A bus load of church youth from the Foursquare Gospel Chruch in Santa Fe were stranded in Muleshoe. Sheriff Clements and the city police put the people in the basement of the jail. They took spare matresses from the jail and improvised beds for the 25 persons on the bus. Another nine people joined the church group as they became stranded motorists after no rooms were available in

It was reported that people in the entire area were stranded in cotton gins, elevators, churches, schools, post offices and all facilities large enough to be utilized.

Officers were hampered attempting to travel the streets and highways by ice and snow. There were no major accidents reported in the immediate area and no injuries from the several small accidents which were directly weather-related.

Roads are all open in the Needmore-Circleback area and one-half inch of snow was reported, no drifting there. At Lazbuddie, Foster Fertilizer reported eight foot drifts, with numerous people stranded. In the West Camp area, although the roads were open, two to three inches of snow with two foot drifts were reported.

The Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge south of Muleshoe reported one and one half inches of snow with no drifts.



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


