Scranton Plans Reunion Sunday

An all-day program has been planned for the Scranton Reunion Sunday, June 14.

The program will include a worship service, outdoor picnic, entertainment and speeches. More than 350 persons attended the reunion last year.

The reunion gets underway at 9:15 Sunday morning with registration in the Scranton gym. Church services will be held in the gym at 10:45 a. m. with Dr. Hugh E. Bradshaw of West Monroe, La., former Scranton resident, as speaker.

All ex-students who have become ministers, or any former Scranton pastor, are invited to be on the platform for the morning service.

A luncheon and visitation period is scheduled from 12 to 2 p. m. Sunday afternoon. Each person will furnish his own basket lunch. Bill Ledbetter, a Scranton High School ex-student and now athletic director at Hardin-Simmons University, will serve as master of ceremonies for the afternoon session.

Music will be furnished by Dr. C. E. Adams and the Three Blind Mice. A short business session will conclude the reunion.

Veteran Teacher To Be Honored

The man who had an integral part in the growth and culture of Scranton and the community surrounding it will be honored at the annual Scranton Reunion Sunday, June 14.

He is John H. Shrader, a veteran of 46 years of teaching in the area. He is now retired but keeps a keen interest in the community which he helped develop.

Close to 500 former residents and their families of the Scranton area are expected to attend the day-long activities Sunday and help dedicate the reunion to Shrader who now lives on a farm 2 1/2 miles west of the community.

Shrader began his teaching profession without college benefits, but he later received his chance to study and in 1953, 45 years after he became a teacher, he graduated from McMurry College. He had done earlier college work at Daniel Baker College in Brownwood.

Shrader's first school teaching job was at Cedar Creek school in Stephens County, with the authority of a second grade teacher's certificate secured by examination. Following that he taught at Cedar Grove in Callahan County and later he attended Scranton Academy, graduating in 1911 with a class of 13.

He remained at the academy the next year to teach the fifth grade and after a year of study at Daniel Baker, Shrader taught at Eagle Cove, Clyde, Plainview school, now Lenora in Martin County, and at Cottonwood. He returned to Scranton to teach and later followed that with a job at Atwell.

In 1944 he resigned as superintendent at Scranton and came to Baird where he was elementary school principal for 11 years. The retirement rule forced him to resign at Baird, and he went over to Putnam to teach for two years before retiring to his farm. He served as a trustee at Scranton during his farming years and had a part in the consolidation of the district and continuation of the high school.

Shrader married Ila Ray, a Scranton Academy classmate, in 1911. The couple had six children, five of whom were graduated from Scranton High School and the other from Baird.

ASC News Letter

Measurement for Cotton and Peanut Acreage

This past week crop reporters began the measurement of cotton and peanuts. This year all the measurements made by this office must be accomplished by the use of a steel tape. It will be greatly appreciated if the farm operator will assist the reporter in the measurement of their planted acreage of these crops.

Cards were mailed to all known cotton and peanut producers the first week in June asking for information in regard to crops planted or not planted. You are

requested to read the instructions on the card that you received and fill in the required answers. Please give this your prompt attention and return the card to this office immediately.

1959 Wheat Marketing Cards

All eligible producers were mailed wheat marketing cards on June 1, 1959. For those who did not receive a marketing card, a letter of explanation was mailed stating the reason why such card could not be issued at this time. This marketing card must be signed by the producer on the line indicated and be presented to the wheat buyer at the time you deliver your first load of wheat.

ACP Funds

This is to inform all farm operators in Callahan County that our ACP funds are exhausted at this time. Pending the receipt of an additional allocation, the county committee cannot approve a request for government cost share for carrying out a practice.

It is expected that a limited amount of funds will be received about the first of September and when an additional allocation of ACP funds is received all producers will be notified. Our yearly allocation of ACP funds are received on a yearly basis and will be available for use on January 1, 1960.

Report On Release Of Cotton And Peanut Acreage

The County Committee would like to take this opportunity to express their appreciation to the generous response by the cotton and peanut farmers in releasing acreage they did not intend to plant. By receiving this release acreage, the committee was able to give every farmer an increase in his allotment, provided a request was received for additional acreage by the closing date.

For those receiving additional acreage, you are requested to plant all of your allotment for the protection of our county allotment. In other words, all released acreage received must be planted for the county to receive history credit. A total of 1313.7 acres of cotton and 367.3 acres of peanuts were reassigned to other farmers in this county.

About Your Health . .

There is a brand new wrinkle in the mosquito killing business.

Early reports suggest that the pesky household critters can be done in without the fuss and bother -- or health hazard -- of old-fashioned flit guns or mist bombs.

The new method has been described in the May issue of Public Health Reports, the monthly journal of the U. S. Public Health Service. It consists simply by putting a bag of insecticide in the room during the mosquito season. It was discovered like this:

Scientists at the Communicable Disease Center laboratory in Savannah, Ga., left work one afternoon. Inside the large lab room when they left was an unopened bag of insecticide.

Also in the room were some adult mosquitoes in which the scientists had been conducting tests and experiments, as part of the constant international struggle against malaria and

other forms of mosquito-borne disease.

When the scientists reported for work next morning, most of the mosquitoes were dead. Immediately they suspected that the sealed bag of insecticide -- or rather the fumes from it -- were responsible for killing the mosquitoes.

In days following they confirmed their theory. They found that the fumes killed the mosquitoes even when the insecticide was enclosed in a paper bag with a polyethylene liner. Subsequent work showed the method worked even in well ventilated rooms.

The most effective chemicals tested were malathion and DDT used in combination or separately. Both have been widely used against mosquitoes in recent years.

More study will be required and specific techniques will have to be worked out before the method can be generally used, investigators say.

But once the technique has been perfected and proved safe, it may greatly simplify control of mosquitoes. Meanwhile, you'll have to go along with old methods if you're interested in a summer relatively free of mosquito infestation.

Despite being more costly and difficult, old methods do work. They consist of spraying inside

the house with aerosol bombs, and keeping your yard free of tin cans, old tires, grass cuttings and anything else that can breed or harbor mosquitoes.

Texas Traffic Deaths Show "Upswing"

The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety warned a "definite upward trend" in Texas traffic deaths has been established this year even before the heavy summer-holiday travel season.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. said unless something happens to change the trend, it could mean that an all-time record of traffic deaths could be in the making for 1959.

He said the death trend appears to be leveling off at about 10 per cent above 1958, when 2,342 traffic victims were counted, and pointed out this could mean 233 additional deaths this year if the pace is maintained.

"With travel up an estimated three per cent this year, and with the Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays yet to come, this could mean we're driving for an all-time high in motoricides on the streets and highway of Texas," Garrison said.

Garrison reported that as of Friday noon, May 29, at least 833 persons were killed in traffic, compared with 753 during the same period of 1958 — an increase of 11 per cent.

"This means 80 more lives were lost in traffic violence," he said. "We appeal to every driver to observe these cold, hard statistics and realize those summer trips are potentially more dangerous this year than last."


"We also must realize it is extremely likely that one of the biggest killers on the long, hot summer road is fatigue — an insidious demon that can attack even those of us who observe all the other known safe-driving practices.

"Our statistics cannot reflect how many traffic deaths are caused by fatigue, only that the death car was on the wrong side of the road, ran off the road, or rammied into a slower-moving vehicle. They cannot tell us that the driver was asleep, or nodded at the wrong split-second.

"Don't let your vacation enthusiasm cause you to drive when you should be resting. Don't push yourself to make up for lost time. Don't get caught napping at the wheel."
