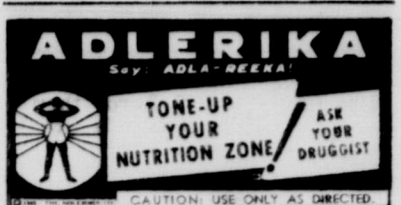

What We Think (By Frank Olson)

The present state of economic affairs that pervades the country, in my opinion, demonstrates the futility of Congress as presently constituted in handling matters that pertain to our economic stability...

Congress has seen fit to pass laws that prevent monopoly on the part of capital. Numerous court actions are on record where corporations have been arbitrarily dissolved...

When it comes to the matter of labor legislation the pattern is no longer followed. A new code is set up—a code diametrically opposed to that established in previous corporations.

The Wagner Act, an obviously one-sided law, which has little or no regard for the public welfare, was passed under and by which one man can tie up the transportation industry of the country in the tightest monopoly that exists in America...

Just why it is a sin for capital to attempt to control the field and a virtue for John Lewis and his kind to automatically control their fields has never been made clear.

At the time this is written the coal mines are shut down and the railroads have ceased operating and economic paralysis is slowly possessing the nation.

The difficulty lies in the fact that the Congress has created step by step the bed in which it now finds itself lying. Haunted by the fear that they might lose votes and not be re-elected, members of Congress have sold out their bright light to labor leaders and puppets in a market show responding in the hidden hand that pulls the strings as they march through their set.

I propose as a remedy to the disgraceful situation a change in the national set-up. I would limit by law the President to one term of six years and I would limit by law the term of members of Congress to six years.

This it appears to me is the only solution. The possibility of long tenure in office by granting special privileges to special groups is a weakness in our Democratic form of government which its founders did not see.

HISTORY Independence Day—July 4 is the anniversary of the adoption of the American Declaration of Independence. The consideration of the document now known as the Declaration of Independence began in June, 1776, when a resolution was offered before the Continental Congress by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia. The substance of the resolution was that the Colonies should declare themselves free and independent states. Consideration of the resolution was postponed until the following day and all members were urged to be present. The resolution was debated for several days. On June 19 a resolution was submitted asking that consideration of the Lee resolution be postponed three weeks and asking that a committee be appointed to draft a new resolution along the same lines as the Lee resolution. On the following day a committee of five was appointed to draft the proposed resolution. The committee consisted of Thomas Jefferson, chairman; John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Elbert Loring. Seventeen days later on June 28, the committee submitted a draft of what has come to be known as the Declaration of Independence. On July 2, the Congress adopted the original Lee resolution. It then took up the resolution drafted by the committee and on July 4, adopted it. The first celebration of its adoption occurred in Philadelphia on July 4. General observance of the day by the Colonies was slow in coming. The first celebration did not take place until 1783, seven years after the adoption of the resolution. The observance of the day spread slowly. The custom gradually took form of a celebration consisting of a band concert, a speech and a day of carnival events. The day usually closed with a display of fireworks. The works and fire cracker heights in the early days resulted in many injuries and loss of life resulting from the explosion and the size of the display was limited. The day became a national event not unlike New Year's and beyond the closing places, little or no effort to observe it.

Washington News

By Congressman Ed Gossett, 13 District of Texas.

Washington, D. C., June 8.—We are the only nation of any consequence in the world that even pretends to be a democracy. Americans under democratic government and a system of free enterprise have attained the highest standards of living ever known. While only 7 per cent of the world's 2 billion people live in our country, we consume three-fourths of the world's silk, half the world's rubber, have half the world's telephones, one-third of the world's railroad mileage, one-third the world's improved highways, 60 per cent of the world's life insurance, 80 per cent of the world's automobiles, and most of the world's radios. The American worker eats twice as well as the British, three times as well as the German, four times as well as the Italian, and seven times as well as the Russian worker. In Russia there is one automobile for every 252 persons, in Italy one to each 93 persons, in Great Britain one to 22, France one to 18, and in America an automobile for every 4 persons. A per capita comparison of life insurance reveals the following: Italy \$36; France \$49; Germany \$117; Sweden \$254; Great Britain \$353; United States \$842. Still, we have many folks who would like to trade our democracy for the national socialism, or the communism, or the fascism of other countries. Through his coal strike in 1943 John L. Lewis secured an increase of \$1.50 per day for the miners. Through his recent strike he secured another raise of \$1.85 per day, plus a fund guaranteeing payment to miners or their survivors for loss of wages resulting from sickness, disability, retirement, or death, plus medical and health funds to be controlled by the unions, plus \$100 vacation allowance per year. The miner who works on a 5-day week will receive \$59.25, or \$63.50 for a 6-day week, or if he works 54 hours per week his pay will be \$75.25. The Pentagon building in Washington, occupied by the War Department, is the world's largest office building. It accommodates more than 30,000 employees. Those of us who have experienced difficulty in finding our way around the Pentagon were amused this week to learn that General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff, got lost in the building and called a guide to find his office. Among the gags about Pentagon promotions during the war is the one about the Western Union boy who went into the Pentagon to deliver a message and came out a Colonel. The nomination by the President of Treasury Secretary Fred M. Vinson of Kentucky to be Chief Justice of the Supreme Court has occasioned much backstage comment in Washington. It is hoped Mr. Vinson will devote all of his talents to the Court, and will not be used by the President as a behind the scenes advisor in political affairs. In recent years Presidents have fallen into the exceedingly bad habit of calling on Supreme Court Justices for a variety of services outside their judicial duties. Justice Jackson has been gone for a year as chief war crimes prosecutor in Germany. There are hundreds if not thousands of lawyers in America who could have done just as well with this job as Justice Jackson. Just this week the President has designated Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy to accompany the body of the late President of the Philippines, Manuel Quezon, to Manila. These extra-judicial errands of the Supreme Court Justices may in part be responsible for the ill repute into which the Court has fallen. The founding fathers provided in the Constitution for three departments of government, legislative, judicial, and executive. It provided that each department should be a check and balance on the others. The separation of these departments and their effective use as checks and balances

Method 2 is using controlled heat. Controlled heat can be used in any kind of climate or weather—day or night. It is faster and yields a better product as well as saves more food value.

Test For Dryness. When peaches are dry they are pliable and leathery and not sticky. They have a springy feel. Good Storage Is Most Essential.

ing. Have cans or jars and lids clean, hot and dry. Pack the hot fruit into hot containers and seal immediately. Self-seal lids are most satisfactory if jars are used.

Driving Habits of Motorists Need An Occasional Check-Up

Driving habits, like automotive equipment itself, may need an occasional check-up on the part of the motorist, it is suggested by Ed Hedner, director of service and mechanical department, Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors Corporation.

Motorists in the middle years age group in particular should review their driving pattern, established through perhaps two decades of car handling, he said, pointing to a statement by Detroit police that 40 per cent of the city's traffic accidents in April involved drivers between the ages of 30 and 49 years.

"While these figures represent a departure from the current trend to draw a lowering of the age group associated with highway accidents," Hedner said, "they point up a pertinent and timely reminder to the more mature motorist. Over confidence on the part of the experienced driver may lead to the formation of bad driving habits.

"Dangerous tendencies in driving habits of older, experienced motorists can lead to quite as fatal consequences as the so-called recklessness of inexperience, and only by striving for safety on all fronts can we reduce our highway accident record.

"Another factor in the safety picture, of course, is the matter of 'middle-aged' cars. Faulty brakes and steering equipment or worn-out tires can be the cause of accidents on the streets and highways as careless driving.

"With the present situation on new car deliveries so uncertain, every prewar car owner should have his vehicle checked periodically for mechanical defects that might lead to accidents.
