Three Muleshoe residents, who had filed a suit against the Bailey County Commissioners Court on December 30, 1969, requesting redistricting of the four county precincts, filed a Motion for Dismissal of the suit on March 23.

The action filed by Lee Pool, Ed Edmiston and D. O. Kinard asked that the suit be dismissed "... since the Commissioners Court has taken the action as above (redistricting) set out, which said redistricting having been effective as of January 19, 1970, that there no longer remains any legal controversy between the parties at this time..."

On Wednesday, March 25, District Judge Pat Boone Jr. of Littlefield officially signed a motion dismissing the suit. District Court Clerk Nelda Merriott received the Order of Dismissal in her office Friday morning and filed it of record.

Pool, along with his attorney, John McFall of Lubbock, met with the Bailey County Commissioners at their regular meeting on December 8 and requested the redistricting at that time. He said the population in the commissioners precincts was unequal in violation of the 'one-man, one-vote' Supreme Court decision.

Attorney McFall told the commissioners during the meeting in December that the 1968 voter registration showed 2,672 voters registered in Precinct One; 280 in Precinct Two; 301 in Precinct Three and 374 registered voters in Precinct Four. He said at the time this comprised 3,627 registered voters in the county and results in 73.69 percent of the registered voters being in Precinct One; 7.71 percent in Precinct Two; 8.29 in Precinct Three and 10.31 percent in Precinct Four.

## Bailey County Census Takers Take Training

Census takers who will visit every dwelling unit in the area during the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, which starts April 1, will be trained on March 30 and 31, District Manager R.L. Butler announced today.

The training sessions will be conducted by crew leaders. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count. Classroom training will cover the proper manner of asking questions, use of the census questionnaire, census definitions, and map reading.

Map reading is an important census-taking technique, since, without maps defining the limits of each enumeration district to which a census taker is assigned, Cont. on Page 2, Col. 6

## County Court Fines Two In DWI Cases

On pleas of guilty, two persons have been assigned fines plus costs and jail sentences in court this week.

One person was fined \$150 and received a 30 day jail sentence, which was probated for a year and the other was fined \$100 plus costs and sentenced to three days in jail.

A plea of not guilty was heard in a liquor law violation and County Judge Don Cihak released the person on bond.

County Attorney Roger Gorrell said nine check cases are pending in county court with two of those filed on facing six separate charges. He said the trend shows fewer check violations and attributes it to more cautious merchants.

the time that it was projected that the existing county population is approximately 10,000 people. Therefore, he commented, to comply with the 'one-man, one-vote' Supreme Court decision, a precinct division, with approximately 2,500 population in each voting precinct, would be necessary.

A suit was filed in the District Court on December 30, to have the county voting precincts redistricted. Plaintiffs were Lee Pool, D. O. Kinard and

Ed Edmiston. Named defendants were Don W. Cihak, Matt Dudley, Lloyd Stephens, W. H. Eubanks and R. P. McCall.

Following several special sessions the Bailey County Commissioners Court officially adopted revised plats of Bailey County voting precincts on January 19, 1970. Matt Dudley, Commissioner of Precinct One, made the motion to accept the proposed redistricting plat and it was seconded by R. P. McCall, Commissioner of Precinct Four. County Judge Don Cihak reported all commissioners present voted unanimously to pass the motion. He also reported that Precinct Three Commissioner, W. H. Eubanks was not present for the meeting.

Bailey County Commissioners and the Bailey County Democratic Executive Committee are presently working out voting boundary lines within the new precincts.

southwest of Muleshoe. A welding truck from Clovis had overturned.

Three persons were taken to West Plains Memorial Hospital where one was admitted to the hospital with a back injury and the other two were treated and released.

Ted Hamlett of Clovis owned the truck. The accident allegedly occurred when the driver lost control of the vehicle on a county road and shifted the weight to the left side of the truck. Deputy Pe-tree said the shifting weight caused the left front tire to blow out and the truck overturned.

Extensive damage was sustained by the truck.

In the third accident, a truck blew a left front tire a short time later and almost due north of the other truck turnover. The driver could not control the truck, which was owned by Johnny Vaughn of Muleshoe. He overturned in the edge of a plowed field after leaving the roadway. No injuries were reported from that accident.

Muleshoe's new traffic investigators from the Bailey County Sheriff's office expressed the hope that the brief

flurry of accidents was over until the regular highway patrolmen return from their 'rock festival' duties.

A bus load of church youth from the Foursquare Gospel Church in Santa Fe were stranded in Muleshoe. Sheriff Clements and the city police put the people in the basement of the jail. They took spare mattresses from the jail and improvised beds for the 25 persons on the bus. Another nine people joined the church group as they became stranded motorists after no rooms were available in town.

It was reported that people in the entire area were stranded in cotton gins, elevators, churches, schools, post offices and all facilities large enough to be utilized.

Officers were hampered attempting to travel the streets and highways by ice and snow. There were no major accidents reported in the immediate area and no injuries from the several small accidents which were directly weather-related.

Roads are all open in the Needmore-Circleback area and one-half inch of snow was reported, no drifting there. At Lazbuddie, Foster Fertilizer reported eight foot drifts, with numerous people stranded. In the West Camp area, although the roads were open, two to three inches of snow with two foot drifts were reported.

The Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge south of Muleshoe reported one and one half inches of snow with no drifts.

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## Judge Nowlin Has Busy Month In March

Justice of the Peace and City Corporation Judge Morris Nowlin has found March to be a fairly busy month in his office. Winter weather failed to lessen the number of tickets issued and other violations filed in both courts.

**JUSTICE OF PEACE COURT**  
Speeding, as per usual, led the list of traffic violations filed in court, with 40 speeding cases being filed. Tickets for having no drivers' license increased with fourteen cases being filed for March; seven persons ran into difficulty when warrants were issued for failing to appear and answer citations; six truckers found themselves in violation of the over gross weight law; five were stopped for running stop signs; four were nabbed for failing to drive in a single lane on the highway; three were filed on for each of the following violations, driving wrong way on a divided highway, no Texas registration and loitering near a school; two persons were charged with minor in possession of liquor and one violation for each of the following; violation of driver's license restriction; improper left turn, driving at an un-

safe speed; defective taillights, crossing a physical barrier, no RRC authority, illegal entry to country, drinking underage and disturbance and drunk.

**CITY CORPORATION COURT**  
NO DRIVER's license led the list of violations in city court with eight; six minors were filed on for possession of liquor; four were faced with drunk charges; three persons were filed on for impeding traffic; and two violations were noted for each of the following violations - speeding, driving at an unsafe speed and drinking after hours; one violation was on the book for each of the following; running red light; failure to yield right of way; illegal turn; defective headlight; unsafe driving; drunk in public; indecent exposure; failure to control vehicle; loud muffler; abusive language; disturbing the peace; running stop sign; failure to remove junk vehicles in accordance with city ordinance and failure to use due caution in driving motor vehicle.

The violations represent 96 filed in justice court and 44 filed in city court. This is a fairly normal case load for either of the two courts.

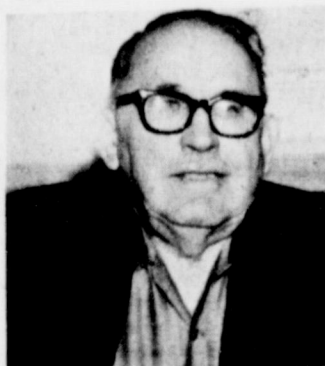
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### Art News

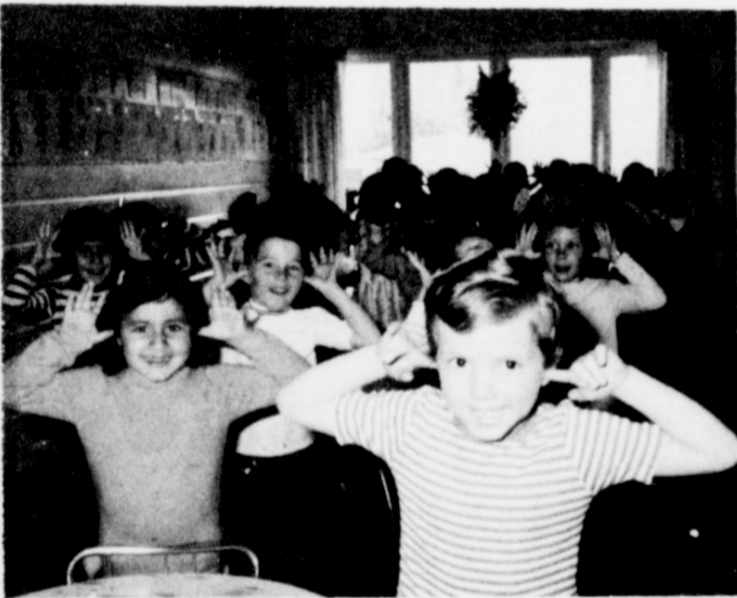
