





## Important Uses for DDT Caven by New **County Farm Agent**

Dichlorodiphenyl-trichloroethane commonly known as DDT) can be used successfully to control horn flies on cattle, according to Joe E. Burkett, county agent. As a spray use one-half (½) gallon of .2 per cent DDT per mature animal. Water should be used to dilute the DDT before spraying livestock, Mr. Burkett savs. You should spray the back of Wheat Crop Has Been Combined; Total each animal thoroughly late in the afternoon for best results. The first treatment should last about two weeks, second about Yield to Be More Than 500,000 Bushels hree weeks and the third about four weeks. A .2 per cent DDT mixture can be made by using 3 1-3 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder to 100 gallons of water. A group of feeder steers in the feed lot treated for horn fly con-trol gained 30 pounds more per animal than an untreated group during the same feeding period, which was about 60 days.


## May 31 Last Day to Make Application for Dairy Payment

All producers who have not made application are requested to call at the local AAA office to do so on or before May 31, 1946.
