Townsend Wins New Radio

A new Philco transistor radio has been won by Tommy Townsend, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Townsend, in Ford Motor Company's "Safe Driving Incentive Program for Young Americans."

More than 3,200 young drivers across the country received awards in the program. Winners qualified for an award by driving without an accident or moving traffic violation from July 1 to September 30 of last year. They also answered a quiz on driving rules and practices, and wrote brief essays on personal program for safe driving.

"It was gratifying to learn that so many young Americans share our concern for traffic safety," Henry Ford II, company chairman of the board, said.

The company awarded 15 Mercury Caliente hardtops, 15 Mustang hardtops, 200 Philco portable stereo phonographs and 3,000 Philco transistor radios in the competition. Under a similar program, another 10 cars, 30 phonographs and 200 radios were awarded to members of families who work for Ford, its subsidiaries, dealers and advertising agencies.

Ford announced the program early last summer for licensed drivers who would not have reached their 25th birthdays by September 30. It was prompted by the fact that young people in the 15 to 24 year age group have a disproportionate number of motor vehicle accidents.

Winners were selected by an independent judging company after a panel of driver training entries.

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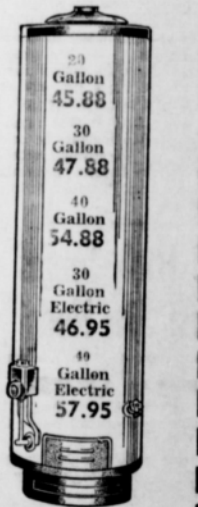

Brush Control and Range Seeding On Jackson Brothers Ranch

Picture on left is of a pasture that was rootplowed to control mesquite. Sideoats grama and K. R. bluestem were then seeded following a heavy roller chopper, which firmed the soil and prepared a favorable seedbed.

Picture on right is of a pasture that was chopped with a heavy roller chopper. The chopper controlled oak and also prepared a seedbed to seed K. R. bluestem. Native grasses are also recovering following the brush control. The once thick brush no longer shades out the needed sunlight, which grass needs to manufacture food in the leaves and stems, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

In addition to growing more grass for livestock, Rupert and Randall stated, "Controlling brush has also reduced the problems in handling cattle and goats."

Almost all the brush on the Jackson ranch has been controlled over the last five year period. Where thick oak and mesquite once were, a good cover of nutritious, high producing, and very palatable grasses now exist. This cover on the entire ranch has reduced runoff of floodwater, which previously caused damages to the county roads, fences, and soil erosion on the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed.

The above methods of brush control and range seeding were done in April, 1966. These prac-

tices are a part of the Jackson's conservation ranch plan, which is being carried out with assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

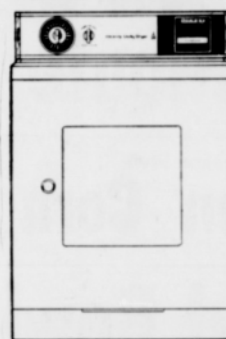

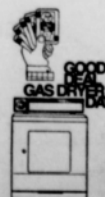
