Conservation Program.

Picture on right is of a pasture that was chopped with a heavy roller chopper. The chopper controlled oak and also prepared a seedbed to seed K. R. bluestem. Native grasses are also recovering following the brush control. The once thick brush no longer shades out the needed sunlight, which grass needs to manufacture food in the leaves and stems, according to A. H. Ringhoffer. Range Conservation Service.

In addition to growing mo grass for livestosk, Rupert at Randall stated, "Controlling brush has also reduced the pro-blems in handling cattle at goats."

Almost all the brush on the Jackson ranch has been controlled over the last five year period. Where thick oak and mesquite once were, a good cover of nutritious, high producing, and very palatable grasses now exist. This cover on the entire ranch has reduced runoff of floodwater, which previously caused damages to the county roads, fences, and soil erosion on the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed.


