hutchinson, Kan.

Meanwhile, demonstrations are being continued by the national committee on visiting teachers in the following communities: Berkeley, Cal.; Birmingham, Ala.; Boone county, Missouri; Butte, Mont.; Charlotte, N. C.; Chisholm, Minn.; Coatesville, Pa.; Columbus, Ga.; Detroit, Mich.; Durham, N. C.; Eugene, Ore.; Huron ounty, Ohio; Omaha, Neb.; Pocatello, Idaho; Racine, Wis.; Rochester, Pa.; Rock Springs, Wyo.; San Diego, Cal.; Tueson, Ariz.; Tulsa, Okla.

Appointed by Committee.

When the work is finished in these cities the thirty visiting teacher demenstrations under the commonwealth fund program will have been com-pleted. Under the arrangements made for these demonstrations the visiting teachers were appointed by the national committee on visiting teachers subject to the approval of the local authorities; in each case the national committee pays two-thirds of the salary for a three-year period and provides funds for certain additional expenses, while the remainder of the sal ary is paid by the local school board everal hundred cities have made ap olication for demonstrations under this olan, but the thirty communities procided for in the original grant from the commonwealth fund having been chosen, no further applications are now being considered.

Including the visiting teachers appointed by the national committee for these demonstrations there are now altogether 186 visiting teachers in the United States working in 64 cities and 6 counties scattered through 34 states. These figures are given by Mr. Nudd in a chapter on the history, purpose and scope of the visiting-teacher movement, which he contributes to "The Problem Child in School," a volume of visiting teacher case narratives by Mary B. Sayles, just published by the Joint Committee on Methods of Preventing Delinquency, Inc., of 50 East Forty-second street, New York city.

Describing the visiting teacher as a pecialist in the schools who devote erself to the problems of unadjusted children, Mr. Nudd, in the article above referred to, points that "every teacher every social worker, and many a parent is familiar with the proble alld-the boy or girl whose school progress or whose reactions to norma requirements point toward later ineffi dency, delinquency, or some other failure in personal or social adjustment What is the trouble with such children, and what can be done for them? can the school obtain and utilize a knowledge of the forces that are affectng their success, and give them in illest measure the benefits of their ests at home, in school, or elsewhere, heir personal welfare and the welfare of society require painstaking effort in their behalf. They present at once he most baffling, the most urgent and he most interesting problems in the eld of education."

Finds Needs of Children.

Describing the methods of the visitng teacher in meeting these problems. which are both educational and social n nature, Mr. Nudd points out that this relatively new specialist, trained ooth as a teacher and social worker, is specifically equipped not only to find out why things are not going right in the lives of these children but also to take back to the class teacher, the parent or the social agency which may help, the essential information needed to meet their individual limitations. As a result of the new facts she discovers the school is enabled to see what the actual situation is and to become aware of the real need of the child. It can often modify requirements to meet the newly seen limitations by changing the class, transferring the child to a special school, shifting emphasis from one phase of school work to another, adopting a new approach to the child or connecting his school work more closely with his outside interests.



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


